NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(ALL BEARINGS BY COMPASS.)

THE Trustees of the Liverpool Docks and Harbour do hereby give Notice, that the following changes in the lighting, beaconing, and buoying of the Northern approaches to this Port, will take place on and after the night of Thursday, October 10th, 1839: viz.—

CROSBY LIGHTHOUSE.

A new Light Tower has been erected about a

mile and a half S. S. W. of Formby Lighthouse, towards Crosby Point; the Light therefrom will be exhibited, for the first time, on the evening of the above date, and continued every night, from sunset to sunrise.

The Light in this Tower will be stationary, of a red colour, elevated 96 feet above the sea at half tide level, and will be visible between the points of S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., which limits will indicate respectively when a Vessel is Westward of Mud Wharf, and when she ought to shape her fairway course up Crosby Channel.

THE FORMBY LIGHT VESSEL

Will be moved one-fifth of a mile S. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. of her present berth, into 30 feet at low water. Her application through the half tide swatchway, when brought in a line with the Rock Lighthouse, will remain as heretofore, and when brought in a line with the New Crosby Shore Light, will lead in from Seaward through the New Cut, now called Victoria Channel, on a course of S.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

CROSBY LAND MARK.

In order to render the line of leading objects into the Victoria Channel more available in hazy weather, or accidental absence of the Light Vessel, a Beacon, surmounted by a Black Ball, has been erected on the Low Water Shore towards Crosby Point, in line of Light Vessel and Lighthouse.

THE BELL BEACON

Will be shifted a little more than $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. of her present station, into 39 feet at low water, with the Formby Light Vessel and Crosby Shore Light in one, and bearing from the North-west Light Ship N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 4 and $\frac{1}{4}$ miles, indicating the Fairway of the Channel.

These Buoys will bear N.E. and S.W. of each other, rather more than a $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile apart, the width of the Channel entrance.

V. 1. Red (Can), on N.W. spit of Victoria Channel, in 10 feet at low water, bearing from the Bell Beacon S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile.

V. 1. Black (Nun), on N.E. spit of Victoria Channel, in 11 feet at low water, bearing from the Bell Beacon E. S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., a little more than $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile.

These Buoys bear from each other N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. and S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile apart.

V. 2. Red (Can), on S. W. spit of Victoria Channel, in 12 feet at low water, bearing from V. 1. Red S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile.

- V. 2. Black (Nun), on S. E. spit of Victoria Channel, in 12 feet at low water, bearing from V. 1. Black S. E. by E., $\frac{2}{3}$ of a mile.
- N. 2. Red (Can), on North Edge of North Burbo, will be altered to V. 3., Red (Can), and shifted about $\frac{1}{3}$ of a mile E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. of its present position, into 20 feet at low water, bearing from Formby Light Vessel W. N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., $\frac{2}{3}$ of a mile.
- N. 3., Red (Can), with Perch, on N. Edge of West Middle will be altered to V. 4., Red (Can), with Perch, and shifted $\frac{1}{3}$ a mile S. E. of its present position in 17 feet at low water, bearing from Formby Light Vessel S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., about one-fifth of a mile.
- N. 3. Black (Nun), will be altered to V. 3., remaining in its present position.
- A Nun Buoy, quartered Red and White, and marked N. Fr., will be placed in the position at present occupied by N. 1. Red (Can), for the guidance of such Mariners or Pilots as may chose to take the New Channel, of which it will indicate the Fairway.
- C. 1. Black (Nun), on N. W. spit of Formby Middle, Middle Bank (Taylor's Buoy), will be moved 1 cable N. W. by W. into 20 feet at low water, bearing from Formby Light Vessel E. $\frac{1}{3}$ of a mile.

On the foregoing alterations taking place, Formby Shore Light will be discontinued, and the Buoy N. 1., Black, will be taken away; but Formby Lighthouse will remain as an object, in conjunction with the N. W. mark, for a leading line into the Formby Channel by day. The Light Ships will, from the above date, be distinguished by carrying Balls at their Mast-heads, instead of Flags. The Formby Light Ships to be painted Red; the North-west Light Ships, Black.

POINT LYNUS' LIGHT.

In order to effect a distinction between this Light, and that of the Skerries, Point Lynus' Light, which has hitherto been known to Mariners as a Fixed Light, will, on and after the night of Friday, November 1st, 1839, be changed to a Flashing Light, becoming instantaneously obscured to the Mariner at intervals of ten seconds, and remaining so obscured two seconds.

IMMIGRATION.

WITH a view to the further encouragement of the introduction into the Colony of useful and respectable Agricultural Laborers, and Mechanics from the United Kingdom, His Excellency the Governor is pleased, in accordance with the recommendation of the Committee of the Legislative Council on Immigration in their Report of 12th November, 1839, to revise the Regulations published in the Government Notices of 25th September, and 18th November, 1837, and 30th April, 1838, and directs it to be notified, that a pecuniary aid to the amount and under the conditions hereinafter specified, will be granted to those persons who shall be at the charge of bringing into New South Wales, from the United Kingdom, Emigrants of the following description, viz. —

Agricultural Laborers.
Shepherds.

Carpenters.

Smiths.

Wheelwrights.

Bricklayers.

Masons.

Female Domestic and Farm Servants.

- (1.) The sum of £38 will be granted as a bounty towards defraying the expence of the passage of every married man of any of the foregoing descriptions, and his wife, neither of whose ages shall exceed on embarkation 40 years.
- (2.) The sum of £5 will also be paid for each child between the ages of 1 and 7 years; of £10 for each child between the ages of 7 and 15 years; and of £15 for each child above 15 years, for whose parents, or either of them, the foregoing bounty is allowed, but for no other children.
- (3.) A sum of £19 will also be allowed for every unmarried female domestic or farm servant, whose age shall not be below 15, nor above 30 years, who shall come out under the protection of a married couple, as forming part of the family, and destined to remain with it until such female be otherwise provided for.
- (4.) A bounty of £19 will also be allowed for every unmarried male mechanic or agricultural laborer of any trade or calling as above enumerated, above the age of 18, and not exceeding 30 years, brought out by a person who, at the same time brings out an equal number of females, accompanying and attached to a family, as hereinbefore described.

II. With a view to encourage attention to the health, comfort, and improvement of the Emigrants during the passage, the selection of well informed Medical Men to fill the office of Surgeon Superintendent, and a zealous co-operation with them on the part of the officers of the ship, the following gratuities have been established, viz.—

A gratuity of 10s. 6d., per head, for every Emigrant brought out under these Regulations, and including children under 1 year, to the Surgeon Superintendent in charge, upon the Government being satisfied of the zealous and efficient performance of his duties.

A gratuity of 3s., to the Master, of 1s. 6d., to the First Mate, and of 1s. each to the Second and Third Mates, for every such Emigrant brought out in the ships to which they belong, provided that the Government be satisfied of their attentive, humane and orderly conduct towards the Emigrants.

The Surgeon Superintendent will be allowed, where the number of bounty Immigrants shall exceed one hundred, to appoint an Hospital Assistant, to whom, if recommended by him and approved by the Government, a gratuity of £3 will be granted. To preserve order and cleanliness amongst the Immigrants, the Surgeon Superintendent will also be allowed to appoint Overseers in the proportion of one for every fifty Immigrants, who, upon being recommended and approved as above, will be entitled to a gratuity of £2 each: Also a Teacher for the Children, who, in proportion to the numbers and to the satisfactory proofs of his good conduct, will be rewarded by a gratuity not exceeding £5. In consideration of these advantages, it will be the duty of every Surgeon Superintendent of a vessel on the Bounty System to establish a School on board, selecting the fittest person he can for the Teacher, and to

assemble the Passengers every Sunday morning for public worship, which he is to conduct with all proper seriousness and devotion.

III. In consideration of raising the Bounties to the scale hereby established, the parties claiming them, or their agents, will be required to provide the Immigrants with suitable accommodation on shore, or allow them to remain on board the ships by which they arrive, for a period not exceeding ten clear days from the time of their coming to anchor, and to supply them with a ration at least equivalent to that they received at Sea.

IV. Before any payments are made under these Regulations, the Immigrants on whose account they are claimed will be required to present themselves before a Board appointed by the Governor to inspect persons of this description, to whom the Adults are to exhibit Testimonials of good character, signed by Clergymen and respectable inhabitants of note in the places of their former residence; with which Testimonials it is necessary that every family and single person, for whom the Bounty is claimed, be provided. If the Board shall be satisfied with these Testimonials, and that the persons presenting themselves are within the prescribed ages, (to be established, where possible, by the production of copies or extracts of the registry of their Baptism, duly certified by the parish Minister, or other proper Officer), of good bodily health and strength, and in all other respects likely to be useful members of their class in society, a Certificate to such effect will be granted by the Board, or if the Immigrants be landed at Melbourne, by His Honor the Superintendent, and, this being presented at the Colonial Secretary's Office in Sydney, a warrant will be immediately issued for the payment of the sum to which the person bringing the Emigrants out shall become entitled under this Notice.

V. In addition to the foregoing Certificates, the Importer will be required to satisfy the Board that the Immigrants have been duly supplied with a sufficiency of good and wholesome provisions and water, the latter in the proportion of at least three quarts per day for every Immigrant, and with reasonable comfortable accommodation.

VI. It will be the duty also of the Board to enquire strictly whether the conditions upon which the gratuities hereby established in favour of the Surgeon Superintendent, and Officers of the Ship, have been duly fulfilled, and to report, for the intimation of his Excellency the Governor, the grounds upon which they may recommend the Gratuities to be paid or withheld, as the case may be.

VII. Any Persons desiring to avail themselves of these Bounties, are required to transmit to the Colonial Secretary, at Sydney, a List specifying, as nearly as circumstances will permit, the number, condition, and calling of the Persons they propose to bring out, and whether to Sydney or to Melbourne.

VIII. It is to be understood that Bounties will not be allowed for any Persons brought out, unless the Claimant shall have transmitted to the Colonial Secretary the list required by the foregoing paragraph, and shall have received in reply an intimation of its being the intention of this Government to grant a Bounty on the introduction of the persons described therein. This document the claimant will be required to produce to the Board, and to prove to their satisfaction that the Immi-

grants have been imported in pursuance thereof. In order to guard against the inconvenience of long outstanding claims against the Government, Bounties will not be allowed unless the Immigrants described in the application shall be presented to the Board within two years after the date of the notification of acceptance by the Colonial Secretary.

IX. It is to be distinctly understood, that parties claiming bounties under the Regulation of 25th September, 1837, will only be entitled to receive them according to the scale therein set forth, on account of any Immigrants who may sail from the United Kingdom previously to the first day of July 1840, but for any who sail after that date, they will become entitled to the increased bounties and gratuities established by the present Regulation.

X. It is also to be understood, that no expense whatever attendant upon the introduction of these Immigrants will be defrayed by Government, excepting the Bounties and Gratuities herein-before mentioned; and that the Wives and Families of Soldiers in Regiments in this Colony, or in Van Diemen's Land, and of persons serving under sentence of Transportation in either Colony, are excepted from the present Regulations.

XI. To prevent misapprehension and disappointment, and to ensure a strict adherence to the principle of this Regulation, it is proper to state that the qualifications of Immigrants brought out under it will be strictly construed. Parties therefore, who may introduce Immigrants not qualified by age, calling, character, or otherwise, will do so entirely at their own risk, and will have no claim on the Government to obtain the bounties offered by the present Notice.

SYDNEY MARKET.

RULES and Regulations for George-street Market, Sydney, under the authority of the Act of the Governor and Council, 4th William IV., No. 7, section 64.

1—The Market shall commence by ring of a bell at 5, A. M., from 1st of September to the last day of February; and at 7, A. M., from the 1st of March to the 31st of August. Any person selling, or offering for sale, in the Market, any article, before the ringing of the bell, shall forfeit and pay (10s.) ten shillings for each offence.

2—The gates of the Market shall be shut at sun-set throughout the year, excepting on Saturdays, when they may remain open till 10, P. M.; but articles for sale on the Market days may be admitted at any hour of the night previous to the Market days.

3—The Market will be kept closed during the whole of the Lord's Day, excepting the Butchers' and Poulterers' stalls, which may, however, be kept open till 10 A. M.

4—The Clerk of the Market and his assistants (being sworn constables), are required to preserve order and regularity in the Market, and to apprehend and carry before the sitting Magistrate at the Police-office any person making a riot or disturbance therein, or guilty of cursing or swearing, or using any gross or indecent language.

5—The Clerk of the Market being appointed Examiner under the Act of the Governor and Council 3 William IV., No. 4, is required to inspect all scales, weights, and measures used in the

Market, and to seize such as are fraudulent or defective, and proceed in every such case according to law.

4.—The Market Scales shall be kept by the Clerk, who shall also be provided with weights and measures, regularly stamped, by which all others used in the Market are to be adjusted; and for every examination of such weights and measures the Clerk shall receive from the person who shall cause the same to be made, the sum of 3d. for every weight and measure so compared; and when required to weigh any particular article for sale, he shall receive the sum of 1d. per cwt.

7.—All articles sold by the cwt. shall be computed by the standard of 112 lbs.; and any person selling, or offering for sale, by the cwt., any article deficient in weight by such standard, shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than 6s., nor more than 20s. for each offence.

8.—The North-east Building, marked A, will be reserved for the use of Settlers arriving from the interior, who may be themselves desirous of disposing of their own produce, of whatsoever kind the same may be, excepting only grain.

9.—The North-west Building, marked B, is appointed for the sale of beef, mutton, and other butcher's meat, pork, bacon, hams, butter, cheese, milk, eggs, poultry, game, and fish.

10.—The South-east Building, marked C, is appointed for the sale of potatoes, which shall be sold by weight only and not by measure. Any person infringing this regulation shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than 6s., nor more than 20s.; and if the whole Building be not required for the sale of potatoes, other vegetables and fruit may be sold therein, reserving always six stalls for the sale of dry goods.

11.—The South-west Building marked D, is appointed for the sale of fruit, vegetables and all garden produce of every description, excepting potatoes.

12.—Any person exposing for sale in any of the aforesaid buildings any articles not herein-before appointed to be sold therein, and any person exposing to sale any articles whatever, in the open spaces between the buildings, or adjoining to the same, shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than 5s., nor more than 20s., and any such person refusing or neglecting to remove any articles improperly exposed to sale after an order from the Clerk of the Market, or his assistant to that effect, shall forfeit and pay an additional sum not less than 5s., nor more than 20s.

13.—All carts, carriages or barrows, belonging to or in the service of persons selling goods in the Market, shall be removed from the Market and the streets adjoining at or before the morning bell, or if arriving after the time, within fifteen minutes after their arrival, any person infringing this regulation shall forfeit and pay 2s. 6d. for each cart, carriage or barrow, not so removed, and any person refusing or neglecting to remove the same after an order of the Clerk of the Market, or his assistant to that effect, shall forfeit and pay an additional sum of 5s.

14.—No carts or other carriages or barrows shall be brought inside the buildings at any time, any person infringing this regulation shall forfeit and pay 2s. 6d. for each offence. But licensed porters with barrows for the use of purchasers may

ply in the open spaces between the buildings during the Market hours, and licensed porters or any persons with baskets may enter the buildings to carry away goods.

15.—If any article for sale within the buildings shall be placed beyond the line of the pillars, the occupier of the stall or standing, shall forfeit and pay 2s. 6d., and if he shall neglect and refuse to remove such article after order of the Clerk of the Market, or his assistant, he shall forfeit and pay an additional sum of 6s.

16.—Any person being desirous of having his name and calling affixed to his stall, or to have the same enclosed and fitted up in any particular way, will apply to the Clerk of the Market, under whose directions the same may be done at the cost of the applicant.

17.—If any hooks, nails or plugs, shall be put into any part of the wood work or stone work of the building, or any name or notice written or painted thereon, or attached thereto, without the permission of the Clerk of the Market, the occupier of the stall shall forfeit and pay 2s. 6d. for each offence, and for each day which the same shall be suffered to remain after order from the Clerk of the Market or his assistant, to remove it, an additional sum of 5s.

18.—The Market days specified in the proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, dated the 28th day of October, 1834, are Tuesdays and Fridays, and subject to the provision therein contained, and to the foregoing rules and regulations, goods may be exposed for sale in this Market on any other lawful day.

It is established as a general rule that in no case shall any one individual lease more than one stall, either directly or indirectly, any infringement on this regulation shall subject the party offending to a penalty of not less than 10s., nor more than 20s. for each offence.
