#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governorin-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

HEREAS by a certain Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the Second year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, initiated "An Act for regulating the Police in the Towns of Parramatta, Windsor, Maitland, Bathurst, and other Towns respectively, and for removing and preventing Nuisances and Obstructions, and for the better alignment of Streets therein," it was amongst other things enacted that whenever the Governor or Acting-Governor for the time being shall deem it expedient to extend the same to any other Town in the said Colony, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governor or Acting-Governor for the time being to declare the same by Proclamation. Now, therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the Power and Authority so vested in me by the said recited Act, by this, my Proclamation, do hereby direct that the Provisions of the said Act be extended to the Town of Melbourne.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

Foreign Office, June 5th, 1838.

RARL GRANVILLE, Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, has transmitted to Viscount Palmerston, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, an official letter (of which the following is a translation), which has been addressed to Earl Granville by the

Count Mo'e, French Minister for Foreign Affairs, notifying the establishment of a Blockade of the Ports of Mexico, against all vessels, except British Packet Boats, employed in the conveyance of the Mails.

(TRANSLATION.)

My Lord,—The Mexican Government having refused to redress the numerous grievances for which the Minister Plenipotentiary of the King, at Mexico, had been directed to demand reparation, the Commander of the French Naval Forces before Vera Cruz, has found himself under the necessity of adopting, as by his instructions he was authorised to do, the measures which in such a case the dignity of France, and the justice of its claims, required.

Accordingly all the Perts of Mexico have been declared to be in a state of Blockade; and this Blockade, which became effective so far as regards Vera Cruz, from the 16th of April last, will, without delay, have taken effect in like manner with respect to the other Ports of Mexico. making known to you these measures, I hasten, My Lord, to add, that the orders given by the Government of the King, for insuring the execution of them, are so conceived, as to reconcile the practical exercise of a legitimate right with the respect due to the independence of neutral flags, and with the sincere desire to cause the least possible inconvenience to the navigation of neutral vessels. Of this the Government of Her Britannic Majesty will find a special proof in the mea-sure which exempts British Packet Boats employed in the conveyance of correspondence from the application of the rules of the Blockade. exemption has appeared to us to be an indirect consequence of the liberal principle sanctioned by the 13th article of the Post Office Convention of 14th June, 1833, which authorises the continuation of the Post Office arrangements between the two countries, even in case of war.

I request you to be so good as to convey the present notification to the knowledge of the Government of Her Britannic Majesty.

A Despatch has been received at this Office and from Mr. Mandeville, Her Majesty's Minister at Buenos Ayres, stating that Rear Admiral Le and of the King of the French on the coast of Brazil, avand in the South Seas, bad declared the Port of .e.Buenos Ayres, and the whole of the Rivers of the Argentine. Republic, to be in a state of strict Blockade by the French Naval Force.

The French Admiral had also declared that this Blockade was to be strictly maintained, until the grounds of complaint upon which it was estabalished should be removed; but that the foreign merchant vessels then in the Port or Roads of Buenos Ayres should have permission to depart from thence until the 10th day of May following, from which time the Blockade was to be general, and to extend equally to vessels entering or leaving

the Port.

The French Admiral had further informed Mr. Mandeville, that Her Majesty's Branch Packets, conveying the Mails between Rio de Janeiro and Buenos Ayres, would meet with no interruption from the Blockading squadron, upon the condition that the Commanders of the said Packets should declare upon their word of honor, that they are not bearers of any merchandise subject to Customhouse duties.

The remaining Services may be tendered for separately, but it is to be observed, that the Contractor for any Surveying Party is to furnish both Provisions and Forage to such party.

CONDITIONS.

All the Articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial Wheat, from which on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying Parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light Men at the Light-house, Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent. and on the Ration to prisoners of the Crown 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste,

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be deliverable in fore and hind quarters

alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—1lb. wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit, equal to 1½ of bread; 1lb. salt beef or 11b. mutton or 10oz, salt pork, equal to 11b. of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to

draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Female Orphan School, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions,

The supplies for Road Parties and Surveying Parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley, 4-12—the hay, 5-12—the bran, 2-12—the straw,

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised

for the purpose.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to

express the price per ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, ac-

country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two: will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense

charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise pro-

cured in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing it and that the contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate

the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor. General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed Forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, and from the Police Magistrates of the several Districts; and as adequate security will be required for the due fulfilment of the Contract, no Tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as such, stating that they are willing to become bound as securities for the Concording to the practice of the service. 1. NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at the Surveyor-General's Office, on or before Twelve o'clock on the 15th day of December next, from all Persons who may be willing to Contract for the Survey of Crown Lands in any County within the Boundaries of Location, the County of Bourke, at Port Phillip, and an intended new County at Geelong. Exceptions to be made of such counties as the Surveyor-General may advise.

2. Each Tender must specify the price per section, or per acre, at which the person tenders to perform the work, and also the price per line or mile of surveying, in cases where the superficial content is not required; the survey however of all section lines, rivers, water courses, roads, or other boundaries, is to be included in the price per

section.

3. The survey is to be made in every case under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Surveyor-General, or deputy Surveyor-General, on whose certificate alone that the work has been so performed, will payment for it be made.

4. Each contractor will be allowed four assigned servants for each county in which he may be employed, during the continuance of his contract.

5. The contractor or surveyor is to provide

himself with surveying and drawing instruments, paper, pencils, &c., and also with the whole of his field equipment, the contract price being intended to form his sole remuneration; each contractor will be required to perform the work himself, and to live within the county or counties for which he contracts.

6. Officers of the Surveyor-General's department will be allowed to tender; but in the event of any contract being entered into with them, the whole of their pay and other emoluments will be suspended during the continuance of it.

7. Tenders will be received only from persons

of known competency, or from those who may be willing and able to prove their competency before a Board of Examiners to be appointed by the

Government. It is also clearly to be understood, that the lowest tender will not of necessity, or as a matter of course, be in every case accepted. Security also will be required for the due and accurate performance of the work.
