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Working up to the anchorage of Victoria from Point Record, with a southerly wind, being well clear of the shoal off Spear Point, stand to the eastward until Point Record bears north. By not standing further in, a shoal will be avoided which runs more than a mile north of Middle Head. Standing to the westward, tack the first shoal, east.

The Settlement of Victoria is on the west shore, and may be known by its standing on a promontory which is the highest piece of land on that side of the harbour. The northern part of this promontory is now named Minto Head, its latitude being $11^{\circ} 21' 45''$ South, and longitude $132^{\circ} 18' 0''$ East, and its height from the level of the sea, about seventy-five feet. The southern part is a remarkable red cliff, the only one inside Point Record. It can be seen more than two miles outside Point Record, and will always be a leading mark to the anchorage off the Settlement. With a fair wind, and inside Point Record, steer directly for it.

The best anchorage for ships not drawing more than sixteen feet water, is, with Minto Head bearing $W. \frac{1}{2} N.$; Point Record N. by $E. \frac{1}{2} E.$; and the end of the red cliff $S. W. \frac{1}{2} S.$; in three fathoms low water, spring tides, on a muddy bottom. This anchorage is only a quarter of a mile from a very good pier which has just been built, where all cargoes may be lauded with convenience and safety. Ships of greater draught should anchor a mile and half to the N. N. E. of the above berth. It is high water at full and change, at 3h. 30m. P. M. The rise and fall at spring tides, ten feet; but the neaps are very irregular. The flood runs to the southward, the ebb to the northward.

Excellent water and wood, can be obtained in abundance. The soil is of first-rate quality, and the climate extremely healthy.

This fine port must ere long become one of very great importance to all ships from Sydney, and Van Diemen's Land, bound to India.

CONVEYANCE OF MAILS.

WITH a view to improvement in the conveyance of the Post-office Mails, and to induce a better establishment, it is proposed to afford an opportunity for the same, by extending the term of Contract to three years from 1st January, 1840. Should eligible Tenders be received, and persons disposed to Contract for their transmit to and from the undermentioned places for three years, are invited to send their offers in writing to this Office until 12 o'clock on Thursday, the 1st August next, endorsed "*Tenders for Conveyance of Mails in Cumberland.*"

From and to Sydney and Windsor, via Parramatta daily (Sundays excepted).

From and to Sydney and Campbelltown, via Liverpool daily (Sundays excepted).

From and to Sydney and Penrith daily (Sundays excepted).

It will be required of persons tendering, to specify the rate demanded per mile, and payment will be made according to the number of miles actually run over, and computed for the distance by the Surveyor-General.

Each Tender must be accompanied by a plan or model of the vehicle it is proposed to use, and each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £50 not to use any other description of carriage without the express permission of the Postmaster-General, accidents only excepted.

Each vehicle is to be supplied with a commodious and secure box for the accommodation

of the Mail Bags, and to be drawn by two horses, and not to carry more than three passengers, exclusive of the Driver, under a penalty of Five pounds for a breach of agreement in either case.

It is to be understood that the Mail is invariably to start at the hours as now or hereafter to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, and the Contractor to carry all bags or letters which may be delivered to him under the authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters.

Each Contractor will be bound under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence over and above the penalties provided by the Act of Council for the receipt or conveyance of any letter or packet by himself, or by any of his servants or passengers to the prejudice of the Post-office Revenue.

The Drivers employed, to be free men and of certified good character, and the Contractor to be answerable for the conduct of his agents and servants.

The Contractor will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes' delay after the specified time of starting.

The rate of travelling will not be less than seven miles per hour, including all stoppages, under a penalty of five shillings for every ten minutes' delay after the specified time of arrival.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly payment falling due to the Contractor.

It is desirable that each party tendering, or an agent for him, may attend at this Office on the appointed day for opening the Tenders; and that each Tender may bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post-office, and other particulars may be ascertained at the General Post-office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to apply.
