CROWN LANDS.

JURSUANT to the Act of the Governor and Council passed in the present year of His Majesty's reign, intituled " An Act to restrain the unauthorised occupation of Crown Lands." His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs it to be notified, that from and after the first day of January next, any Person who shall be found occupying any Crown Lands within the limits of location fixed by the Government Order of the 14th October, 1829, either by residing, or by erecting any tent, but, or building thereon, or by clearing, enclosing, or cultivating any part thereof, without holding a lease under the Regulations of the 1st August, 1831. And any Person who shall be found occupying any Crown Lands beyond the said limits of location, without holding a license for depasturing cattle and other animals under these Regulations, will be liable, upon the complaint of any Commissioner of Crown Lands, to the penalties imposed by the said Act: that is to say, for the first offence, any sum not exceeding Ten Pounds at the discretion of the Justice before whom the complaint is heard; for the second offence, Twenty Pounds; and for the third and any subsequent offence, Fifty Pounds: Provided always, that no information shall lie for any second or subsequent offence, until one month after a conviction for the former offence.

- 2. Leases of vacant Crown Lands within the limits for location established by the same Government Order of the 14th October, 1829, will continue to be given in the terms and under the Regulations prescribed by the Government Order of the 1st August, 1831; the proper Officer being instructed not to permit any Person to become a Lessee, of Crown Lands, unless he shall be satisfied that such Person is of honest and respectable character.
- 3. Licenses to depasture the vacant Crown Lands beyond the limits of location will be granted on application to the Colonial Secretary, according

to the annexed form marked A, which is to be accompanied by a certificate of character from the nearest Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the terms therein set forth. Persons desirous of depasturing in distinct parts of the Colony will be required to take out a separate License for such District. Every such License will be chargeable with a fee of Ten Pounds, to be paid to the Colonial Treasurer, previously to its issue.

4. The Licenses will be executed by the Colonial Treasurer, or other Officer of Government acting for, and on behalf of His Majesty, and will be in the form hereunto annexed marked B.

- 5. The Licenses will be granted for one year, commencing on the 1st January and renewable for the ensuing year in the months of November and December following, upon the application of the Holder, and with the approval of the Governor. Such as are granted subsequently to the 1st July in any year will be chargeable with half the amount of the regulated fee, but will determine in like manner as other Licenses on the 31st of December next ensuing. Applications for the renewal of Licenses are to be made to the Colonial Secretary in the annexed form marked C, and are to be accompanied by a certificate from the nearest Commissioner of Crown Lands in the terms specified therein.
- 6. Any improvement effected upon Crown Land depastured under the authority of a license, will be at the risk of the party holding the same, as such land whenever it may be deemed expedient to extend the boundaries of location, will be liable to be put up to competition at public auction, in the same manner as other unalienated Crown Lands.
- 7. Any person who shall be convicted of any breach of law, whereby the objects of these regulations may be defeated or endangered, will be liable, on the report of a Commissioner of Crown Lands, to have his license cancelled, and will be considered disqualified from holding one in future, if the circumstances of the case appear to the Governor to require it.

quired to visit their several Districts annually, or oftener if necessary, in order to carry these regulations into full effect.

9. It is to be distinctly understood that the Issue of Licenses to depasture Lands beyond the limits of location, gives to the holders no claim to any greater protection by the Civil or Military Force of the Colony than is now enjoyed by Persons residing in those parts. The Act of the Governor and Council above referred to has been passed, and these Regulations consequent upon it are now promulgated, as the fittest mode of putting an end to the mischief arising from unauthorised occupation; and the Fee to be paid for the License can only be considered as a necessary recognition of the rights of the Crown, and as the means of procuring funds for carrying these Regulations into effect.

RELIGIOUS ESTABLISHMENTS.

IS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to establish the following Regulations, under which issues will be made from the Colonial Treasury in aid of the erection of Churches, Chapels, and Ministers Dwellings and towards the payment of Minister's Stipends, under the provisions of the the Act of the Governor and Council 7 William IV., No. 3.

1. All applications for such aid are to be made to the Governor and Executive Council, through obtaining a License to depasture Stock upon the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Australia,

the Presbytery of the Church of Scotland, or the will be from time to time issued to the Trustees Right Reverend the Roman Catholic Bishop on behalf of their respective Churches.

2. Every such application for aid towards the Building of a Church, or Minister's Dwelling, under the first clause of the said Act, shall be made in the annexed form marked (A), and shall set forth particulars therein required.

3. All applications for stipends towards the support of Ministers under the second clause of the Act, shall be made in the form hereunto annexed, marked (B), and shall contain all such particulars

as are set forth in the said clause.

4. All special applications for Minister's stipends under the third clause of the said Act, in cases where there are not one hundred proposed adult attendants shall be made in the same form B last mentioned, accompanied by an explanatory letter from the Lord Bishop of Australia, the Presbytery, or Roman Catholic Bishop respectively, setting forth the particular circumstances of the case for the consideration of the Governor and

5. All applications for increase of stipends, made under the fourth clause of the said Act, shall contain the several particulars required by the second clause, and set forth in form (B) hereunto annexed, with such alterations only as the case

may require.

6. All applications made under the fifth clause of the Act for stipends towards the support of Ministers where there is no Church or Chapel, must contain the several particulars required by that clause and be accompanied by the recommendation of the Lord Bishop of Australia, the Presbytery, or Roman Catholic Bishop respectively.

- 7. Pursuant to the sixth Clause of the said Act, a statement shall be transmitted in the month of January of every year, to the Clerk of the Executive Council, signed by the Lord Bishop of Australia, the Moderator on behalf of the Presbytery, or the Roman Catholic Bishop respectively, certifying that each Minister of their respective Churches has, during the past year, or such part thereof as he shall have been employed, faithfully and diligently performed the several duties allotted to him in the District for which he shall be appointed; which statement shall be deemed sufficient proof of such performance, unless a complaint be made in writing to the Governor and Executive Council, which shall render further enquiry necessary; and no stipend will be issued for the current year, until such certificate shall have been received, or such enquiry, if instituted, shall have been satisfactorily determined.
- 8. Previously to the issue of any sum from the Colonial Treasury under these Regulations towards the erection of any Church, Chapel, or Minister's Dwelling, the Trustees thereof will be required to transmit to the Colonial Secretary, an account (accompanied by the usual vouchers) of the sums actually expended in the Building. Such account will then be referred to some competent Architect appointed on behalf of the Government, who will be required to examine the Building and certify that the workmanship and materials are good and sufficient, and conformable to the Plan and Elevation laid before the Governor and Council, and that he believes the specified sum to have been actually laid out. One half the amount (not being less then £50) of any sums so expended, and certified,

subject to the limitation imposed by the said Act.

9. Application for aid from the Colonial Treasury towards the erection of Churches or Chapels. or Minister's Dwellings, or towards the stipends of Ministers on behalf of any denomination of Christians not named in these Regulations, will be taken into consideration according to the special circumstances of each case, but such part of these Regulations will be acted upon as may be applicable thereto.

It is to be understood that the Mail is invariably to start, on days as now, or hereafter to be fixed. from the places first above-mentioned; and the Contractor to carry all bags or letters which may be delivered to him under authority of the Postmaster-General or any of the Postmasters.

Each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £5, for each and every offence (over and above the penalties provided by the Act of Council), not to receive or convey, or permit to be received or conveyed, by any of his servants or passengers, any letter or packet to the prejudice of the Post-Office Revenue.

It will be optional with the parties offering (whether for one or more of the above line of Stages), to propose the mode of conveyance, but on all roads where Mail Carriages can travel, a preference will be given to that mode of conveyance; and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to provide secure lockers and dry covering for the Mail Bags. Mail Carts drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers. exclusive of the drivers, under a penalty for each offence of not less than £1 nor more than £5.

All Vehicles and Horses employed in the conveyance of Mails to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection, of the Postmaster-General or person appointed for that purpose. The drivers and postmen to be free men and of certified good character.

The Contractor will be liable to a fine of five shillings, for every five minutes delay, after the specified time of starting.

The rate of travelling will not be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages, under penalty of five shillings for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the first quarterly payment, next falling due to the Contractor.

It is requested that each party tendering, or an agent for him, will attend at this Office on the appointed day for opening the Tenders; and that | or Scarr's Creek, opposite P. P.
