#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

HEREAS by an Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the present year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to amend" An Act for better regulating Courts of Re-"quests in New South Wales," it is amongst other things enacted, that Courts of Requests shall be holden at such places and times as the increase in the population may require, and as the Governor of New South Wales with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, may deem expedient;

Now, therefore, I, the Governor aforesaid, with the advice of the said Executive Council, do hereby determine and appoint that Courts of Civil Jurisdiction to be called Courts of Requests shall be holden at the Town of Melbourne, in the County of Bourke, and at the Town of Macquarie, in the County of Macquarie, on the first Mondays and following days in the months of January, April, July, and October, in each and every year respectively.

IS Excellency the GOVERNOR, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs it to be notified, that, in pursuance of Additional Instructions under the Royal Signet and Sign Manual, bearing date the 22nd day of May, 1840, and of directions issued in conformity therewith, by Her Majesny's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the recommendation

of the Colonial Land and Emigration Board, the present Territory of New South Wales is, for all purposes connected with the disposal of Land, to be divided into three Distinct Portions or Districts under the names of the Northern, the Middle, and the Southern Districts.

The Northern District will commence at the mouth of the River Manning, and comprise the lands lying to the Northward of the Counties of Gloucester, Durham, Brisbane, and Bligh. But the Northern boundaries of this District are not yet defined.

The Middle or Sydney District will comprise the Nineteen Counties described in the Government Order, dated the 14th day of October, 1829, and the Proclamations dated respectively the 22nd day of May and 27th day of November, 1835, extending on the east from the mouth of the River Manning to the mouth of the River Morning to the mouth of the River Morning to the north by the northern boundaries of the Counties of Gloucester, Durham. Brisbane, and Bligh; and on the south by the southern boundaries of the Counties of St. Vincent and Murray, and thence by the Rivers Murrumbidgee and Murray, to the eastern boundary of the Province of South Australia.

The Southern or Port Phillip District will comprise all Lands lying to the southward of the southern boundary of the Middle or Sydney District, as described above, and to the eastward of the eastern boundary of the Province of South Australia.

Within the Northern District the principle of selling Lands at an uniform price, as hereinafter more particularly described in respect to Port Phillip, is to be applied as soon as the necessary arrangements have been completed by Her Majesty's Government, of which due notice will be given.

Within the Middle or Sydney District no change whatever is made by the present regulations in the disposal of land, the method of sale by Auction being continued at an upset price that is never to be less than twelve shillings sterling an acre.

In the Southern or Port Phillip District the following course is to be observed, viz; --

All country lands not required for public pur-

poses, with the exceptions hereinafter mentioned, are to be open to purchase, after survey, at one uniform price, which is fixed for the present at one pound sterling an acre.

Allotments in Towns in which sales by auction have already taken place are to continue to be sold by auction. Melbourne, Williams' Town, Geelong and Portland, fall within this principle.

In such other Towns as may be established hereafter, Allotments will be open to purchase at an uniform price which is fixed for the present at one hundred pounds sterling an acre.

No reservation is to be made of Minerals, except in very special cases, where mines of great value are known to exist. The Deeds of Grant are to convey to the purchaser everything below and everything above the surface.

Purchasers will not, of course, be allowed to pay any indefinite number of Pounds sterling, and receive a corresponding number of acres, but must buy in lots of such size as shall, from time to time, be established by public regulation. Measures will be taken to keep the surveys, as far as possible, in advance of the demand for land; and Charts will be exhibited in an Office at Melbourne, to be appointed for that purpose, showing all appropriations and reserves, and the surveyed lands still open for selection.

All purchases must be made at the Land Office of the District in which the lands are situated, and the money paid into the Local Treasury of that District. Purchasers, however, coming out from the United Kingdom will be allowed to deposit money with the Agent-General for the Colonies, or such other officer as may be appointed for that purpose, and thereupon to receive an order from the Land and Emigration Commissioners, entitling them, on preduction of the same to the Local authorities, to obtain credit for a corresponding sum, in the acquisition of Land. They will be allowed also, to bring out to the colony a proportionate number of labourers upon bounty, under such regulations as shall be established.

His Excellency the Governor directs it further to be notified, that the Lands open to selection in the Port Phillip District will be proclaimed from time to time, but that in conformity with the advice of the Executive Council, no Lands which have either been advertised at a higher upset price than One Pound sterling an acre, or are situated within a distance to be hereafter fixed, of the Towns to Melbourne, Williams' Town. Geelong, and Portland, will be open to purchase under the preceding regulations, until further directions are received from Her Majesty's Government

As soon as the necessary arrangements are completed for carrying these regulations into effect, a further notification will be made for general information.

H 18 Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct, that the following observations on the approaches to the Town of Auckland be published for general information.

The Town of Auckland, on the southern bank of the River Waitemata, is situated in latitude 36 ° 51' 36" south, and longitude 174 ° 43' east

nearly.

The entrance to the Waitemata is on the western side of the Gulf of Shouraka, or the Frith of the Thames, and is screened from the northeast by the Is'ands of Rangi Toto, Moto Tapou, and a succession of bold precipitous islets lying off the north-west end of the large Island of Waihekeh.

#### DIRECTIONS.

Vesse's bound to Auckland from the northward, after making Point Rodney, should steer for the Island of Tiri Tiri Mantangi, taking care to avoid a small rocky islet lying one league north, 53° west (mag.), from Point Takatu lenoa, and passing it on either side, steer for Rangi Toto, keeping between that island and the main, and not approaching either in less than five fathoms water. When to the westward of Rangi Toto the bluff north head of the River Waitemata becomes visible.

Vessels coming from the eastward should enter the Frith between Cape Colville and the Great Barrier, passing on either side of the small Island Motu Tokapu, which lies about a league distant, N.N.W., from the Cape, whence a course may be shaped for the mid channel, between Tiri Tiri Mantangi and Motu Tapou, which nearly joins Rangi Toto, and over which the peaks of Rang Toto are visible; then proceed as if coming from the northward.

Vessels drawing less than eighteen feet may enter the Tehmaki Channel, on either side of Waihekeh, and pass to the southward of the group formed by Waihekeh, Motu, Tapou, and Rangi Toto, to the entrance of the Waitemata; but this channel is not recommended to strangers, unaided by a pilot. In the event of stress of weather, or other emergency, excellent shelter may be found inside any part of Waihekeh, or under the east end of Motu Tapou, the passage so far, and the channels leading to it, being perfectly free from danger.

On approaching the entrance of the river, care must be taken to avoid a ledge of rocks, extending in a north-westerly direction from the southern shore, which may be avoided by keeping the North Head to the southward of west, (mag.) until a remarkable rock on the south shore, resembling the bastion of a fort, called the Bastion

Rock, bears south (mag.).

With a fair wind the North Head may be rounded at half a cable's length distance, and a mid- channel course will lead to the anchorage off the town. With a beating wind tack on the south shore on coming into six fathoms water, and on the north shore, which is much steeper, at the first shoal cast.

The only dangers within the Heads are, a spit of sand, that projects half a cable's length from a low sandy point on the north shore, about a quarter of a mile inside the North Head; and a mud flat, which lines the southern shore to a distance of nearly one third of a mile, -throughout the whole river, and all the bays on both sides are shoal. These dangers will be avoided by attention to the lead and the directions above given.

The navigation of the Guf of Shouraka, with ordinary care, is perfectly safe; but attention is required in hazy weather, or at night, to avoid many small Islets, which vary in height from six, or eight, to a hundred feet, and which are generally surrounded by deep water.

The only known exceptions to this rule are the " Peroques," in latitude 39 ° 7' S., and longitude 175° 18' east, according to D'Urville; and a rock, on which the sea breaks occasionally, called Simpson's Rock, lying about four or five miles N.N.E. from the N.W. end of the Great Barrier.

There is a sunken rock reported to exist on the north side of Waihekah, and is marked on the charts about north from the centre of that island, a long league off shore, the position, or even the existence, of which is not positively known.

These rocks, as will be seen by reference to the chart, are out of the ordinary track of shipping; but contrary winds may oblige vessels to approach them, and they are therefore worthy of notice.

The rocky Islet off Point Takatu Tenoa, above alluded to, stands about 8 feet above high-water mark, and is bold too; its position is accurately laid down by the Baron D'Urville.

High water at Waitemate, on full and change 6h. 45m., rise and fall about 11 feet on the spring tides.

The flood runs to the southward within the Frith of the Thames, but to the north on the coast.
