#### A CONDITIONAL PARDON.

HEREAS it has been represented to the Government that Serjeant James Fox, of the Soth Regiment, about eight o'clock in the morning of the 30th of December last, was attacked at a place called Lennox Bridge, between Emu Plains and the Pilgrim Inn, on Mitchell's Pass, by two armed men, (one of whom has been apprehended) having their faces covered with pieces of striped cotton cloth, and was robbed of money to a considerable amount; and whereas a man named Thomas Williams (whose description is annexed) supposed to be the other offender, is still illegally at large:
