PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General, and Governor-in-Chief, of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a certain Act of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Act intituled "An Act to repeal an Act of Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act intituled "An Act to repeal an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, intituled 'An Act to authorize the erection of Pounds, and for regulating the impounding of Cattle, and to make further and other provisions in lieu thereof,'" it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor of the said Colony, by any order to be by him from time to time published in the Government Gazette, to declare that the Poundkeeper of any Public pound should not be required to cause public notice of Cattle impounded therein to be published in the Government Gazette, but to be inserted in one or more of the public newspapers of the district wherein such public pound should be situate, or to be in any other manner published as the said Governor might direct; now, therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested, do hereby direct that notice of all Cattle impounded in the Public Pounds in the District of Port Phillip, shall be published by the Poundkeeper of such pound, in one or more of the Newspapers published at the town of Melbourne, in the county of Bourke, in the said District.

And, whereas, by the said recited Act, it was further enacted, that whenever the Governor or Acting Governor for the time being, should deem it expedient and advantageous to extend the provisions of an Act of the said Governor and Council, passed in the Fourth year of the Reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to repeal an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, intituled 'An Act to authorise the Erection of Pounds; and for regulating the Impounding of Cattle,' and to make

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further and other provisions in lieu thereof," so far as the same relate to any person suffering any Cattle belonging to him, or in his charge, to stray or go about, or to be tethered or depastured in any street or public place within the limits or reputed limits of the several Towns in the said Act mentioned, to such other Towns then erected or thereafter to be erected or established at any place within the said Colony, as might thereafter be deemed necessary, it should be lawful for the said Governor or Acting Governor for the time being to declare the same by Proclamation;" Now, I, the Governor, aforesaid, do hereby further declare that so much of the said last recited Act as relates to the straying of Cattle as is herein before specified, shall be extended to the said Town of Melbourne, in the County of Bourke, aforesaid.

And, whereas, it is expedient that the Sub-Treasurer at Melbourne should, in respect of all matters or things required to be done under the Provision of the said recited Acts in the Districts of Port Phillip, and for and on behalf of the Colonial Treasurer in Sydney; now, I, the Governor aforesaid, do hereby further declare, that the said Sub-Treasurer shall act for and on behalf of the said Colonial Treasurer accordingly.

PORT PHILLIP.

From and to Melbourne and Yass, once a week for the whole distance, or separately for portions of the road, as follows:—

From and to Yass and Albury, on the Murray, Albury and Mitchell's Town, and Mitchell's Town and Melbourne.

From and to Melbourne and Geelong, once a week.

As expedition is of so much importance, offers for any quicker conveyance of the Mails than is now effected will be favourably entertained; but it is to be understood that they are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance; and the contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £ 5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £ 3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £ 10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the

Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party Tendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a Bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post Office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

Printed forms of Tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

POST OFFICE.

THE Postmaster-General having brought under notice the practice which is understood to prevail of bags or mails of letters being made up by merchants and others for despatch, by vessels sailing for Great Britain or elsewhere HIS EXCELLENCY the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that under the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 5th William IV., No. 24, section 22, any person sending letters or packets chargeable with postage, otherwise than by post, is liable to a penalty of not less than £2, nor more than £20, for every such letter or packet so sent, and that orders have been given for strictly enforcing the penalty in future. His Excellency at the same time directs it to be notified, that masters of vessels render themselves liable to the same penalty, by receiving any letter or packet, on board, except through the Post Office; but that they will be entitled to receive one penny for each letter, or packet sent to them by the Postmaster-General, or Postmaster of the place from which they may be about to depart.

CONTRACTS

FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE FOR 1841.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this office until Thursday the 20th of October next, at noon, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the Supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during twelve calendar months, commencing 1st January 1841, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, or other mounted parties when required—

1lb of fresh meat, 1lb of wheaten bread, 1-7th of an imperial quart of rum.

2. The Ration for Emigrants—For men: 24oz. wheat bread, 16 oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 1½oz. sugar, ¼oz. soap.—For Women: 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 1½oz. sugar, ¼oz. soap.—Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

3. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown and others in the employment of Colonial Departments when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in Nos. 2, 3, and 4—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, ¼oz. soap.

4. The Ration to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties: 24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 2½oz. sugar, ½oz. tobacco, ¼oz. soap.

5. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light Vessel, Sydney Harbour—16oz. wheat bread, 8oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. tea, 3oz. sugar, 2½oz. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint vinegar.

6. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house, South Head, and Boatmen in the Departments of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police—24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, ¼oz. soap.

7. Flour, tea, sugar and tobacco, bread or meat, in such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others, in the Department of the Colonial Engineer, and other Colonial Establishments, when authorised.

8. To Prisoners confined in Gaol: 12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ½oz. soap. (Ration No. 3 is issued to Gaol Attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 10.)

9. To Children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol—8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, ¼oz. yellow soap.

10. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24oz. wheat bread—(Ration No. 3 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses, to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

11. Forage for Horses and Oxen—8lbs. maize, or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

12. For the Light-house, South-head, and Floating-light, Sydney Harbour—Best sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks, each.

13. Fuel and Light—Firewood per 100lbs.; sperm oil, common oil, per gallon imperial mould candles, dipt candles, cotton wick, per lb.

14. For Emigrants or other Persons or Establishments in Sydney, when ordered—Fresh beef, fresh mutton, maize meal, the best wheaten bread, bread of 2nd and 3rd quality, ditto flour, arrow-root, sago, rice, tea, sugar, oatmeal, salt, yellow soap, pearl barley, tobacco, vegetables, per lb; milk per quart; port wine per dozen; vinegar per

imperial gallon ; roach lime per bushel ; straw for bedding per 100lbs.

15. For the Lunatic Asylum at Tarban Creek—fresh beef, fresh mutton, the best wheaten bread, bread of 2nd and 3rd quality, rice, tea, sugar, salt per lb., milk per quart.

MALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, LIVERPOOL.—Daily Rations of Provisions.

No. 1. To the Master, Schoolmaster, and Men employed as servants or laborers and to every two of the Master's Children—22 oz. flour, 16 oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

No. 2. To the Wives of the Master and Storekeeper, and Female Servants entitled to Rations—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. soap.

No. 3. Children above six years of age—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

No. 4. Nursery Children under six years of age—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

SUPPLIES.

No. 5. For the use of the Establishment—3 $\frac{1}{2}$ pints of oil, and 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of vinegar, daily.

No. 6. For Artificers and Laborers— $\frac{2}{8}$ oz. of tobacco daily, when authorised.

No. 7. Forage for a Horse—10lbs. of Maize, daily.

No. 8. Flour, tea, sugar, salt, pear-barley, rice, oatmeal, arrow-root, sago, yeast, lard, candles, and soap, as required.

FEMALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, PARRAMATTA.—Daily Rations of Provisions.

No. 1. To the Superintendent, and Men employed as laborers, or servants, the same as No. 1 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 2. To the Matron and Female Servants, entitled to Rations, the same as No. 2 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 3. To each of the Female Orphans and Children—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. soap. On Sundays, 12oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. maize meal, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. soap.

For Children under seven years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, at the discretion of the Superintendent, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. flour.

No. 4. For the use of the Establishment—1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pints of oil, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pints of vinegar daily.

No. 5. For Artificers and Labourers—The same as No. 6 of the Male Orphan School.

No. 6. Forage—The same as No. 7 of the Male Orphan School.

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No. 7. Best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, sago, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, yeast, lard, candles, soap, as required.

The Holidays at these Schools are, New Year's Day, Easter Day, Christmas Day, and the Queen's Birth Day,

INSTITUTION FOR DESTITUTE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHILDREN, SYDNEY.

No. 2. To the Female Servants—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. soap.

No. 3. To children above six years of age—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying and Mounted Police Parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light-house, Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be deliverable in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground,

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—1 lb. wheat flour or 1 lb. biscuit, equal $1\frac{1}{2}$ of bread; 1 lb. salt beef or 1 lb. mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1 lb. of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Female Orphan School, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c. &c.

The supplies for Road and other Parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 6-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Separate Tenders will be required for the Forage in the District of Sydney; but the other supplies for that district are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Orphan Schools and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract; and therefore no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and to each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders to be made for each of the Orphan Schools, and for the Lunatic Asylum.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one half the

price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, falling of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the Contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed Forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, and from the Police Magistrates of the several Districts; and as adequate security will be required for the due fulfilment of the Contract, no Tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as such,

stating that they are willing to become bound as securities for the Contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which the Contracts will be again advertised, or another Tender accepted.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.
