To His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Territory of New South Wales.

May it please Your Excellency,

We, the undersigned Magistrates, Clergy, Landholders, and Free Inhabitants of the Town and District of Campbelltown, beg to offer to Your Excellency our sincere congratulations upon your assumption of the Government of this Territory, and the respectful assurance of our welcome upon your arrival in the Colony.

As the Representative of our Queen, we would convey to you the expression of our warm and devoted loyalty, and our conviction, that in Her Majesty's selection of Your Excellency as our Ruler, we shall experience the benefits of a liberal and enlightened administration.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to return you my very sincere thanks for this Address, and for the con-

gratulations which you have offered to me, on my arrival amongst you.

The kind feelings which have been evinced towards me, not only by yourselves, but by the people generally of this country, demand my most grateful acknowledgments. They must act upon me as an incentive to devote my whole time and attention to the laborious duties of my station; and the remembrance of them will I hope ever enable me to preserve an inflexible impartiality in all my measures. It is not by promising many things to many men, but by scrupulously performing what I promise, that I shall hope to win the esteem of all honorable men, and continue to deserve the confidence, which you have expressed yourselves willing to repose in me.

To His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of New South Wales and its Dependencies.

We, the undersigned, Magistrates, Clergy, Landholders, Merchants, and other Free Inhabitants of the Town and District of Windsor, respectfully offer our congratulations to Your Excellency on your safe arrival amongst us, and on your assuming the Government of this important Colony.

We beg to assure you of the loyalty and attachment of the Inhabitants of the Districts of the Hawkesbury to our most gracious Sovereign Queen Victoria, and we hail the appointment of Your Excellency as a pledge that the true interests of the Colony will be promoted under a just and impartial Government.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

GENTLEMEN,—I accept with great pleasure this Address, and thank you for it very sincerely, though indeed it is a matter of regret to me that I have not been able to receive it in your own neigh-

bourhood, and thus have prevented the necessity of your performing a long journey for the purpose of presenting it to me.

It is, indeed, Gentlemen, the urgent press of business alone that has kept me so long in Sydney; for I can assure you that I am most anxious to visit the interior of the Colony, not only to enjoy the gratifying spectacle which it everywhere presents of industry meeting its just reward, but also to make myself better acquainted with the wants of the people, and particularly to see and form my own judgment in the agricultural districts, of the working of the system on which Convict labor is now supplied to the Colonists.

It would be needless, Gentlemen, to attempt to conceal the fact, that an unfavorable impression of this system was produced in England, by the evidence delivered in the course of last year before a Committee of the House of Commons; and it would be no less idle to attempt to deny, that any sudden alteration in that system, or withdrawal of labor supplied by Government to the Colonists, would, in the present state of their affairs, be productive of the most calamitous consequences to them.

A most important question thus arises, as to the means, not by which the present system can be perpetuated, for that I believe to be impossible, but by which any change in it can be deferred, so as to afford time for the introduction or formation of another class of laborers:—and to this I answer, Gentlemen, without any doubt or hesitation, that the only terms on which any delay will be conceded are, that the most anxious care and attention shall be devoted in the interim, by persons who are the employers of labor, to the treatment of their assigned servants, and to the means whereby an amendment in their moral condition may be effected, and their ultimate reformation hoped for.

It is of no avail, Gentlemen, for us to say, that the evil impression of which I have spoken, has been produced by overcharged representations—these representations have been made by persons who are at least supposed to be well acquainted with the country; whether true or not, they have produced their effect, and the only way of counteracting them is, by now sending home records of well authenticated facts, tending to shew that the moral condition of the country is improving.

The question of Assignment, and even of Transportation itself, is viewed in England, solely as a great moral one; and it is perhaps the only one of the day into which party politics have not been suffered to enter. It is a question, Gentlemen, which to say the truth, has been taken up rather by the People than by the Government; but in England, which is so essentially a moral and a religious country, you must be aware that the utmost power of the strongest Government that ever existed in it, would be exerted in vain, if exerted in opposition to the moral feelings of the people.

Gentlemen, in my answers to the various Addresses with which I have been honored since I arrived amongst you, I have endeavored to make known the general principles by which I shall be guided in the execution of my public duties; and it is because this present occasion is the last of the sort that will in all probability occur to me, that I now think it proper to open to you my mind on the subject of Convict labor—a subject which is, I

believe, of far more importance to you than any other whatsoever.

I have now, Gentlemen, myself, a stake in this your country, greater than that which the possession of lands, or of flocks and herds can bestow. I am ready to devote every energy of mind and body to its service, and I most anxiously intreat you, and people of all classes in it, to join with me, and do the like.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that applications for pecuniary aid from the Colonial Treasury for the support of Dispensaries, Schools, or other Charitable Institutions established by Societies or Individuals, and unconnected with the local Government, are to be addressed to the Colonial Secretary, and delivered at his Office in Sydney, on or before the 31st of May next.

All such applications are to be made by the trustees, committee, treasurer, or other person or persons managing the affairs of the Institution, and are to contain a brief account of the objects for which it has been established, and of the service it has rendered to the public in the past year, with the names of the persons forming the society. The application is to be accompanied by a statement of the funds of the Institution, shewing the amount received in the last year by private contributions, or from public bodies, the amount and general particulars of expenditure during the same period, and the balance actually in hand, on the 1st day of January of the present year, together with a statement of any debts then chargeable against the Institution.

The statement of accounts is to be verified by a declaration from the treasurer or manager of the funds of the Institution in the following form:—

"I do hereby declare and certify, that to the best of my knowledge and belief, the foregoing account is a true and bona fide statement of the whole funds, receipts, and expenditure of the Institution during the year, 1837, and of the balance in hand, and the debts of the Institution, upon the 1st of January, 1837. If the objects of the Institution, and the manner of conducting it, are such as in the opinion of the Governor to render it deserving of support from the public funds, application will be made to the Legislative Council for such aid as it may be deemed proper to grant, in no case exceeding the amount of private contributions and donations from public bodies.

If the Council shall think fit to appropriate a sum towards the support of the Institution, it will be placed on a supplementary estimate for the present year, and issued immediately after being granted.

COURT OF CLAIMS.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the following CLAIMS for DEEDS OF GRANT of LAND and TOWN ALLOTMENTS will be ready for the examination of the Commissioners appointed for that purpose, under the Act of Council 5th William IV., No. 21, at the expiration of two months from this date, before which day any Caveat or Counter-claim must be entered at this Office. Due notice will be given of the days appointed for the hearings.

Case No. 241.—SAMUEL MASON, of Parramatta.

Forty-five perches, County of Cumberland, parish of Field of Mars, town of Parramatta; allotment No. 8 of section No. 1; bounded on the north by William Johnson's allotment 108 links; on the east by a line 263 links; on the south by a street unnamed; 108 links; and on the west by a line 263 links.

This allotment was located to Robert Parks, on

an order by Governor Darling, dated 20th November, 1829. Parks, who is either dead or left the Colony, sold it is alleged, to claimant.

Case No. 242—WILLIAM BARNES of Bedlam, Kissing Point.

Thirty-two perches in the County of Cumberland, parish of the Field of Mars, town of Parramatta; parts of allotments Nos. 1 and 2 of section No. 3, together with some reserved land, bounded towards the west by Church-street, commencing from the north end of the old bridge on the Parramatta River 118 feet; on the north by the premises of J. Fuller 61 feet; on the east by Jacob Williams' allotment 146 feet to the Parramatta River; and on the south by that River to the commencing point.

The allotments, above alluded to, were leased by Sir Thomas Brisbane for 21 years, from the 30th June, 1823, to Jacob Williams, deceased, whose widow, it is alleged, sold a small portion to claimant. She also sold another portion to Jesse Hudson, who sold to claimant, who requests a Deed on proof of erection of buildings of the value of £1000, as provided by one of the clauses of the lease. The Crown requires evidence of the alienation of the land reported by the Surveyor-General to be reserved.
