HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the following ORDER IN COUNCIL respecting the Transportation of Convicts be republished for general information.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the 5th year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled, "*An Act for the Transportation of Offenders from Great Britain,*" it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for his Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, from time to time to appoint any place or places beyond the seas, either within or without his Majesty's dominions, to which felons and other offenders under sentence or order of transportation or punishment should be conveyed. And whereas by an Order made by the advice of his said late Majesty's Privy Council, on the 23rd June, 1824, his said late Majesty was pleased, in pursuance of the power so vested in him as aforesaid, to appoint New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land, and all Islands adjacent thereto, to be places to which felons and other offenders then being, or thereafter to be, under sentence or order of transportation or punishment, should be conveyed under the provisions of the said recited Act. And whereas by the said Act it was further enacted, that it should be lawful for his Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to declare his Royal Will and Pleasure that male offenders convicted in Great Britain, and being under sentence or order of transportation, should be kept to labour in any part of his Majesty's dominions out of England, to be named in such Order or Orders in Council. And whereas his said late Majesty, in pursuance of the powers so vested in him, was further pleased,

by and with the advice aforesaid, by the Order in Council aforesaid, to declare his Royal Will and Pleasure, that male offenders convicted in Great Britain, and being under sentence or order of transportation should be kept to hard labour in his Majesty's colony of Bermuda: and whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the sixth year of the reign of his said late Majesty, intituled, "*An Act for punishing Offences committed by Transports kept to Labour in the Colonies, and better regulating the Powers of Justices of the Peace in New South Wales,*" it was among other things enacted, that it should and might be lawful for his said late Majesty, by any Order or Orders to be by him from time to time for that purpose issued by the advice of his Privy Council, to appoint, or by any such Order or Orders in Council to authorize the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other person for the time being administering the government of any of his Majesty's foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, to appoint the place or places within his Majesty's dominions to which any offender convicted in any such foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, and being under sentence or order of transportation, shall be sent or transported; and it was thereby enacted, that all such persons should, within the place or places to which, in pursuance of any such Order or Orders in Council, they should or might be so sent or transported, be subject and liable to all such and the same laws, rules, and regulations as were or should be in force in any such place or places with respect to convicts transported from Great Britain. And whereas in pursuance of the said last recited Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the powers thereby vested in him, his said late Majesty, on the 11th day of November, 1825, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, did order that the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other persons for the time being administering the government of any of his Majesty's foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, should from time to time, by proclamation to be by them respectively for that purpose issued, appoint the place or places within his Majesty's dominions to which any offender in any

such foreign possessions, colonies, or plantations, and being under sentence or order of transportation, should be sent or transported.

And whereas it hath seemed fit to Her Majesty, on the advice of her Privy Council, to revoke the said recited Orders in Council, and substitute in lieu thereof such other provisions as are herein-after mentioned. Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers vested in her Majesty in Council by the said recited Acts of Parliament, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that upon and from the 1st day of August, in this present year, 1840, the said recited Orders in Council of the 23rd day of June, 1824, and of the 11th day of November, 1825, shall be, and the same are hereby revoked, so far as respects any Act, matter, or thing to be done from and after the said 1st day of August, 1840, in the premises. And it is hereby further ordered, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority aforesaid, that from and after the said 1st day of August, 1840, the Island of Van Diemen's Land and Norfolk Island, and the Islands adjacent to and comprised within the government of Van Diemen's Land, shall be the places to which felons and other offenders in the United Kingdom, then being or thereafter to be under sentence or order of transportation, shall be conveyed under the provisions of the said recited Act of the 5th year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Fourth; and it is hereby further ordered, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority aforesaid, that male offenders convicted in the United Kingdom shall, from and after the said 1st day of August, 1840, in pursuance of the provisions of the said last recited Act, be kept to hard labour in Her Majesty's colony of Bermuda; and it is further ordered, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority aforesaid, that from and after the said 1st day of August, 1840, the respective Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and other persons for the time being administering the government of any of Her Majesty's colonies, shall, in pursuance of the provisions of the said recited Act of the 6th year of the reign of his said late Majesty, by proclamation to be by them respectively for that purpose issued, appoint the place or places within Her Majesty's dominions to which any offender convicted in any such colonies, and being under sentence or order of transportation, shall be sent or transported, provided that neither the said colony of Bermuda, nor any of Her Majesty's colonies in New Holland, or in the Southern Ocean, be so appointed for that purpose by any such proclamation as aforesaid, other than the said Island of Van Diemen's Island and Norfolk Island, and the islands adjacent to and comprised within the government of Van Diemen's Land. And the Most Noble the Marquis of Normanby, and the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary instructions herein accordingly as to them may respectively appertain.

As expedition is of so much importance, offers for any quicker conveyance of the Mails than is now effected will be favourably entertained; but it is to be understood that they are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance; and the contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stop-

pages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £ 5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £ 3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £ 10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party Tendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a Bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post Office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

CONTRACTS

FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE FOR 1841.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this office until *Thursday the 29th of October next, at noon*, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the Supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during twelve calendar months, commencing 1st January 1841, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, or other mounted parties when required—

1lb of fresh meat, 1lb of wheaten bread, 1-7th of an imperial quart of rum.

2. The Ration for Emigrants—*For men*: 24oz. wheat bread, 16 oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.—*For Women*: 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.—Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

3. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown and others in the employment of Colonial Departments when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in Nos. 2, 3, and 4—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

4. The Ration to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties: 24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

5. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light Vessel, Sydney Harbour—16oz. wheat bread, 8oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 3oz. sugar, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint vinegar.

6. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house, South Head, and Boatmen in the Departments of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police—24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

7. Flour, tea, sugar and tobacco, bread or meat, in such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others, in the Department of the Colonial Engineer, and other Colonial Establishments, when authorised.

8. To Prisoners confined in Gaol: 12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. (Ration No. 3 is issued to Gaol Attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 10.)

9. To Children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol.—8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. yellow soap.

10. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24oz. wheat bread—(Ration No. 3 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses, to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

11. Forage for Horses and Oxen—8lbs. maize, or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

12. For the Light-house, South-head, and Floating-light, Sydney Harbour—Best sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks, each.

13. Fuel and Light—Firewood per 100lbs.; sperm oil, common oil, per gallon imperial mould candles, dipt candles, cotton wick, per lb.

14. For Emigrants or other Persons or Establishments in Sydney, when ordered—Fresh beef, fresh mutton, maize meal, the best wheaten bread, bread of 2nd and 3rd quality, ditto flour, arrow-root, sago, rice, tea, sugar, oatmeal, salt, yellow soap, pearl barley, tobacco, vegetables, per lb; milk per quart; port wine per dozen; vinegar per imperial gallon; roach lime per bushel; straw for bedding per 100lbs.

15. For the Lunatic Asylum at Farban Creek—fresh beef, fresh mutton, the best wheaten bread, bread of 2nd and 3rd quality, rice, tea, sugar, salt per lb., milk per quart.

No. 2. To the Wives of the Master and Store-keeper, and Female Servants entitled to Rations—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{2}{3}$ oz. soap.

No. 3. Children above six years of age—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

No. 4. Nursery Children under six years of age—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12 oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

SUPPLIES.

No. 5. For the use of the Establishment— $3\frac{1}{2}$ pints of oil, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ pint of vinegar, daily.
