IMMIGRATION.

IS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct that the period allowed to settlers for notifying their intention to bring out Emigrants under the Government Notice of the 28th October, 1835 (now re-published for more convenient reference), shall be extended to the 31st day of December next.

In order to guard against the inconvenience of long outstanding claims against the Government, His Excellency is further pleased to notify that Bounties will not be allowed under this Notice, unless the Emigrants shall arrive on or before the 31st day of December, 1837.

S a part of the arrangements intended to be adopted with a view to facilitate the introduction into the Colony of useful and respectable Emigrants from any part of Europe, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified that a pecuniary aid, to the amount and under the conditions hereinafter specified, will be granted to those Settlers who shall be at the charge of bringing Emigrants to Sydney :-

1. The sum of £30 will be granted as a bounty towards defraying the expense of the passage of every married man, whether mechanic or farm servant, and his wife, neither of whose ages shall exceed, on embarkation, 30 years; and the sum of £5 for each of their children whose age shall exceed 12 months. A sum of £15 will also be allowed for every unmarried female whose age shall not be below 15 nor above 30 years, who shall come out with the consent of the Settler or his agent, under the protection of the married couple, as forming part of the family, and destined to remain with it until such female be otherwise be allowed for any persons brought out by Settlers,

provided for. A bounty of £10 will also be allowed for every unmarried male mechanic or farm servant, above the age of 18 and not exceeding 25 years, brought out by a Settler who at the same time brings out an equal number of females, accompanying and attached to a family, as hereinbefore described.

2. Before any such payments are made, the Emigrant on whose account they are claimed, will be required to present themselves before a Board, appointed by the Governor to inspect persons of this description, to whom the adults are to exhibit testimonials of good character, signed by clergymen and respectable inhabitants of note in the places of their former residence, with which testimonials it is necessary that every family and single person for whom the bounty is claimed, should be provided. If the Board shall be satisfied with these testimonials, and that the persons presenting themselves are within the ages set forth in the foregoing paragraph, to be established by the production of copies or extracts of the registry of their baptism, duly certified by the Parish Minister, or other proper officer, of good bodily health and strength, and in all other respects likely to be useful members of their class in society, a certificate to such effect will be granted by the Board, which being presented at the Colonial Secretary's Office, in Sydney, a warrant will be immediately issued for payment to the Settler, of the sum to which he shall become 'entitled under this notice. In the case of Foreigners brought to the Colony for the cultivation of the vine or olive, or for the manufacture of wine or oit, certificates of age, but not of character, will be dispensed with.

4. Settlers desiring to avail themselves of any of these bounties are required to transmit to the Colonial Secretary, at Sydney, on or before the last day of November next, a list, specifying as nearly as circumstances will permit, the number, condition, and calling of the persons they propose

to bring out.

4. It is to be understood that bounties will not

unless the claimant shall have transmitted to the Colonial Secretary, within the time specified, the list required by the foregoing paragraph, and that he shall have received in reply an intimation of its being the intention of this Government to grant a bounty on the introduction of the persons described therein. If hereafter it shall be found expedient to renew the arrangement now promulgated due notice will be given from the Colonial Secretary's Office.

5. It is also to be understood that no expense whatever, attendant upon the introduction of these Emigrants, will be defrayed by Government, excepting the bounties hereinbefore mentioned; and that the wives and families of soldiers in regiments in this Colony, or Van Diemen's Land, and of persons serving under sentence of transportation in either Colony, are excepted from the present regulation.

The Gaols are those of Sydney, Parramatta, Liverpool, Campbelltown, Windsor, Bathurst, and Newcastle.

The Watch-houses are those of Sydney, Parramatta, Windsor, Liverpool, Campbelltown, Penrith, Stonequarry, Illawarra, Bong Bong, Wingello, Goulburn, Bungonia, Yass, Clwyd, Brisbane Water, Newcastle, Maitland, Paterson, Dungog, Wollombi, Patrick's Plains, Invermein, Merton, Port Stephens.

The following are the Districts in which Tea, Sugar, &c., for Men, and Forage for Horses attached to Road Parties will be required :-

Sydney—Includes the hundred of Sydney, as specified in the Proclamation of 22 May, 1835. Parramatta-Includes the hundred of Parramatta. Liverpool-Includes the hundreds of Liverpool, Campbelltown, Bringelly, and Evan.

Windsor—Includes the hundreds of Windsor and Richmond.

Illawarra-

Camden-The whole of this county except the district of Illawarra.

Cook (Eastern Division)—Extending from the Ferry at Emu to Weatherboard Hut.

Roxburgh, and Western Division of the County of Cook-Extending from this side Mount Victoria to the Macquarie River.

Northumberland (North-west Division) - Extending from Maitland to the boundary of the County. Northumberland (North-east Division) - Comprehending the Town of Newcastle, and extending thence to Maitland.

Forage for Horses and Oxen in the Colonial Service (exclusive of those attached to Road Parties) will be required in Sydney and Parramatta.

The whole of the supplies for Sydney to be included in one Contract.

The Contract for Parramatta to include the Female Orphan School and all the supplies required in the District for the Colonial Service.

The Contract for Liverpool to include the Male

Orphan School. The remaining Services may be tendered for separately; but it is to be observed that the Contractor for any Surveying Party or Parties is to furnish both Provisions and Forage to such Party or Parties.

CONDITIONS.

All the Articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour or Bread must be the produce of clear, sound Colonial Wheat, Barley, and Maize, from which, on the Ration to Emigrants, Orphan Schools, Men in Surveying Parties, and the Water Police, 20 per cent., and on the Convict Ration, 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste. The Wheaten Bread to be made in loaves of 3 lbs., and the mixed Bread in $3\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. each, and baked twenty-four hours before being issued.

Beef is to be supplied to Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The fresh Meat for the Emigrants to be in the proportion of $3\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. of Beef and $1\frac{1}{3}$ lb. of Mutton weekly; deliverable alternately in fore and hind quarters, when the quantity admits of it, and for the Convict Ration the Beef is required in the

The Maize meal to be similar in quality to the Wheaten meal, and to be twice ground.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Female Orphan School, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of Potatoes, Greens, Pumpkins, Onions, &c.

The supplies for Road Parties and Surveying Parties, are to be delivered at the nearest fixed stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:-

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the Party receiving the supplies, as to its quality, the same is to be decided in the following manner :-

The Party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part), concur in naming a third as Umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured in like manner; and on a repetition of the inconvenience it will be in the power of the Governor to terminate the Contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the Contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months, to the opposite Party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a warrant may be prepared and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

HEREAS, it has been represented to the Government, that the late Corporal Hardman, of the Mounted Police, was, some time ago, most wickedly and barbarously murdered by some person or persons unknown.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a REWARD OF FIFTY POUNDS will be paid to any person, if free, who will give such in-formation as will lead to the apprehension and conviction of the Offender or Offenders; OR, IF A PRISONER OF THE CROWN, he will be recommended to His Majesty for a CON-DITIONAL PARDON.

IS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct that the following statement, taken from the Journal of Captain Lewis, of the Colonial Schooner Isabella, who was sent to seek for the passengers and crew of the ship Charles Eaton, wrecked in Torres' Straits, in August 1834, be published for general information. A more .detailed account is preparing for press.

Captain Lewis sailed from Sydney on the 3rd June, reached Murray's Island on the 19th, and found there, William, youngest son of Captain D'Oyley, of the East India Company's Service, and the ship's boy, John Ireland, both of whom had been wrecked in the Charles Eaton.

Captain Lewis was informed by the boy Ireland, that the ship was wrecked near Sir Charles Hardy's Island, at the latter end of August, 1834; that the carpenter and four men left the wreck in the only serviceable boat, the day the ship struck, as has been reported; that subsequently the rest of the crew and passengers made two rafts, and were drifted upon an Island called by the natives Boydang, in lat. 11° 28' S., and long. 142° 59' E. There they were all, except the two persons abovementioned, murdered by the natives of an Island called Oureed, who were then at Boydang fishing. The lives of these two were preserved, from some unexplained motive, and the savages baving taken them to Oureed or some adjacent Island (the boy John Ireland is not sure of the place), some Natives of Murray's Island who had heard of white men being there, arrived in a canoe and purchased them of the savages of Ourced for a bunch

of bananas each. The purchasers removed them to-Sydney, 22nd October, 1836. Murray's Island, and treated them with great kindness during nearly two years that they sojourned there, giving them up to Captain Lewis with manifestations of great regret, as they appeared much attached to them. Captain Lewis was on the most friendly terms with the Natives of the Island during the whole of his stay.

At Murray's Island, he was informed that the skulls of the murdered persons had been removed from Boydang to Oureed. He therefore determined to go for them, and after a long search found them at that place. The Island was deserted by the Natives on his approach, but the skulls were left behind. Oureed is in Lat. 9 ° 56' 7" S.,

and Long. 143 ° 10' 15" East.

Captain Lewis brought off 45 skulls, 17 of which are said to be European. They have all been buried at Sydney. From Ourced he proceeded through the Straits to Copang. and thence round Cape Leewin to Sydney, where he arrived on the 12th instant. While passing through the Straits, he was joined at Double Island by the Honorable The East India Company's Brig-of-War Tigris. This vessel accompanied the Isabella to Copang, where she parted on the 27th August, on her return to India.

The following is a list of the Crew and Passengers who sailed from Port Jackson in the Charles Eaton :-

The Officers of the East India Company's Army will be allowed the indulgence in question, on producing to this Government the necessary certificates of their rank and length of service signed by competent authorities.

IS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to command that the following Notice, issued from the Office of the Secretary of State on the 15th of August, 1834, for the use of Officers proposing to settle in the British Colonies, and having reference to the Regulations for the Disposal of Land already in force in this Country, shall be re-published here, for the information of all Persons interested.

Information for the use of Military and Naval Officers, proposing to Settle in the British Colonies.

> Colonial Office, 15th August, 1834

- 1. Annexed is a statement of the Regulations, according to which, with such modifications as local circumstances may render necessary, Lands belonging to the Crown are disposed of in the several British Colonies in North America, as well as a statement of the Regulations in force in the Australian Colonies.
- 2. Under these Regulations, Military and Naval Officers cannot receive Free Grants of Land; but, in buying Land, they are allowed a remission of the purchase-money, according to the undermentioned scale:—

Field Officers of twenty-five years' service and upwards, in the whole, £300.

Field Officers of twenty years' service and upwards, in the whole, £250.

Field Officers of fifteen or less years' service, in the whole, £200.

Captains of twenty years' service and upwards, in the whole, £200.

Captains of fifteen years' service or less, in the whole, £150.

Subalterns of twenty years' service and upwards, in the whole, £150.

Subalterns of seven years' service or less, in the whole, £100.

Regimental Staff Officers, and Medical Officers

of the Army and Navy, will be deemed to come within the benefit of this Rule.

3. Officers of the Army or Navy who propose to proceed to the Colonies, in order to take advantage of this indulgence, should provide themselves with Certificates from the Office of the General Commanding-in-Chief, or of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, shewing that their Emigration has been sanctioned, and stating exactly their rank and length of service. No document from the Office of the Secretary of State is necessary.

4. Officers on half-pay, residing in the Colony where they propose to settle, may be admitted to the privileges of Military and Naval Settlers, without referring to this Country for testimonials, provided they can satisfy the Governor that there is no objection to their being allowed the indulgence, and that their return of rank and length of service is accurate; and provided, if they belong to the Navy, that they produce their letter of leave

of absence from the Admiralty.

5. Military Chaplains, Commissariat Officers, and Officers of any of the Civil Departments connected with the Army, cannot be allowed any privileges on the subject of Land. Pursers, Chaplains, Midshipmen, Warrant Officers of every description, and Officers of the Civil Departments connected with the Navy, must also be considered as not qualified for those privileges.

Although numbers of these classes may have been admitted formerly, and under a different state of circumstances, they must now be excluded.

6. Gentlemen who have ceased to belong to His Majesty's Service, cannot be allowed the advantages to which they were entitled, while in the Army or Navy. It is not, however, proposed to affect by this rule Officers who desire to quit the service for the express purpose of settling in the Colonies: it is only required, that when they resign their commissions, they should apply for a certificate from the General Commanding-in-Chief, or from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that they do so with a view of emigrating; and such certificate, if produced to the Governor of any Colony, within one year from its date, but not otherwise, will be a sufficient warrant for allowing the bearer the same advantages as Officers still in His Majesty's Service.

Officers who have sold out within the last twelve months, preceding the date of this memorandum, will be allowed the usual privileges, notwithstanding their want of the certificate required by these Regulations, if they present themselves to the Governor of the Colony within a year from the present date; and all Officers who have already been recommended by the General Commanding-in-Chief will be entitled to their privileges, without regard to any obstruction which might otherwise be offered by the Regulations now established.

7. Officers cannot be allowed advantages in the acquisition of Land in any Colony, unless it be their intention to fix their residence in that Colony. In order to insure the observance of this rule, it has been determined that the Tides to Lands, obtained by Officers who take advantage of the peculiar Regulations existing in their favor, shall be withholden for a period sufficient to prove that they have not repaired to the Colony for the mere purpose of gaining possession of a portion of land and then departing.

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Two years is the period for which it has been decided that the Titles shall be kept back: this delay will be sufficient for the salutary object in view, and will not constitute any serious incon-

venience to the bona fide Settler.

8. By the annexed Regulations for the disposal of Crown Lands, it will be observed that the General Sales will take place periodically; but in order to prevent inconvenience to Officers who may arrive in the intervals between those Sales, and be desirous at once to obtain an allotment, the Governors of the Colonies are authorised to allow Officers to acquire, at any time, on payment of the officer price, Lands which have previously been offered for sale at some General Sale, and not been bought.

discovered will thus be relieved from delay at the stand of establishing themselves in the Colony. They will also be enabled, by this arrangement, which will permit them to obtain their land at a fixed price, to choose such a quantity as shall be to which they are entitled, instead of being liable to the called upon to pay a balance, which must be the case if they bid for lands at a Sale by Auction.

9. There being little or no Crown Land available in Prince Edward's Island, Officers cannot be offered any privileges in the acquisition of land in that Colony. In Cape Breton, an island in which the natural inducements for settlement of Officers are not very considerable, it is necessary, from local circumstances, that there should not be a remission of purchase-money as in other Co-lonies; to such Officers as may wish to settle in this faland, Allotments of Land will be granted on the land and Conditions as before the general introduction of the system of selling the Crown Lands, vizi-
