PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight,
Captain General and Governor in Chief of the
Territory of New South Wales and its Depen-
dencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c.
&c. &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and
Legislative Council, passed in the third
year of the Reign of his late Majesty King
William the Fourth, intituled, "*An Act for the
better regulating Courts of Requests in the Colony
of New South Wales*," it is enacted, That Courts
of Civil Jurisdiction, to be called Courts of Re-
quests, shall be holden at and in the following
Towns or places, respectively: that is to say, in the
County of Cumberland, at the several Towns of
Sydney, Parramatta, Liverpool, Penrith, Windsor,
and Campbelltown, and in the County of Camden,
at the Town of Wollongong; and that the said
Courts, respectively, shall be holden at such times
at the said several Towns or Places as the Governor
for the time being shall, by Proclamation duly
issued for that purpose, from time to time, direct
and appoint.

Now I, the said GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the
power and authority so vested in me by the said
recited Act, do hereby direct and appoint, that the
said Courts of Civil Jurisdiction, to be called
Courts of Requests, shall be holden, during the
year One thousand eight hundred and forty-two,
at the several and respective places aforesaid, on
the days and times hereinafter respectively men-
tioned, that is to say:—

At SYDNEY, on the second Monday in the re-
spective months of January, April, July, and
October; on the first Tuesday in the respective
months of February and August; and on the
first Monday in the respective months of March,
June, September, and December.

At PARRAMATTA, on Friday, the 11th of March,
the 10th of June, the 9th of September, and the
9th of December.

At LIVERPOOL, on Wednesday, the 19th of
January, the 20th of April, the 20th of July, and
the 19th of October.

At PENRITH, on Saturday, the 19th of March,
the 18th of June, the 17th of September, and the
17th of December.

At WINDSOR, on Tuesday, the 15th of March,
the 14th of June, the 13th of September, and the
13th of December.

At CAMPBELLTOWN, on Thursday, the 20th of
January, the 21st of April, the 21st of July, and
the 20th of October.

At WOLLONGONG, on Friday, the 29th of April,
and the 28th of October.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight,
Captain General and Governor in Chief of the
Territory of New South Wales and its Depen-
dencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c.
&c. &c.

WHEREAS by a certain Act of the Governor
and Legislative Council, passed in the
third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King
William the Fourth, intituled, "*An Act to con-
solidate and amend the Laws for the Transportation
and Punishment of Offenders in New South Wales,
and for defining the respective powers and autho-
rities of General Quarter Sessions and of Petty
Sessions, and for determining the places at which
the same shall be holden, and for better regulating
the summary jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace,
and for repealing certain Laws and Ordinances
relating thereto*," it is, amongst other things,
enacted, that the Courts of General Quarter Sessions
for the said Colony shall be holden at such times,
respectively, as the Governor for the time being

shall, by any Proclamation duly issued for such purpose, appoint.

Now I, the said GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said recited Act, do hereby direct and appoint, that Courts of General Quarter Sessions shall be holden, during the year One thousand eight hundred and forty-two, at the several and respective places, and on the days and times hereinafter respectively mentioned, that is to say :—

At SYDNEY, on the first Monday in the respective months of January, April, July, and October ; and also by adjournments of such Sessions respectively, on Monday the 7th of February, the 9th of May, the 8th of August, and the 7th of November.

At PARRAMATTA, on Saturday, the 12th of March, the 11th of June, the 10th of September, and the 10th of December.

At CAMPBELLTOWN, on Friday, the 21st of January, the 22nd of April, the 22nd of July, and the 20th of October.

At BERRIMA, on Monday, the 24th of January, the 25th of April, the 25th of July, and the 24th of October.

At WINDSOR, on Wednesday, the 16th of March, the 15th of June, the 14th of September, and the 14th of December.

At MAITLAND, on Tuesday, the 1st of March, the 31st of May, the 30th of August, and the 29th of November.

At BATHURST, on Tuesday, the 22nd of March, the 21st of June, the 20th of September, and the 20th of December.

COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bills, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information,

By His Excellency's Command,

E. DEAS THOMSON.

No. 1.—“*A Bill to amend an Act, intituled ‘An Act for better regulating the keeping and carriage of Gunpowder.’*”

It being expedient to amend the Act above recited, (7 WILLIAM IV., No. 7) it is proposed :—

That the Master of every Vessel arriving in the Harbour of Port Jackson, shall land at the Government Magazine, in manner required by the said recited Act, all Gunpowder brought in such Vessel,

whether as cargo or stores, before such Vessel shall be allowed to enter Sydney Cove or Darling Harbour, under penalty of one pound sterling for every pound in weight above twenty pounds of such Powder, which may be found on board such Vessel, after the lapse of twelve hours from the time of anchorage.

That all Boats used for the conveyance of Gunpowder shall be provided with tarpaulins, and be properly housed over, under penalty of ten pounds.

That Steam Boats shall not be allowed to carry Gunpowder except what may be necessary for signal uses, when proceeding to any port beyond seas, under penalty of not less than ten pounds nor more than fifty pounds.

That no Gunpowder shall be landed from the Government Magazine at any Wharf or place, or at any time, other than at the Queen's Wharf, and between the hours of 6 and 10 a. m., under penalty of two shillings for every pound in weight of such Gunpowder.

That not more than ten barrels of Gunpowder shall be conveyed at one time in any cart or carriage ; and that every such cart or carriage shall have a complete covering of wood or tarpaulin, under penalty of ten pounds.

Proposed Act not to apply to the custody or carriage of any Gunpowder belonging to Her Majesty.

As to the recovery of penalties.

No. 2.—“*A Bill to secure, on the Ordinary Revenue of New South Wales, the payment of Debentures to be issued, to a limited amount, by the Governor thereof, in support of Immigration.*”

The Funds arising from the Territorial Revenue of the Colony being insufficient for the purposes of Immigration, and it being therefore expedient to make further provision for defraying the expense of importing Emigrants from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, it is proposed :—

That it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being of the Colony to issue Debentures, in a certain form set forth in a Schedule to the proposed Act, for sums of one hundred pounds each, or for any number of hundreds of pounds, bearing Interest at any rate not exceeding four pence per hundred pounds per diem.

That such Debentures shall be issued for a period of three years from and after the date of the issue thereof.

That no such Debenture shall be issued after the 31st December, 1842.

That the total amount of such of the said Debentures as may be outstanding and unpaid shall never, at any one time, exceed the sum of two hundred thousand pounds.

That payment of all such of the said Debentures as may not, under sanction of Her Majesty, be paid out of the Territorial Revenue of the Colony, shall be secured on, and be made out of, the Ordinary Revenue thereof.

That such Debentures shall bear Interest at the rate aforesaid from the date of the issue thereof ; such Interest to be paid half yearly.

That payment of the said Debentures, and of the half yearly Interest thereon, shall be made at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney, or at the Office

of an Agent in London, to be appointed by the Governor for that purpose.

That such Debentures shall not be called in or paid off, until after the expiration of three years from the date of the issue thereof respectively, except with consent of the respective holders.

That such Debentures shall continue to bear Interest at the rate aforesaid, until and after the expiration of the three years for which they shall be respectively issued, except such as shall not have been presented for payment on or after the expiration of such term of three years, in conformity with a notice to that effect to be published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, and in the *London Gazette*.

No. 3.—“ *A Bill to amend an Act, intituled ‘ An Act for subjecting Vessels coming to New South Wales from certain places, to the performance of Quarantine.’*”

It being expedient to amend the Act 3 William IV., No. 1, it is proposed :—

That the Health Officer shall have power to place any Vessel under Quarantine which shall arrive in the Harbour of Port Jackson with any infectious or contagious disease on board, or if such Vessel shall have touched at any place or communicated with any other Vessel visited by any such disease, if he shall entertain any reasonable apprehension that the public health would be affected by the admission to entry of such Vessel, provided he immediately afterwards report the same to his Excellency the Governor.

That His Honor, the Superintendent of Port Phillip, shall have and exercise the like powers and authority, at Port Phillip, in respect of all matters of Quarantine in that District, as are, by the said recited Act, vested in His Excellency the Governor, in respect of similar matters at Sydney.

No. 4.—“ *A Bill for giving relief to Insolvent Persons, and providing for the due Collection, Administration, and Distribution of Insolvent Estates, within the Colony of New South Wales, and for the prevention of Frauds affecting the same.*”

It being expedient to make provision for giving relief to such persons as, by misfortune, and without having been guilty of fraud or dishonesty, are or may become Insolvent, and for the due Collection, Administration, and Distribution of Insolvent Estates, within the Colony of New South Wales, and for the prevention of Frauds affecting the same, it is proposed :—

That the Governor shall appoint Commissioners of Insolvent Estates.

That any Judge shall have power to accept the surrender of Insolvent Estates, either on Petition of the Insolvents themselves, or of the Administrators of Estates becoming Insolvent, or of the greater number of the Partners of any Company becoming Insolvent, or on the Petition of any Creditor over fifty pounds, or of any Joint Creditors over one hundred pounds, against any Person or Company who shall commit any of the acts declared in the proposed Bill, to be acts of

Insolvency, and to place such Estates under Sequestration, in the hands of such Commissioners.

Declaring what alienations, &c. shall be valid, what void, what fraudulent, and what the punishment for fraud.

Regulating the number of, and proceedings at, Meetings of Creditors.

Declaring the powers and liabilities of Trustees.

Effect of Sequestration and surrender of Estates.

Repealing 2 Victoria, No. 14, and 4 Victoria, No. 24.

No. 5.—“ *A Bill for vesting in certain Trustees, the Estate in fee-simple of a certain piece of Land in Macquarie-street, Sydney, upon the Trusts set forth in the Model Deed of the Society, denominated Wesleyan Methodists.*”

It is proposed, by this Bill, to vest in certain Trustees, named therein, the Legal Estate of a Wesleyan Chapel, and of the ground on which it stands, upon certain Trusts set forth in the Model Deed of the Wesleyan Methodist Society.

No. 6.—“ *A Bill further to amend an Act, intituled, ‘ An Act for the better preservation of the Ports, Harbours, Havens, Roadsteads, Channels, Navigable Creeks and Rivers in New South Wales, and the better regulation of Shipping in the same.’*”

By the Act of Council, 4 Victoria, No 4, the Governor is empowered to frame Rules and Regulations, to be observed by the Masters and Commanders of all Ships in any Port or Harbour of New South Wales, except Port Jackson ; and it being expedient to discontinue such exception in regard to Port Jackson, and further to amend the Act 3 William IV., No. 6, it is proposed :—

That the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may, from time to time, frame Rules and Regulations to be observed by the Commanders of all Vessels in the Harbour of Port Jackson, and by all persons authorised to act as Pilots in the said Harbour, provided the same be promulgated one Month before they shall take effect.

That the Master of any Vessel, or any Pilot neglecting, or failing to observe such rules, shall forfeit not less than five pounds, nor more than fifty pounds.

That the Commanders of Vessels shall allow warps to be fastened thereto, by order of the Harbour Master, under penalty of five pounds ; provided that any damage done thereby to such Vessel shall be made good by the Master or Owner of the Vessel fastening the warp.

That former Rates of Pilotage shall be repealed, and the new ones set forth in a table to the proposed Act, substituted in their stead.

Declaring what Vessels shall be subject to the payment of Pilot Rates.

That Pilots shall provide themselves with Blue Flags, to hoist on board Vessels subject to Pilotage, under penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Penalty on Commanders interfering with Pilots in the discharge of their duty.

Penalty on Pilots, refusing, neglecting, or incapacitating themselves by drunkenness to perform their duty.

Appropriation of Penalties, as prescribed by the Act 4 William IV., No. 6, repealed; one moiety of all Penalties in future to go to the Informer, the other to Her Majesty, for the public uses of the Colony.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

ALL Persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their accounts, through the proper channel, before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of public monies will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st December next, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands, respectively, up to that date, so that the entire revenue collected by each may be credited in the accounts of the year within which it was received. The Heads of Departments and other Officers who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence, are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable, and with all convenient dispatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of next month, to pay into the Colonial Treasury the unexpended balance of such advances, that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to the 31st proximo.

They will also, as soon as practicable after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of expenses incurred within the same, which do not admit of being previously settled, so that, if possible, all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month after its termination.

The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and

to report through the proper channel, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith, on the part of the Public Officers concerned.
