MINIMUM PRICE OF LAND.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR, with reference to the Regulations for the Sale of Land, dated the 1st July, 1831, directs it to be notified that, in pursuance of instructions from THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE SECRETARY OF STATE, dated the 9th August, 1838, and received yesterday by the ship *Alfred*, the MINIMUM PRICE of Crown Land in all parts of this Colony open to selection for Purchase, including the Lands already under advertisement or applied for, will henceforth be raised from Five Shillings to Twelve Shillings Sterling per acre.

SOUTH AMERICA.

THE GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the publication of the following Extract of a Letter addressed to His Excellency by the Consul-General at Lima, dated 15th November, 1837, and received on the 11th instant, forwarding an extract of a Decree issued on the 31st of May, 1837, by the Government of the Peru-Bolivian Confederation, determining the only admissible documents in the Custom-houses thereof to prove that wheat, flour, or other raw or manufactured produce of a nature similar to the raw or manufactured produce of Chili, is not of the growth or manufacture of that republic; but which Decree, it will be observed, is not intended to be enforced in respect to vessels from New South Wales which may have left Sydney prior to its receipt here.

Extract of a Letter from the Consul-General at Lima to His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, dated 15th November, 1837.

"A British vessel, the *Medway*, having re-

cently arrived at the port of Callao, laden with a cargo of flour, I deem it advisable, in the event of similar speculations being entered into, to transmit to you, herewith, the Extract of a Decree issued on the 31st of May last, by the Government of the Peru-Bolivian Confederation, determining the only admissible Documents in the Custom-houses thereof to prove that wheat, flour, or other raw or manufactured produce of a nature similar to the raw or manufactured produce of Chili (the importation of all which into the ports of the said Confederation is absolutely prohibited) is not of the growth or manufacture of that republic.

On my representation, this Government has deferred the enforcement of this Decree in respect to vessels arriving from *Australasia* to such time as intelligence of it shall have been there received; and the present is the first opportunity which has occurred of communicating it.

"I should conceive that the certificate of the Governor, or chief authority, of a country where there are no Consuls resident, would be requisite, in lieu of the consular certificate required by the third paragraph of the second article.

ARTICLE 2. To prove that said fruits (wheat, flour, and other raw or manufactured articles similar to those produced in Chili) are the growth of a friendly country situated in the Pacific, the captain shall present—1st, A certificate from the local authority of the port from which he proceeds. 2ndly, The manifest, in which shall be specified the origin of such produce, countersigned by the Collector of Customs of said port. 3rdly, The certificate of the Consul of the Confederation resident in the said port, and, where there is none, of the Consul or Vice-Consul of any friendly state.

ARTICLE 3. The want of any of the before-mentioned documents will subject the said produce to confiscation.

NAVIGATION OF THE BRISTOL CHANNEL.

Trinity House, London, August 6, 1838.

PURSUANT to the intention expressed in the Notice issued from this House, on the 8th May last, a Light Vessel has been moored and Buoys laid in the Bristol Channel, the marks, bearings, and other particulars of which are as follow; the depths of water being those of ordinary low water spring tides, and the bearings magnetic.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

ALL Persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their Accounts through the proper channel before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of Public Monies will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st of the present month, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands, respectively, up to that date, so that the entire Revenue collected by each may be credited in the accounts of the year within which it was received.

The Heads of Departments and other Officers who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable, and with all convenient despatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of the current month to pay into the Colonial Treasury the unexpended balance of such advances, that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to the 31st instant.

They will also, as soon as practicable after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of expenses incurred within the same, which do not admit of being previously settled, so that, if possible, all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month after its termination.

The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and to report, through the proper channel, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith, on the part of the Public Officers concerned.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 2 Victoria, No. 2, intituled "*An Act for regulating the Police in the Towns of Parramatta, Windsor, Maitland, Bathurst, and other Towns, respectively, and for removing and preventing nuisances and obstructions, and for the better alignment of streets therein.*" has been pleased to direct the publication of the following description of the Boundaries of the Town of Windsor, viz:—

WINDSOR.

Commencing at a marked Oak Tree on the South Creek to the south-east of the Court House; from this Tree by South Creek to a Stake situated on the bank of the Creek, on Fitzgerald's Farm; from this Stake by a line bearing west 91 chains,

to another Stake ; from this by a line passing the north fence of Land belonging to the Benevolent Asylum, bearing west 34 degrees north 52 chains 80 links, to a marked dead Stump on Rickaby's Creek ; from this Stump by Rickaby's Creek to the Nepean River ; and by the Nepean River to a Stake nearly north of the Court House ; and from this Stake by a line bearing south 28 degrees east 28 chains to the aforesaid marked tree on South Creek.

3. The Fresh Meat for the Military Ration to be in the proportion of 5lbs. of Beef and 2lbs. of Mutton weekly; deliverable alternately in fore and hind quarters, when the quantity admits of it; for the Convict Rations the Beef is required in the same manner; Salted Beef being issued only in summer to Road Parties, and when authorised.

4. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheaten Meal, and to be twice ground.

5. The Vegetables for the Hospitals and other Establishments entitled thereto to be supplied in reasonable proportions of Potatoes, Greens, Pumpkins, Onions, &c.

The Rum to be West India, five per cent. under-proof.

MODE OF DELIVERY.

6. No part whatever of the Supplies above specified are to be received in charge of the Commissariat, but all to be delivered by the Contractor direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, upon the written order of the Commissariat Officer in charge of the District, or of the Person authorised for that purpose.

7. At the several fixed Stations the Rations for the Troops, the Convict Establishments, and Road

GENERAL CONDITIONS.

9. The whole of the supplies of every description in each District are intended to be included in one Contract; and, therefore, no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole without exception that may be required in the entire of a District, and to each District there must be a separate Tender.

10. Provisions and Forage being required by Rations according to scales under these respective

heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per Ration only, and not of the several Articles, excepting that of Rum, the price of which requires to be separately stated.

14. It will be in the power of either Party to limit the duration of the Contract by giving in writing a Notice of three calendar months to the opposite Party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such Notice can be given only from the first day of a Month.

15. The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, according to the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers in a complete state, will receive payment either in British Silver Coin, or by a Bill on Her Majesty's Treasury at the established rate of the period, at the option of the Senior Commissariat Officer.

17.
