HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct, that the general objects of the following Bills, about to be brought under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,
E. DEAS THOMSON.

1.—“*A Bill for facilitating proceedings by and against the Banking Company, called ‘The Port Phillip Bank,’ and for other purposes therein mentioned.*”

A Banking Company called “*The Port-Phillip Bank*” being established, and in full operation at Port Phillip, and it being thought convenient and just, that persons having demands against the said Company should be enabled by law to sue some one member thereof, in place and stead of the whole.—It is proposed

That all actions, suits, and other proceedings at law or in equity, shall be in the name of the Managing Director.

That a memorial of the name of the Managing Director shall be recorded on oath in the Supreme Court and no action shall be brought until such memorial shall be so recorded.

That the Managing Director and other officers of the Bank, shall be competent witnesses in any action, notwithstanding that they, or any of them, shall be personally interested in the result.

That execution upon any judgment may be issued against any member of the Bank, who, however, shall have his remedy against the other members

That the provisions of the proposed Act shall be at all times in force, notwithstanding a change in any or all the members of the Bank.

That nothing in the proposed Act shall be deemed or construed to incorporate the members or proprietors of the Bank.

That all bonds, covenants, mortgages, warrants of attorney, and other securities taken in the name of the Managing Director, or in the name of a Director or Directors of the Bank, may be put in suit, in the name of such Managing Director, or in the name of the Managing Director, for the time being.

That no plaintiff shall be nonsuited in any action for want of proof of the record of the memorial aforesaid.

That nothing in the proposed Act shall affect the rights of Her Majesty, or of any bodies politic or corporate.

That the proposed Act shall not take effect until notice of the Royal approbation shall be published in the *Government Gazette*.

That the proposed Act shall be a Public Act.

2.—“*A Bill to amend an Act, intituled ‘An Act for the better preservation of the Ports, Harbours, Havens, Roadsteads, Channels, Navigable Creeks and Rivers in New South Wales, and the better regulation of Shipping in the same.’*”

It being expedient and necessary, in consequence of the increase of population and the extension of Commerce in divers sea-port towns in New South Wales, to alter and amend the Act 3 WILLIAM IV, No. 6—It is proposed,

That the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may frame rules and regulations to be observed by masters of vessels in any Port or Harbour in New South Wales, except Port Jackson; provided that no penalty be imposed for any offence by any such regulations exceeding the respective penalties set forth in Schedule A of the said Act.

That the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may make increased rates to be demanded for Pilotage in the harbour of Port Phillip, provided they do not in any case exceed — per cent on the rates respectively set forth in Schedule B of the said Act.

That so much of the said Act as relates to the rates to be demanded for Water supplied

to shipping from the pipes in the Dock Yard, at Sydney, be repealed, and that in lieu thereof, other rates may be fixed by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council; provided that such new rates shall in no case exceed two shillings per tun.

That so much of the said Act as relates to the rates to be demanded for wharfage shall be repealed, and other rates established in lieu thereof.

That the several rates and charges to be demanded and received by virtue of the proposed Act, shall go to Her Majesty, for the public uses of the place whereat the same may be respectively levied.

3.—“ A Bill to repeal an Act, intituled ‘ An Act for regulating Foreign Attachment in New South Wales,’ and to consolidate and amend the laws relating to actions against persons absent from the Colony, and against persons sued as joint contractors.”

The Act 2 WILLIAM IV, No. 7, being in several particulars defective, and it being expedient to remedy such defects, and also to introduce into practice in this Colony, certain of the provisions of an Act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the third and fourth years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “ An Act for the further amendment of the law and the better advancement of justice ”—It is proposed,

That from and after the — day of — next, the said Act 2 William IV., No. 7, shall be repealed, except as to any writ of attachment issued before such day, and as to matters done, or thereafter to be done, under such writ.

That in every action at law thereafter commenced, wherein the writ of summons, or of *capeas*, shall, as to any defendant named therein, be returned *non est inventus* on affidavit that the cause of such action arose within the Colony, or its Dependencies, and that the defendant does not reside within the same, the plaintiff may proceed against the defendant by process of Foreign Attachment.

That from the time of the service of any writ of Foreign Attachment upon any garnishee, all lands and other hereditaments, monies, and chattels, bills, bonds, and other property of whatsoever nature in the custody or under the control of such garnishee, then belonging to the defendant against whom such writ is issued, and all debts, of every kind then due by such garnishee to such defendant, shall be attached in the hands of such garnishee.

That as soon as conveniently may be after the return of every such writ of attachment, the Court, or one of the Judges thereof, shall proceed to inquire and determine, whether, in fact, the plaintiff's cause of action arose within the Colony or its Dependencies; and if so, then what lands, monies, chattels, and other property there are, or, at the time of the service of such writ were, in the custody, or under the control of such garnishee, belonging to the defendant, and what debts were then due to such defendant from such garnishee, and the particulars thereof, and whether the

same or any part thereof are, or can be made, available for the purpose of making satisfaction to such plaintiff.

That if any garnishee in whose hands any such lands, goods, or property, shall have been attached as aforesaid, shall be desirous of disposing of the same, or of receiving, or paying, the amount of any bills, bond, debt or other chose in action, pending such attachment, and for that purpose shall apply to the Court, or one of the Judges thereof, it shall be lawful for the Court or a Judge thereof, (due notice of such application having been first given to the plaintiff) to authorise such garnishee, to sell or dispose of any such property, or to receive, or pay, any such amount, and the proceeds of such sale, or the amount so received, or paid, shall thereafter be held by such garnishee, or paid into Court, or invested, or be otherwise detained, or appropriated, subject to such attachment as aforesaid, or otherwise for the satisfaction of such plaintiff as the Court or Judge shall think fit to order.

That at any time after the return day of such Writ of Attachment, the plaintiff may proceed in the action.

That, so soon as upon such examination and enquiry, it shall be ascertained by the court, or sitting Judge, what lands, monies, or other property, and debts, can consistently with existing prior claims thereon, be rendered available for the purpose of making satisfaction to the plaintiff, the said court or Judge shall, forthwith order the same to be thenceforward holden for that purpose, and to continue subject to such attachment accordingly; or to be sold or otherwise disposed of, and the proceeds, or—in case of debts then payable—the amount of such debts shall be paid into the hands of some officer of the court, subject to such attachment as the court or Judge may determine; and that with respect to all and singular the lands, monies, and other property, debts and other choses in action, to which no such order shall be intended to apply, or as to which no such order can be made, the court or judge may at any time direct that the said attachment shall be dissolved. Provided that when more than one Writ of Attachment shall have issued against the same garnishee or the same property shall have been attached at the suit of more than one plaintiff, the court or judge may award and determine what parts of the property so attached, or what amount in value thereof, shall be retained or holden under each of such writs, or to be paid into court, or disposed of for the separate benefit of each plaintiff; and that as to writs lodged with the Sheriff on the same day, the plaintiffs therein shall be entitled to satisfaction *pari passu* but if any of such writs shall have been lodged with the Sheriff on different days, the Plaintiffs shall be entitled to satisfaction respectively, according to the priority of each, in such lodgment.

That within fourteen days next after any such writ of attachment shall have issued, as aforesaid, the plaintiff at whose suit the same shall have been issued, or if absent, some

person on his behalf shall enter into a bond, with two sureties, acknowledging himself and themselves to be indebted to the defendant against whom such attachment so issued, in such sum as the Judge shall order; conditioned, among other things, to repay all such sums as the plaintiff shall recover in the action, in case the judgment thereon shall thereafter be vacated, revised, or altered, together with all costs sustained by the defendant.

That at any time after such bond shall have been entered into, and after final judgment in favour of the plaintiff, it shall be lawful for him to cause a writ or writs of *feri facias* upon such judgment, to be from time to time issued, as in ordinary cases; for the amount of the debt or damages and costs thereby recovered, and cause to be taken in execution not only all the property which shall then continue subject to such attachment as aforesaid, in whose hands soever the same may be, but also any other property, real or personal, of the defendant, which such plaintiff shall then be able to find, and to receive the same, or part thereof, in satisfaction, or part satisfaction of such debt or damages and costs, at an amount to be fixed by the Sheriff, or to cause such property to be sold under such writ or writs as in ordinary cases—provided, that with respect to any such debt, or other chose in action as aforesaid, no disposition thereof shall take place, except by order of the court or one of the Judges thereof,

That if pending any such writ of Foreign Attachment, or at any time before final judgment obtained, the defendant against whom such writ shall have issued, or any person on his behalf, shall enter into a bond with two sufficient sureties, acknowledging himself and themselves to be indebted to the plaintiff in such sum as the Judge shall order; conditioned to pay the plaintiff the amount of such debt or damages and costs as he shall at any time thereafter recover in such action, it shall be lawful for such defendant, on entering an appearance, or filing a plea or pleas, to defend such action, and upon giving notice thereof to the plaintiff, to apply to the Court by motion, as of course, that the said attachment may be dissolved, and the same shall be dissolved accordingly; and the action shall thereupon proceed to trial and judgment, in the ordinary manner.

That if, after any final judgment, obtained as aforesaid, an affidavit shall be made by the defendant, against whom such process of foreign attachment shall have issued as aforesaid, that such defendant had, at the time of obtaining the said judgment, and still hath a substantial ground of defence, either wholly or in part, to the plaintiff's action on the merits, and such affidavits shall, at any time, before the expiration of three years next after such judgment, be filed in the said court, then upon motion for that purpose made to the said Court, on behalf of the said defendant, and after due notice thereof to the said plaintiff, and security being entered into for payment to him of all costs by him thereby sustained, it shall be lawful for the court to cause the merits so alleged to be inquired into

and determined in such manner as to the said court shall seem meet.

That the property of any such absent defendant may be attached and taken in the custody or power of the defendant's wife, or of any co-defendant; and that no process of Foreign Attachment against any absent defendant, nor any lien to be thereby created upon the lands, monies, securities, debts and chattels, or other property of such defendant thereby attached, shall be defeated by reason of such co-defendant, or any other garnishee, as aforesaid, being, or claiming to be, jointly interested with such defendant therein, either as partner or otherwise; and that in all cases it shall be sufficient to attach property in the hands of the persons who have the actual custody or controul thereof for the time being.

That in all cases wherein two or more defendants shall be sued as co-partners, and as to any such defendants there shall be a return of *non est inventus*, but as to any other of such defendants there shall be a return of personal service, or of *cepi corpus*, then, if at any time after any such return, an affidavit shall be filed that the defendant served or arrested, did, when the cause of action accrued, carry on business in the Colony or its dependencies, as a co-partner jointly with the defendant or defendants as to whom there shall have been such return of *non est inventus*, and that such last mentioned defendant or defendants is, or are, absent from the Colony, the plaintiff may proceed against every such absent defendant in case no appearance be entered for him, as if he, or they resided in the Colony, and had appeared to the action in person.

That the like appearance may be entered, and proceedings had when two or more defendants shall be sued, although not as co-partners, when there shall be such return as last aforesaid.

That every co-partnership, and the several members thereof, or the person or persons having carried on business under the style of any such co-partnership, may be sued in the name or names of any one or more of the members of such co-partnership on behalf of all the members comprising the same, or in the name or names of any agent or agents, for and on behalf of such co-partnership, provided that it shall distinctly appear that the person sued, is so sued as a member of, or as an agent for, and on behalf of such co-partnership.

That in all cases where two or more persons shall be sued as joint contractors, the plaintiff shall be entitled to a judgment against such of the defendants as shall appear to be liable, although one or more of the persons so made defendants shall appear not to be liable, provided that the defendants not liable shall have judgment, and be entitled to costs against the plaintiff, and to the like remedy for the same, as a defendant hath in ordinary cases.

That no plea in abatement for the nonjoinder of any person as a co-defendant shall be allowed in any action, unless it be stated in the plea that such person is resident within the jurisdiction of the court; and to any such plea

the plaintiff may reply that such person has been discharged by bankruptcy and certificate, or under any act for the relief of insolvent debtors.

That if, after any such plea in abatement, the plaintiff shall, without proceeding to trial, commence another action against the original defendant or defendants, and the person or persons named in such plea as a joint contractor or contractors, and if thereafter it shall appear that only the original defendants are liable, but that any of the persons named in such plea is or are not liable, and the defendant or defendants not so liable, shall accordingly obtain judgment for his or their costs against the plaintiff, the amount of the costs payable to the defendant or defendants so succeeding shall be allowed to the plaintiff as costs in the cause against such of the defendants so appearing to be liable, as shall have pleaded in abatement the non-joinder of such person or persons.

That every writ of attachment upon which any order shall have been made as aforesaid, when the same shall have been followed by execution levied, may be pleaded in bar by any person or persons in whose hands any lands, goods, debts, or effects as aforesaid, shall be attached to any action brought by or on behalf of the defendant for the recovery of such property.

4.—“*A Bill to amend an Act, intituled ‘An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws for the transportation and punishment of Offenders in New South Wales, and for defining the respective powers and authorities of general Quarter Sessions and of Petty Sessions, and for determining the places at which the same shall be holden, and for better regulating the summary jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace, and for repealing certain Laws and Ordinances relating thereto.’*”

It being expedient and necessary that provision should be made for the punishment of Convicts absconding and absenting themselves from their service, who may be apprehended before the expiration of their respective sentences of transportation, similar to that made in the said act for Convicts so offending, who may be apprehended after the expiration of their respective sentences.—It is proposed.

That Convicts so offending, on conviction thereof, shall, in addition to any other punishment authorised by law, be liable and required to serve for such and the like time as they shall have so absconded, and been absent from their service; and that until the expiration of the whole of such time, notwithstanding the same may exceed the respective terms of their sentences of transportation, they shall be subject to such and the like punishment, and be dealt with in all respects as convicts whose sentences of transportation have not expired.

It being also expedient and necessary to alter and amend so much of the said act, as relates to punishment for absconding a second time or oftener.—It is further proposed.

That every male convict so offending shall be liable, at the discretion of any Bench of

Magistrates, to be kept to labor in irons on the roads or public works of the Colony, for any time not exceeding two years.

5.—“*A Bill to declare and extend the Laws of New South Wales to Her Majesty’s dominions, in the Islands of New Zealand, and to apply the same, as far as applicable, in the administration of justice therein; and to indemnify certain officers for acts already done.*”

It being expedient that the laws of New South Wales should be enforced in Her Majesty’s dominions, in the Islands of New Zealand, so far as the same can be applied in the administration of justice therein.—It is proposed.

That all laws, and acts or ordinances of the Legislative Council of New South Wales, which now are, or at any time hereafter may be in force within the Colony of New South Wales, shall extend to, and be applied in the administration of justice within the dominions, in the said Islands of New Zealand, which now are, and hereafter may be acquired in sovereignty by Her Majesty, so far as the same can be applied therein.

It being further expedient and necessary to indemnify the Lieutenant Governor, and all Justices of the Peace, Constables, and others acting within Her Majesty’s said dominions in the Islands of New Zealand, for all acts heretofore done and performed by them, respectively, under and by virtue of Commissions or appointments from Her Majesty or Her Majesty’s Government of New South Wales;—It is proposed.

That all Acts heretofore so done or performed by the said Lieutenant-Governor, Justices of the Peace, Constables, and others respectively, shall be, and be declared to be, as good and effectual in law, as if such persons respectively had done and performed such acts within, and under and by virtue of any law or ordinance of, the Colony of New South Wales.

6.—“*A Bill to authorise the Election of Commissioners of Police and Public Works in the Colony of New South Wales.*”

It being considered expedient that provision should be made for the maintenance of a police force, and for the construction and keeping in repair of highways, roads, bridges, and other public works within the Colony of New South Wales, and that for such purposes Commissioners should be elected in the several police districts throughout the Colony.—It is proposed,

That Commissioners of police and public works shall be elected accordingly in the several police districts in the Colony, to be styled “THE COMMISSIONERS OF POLICE AND PUBLIC WORKS;” and that the number of such Commissioners shall be in proportion to the population of the respective districts for which they shall be elected.

That meetings shall be held for the purposes of such elections on the first Tuesday in every year; and that the first elections shall take place at such place in each district as the Governor shall appoint, and the next and all

subsequent elections, as such places as shall be appointed by the Magistrates assembled in Petty Sessions in each district.

That every male inhabitant of each district who shall possess property to the amount of four hundred pounds, or who shall be in the actual occupation of premises within the same, of the yearly value of twenty pounds, shall be entitled to vote at such elections; but no person shall be entitled to vote who shall be six months in arrear for any rate authorised to be levied under the proposed Act; nor any person who shall at any time have been under sentence of transportation, unless the same shall have expired at least three years before, or unless such person shall have held a Conditional Pardon for the like period; provided that no person who shall have obtained a Free Pardon shall be disqualified for voting at such elections by reason of his former conviction.

That no person shall be qualified to be elected to the office of Commissioner, unless he possesses property within the district, to the value of three thousand pounds, at the least, nor any person who shall have been under sentence of transportation, unless he shall have obtained a free pardon, or unless his sentence of transportation shall have expired at least seven years before.

That the Magistrates in Petty Sessions assembled in each district, shall appoint a proper person to preside at each election, and shall also appoint two assessors to assist such presiding officer, together with police clerks and other necessary officers.

That every such election shall be before the presiding officer and assessors so appointed for each district, and shall commence at 9 o'clock in the forenoon and finally close at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

That any person who shall falsely answer the questions to be put to him in certain cases before he shall be deemed qualified to vote, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour, and may be punished accordingly.

That the presiding officers shall examine the voting papers, to ascertain who are elected Commissioners; and, in case of equality of votes for any two, or more persons, shall name from among the persons for whom the votes shall be equal, so many as shall be necessary to complete the number of Commissioners to be elected.

That the presiding officer of each district shall cause a list of the names of the persons so elected, to be published in the "*Government Gazette*" within one week from the day of election.

That in case of the death, or incapacity of the presiding officer of any district to execute the duties of his office, the Governor may appoint some other person to act in his stead.

That one-third of the number of Commissioners shall go out of office annually; and that as vacancies occur they shall be filled up by the same process as for ordinary elections.

That on application to that effect from the Justices of any district, the Governor may divide the same into sub-districts, and appoint

separate places for the polling of elections, and with the advice of the Executive Council, to appoint the proportionate number of Commissioners to be elected by each division.

That if the Justices of two or more districts, or a majority of them, shall make application to that effect, the Governor may unite the same, for the purposes of the proposed Act, or alter the limits of any such district or districts.

That the Commissioners of each district shall be a body corporate, having a perpetual succession, and shall have a common seal, and may sue and be sued; and that in all legal proceedings it shall be sufficient to serve notice upon the chairman to be nominated by the Commissioners from among themselves, a memorial of whose name shall be recorded on oath in the Supreme Court, within thirty days after nomination.

That the Commissioners may appoint a treasurer, surveyor, clerks, collectors, valuator, or any other necessary officers, and may assign and order payment of salaries to them respectively.

That the Commissioners may enter into contracts for the performance of any matter appertaining to their duties, provided no such Commissioners shall have personal interest therein.

That the Commissioners may order and direct the levying of rates within their respective districts; for which purpose they shall cause an accurate valuation to be made of all property within the district, in which shall be included all cattle, horses, and sheep, as well as all land, whether waste or in cultivation, the former in no case to be stated at less than one shilling per acre per annum, provided that no such rate shall exceed — in the pound, and that no greater number than — rates shall be levied in any one and the same year.

That for every rate of — in the pound, the Commissioners may levy a corresponding rate of — shillings for each and every male convict assigned to the respective persons so rated.

That all monies levied under the proposed Act shall be paid into the hands of the treasurer of each district, and shall go in the first place towards the maintenance of the police of such district, as shall be directed by any Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, provided always that no such treasurer shall issue any sum of money except upon an order signed by at least — of such Commissioners; and the residue of such monies shall be applied by the Commissioners towards the construction and repair of highways, roads, bridges, and other public works or buildings; provided that the Commissioners shall apply no portion of such funds to the improvement or repair of any road, which has been, or shall be declared to be, a parish road, under the provisions of any Act of Council.

That the monies so rated shall be paid by the respective proprietors, &c., to the collectors of each district, and shall by them be paid to the treasurer of such district, and if

any of such rates shall not be so paid to the collector, within fourteen days after demand thereof, the same may be recovered by distress and sale of the defaulter's goods.

That parties aggrieved may appeal within — months to the General or Quarter Sessions to be holden for the district, provided that notice of such appeal shall be given to the Commissioners full twenty days before the sittings of such Courts; and that witnesses shall not be disqualified by reason of the non-payment of any such rates.

7.—“*A Bill to empower the Governor of New South Wales to appoint Commissioners to examine and report on claims to Grants of Land in New Zealand.*”

Her Majesty having declared by instructions under the hand of one of Her Principal Secretaries of State, dated 14th of August, 1839, that it is Her Royal will and pleasure not to recognise any titles to land in the Islands of New Zealand, which do not proceed from, or are not, or shall not be allowed by Her Majesty, and it being expedient and proper to put beyond doubt the invalidity of all titles to land within the said Islands, founded upon conveyances or other titles, from the uncivilized tribes or aboriginal inhabitants thereof. It is proposed,

That all titles to land within the said islands of New Zealand, so founded as aforesaid, which are not, or may not hereafter be allowed by Her Majesty, shall be absolutely null and void.

Her Majesty having also, by the said instructions, declared Her gracious intention to recognize claims to land which may have been obtained on equitable terms from the chiefs or aboriginal inhabitants of the said Islands, and which may not be prejudicial to the present or prospective interests of Her Majesty's subjects resorting thereto.—It is proposed,

That the Governor may issue Commissions, and thereby appoint Commissioners to examine into and report on all claims to grants of land in New Zealand; and a Secretary to such Commissioners.

That the Governor, in fulfilment of Her Majesty's gracious intentions, may refer to such Commissioners the claims of all parties to have grants of land within the said Islands executed to them in due form of law; but that all claims shall be null and void which shall not be preferred in writing to the Colonial Secretary within the six months following the passing of the proposed Act.

That the Commissioners shall be guided only by the real justice and good conscience of each case; and shall in every instance enquire into and set forth the price or the sterling value of the consideration given to the chiefs or aboriginal inhabitants for the land claimed, without taking into account the price or consideration which may have been given for such land by any subsequent purchaser, or to any person or persons save such chiefs or aboriginal inhabitants as aforesaid; and if the said Commissioners or any two of them, shall be satisfied that any such claimant is entitled, according to Her Majesty's gracious declaration as aforesaid, to have a

grant of such land made to him such Commissioners shall report the same, with the grounds thereof, to the Governor, setting forth the situation and other particulars by which such land may be described in the grant; but the Commissioners shall recommend no grant of land which shall exceed — acres in extent, or which shall comprehend any Headland, Promontory, Bay, or Island, that may hereafter be required for the purposes of defence, or for the site of any town; nor of any land situate on the sea-shore within — yards of high water mark; nor of any land situate within — miles of the mouth of any river navigable for vessels of more than fifty tons burthen; nor of any land which in point of situation, or otherwise, would have been, if situated in New South Wales, not open to the selection of settlers, under the Government Regulations which were in force on the 1st of July 1831; provided also, that nothing in the proposed Act shall be deemed to oblige the Governor to make any such grant unless His Excellency shall think fit so to do.

That the meetings of the Commissioners for the purposes of the proposed Act, shall be at such places as the Governor may appoint.

That the Commissioners shall have power to summon witnesses, &c.

That the evidence of aboriginal natives shall be received.

That the Commissioners and Secretary shall respectively receive such salaries as the Governor may appoint.

That there shall be paid to the Secretary by every person making any such claim, the usual fees to be, in the schedule to the proposed Act, set forth.

At a Meeting of the Trustees of the New South Wales Savings' Bank, held on Monday, the 20th April, 1840.

PRESENT,

A COMMISSION

from his Excellency, Sir George Gipps, dated the 4th day of November, 1839, appointing the Honourable Edward Deas Thomson to be Vice-President, John Blaxland, Roger Therry, Thomas Shadforth, William Charles Wentworth, Thomas Walker, William Lithgow, Alexander Brodie Spark, Thomas Urmsen Ryder, Edey Manning, William Dawes, Thomas Gore, James Raymond,

Andrew Blowers Smith, Henry Smyth, Robert Lethbridge, John Lord, and Stuart Alexander Donaldson, Esquires, to be Trustees to the New South Wales Savings' Bank, was read.

The Trustees then proceeded to revise the Rules and Regulations of the Bank, and resolved that the following be now adopted, and the same, when approved by his Excellency the Governor, and from the date of their publication in the *Government Gazette*, be binding on the present and all future depositors.

1.—APPOINTMENT OF ACCOUNTANTS.

That the following gentlemen be the Accountants in Sydney, and other districts, viz:—Sydney, George Miller; Windsor, John Ashcroft; Bathurst, George Fergusson; Maitland, John S. Mein; Parramatta, Charles Croaker; Goulburn, Charles E. Newcombe; Wollongong, William Taylor.

2.—ATTENDANCE OF TRUSTEES.

One Trustee in rotation successively, and the Accountant shall attend in Sydney every Saturday evening, (except the 1st and 2nd Saturdays in January,) at 7 o'clock at the Bank Office, and remain there until 9, and on every Thursday (except the first and second Thursdays in January) between the hours of one and two o'clock, for the purpose of receiving deposits, as may be offered agreeably to the rules of the Institution, and entering such deposits when received in the rough cash book, and in the duplicates of their accounts, to be kept by the depositors as after mentioned; and the office shall be open every Monday morning except the first and second Mondays in January. Between the hours of 9 and 11 o'clock for making repayments to depositors.

3.—LENDING OF MONEY.

That as often as the Trustees shall see fit, they will meet for the purpose of lending the money of the Bank.

4.—ATTENDANCE OF ACCOUNTANT.

It shall be the duty of the Accountant in Sydney to attend the weekly and all other meetings of the Trustees, and to keep regular and distinct books of the whole affairs of the Bank, the transactions of which shall be duly entered and posted therein, as also the accounts of depositors in the districts, from lists furnished to him by the district accountants, and the whole shall be regularly balanced on the 31st day of December, in each year, exclusive of which the trial balance to the last day of each of the other three quarters of the year, shall likewise be prepared by him on the close of each quarter.

5.—ACCOUNT BOOKS.

The books to be kept shall consist of a rough and fair cash journal and ledgers, and a minute book, wherein shall be entered the minutes of the proceedings of the trustees at all their meetings.

6.—DESCRIPTION AND DECLARATION OF DEPOSITORS.

Free persons becoming depositors in the Bank must, on and previous to making their first deposit, disclose their names, professions, business, occupations, callings, and residences, and sign a declaration acknowledging that they, or the person on whose behalf such deposit is made, have received due and full notice of the rules and regulations of the said Bank; and that the same are binding on them and their representatives.

7. DEPOSIT BOOKS OR DUPLICATES.

All deposits and repayments are to be entered in the books of the Bank, and also in a deposit book or duplicate, to be given gratis to each depositor on opening an account with the Bank; and in which the sum received or paid on each occasion is to be entered in words at length, and signed with the initials of one trustee and the accountant; and whenever any business is transacted the deposit book or duplicate must be produced; and in case any depositor shall lose the book or duplicate, immediate notice must be given to the accountant, who, upon a satisfactory explanation being given of the loss, and payment of two shillings and sixpence in aid of the funds of the Bank, will fill up another book or duplicate to be copied from the depositor's account in the Bank ledger; but if any money shall have been drawn from the Bank by any other person producing such book or duplicate, and representing himself or herself to be the depositor mentioned therein, before such notice shall have been given to the accountant, or if such depositor shall fail or neglect altogether to give such notice, the loss shall fall on the depositor so losing his or her book or duplicate.

8.—DEPOSITS OF PERSONS UNABLE TO ATTEND.

Forms for signature may be had at the Bank office, enabling persons to become depositors who cannot attend to sign the declaration appointed by the last rule. Those who are already depositors may send the deposit books or duplicates and additional sums by other persons.

9.—WITHDRAWING DEPOSITS.

Depositors may receive the whole or any part of their money on giving due notice, in conformity with the 17th clause of the Act of Council, 3rd Victoria, No. 12; provided, however, that they apply for payment at the hours previously fixed for making repayments to depositors. Payments can be made only to the depositors personally, and on his or her receipt, or to the bearer of an order signed by the depositor, and witnessed if the depositor cannot write. Forms of such orders may be obtained "gratis" on application at the Bank office.

10.—RESTRICTION OF DEPOSITORS.

The trustees reserve the option of returning or rejecting the deposits of any person or persons whom they may deem it inexpedient to continue or admit as a depositor.

11.—CERTIFICATES OF DEPOSITS.

In all cases where a certificate may be required of the state of the account of any depositor with this Bank, such certificate shall be in the following form, signed by one Trustee, and countersigned by the Accountant

12. ARBITRATION OF DIFFERENCES.

In case any difference shall arise between the Trustees of this Bank, or any person or persons acting under them, and any individual depositor therein, or any trustee, executor, next of kin, or creditor of any deceased depositor, or any person claiming to be such, then and in every such case the matter in dispute shall be referred to the arbitration of two indifferent persons, one to be chosen or nominated by the trustees, or the majority of them, and the other by the party with whom the dispute may arise; and in case the arbitrators so appointed may agree, their decision shall be final and binding upon both parties; but if they shall not agree, then such matter in dispute shall be referred in writing to Her Majesty's Attorney-General for the Colony, or to such other party as he may appoint to act in his behalf; and this decision of the Attorney-General, or of the person so appointed to act in his behalf, shall be binding and conclusive on all parties, and shall be final, to all intents and purposes, without any appeal; and the said award, order, or determination, shall declare by whom the expence of the reference to the Attorney-General shall be payable; and such award, order, and determination, shall be made a rule of the Honorable the Supreme Court, and may be therein enforced by attachment.

BUSHRANGERS.

SEVERAL districts of the Colony having recently been infested by Bushrangers who, when captured, carried their outrages to a considerable extent, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified that in the event of any Bushrangers, either armed or of a known desperate character, appearing in any district, the Police Magistrates and Benchers have been requested to swear in as many special constables as they may require, calling upon the holders of tickets of leave within the district to serve as such, if necessary, with whose exertions co-joined with that of the established police, it may be hoped that such lawless characters would be speedily apprehended.

His Excellency is pleased to remark, however, that he is satisfied neither these measures nor any others the Government can adopt will be of any permanent avail unless a stop can be put to the system of harbouring bushrangers, which recent circumstances have proved to be practised on the establishments of settlers to a considerable extent; nor can the exertions either of the regular police or of special constables be rendered efficient unless prompt and willing assistance be afforded them by the settlers, especially, in the supply of provisions and horses, it being impossible to follow bushrangers with any hope of overtaking them, unless the pursuers have at least the same facilities for obtaining fresh horses as the bushrangers themselves possess.

The Governor further directs it to be notified that he will feel himself compelled to withdraw the assigned servants from any establishment on which it shall be proved that bushrangers have been harboured, or in any way assisted, and that he will cancel all tickets of leave held by persons on the same establishment, if upon a full review of the circumstances of the case there shall appear to

have been any neglect on the part of the assignees to provide for the proper discipline and control of their servants, or any omission on the part of the ticket of leave holders to afford any information or assistance in their power which might have been the means of bringing the guilty parties to justice.

CIRCULAR.] *Colonial Secretary's Office,
Sydney, 3rd June, 1840.*

SIR,—I am directed by the Governor to call your attention to the Notice published in this day's *Government Gazette*, respecting the district of Carcor, and to inform you that His Excellency has been driven to the issue of it as a last resource, in order to enlist all classes of society in one strenuous effort, to put down the system of deprecation which has so long prevailed in the Colony, and to bring to justice the parties who are guilty of abetting, concealing, or in any way harbouring or protecting the perpetrators of crime.

In the present state of the finances of the Colony His Excellency instructs me to say, that it is impossible to increase the expenditure on account of the police; neither does it appear to him that the additions which have been made to it during the last two years have produced a corresponding effect in increasing the public security; and the only other way in which the efficiency of the police can be increased, appears to him to be in having recourse to the services of holders of tickets-of-leave. The Governor therefore hereby authorizes you to swear in, on any emergency, or even for the current services of the district under your charge, any number of special constables from amongst the holders of such tickets, as circumstances may seem to require.

With this assistance, and with the further aid which His Excellency hopes will be derived from the increased energy in all classes of the commu-

nity called forth by the Notice of this day, Sir George Gipps trusts considerable effects may be produced. As it is however, only by their effects that he can judge of the exertions made by the police in any district, for the suppression of crime, His Excellency desires it to be understood, that the whole Police Establishments of any district will be removed, in which, within a reasonable time after promulgation of the notice referred to, disorder may still prevail.

ASSIGNED SERVANTS.

If any assistance be required towards the erection of buildings, the application must be made in the annexed form Z, specifying the object, amount of contributions collected, and other particulars therein mentioned; nominating Trustees for the approval of the Governor and Executive Council; enclosing a plan and specification of the intended Building; and describing the nature of the Title to the site, without satisfactory proof of the validity of which, no aid whatever can be granted towards the purpose stated.

5. If the objects of the Institution, and the manner of conducting it, are such as in the opinion of the Governor to render it deserving of support from the public funds, application will be made to the Legislative Council for such aid as it may be deemed proper to grant, in no case exceeding the amount of private contributions and donations from public bodies.

Such account will then be referred to some competent Architect appointed on behalf of the Government, who will be required to examine the building, and certify that the workmanship and materials are good and sufficient, and conformable to the plan and elevation laid before the Governor and Council, and that he believes the specified sum to have been actually laid out. One half of the amount of any sums so expended and certified, will be issued to the Trustees from time to time; but it is to be understood that the number of examinations and issues is not on account of any one building to exceed two intermediate, and one final, or three in the whole.

8. No expenditure can be sanctioned unless the estimate be sent in, and the amount voted by the Legislative Council as above mentioned.
