HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the undermentioned Bills, now under the consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,
E. DEAS THOMSON.

1. "A Bill to regulate the Distillation of Spirits
"in the Colony of New South Wales."

It is proposed to make the distillation of spirits unlawful in any part of the Colony except in the towns of Sydney and Melbourne, or in such other towns or places as the Governor may appoint, under a penalty.

Distillers to be licensed.

Persons desirous of obtaining licenses to apply by memorial, accompanied by a description and drawing of the still, and place where it is to be situated.

No still to contain less than forty gallons.

Distiller, with two sureties, shall enter into a recognizance.

Duty on license to be fifty pounds.

Licenses to be renewable annually, unless Distiller convicted of offences against the Act.

Distillers shall not also brew on the same premises, or within one hundred yards thereof, nor sell spirits in less quantities than sixty gallons, under a penalty.

Owners, part-owners, or shareholders in a licensed distillery, shall not hold a license to retail spiritous or fermented liquors.

Still-house to be not less than one hundred yards distant from any other house, and the premises to be enclosed by a wall not less than ten feet in height, and not less than forty-eight feet distant from the still-house.

Spirit store to be within the enclosed premises, and to be at all times open to the inspection of the Inspector of Distilleries, under a penalty.

Stills shall be set in stone and mortar.

Coolers to be securely fixed, and must contain full charge of the still.

Only one worm for each still to be allowed.

Inspector of Distilleries shall register description and return of stills, and distillery utensils, and to have power to enter premises at all times.

Notice of intention to distil must be given to Inspector, at least six days previous, under a penalty.

Duty on spirits to be 7s. 6d. per gallon, hydrometer proof, to be charged for so many gallons as each still can produce, from the greatest number of charges that can be worked off in twenty-eight days.

Duty to be paid to Colonial Treasurer.

No spirits to be removed without Permit from the Inspector; spirits otherwise removed to be forfeited.

Illicit spirits may be seized.

Officers of Customs, and Inspector, may enter premises to search for illicit spirits, and seize the same.

Spirits seized to be sold by auction within one month.

Foreign and Colonial spirits must be kept in separate cellars.

Sellers and purchasers of illicit spirits subject to penalty.

Penalties recoverable before two or more Justices, or in the Supreme Court, or in the Court of Vice Admiralty.

If penalties not paid, offending parties may be imprisoned for not less than three months, nor exceeding six months.

Governor may remit penalties.

Notice of action to be given to Officers of Customs, or Inspector, and actions against them must be brought within three months, and if probable cause of seizure be certified by the Judge, they shall not be liable to damages exceeding two-pence, without costs, nor to a fine exceeding one shilling.

Action for recovery of penalties may be brought within three years.

2. "A Bill to amend an Act intituled 'An Act for preventing the mischiefs arising from the printing and publishing Newspapers, and papers of a like nature, by persons not known, and for regulating the printing and publication of such papers in other respects; and also for restraining the abuses arising from the publication of blasphemous and seditious libels.'"

It is proposed that affidavits, affirmations, and recognizances, heretofore required to be made and entered into, by Editors, Printers, and Publishers of Newspapers, before the Colonial Secretary and a Judge of the Supreme Court, respectively, shall henceforth be made by the Editors, Printers, and Publishers of Newspapers, published in the Country Towns or Districts, before the respective Police Magistrates, they being required forthwith to transmit the same to Sydney to be recorded.

3. "A Bill to indemnify the Officers of Customs and others, for having permitted the Importation of Liqueurs, Cordials, and Spirituous Syrups, on payment of less than the accustomed Duty."

It is proposed to indemnify the officers of Her Majesty's Customs, and others concerned, for having, since February, 1837, demanded and received a lower rate of duty than legally chargeable on Liqueurs, Cordials, and Spirituous Syrups, acting upon a view of the subject which has not been approved by the Home Authorities.

4. "A Bill to amend an Act intituled 'An Act for regulating Buildings and Party Walls, and for preventing mischiefs by Fire in the Town of Sydney.'"

It is proposed in estimating the several rates of building, that each rate shall be increased one square.

That every dwelling-house, warehouse, stable, and other building (except such buildings not being dwelling-houses as in the Building Act are declared to be first rate buildings) which is at the distance of eight feet from any public road, and is detached from any other property not in the same possession, at least twenty feet, or connected with any other building only by a fence or fence wall, shall be deemed a sixth rate building, and may be built of any dimensions and of any materials whatever.

That the thickness of walls, built of stone shall be increased in the proportion of six inches above the dimensions required by the Act, unless such wall be built of thorough stones, wrought or hammered square on beds and faces.

That footings shall be dispensed with when walls are built upon rock foundations.

That Venetian blinds or window shutters be allowed, provided they do not project from the upright line of the building to which they belong more than the distance prescribed by the Building Act for the cornice or covering of shop windows, but not allowed on the ground floor to project over the footing in the operation of opening or otherwise.

That verandahs and balconies be allowed, if wholly constructed of hard-wood the growth of the Colony, provided they do not approach nearer the angle of the house to which they belong than the distance of two feet, or separated from ad-

joining premises by a nine inch thick party wall; and provided also, that they do not project into any street beyond the distance permitted by the Building Act.

That every flat, gutter, and roof of every first, second, third, fourth, and fifth rate building already built, and every turret, dormer and lanthorn light, or other erection in the flat or roof of any such building, and every external part of any flat, gutter, roof, dormer, and lanthorn in any building of the first, second, third, fourth and fifth rate building now built, or which shall at any time hereafter be ripped or uncovered, shall be covered with glass, copper, lead, tin, zinc, or other metal, slate, tile, artificial stone, or hard wood, the growth of the Colony; except the doors, door-frames, windows, and window-frames thereof.

Nothing in the Building Act contained to prevent the use of Colonial hard wood shingles.

That nothing in the Building Act contained shall be construed to prevent the use of Colonial hard-wood for external enclosures to first, second, third, fourth and fifth rate buildings, provided they do not project into any street beyond the distance allowed by the said Building Act.

That no separate fee shall be charged upon detached offices to first, second, third, or fourth rate buildings, if they be built at the same time as the main building, or completed within six months after it has been covered in; provided, however, that no stable, warehouse, store, or workshop shall be deemed an office, so as to exempt the owner or proprietor from payment of any fee chargeable thereon under the provisions of the Building Act.

That no alteration or addition to any building which does not interfere with the dimensions or materials prescribed by the Building Act shall authorise or require the payment of any fee.

CONVEYANCE OF MAILS.

CONVEYANCE being required for the Post Office Mails from and to the undermentioned places, for one or two years, (to be decided on opening the Tenders,) from the 1st January, 1839; Persons disposed to Contract for providing the same are invited to transmit their offers, in writing, to this Office, before twelve o'clock, on Monday,

the 5th of November next, endorsed "*Tender for Conveyance of Mails.*"

From and to Windsor, Parramatta, and Sydney, daily, Sundays excepted.

From and to Windsor, Pitt Town, Wilberforce, Richmond, and North Richmond, three times a week.

From and to Windsor and Wiseman's Ferry once a week.

From and to Brisbane Water and Wiseman's Ferry once a week.

From and to Penrith and Parramatta daily, Sundays excepted.

From and to Penrith, Hassan's Walls, and Bathurst, three times a week.

From and to Bathurst and O'Connell twice a week.

From and to Bathurst and Wellington once a week.

From and to Liverpool and Parramatta daily, Sundays excepted.

From and to Campbelltown, Liverpool, and Sydney daily, Sundays excepted.

From and to Wollongong, Appin, and Campbelltown, three times a week.

From and to Campbelltown, Cawdor, and Berrima, three times a week.

From and to Berrima, Marulan, and Goulburn, three times a week.

It is to be understood that the Mail is invariably to start on days as now, or hereafter to be fixed, and the contractor to carry all bags or letters which may be delivered to him under the authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters.

Each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence; over and above the penalties provided by the Act of Council, for

the receipt or conveyance of any letter or packet by himself, or by any of his servants or passengers, to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue.

It will be optional with the parties offering, whether for one or more of the above line of stages, to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where mail carriages can travel, a preference will be given to that mode of conveyance, and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to provide secure lockers, and dry covering for the mail bags. Mail carts drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the drivers; under a penalty for each offence of not less than £1, nor more than £5.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of mails, to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed for that purpose. The drivers and postmen to be free men, and of certified good character.

The Contractor will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay, after the specified time of starting.

The rate of travelling will not be less than seven miles per hour in the County of Cumberland, and six miles per hour on all other roads, including all stoppages, under a penalty of five shillings for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly payment falling due to the Contractor.

It is desirable that each party tendering, or an agent for him, may attend at this office on the appointed day for opening the tenders; and that each tender may specify the names of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor, for the safety of the mails, and the due performance of the contract.

The hours of starting from each Post Office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to tender are invited to apply.

Printed forms of tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

N. B. Tenders for a three year's contract for conveyance of the mails daily, (Sunday's excepted), from and to Sydney and Windsor, Parramatta and Penrith, and Sydney and Campbelltown, will be entertained, if submitted, should parties consider it advisable thus to lengthen the term of their engagement, to ensure a more complete establishment of carriages and horses.
