BY THE QUEEN.

A Proclamation requiring all Persons being in Office of Authority or Government at the Demise of the late King, to proceed in the execution of their respective Offices.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen ANNE, intituled, *An Act for the security of her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant line*; it was enacted, That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, or any of Her Majesty's Plantations, should become void by reason of the Demise of Her said late Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that every Person and Persons in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments for the space of six months next after such death or Demise, unless sooner removed and discharged by the next Successor, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to go, remain, and descend: And whereas, by an Act made in the Fifty-seventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled *An Act for the continuation of all and every Person or Persons in any and every Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, and also in all and every of His Majesty's Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, which he or she shall hold, possess, or exercise during the pleasure of the Crown at the time of the Death or Demise of His present Majesty, until removed or discharged therefrom by*

the succeeding King or Queen of this Realm; it was enacted, That all and every Person and Persons, who, upon the day of the Demise of His said late Majesty should hold any Office, Civil or Military, under the Crown during pleasure, should, under and by virtue of the said Act, and without any new or other Patent, Commission, Warrant, or Authority, continue and be entitled in all respects, notwithstanding the Demise of His said Majesty, to hold and enjoy the same: But, nevertheless, the same should be held or enjoyed only during the pleasure of the King or Queen who should succeed to the Crown upon the Demise of His said late Majesty; and the Right and Title to hold and enjoy the same under the Authority of the said Act, should be determinable in such and the like manner, by the King or Queen, who, upon the Demise of His said late Majesty, should succeed to the Crown, as the Right or Title to any Office, Place, or Employment granted by such succeeding King or Queen, during pleasure, would by law be determinable: We, therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure to be, and do hereby direct and command, That all and every Person and Persons, who, at the time of the Demise of Our late Royal Uncle, of Glorious Memory, duly and lawfully held, or were duly and lawfully possessed of or invested in any Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or any of Our Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, do severally, according to their Places, Offices, or Charges, proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties belonging to their respective Offices whilst they shall hold the same respectively during Our Pleasure: And We do hereby require and command all Our loving Subjects to be aiding, helping, and assisting at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the Performance and Execution of their respective Offices and Places, as they and every of them tender Our

utmost Displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their peril.

BY THE QUEEN.
A PROCLAMATION

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for the preventing and punishing of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality.

VICTORIA R.

WE most seriously and religiously considering that it is an indispensable Duty on Us to be careful above all other Things, to preserve and advance the Honour and Service of Almighty God, and to discourage and suppress all Vice, Profaneness, Debauchery, and Immorality, which are so highly displeasing to God, so great a Reproach to Our Religion and Government, and (by means of the frequent ill Examples of the Practices thereof) have so fatal a Tendency to the Corruption of many of Our loving Subjects otherwise Religiously and Virtuously disposed, and which (if not timely remedied) may justly draw down the Divine Vengeance on Us, and Our Kingdom; We also humbly acknowledging that We cannot expect the Blessing and Goodness of Almighty God (by whom Kings and Queens reign, and on which We entirely rely) to make Our Reign happy and prosperous to Ourselves and Our People, without a Religious Observance of God's Holy Laws; To the intent, therefore, that Religion, Piety, and Good Manners, may (according to Our most hearty Desire) flourish and increase under Our Administration and Government, We have thought fit by the Advice of Our Privy Council to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare Our Royal Purpose and Resolution to discountenance and punish all manner of Vice, Profaneness, and Immorality, in all Persons of whatsoever Degree or Quality within this Our Realm, and particularly in such as are employed near Our Royal Person, and that, for the Encouragement of Religion and Morality We will, upon all Occasions, distinguish Persons of Piety and Virtue by Marks of Our Royal Favour; and We do expect and require, That all Persons of Honour or in Place of Authority, will give good Example by their own Virtue and Piety, and to their utmost contribute to the discountenancing Persons of dissolute and debauched Lives, that they, being reduced by that Means to Shame and Contempt for their loose and evil Actions and Behaviour, may be thereby also enforced the sooner to reform their ill Habits and Practices, and that the visible Displeasure of good Men towards them may (as far as it is possible) supply what the Laws (probably) cannot altogether prevent, and We do hereby strictly enjoin and prohibit all Our loving Subjects, of what Degree or Quality soever, from playing on the Lord's Day at Dice, Cards, or any other Game whatsoever, either in Public or Private Houses, or other Place or Places whatsoever; And We do hereby require and command them, and every of them, decently and reverently to attend the Worship of God on

every Lord's Day, on Pain of Our highest Displeasure, and of being proceeded against with the utmost Rigour that may be by Law. And for the more effectual reforming all such Persons who by reason of their dissolute Lives and Conversations are a Scandal to Our Kingdom, Our further Pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Judges, Mayors, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all other our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclesiastical and Civil, and all other Our Subjects whom it may concern, to be very vigilant and strict in the Discovery and the effectual Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons who shall be guilty of excessive Drinking, Blasphemy, Profane Swearing and Cursing, Lewdness, Profanation of the Lord's Day, or other dissolute, immoral, or disorderly Practices, and that they take care also effectually to suppress all Public Gaming Houses and Places, and other Lewd and Disorderly Houses, and to put in execution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, intituled "*An Act for the better observation of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday*;" and also so much of an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, intituled "*An Act for the more effectual suppression of Blasphemy and Profaneness*" as is now in force, and all other Laws now in force for the punishing and suppressing any of the Vices aforesaid; and also to suppress and prevent all Gaming whatsoever in Public or Private Houses, on the Lord's Day; and likewise that they take effectual care to prevent all Persons keeping Taverns, Chocolate Houses, Coffee Houses, or other Public Houses whatsoever from selling Wine, Chocolate, Coffee, Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or receiving or permitting Guests to be or remain in such their Houses in the time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our highest Displeasure; And for the more effectual proceeding herein, We do hereby direct and command all our Judges of Assize and Justices of the Peace to give strict Charges at their respective Assizes and Sessions, for the due Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons that shall presume to offend in any of the Kinds aforesaid; and also of all Persons that, contrary to their duty shall be remiss or negligent in putting the said Laws in Execution; and that they do, at their respective Assizes and Quarter Sessions of the Peace, cause this Our Royal Proclamation to be publicly read in open Court immediately before the Charge is given; And We do hereby further Charge and Command every Minister in his respective Parish, Church, or Chapel, to read or cause to be read this Our Proclamation at least Four times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service, and to incite and stir up their respective Auditories to the practice of Piety and Virtue and the avoiding of all Immorality and Profaneness; And to the end that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practised by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Mariners, and others who are employed in Our Service, by Sea and Land, We do hereby strictly charge and command all our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, that they do take care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery, and other Immoralities, and that by their own Good and Virtuous Lives and Conversations, they do set good Examples to all such as

are under their Care and Authority, and likewise take care of and inspect the Behaviours of all such as are under them, and Punish all those who shall be guilty of any of the Offences aforesaid, as they will be answerable for the ill consequences of their Neglect herein.

Whereas, Her Majesty was this day pleased to declare Her Royal Will and Pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects for the Queen, instead of the word "King," the word "Queen," instead of the word "William," the word "Victoria," instead of the words "Our Sovereign Lord," the words "Our Sovereign Lady" be inserted, and that in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects so altered, such change of the Pronouns He, Him, and His be made as will be by those Alterations rendered necessary; and that in all Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects for the Royal Family, the words "Adelaide the Queen Dowager," be substituted for the words "Our Gracious Queen Adelaide:"—To the end that the same form and order may be observed in Her Majesty's several Provinces, Islands, and Settlements in America and the West Indies, and elsewhere, within Her Majesty's Foreign Dominions, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do cause the necessary communications to be made to the Governors of Her Majesty's said several Provinces, Islands, and Settlements, respectively.

CONVEYANCE OF MAILS.

CONVEYANCE being required for the Post-office Mails, from and to the undermentioned places, for one or two years, (to be decided on opening the Tenders) from the 1st January, 1838; Persons disposed to Contract for providing the same are invited to transmit their offers, in writing, to this Office, before Twelve o'clock, on Monday, the 6th of November next, endorsed—"Tender for Conveyance of Mails."

From and to Sydney and Parramatta, daily (Sundays excepted.)
From and to Windsor and Parramatta, daily, (Sundays excepted.)
From and to Windsor, Pitt Town, Wilberforce, Richmond, and North Richmond, three times a-week; and from and to Windsor and Wiseman's Ferry once a-week.
From and to Penrith and Parramatta, daily (Sundays excepted.)
From and to Penrith, Hassan's Walls, and Bathurst, two or three times a-week.
From and to Bathurst and O'Connell, twice a-week.
From and to Campbelltown, Liverpool, and Sydney, daily (Sundays excepted.)
From and to Wollongong, Appin, and Campbelltown, three times a-week.
From and to Campbelltown, Cawdor, and Berrima, three times a-week.
From and to Berrima, Marulan, and Goulburn, three times a-week.
From and to Bungonia and Marulan, six times a-week.
From and to Goulburn and Yass, via Mutmutbilly, twice a-week.
From and to Lake George and Mutmutbilly, once a-week.
From and to Yass and Melbourne, Port Phillip, once a fortnight.
From and to Bungonia and Queanbeyan, via Lake Bathurst and Bungandore, twice a-week.
From and to Bungonia and Braidwood, once a-week.
From and to Raymond Terrace and Sawyer's Point, twice a-week.
From and to Raymond Terrace and Dungog, twice a-week.
From and to Sparke's Inn and Maitland, as often as the steam-packets shall pass and re-pass Sparke's Inn.
From and to Hinton and Paterson, as often as the steam-packets shall pass and re-pass.
From and to the Greenhills and Maitland, as often as the steam-packets shall arrive and depart.
From and to Maitland and Darlington, three times a-week.
From and to Darlington and Invermein, via Muscle Brook, twice or three times a-week.
From and to Invermein and Murrurundi, once a-week.
From and to Darlington and Merton, via Jerry's Plains, twice a-week.
From and to Merton and Cassilis, once a-week.
It is to be understood that the Mail is invariably to start on days as now, or hereafter to be fixed, and the Contractor to carry all bags or letters which may be delivered to him under authority of the Postmaster General, or any of the Postmasters.

Each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £5, for each and every offence (over and above the penalties provided by the Act of Council) for the receipt or conveyance of any letter or packet by himself, or by any of his servants or passengers, to the prejudice of the Post-office Revenue.

It will be optional with the Parties offering, whether for one or more of the above line of stages, to propose the mode of Conveyance; but on all roads where Mail-carriages can travel, a preference will be given to that mode of Conveyance; and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the Conveyance they propose, and to provide secure lockers and dry covering for the Mail-bags. Mail-carts drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the drivers, under a penalty for each offence of not less than £1 nor more than £5.

All vehicles and horses employed in the Conveyance of Mails, to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection, of the Post-master General, or person appointed for that purpose. The drivers and postmen to be free men, and of certified good character.

The Contractor will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay, after the specified time of starting.

The rate of travelling will not be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages, under a penalty of five shillings for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement to be deducted by the Post-master General from the next quarterly payment falling due to the Contractor.

It is requested that each party Tendering, or an agent for him, will attend at this Office on the appointed day for opening the Tenders; and that each Tender may specify the names of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post-office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post-office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to apply; and where also printed forms of Tender may be obtained.

N.B.—Tenders for a *three years' Contract* for Conveyance of the Mails daily (Sundays excepted)—from and to Sydney and Windsor, Parramatta and Penrith, and Sydney and Campbelltown, will be entertained, if submitted, should parties consider it advisable thus to lengthen the term of their engagement to ensure a more complete establishment of carriages and horses.

The Rations for Emigrants will be required in the District of Sydney.

The following are the Counties and Districts in which Provisions for Men, and Forage for Horses and Oxen, attached to Surveying Parties (each party consisting, generally, of Eight Persons, and Three Horses, and Seven Oxen), will be required, viz.—

Argyle, Brisbane, Bligh, Bathurst, Camden, Cook, Cumberland, exclusive of Sydney, Durham, Gloucester, Georgiana, Hunter, Illawarra and Shoalhaven, King, Murray, Macquarie, Northumberland, Phillip, Roxburgh, St. Vincent, Sydney, Westmoreland.

In the undermentioned Districts, Flour, Tea, Sugar, and Tobacco, for Men, and Forage for Horses and Oxen, attached to Road Parties, and for Horses in the Colonial Service generally, will be required.

Sydney includes the hundred of Sydney, as specified in the Proclamation of 22nd May, 1835.

Parramatta includes the hundred of Parramatta.

Liverpool includes the hundreds of Liverpool, Campbelltown, Bringally, and Evan.

Windsor includes the hundreds of Windsor and Richmond.

Illawarra.

Camden, the whole of the County, excepting the District of Illawarra.

Cook (eastern division), extending from the Ferry at Emu to the Weatherboarded Hut.

Roxburgh, and western division of the County of Cook, extending from this side Mount Victoria to the Macquarie River.

Northumberland (north-west division), extending from Maitland to the boundary of the County.

Northumberland (north-east division), comprising the Town of Newcastle, and extending thence to Maitland.

Towrang, County Argyle.

The Gaols are those of Sydney, Parramatta, Liverpool, Campbelltown, Windsor, Bathurst, and Newcastle.

The Watch Houses are those of Appin, Bargo, Berrima, Braidwood, Brisbane Water, Bong Bong, Bungonia, Campbelltown, Clwyd, Dungog, Goulburn, Illawarra, Invermein, Liverpool, Maitland, Merton, Upper and Lower Minto, Muscle Brook, Newcastle, Parramatta, Paterson, Patrick's Plains, Penrith, Port Stephens, Stonequarry, Wingello, Wollombi, and Yass.

Separate Tenders will be received for supplying the Crews of Boats, and for the supply of Forage to Horses and Oxen in the town and district of Sydney; but it is required that the other supplies for that district should be included in one Tender.

Separate Tenders will also be received for supplies to the Female Orphan School, Parramatta, and for the Male Orphan School, Liverpool. The other supplies for each of these districts, respectively, to be included in one Tender.

The remaining Services may be Tendered for separately, but it is to be observed, that the Contractor for any Surveying Party is to furnish both Provisions and Forage to such Party.

CONDITIONS.

All the Articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial Wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying Parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light-house, Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to prisoners of the Crown 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be deliverable in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the Officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Female Orphan School when required, by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of Potatoes, Greens, Pumpkins, Onions, &c.

The supplies for Road Parties and Surveying Parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—

The Maize or Barley.....	4-12
The Hay.....	5-12
The Bran.....	2-12
The Straw.....	1-12

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding Paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the Person duly authorised for the purpose.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the Party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the Service. But in Country Districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the Party objecting will name one Person as Arbitrator, the Contractor or his Agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as Umpire, who, in the event of the Arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the Board, Arbitrators, or Umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured in like manner.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the Contractor, upon the report of the Officer in charge of the Parties or Establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the Contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a Warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed Forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, and from the Police Magistrates of the several Districts, and as adequate security will be required for the due fulfilment of the Contract, no Tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as such, stating that they are willing to become bound as securities for the Contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of the acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which the Contracts will be again advertised, or another Tender accepted.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.

All Tenders to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "Tender for Provisions, &c."
