**CROWN LANDS.**

**P**URSUANT to the Act of the Governor and Council passed in the present year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "*An Act to restrain the unauthorised occupation of Crown Lands.*" His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs it to be notified, that from and after the first day of January next, any Person who shall be found occupying any Crown Lands within the limits of location fixed by the Government Order of the 14th October, 1829, either by residing, or by erecting any tent, hut, or building thereon, or by clearing, enclosing, or cultivating any part thereof, without holding a lease under the Regulations of the 1st August, 1831. And any Person who shall be found occupying any Crown Lands beyond the said limits of location, without holding a license for depasturing cattle and other animals under these Regulations, will be liable, upon the complaint of any Commissioner of Crown Lands, to the penalties imposed by the said Act: that is to say, for the first offence, any sum not exceeding Ten Pounds at the discretion of the Justice before whom the complaint is heard; for the second offence, Twenty Pounds; and for the third and any subsequent offence, Fifty Pounds: Provided always, that no information shall lie for any second or subsequent offence, until one month after a conviction for the former offence.

2. Leases of vacant Crown Lands within the limits for location established by the same Government Order of the 14th October, 1829, will continue to be given in the terms and under the Regulations prescribed by the Government Order of the 1st August, 1831; the proper Officer being instructed not to permit any Person to become a Lessee, of Crown Lands, unless he shall be satisfied that such Person is of honest and respectable character.

3. Licenses to depasture the vacant Crown Lands beyond the limits of location will be granted on application to the Colonial Secretary, according

to the annexed form marked A, which is to be accompanied by a certificate of character from the nearest Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of Crown Lands, in the terms therein set forth. Persons desirous of depasturing in distinct parts of the Colony will be required to take out a separate License for such District. Every such License will be chargeable with a fee of Ten Pounds, to be paid to the Colonial Treasurer, previously to its issue.

4. The Licenses will be executed by the Colonial Treasurer, or other Officer of Government acting for, and on behalf of His Majesty, and will be in the form hereunto annexed marked B.

5. The Licenses will be granted for one year, commencing on the 1st January and renewable for the ensuing year in the months of November and December following, upon the application of the Holder, and with the approval of the Governor. Such as are granted subsequently to the 1st July in any year will be chargeable with half the amount of the regulated fee, but will determine in like manner as other Licenses on the 31st of December next ensuing. Applications for the renewal of Licenses are to be made to the Colonial Secretary in the annexed form marked C, and are to be accompanied by a certificate from the nearest Commissioner of Crown Lands in the terms specified therein.

6. Any improvement effected upon Crown Land depastured under the authority of a license, will be at the risk of the party holding the same, as such land whenever it may be deemed expedient to extend the boundaries of location, will be liable to be put up to competition at public auction, in the same manner as other unalienated Crown Lands.

7. Any person who shall be convicted of any breach of law, whereby the objects of these regulations may be defeated or endangered, will be liable, on the report of a Commissioner of Crown Lands, to have his license cancelled, and will be considered disqualified from holding one in future, if the circumstances of the case appear to the Governor to require it.

8. Commissioners of Crown Lands will be required to visit their several Districts annually, or oftener if necessary, in order to carry these regulations into full effect.

9. It is to be distinctly understood that the Issue of Licenses to depasture Lands beyond the Limits of location, gives to the holders no claim to any greater protection by the Civil or Military Forces of the Colony than is now enjoyed by Persons residing in those parts. The Act of the Governor and Council above referred to has been passed, and these Regulations consequent upon it are now promulgated, as the fittest mode of putting an end to the mischief arising from unauthorised occupation; and the Fee to be paid for the License can only be considered as a necessary recognition of the rights of the Crown, and as the means of procuring funds for carrying these Regulations into effect.

**CONVEYANCE OF MAILS.**

**C**ONVEYANCE being required for the Post Office Mails, from and to the undermentioned places, for One or Two Years (to be decided on opening the Tenders) from the 1st of January, 1837, Persons disposed to contract for providing the same, are invited to transmit their offers, in writing, to this Office, before Twelve o'clock on Monday, the 14th of November next, endorsed "*Tender for Conveyance of Mails.*"

From and to Windsor, Parramatta, and Sydney, daily (Sundays excepted).

From and to Windsor, Pitt Town, Wilberforce, Richmond, and North Richmond, three times a week.

From and to Penrith and Parramatta, daily (Sundays excepted).

From and to Penrith, Hassan's Walls, and Bathurst, two or three times a week.

From and to Bathurst and O'Connell, twice a week.

From and to Campbelltown, Liverpool, and Sydney, daily (Sundays excepted).

From and to Wollongong, Appin, and Campbelltown, twice a week.

From and to Campbelltown, Cawdor, and Bong Bong or Berrima, three times a week.

From and to Bong Bong or Berrima, Marulan and Goulburn, three times a week.

From and to Bungonia and Marulan, three times a week.

From and to Goulburn and Yass, twice a week.

From and to Bungonia and Queanbeyan, *via* Lake Bathurst and Bungandore, twice a week.

From and to Bungonia and Braidwood, once or twice a week.

From and to Raymond Terrace and Sawyer's Point, twice or three times a week.

From and to the General Post-Office and the several Steam Packets and the Government Boat Wharf, by one-horse cart, as occasion may require.

It is to be understood that the Mail is invariably to start, on days as now, or hereafter to be fixed, from the places first above-mentioned; and the Contractor to carry all bags or letters which may be delivered to him under authority of the Postmaster-General or any of the Postmasters.

Each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £5, for each and every offence (over and above the penalties provided by the Act of Council), not to receive or convey, or permit to be received or conveyed, by any of his servants or passengers, any letter or packet to the prejudice of the Post-Office Revenue.

It will be optional with the parties offering (*whether for one or more of the above line of Stages*), to propose the mode of conveyance, but on all roads where Mail Carriages can travel, a preference will be given to that mode of conveyance; and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to provide secure lockers and dry covering for the Mail Bags. Mail Carts drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the drivers, under a penalty for each offence of not less than £1 nor more than £5.

All Vehicles and Horses employed in the conveyance of Mails to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection, of the Postmaster-General or person appointed for that purpose. The drivers and postmen to be free men and of certified good character.

The Contractor will be liable to a fine of five shillings, for every five minutes delay, after the specified time of starting.

The rate of travelling will not be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages, under penalty of five shillings for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the first quarterly payment, next falling due to the Contractor.

It is requested that each party tendering, or an agent for him, will attend at this Office on the

appointed day for opening the Tenders; and that each Tender may specify the names of two respectable and solvent persons willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor, for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post-Office and other particulars may be ascertained at the General Post-Office, where parties proposing to tender are invited to apply.
