WE, the undersigned, landholders and inhabitants of the District of Liverpool, respectfully approach Your Excellency on the important occasion of your arrival here this day, to testify our unabated attachment to you as the representative of our most gracious Sovereign, and of our personal esteem and respect for Your Excellency.

“ We should be wanting in gratitude were we to omit the expression of our obligations to Your Excellency for the highly important benefits this District and the surrounding Country, must receive by the erection of that splendid structure Lansdowne Bridge, founded, completed, and now opened to the public under Your Excellency’s direction.

Fully sensible of the interest you have at all times taken in the advancement of the Colony, and the advantages this Township and District will derive from the improvement contemplated, and now in progress, for the welfare and comfort of its inhabitants, we have the honor to remain, with great respect and sincere good wishes for the health and happiness of Your Excellency, your most obedient servants.”

(Here follow the Signatures.)

The following was His Excellency’s reply :—

“ I receive with much satisfaction the assurance of unabated loyalty to our gracious Sovereign, and the kind expression of attachment to his representative, contained in the address from the landholders and inhabitants of the District of Liverpool. The gratification it affords is much enhanced by the occasion of its presentation. I participate fully in the opinion expressed in the address, that this may be considered an important day in the history of Australia. It exhibits in a work of art, of no mean value, the great resources of a Colony which but eight and forty years ago, was a waste wilderness. Whether the materials or the workmanship be examined, or the varied productions of this soil and

climate which have been just now taken across it, the structure which has this day been appropriated to the public service, cannot fail to be regarded with interest and pleasure. It proves that means exist, and can be called into operation, for extending the inland commerce, and securing a safe and easy communication between distant parts of this vast Country; and judging from what has been accomplished in less than half a century, under circumstances of greater difficulty than are likely to occur again, the inhabitants may anticipate the advancement of this their native or adopted Country, with a rapidity unknown to other lands. Upon the unrivalled prosperity of the Colony I beg leave to offer my sincere congratulations, and to assure them that no effort of this Government will be wanting to promote the welfare and happiness of all His Majesty’s subjects in Australia.”

GRANTS OF LAND.

THE following descriptions of GRANTS OF LAND with the names of the Persons to whom they were respectively promised, are published for general information, in order that all parties concerned may have an opportunity of correcting any errors or omissions which may have been made inadvertently. And notice is hereby given, that at the end of Three Months from this date, unless written caveats be previously lodged at this Office, Deeds of Grant will be prepared accordingly.

It is requested that all Christian and Surnames may be communicated to this Office at full length, together with the intended name of the property, and the present residence of the party.

BRISBANE AND DURHAM.

1. THOMAS POTTER MACQUEEN, 20,000, Twenty thousand acres, being two 10,000 acres, parishes of Macqueen, Russell, and parish unnamed; bounded on the north by a line west 184 chains, commencing on Page’s River; on the west by a line south 600 chains; on the south by a line east 45 chains 50 links to Hunter’s River; again on

the west by that river 80 chains to the section line ; again on the south by the section line east 450 chains ; on the east by a line north 280 chains ; again on the north by a line west 290 chains to Page's River ; and again on the east by that river to the eastern extreme of the first mentioned northern boundary.

Promised on 30th April, 1825, in pursuance of instructions from Secretary of State.

Quit-rent one peppercorn per annum.

WILLIAM WILSON, 200, Two hundred acres, parish unnamed, *district of Illawarra* ; bounded on the west by a line bearing north 40 chains, commencing at the north-west corner of John Anderson's farm ; on the north by a line bearing east to the Sea Coast ; and on the east by the Sea Coast to John Anderson's farm ; and on the south by John Anderson's farm.

Promised by Sir Thomas Brisbane to Connor Bolan or Boland, 60 acres on 30th June, 1824, and 140 acres on 7th April, 1825, and being the land advertised on the 23rd October, 1832, in favor of the original donee, but now at his request re-advertised for Mr. Wilson.

4. MORGAN PRICE, 1200, Twelve hundred acres, parish unnamed, *near Bong Bong* ; bounded on the north by the grant of J. G. Colyer, east 90 chains ; on the east by a line south 115 chains ; on the south by a line west 160 chains ; and on the west by part of Knight, Price, and Throsby's lands, bearing north 20 degrees east 16 chains ; east 20 degrees south 25 chains ; north 20 degrees east 40 chains ; west 30 degrees north 15 chains ; north 64 degrees east 62 chains ; and north 26 degrees west 39 chains.

Promised by Sir Thomas Brisbane, on 18th October, 1824.

Quit-rent £9 sterling per annum, commencing 1st January, 1831.

5. GREGORY BLAXLAND, 1280, Twelve hundred and eighty acres, parish unnamed, at *Illawarra*, commencing at the north-east corner of Ryan's land ; and bounded on the east by Spearing's land, by a line bearing north 130 chains ; on the north by a line bearing west 90 chains ; on the west by a line bearing south 165 chains ; and on the south by part of Jemima Jenkins' land, and by the lands of Clark, Darragh, and Ryan, being lines bearing east 30 chains ; north 25 chains ; east 24 chains ; north 32 chains ; east 16 chains ; south 21 chains ; and east 20 chains, to the north-east corner of Ryan's land aforesaid.

Promised by General Darling, on 5th March,

and possession authorised on 25th June, 1830, as an additional grant.

JOSHUA THORP, 50, Fifty acres, parish of Saint George, commencing at the north-west corner of Arthur Martin's 100 acres, and bounded on the east by that farm by a line south 30 degrees east 27 chains to a creek ; on the south by J. ROADS.

WITH reference to the Government Notice dated 2 September, 1835, relative to the opening and making a certain Parish Road in the County of Northumberland, between the TOWNS OF MAITLAND AND PATERSON, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN in conformity to the Act of Council, 4, Wm., IV, No. 11, intituled, "An Act for making, altering, and improving the Roads throughout the Colony of New South Wales, and for opening and improving the Streets in the Towns thereof." That after due consideration of all objections to the proposed line of Road which have been transmitted in pursuance to the said Notice, and in conformity to the said Act, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to confirm the same, and it is therefore hereby declared expedient to open and make the said Road according to the Map or Plan to be seen at the Office of the Surveyor General, and all persons intending to claim compensation in respect of the said line, are hereby reminded that notice must be served upon the Colonial Secretary within forty days from the date hereof, in such manner and form as provided by the sixth, and thirty-second sections of the Act above referred to, or they will be for ever foreclosed from such claim.

QUALITIES OF THE SUPPLIES.
