SYDNEY—JAMISON-STREET.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the GOVERNOR, with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the fifth year of the Reign of His late MAJESTY, intituled "An Act for better regulating the Alignment of Streets in the Town of Sydney," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That before the said Surveyor-General shall set out the Footway in any Street, or part of a Street, or public place in the said Town, after the passing of the said Act, he shall lay before the Governor and Executive Council a plan of the same, setting forth the proposed breadth of the Carriage and Footways; and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said Governor and Council, by notice in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, to fix and declare the distance from the Curb-stone, or exterior edge of said Footway in any such Street, part of a Street, or public place, within which it shall not be lawful to erect any Building;" And whereas the said Surveyor-General has laid before the Governor and Executive Council, a Plan of the proposed breadth of the Carriage and Footways, in the Street known by the name of Jamison-street, and the Governor and Council have been pleased to approve of the same:—

Notice is hereby given, that the breadth of the Footway on the north-side of the said Street shall be, and is hereby declared to be, six feet three inches, and the breadth of the Footway on the south side of the said Street shall be, and is hereby declared to be, seven feet; and that it shall not be lawful for any person to erect any Building within the above distances, respectively, of the Curb-stone or exterior edge of the Footways in the said Street, that is to say,—

LAND AND IMMIGRATION DEBENTURES.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that Tenders will be received at this Office, to be endorsed "Tender for Debentures," until noon on Friday, the 14th day of January next, for the purchase of Land and Immigration Debentures, to the extent of Ten Thousand Pounds.

Payment will be required to be made in cash, and the Tender may include the whole of the above amount, or any part thereof, being an unbroken sum of Hundreds of Pounds.

These Debentures will be issued for sums of £100 each, under the signature of His Excellency the Governor, and on the security of the Land Revenue of the Colony. They are to be current and to pass at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney and Melbourne, in payment for Crown Lands. They will bear interest at the rate of five pence one farthing per £100 per diem, (being, with a slight fractional difference for the convenience of calculation, at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum,) payable quarterly, at the Colonial Treasury in Sydney or Melbourne.

The principal sum will be paid off at any time after the expiration of one year, on demand by the holder, at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney; or, if payment be not so claimed, on three months notice being given by the Colonial Treasurer, in

the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, at the expiration of which, interest will cease.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

ALL Persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their accounts, through the proper channel, before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of public monies will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st December next, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands, respectively, up to that date, so that the entire revenue collected by each may be credited in the accounts of the year within which it was received. The Heads of Departments and other Officers who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence, are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable, and with all convenient dispatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of next month, to pay into the Colonial Treasury the unexpended balance of such advances, that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to the 31st proximo.

They will also, as soon as practicable after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of expenses incurred within the same, which do not admit of being previously settled, so that, if possible, all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month after its termination.

The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and to report through the proper channel, for the information of his Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith, on the part of the Public Officers concerned.
