HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct the republication from the London Gazette of the 3rd November, 1840, of the following Notice, promulgating a rule for the guidance and government of persons entrusted with the charge of Steam Vessels ; and which His Excellency earnestly recommends to the attention of Masters of Steam Vessels in this Colony.

NAVIGATION OF STEAM VESSELS.
Trinity-House, London, October 30, 1840.

THE attention of this Corporation having been directed to the numerous, severe, and, in some instances, fatal accidents, which have resulted from the collision of vessels navigated by steam ; and it appearing to be indispensably necessary, in order to guard against the recurrence of similar calamities that a regulation should be established for the guidance and government of persons entrusted with the charge of such vessels ; and,

Whereas the recognized rule for sailing vessels is, that those having the wind fair, shall give way to those on a wind ;

That when both are going by the wind, the vessel on the starboard tack shall keep her wind, and the one on the larboard tack bear up—thereby passing each other on the larboard hand ;

That when both vessels have the wind large or a beam, and meet, they shall pass each other in the same way on the larboard hand, to effect which two last-mentioned objects, the helm must be put to port ;

And as steam vessels may be considered in the light of vessels navigating with a fair wind, and

should give way to sailing vessels on a wind on either tack, it becomes only necessary to provide a rule for their observance, when meeting other steamers, or sailing vessels, going large.

Under these considerations, and with the object before stated, this Board has deemed it right to frame and promulgate the following rule, which, on communication with the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Elder Brethren find has been already adopted in respect of steam vessels in Her Majesty's service, and they desire earnestly to impress upon the minds of all persons having charge of steam vessels, the propriety and urgent necessity of a strict adherence thereto, viz.

Rule.

When steam vessels, on different courses, must unavoidably or necessarily cross so near that, by continuing their respective courses, there would be a risk of coming in collision, each vessel shall put her *helm to port*, so as always to pass on the *larboard side of each other*.

A steam vessel, passing another in a narrow channel, must always leave the vessel she is passing on the *larboard hand*.

1500, One thousand five hundred acres, more or less, situated on the River Wairoa; and bounded on the front by a part of the said river, called Mangakahia; on the one side by land belonging to the Wesleyan Mission; on the other side by land the property of James Johnson; and on the back by land belonging to the Natives.

600, Six hundred acres, more or less, situated on the east bank of the Orida River. (Boundaries not given.)

Alleged to have been purchased on the 25th of April, 1839, from Taoku and E Matu.

Nature of conveyance not stated.

Nature of conveyance—Deed to the original purchaser, dated 19th November, 1833.

Case No. 89. (a)—JOHN EVANS, of Kororarika, Bay of Islands, New Zealand, *claimant.*

A portion of land, situated at Kororarika; bounded on the west by the beach; on the north by the above named piece of ground; on the east by ground of the said John Evans; and on the south by a yard belonging to John Johnson, 8 feet frontage, 74 feet deep, and 5 feet wide at the back.

Alleged to have been purchased in 1835, from the Native Chief Puss, by Mr. Benjamin Evans Turner, from whom claimant derives.

Consideration—merchandise to the amount of £4 sterling.

Nature of conveyance—Deed in favour of the original purchaser, dated 23rd October, 1835.

Alleged to have been purchased by the present applicant in October, 1838, from the Native Chiefs Heyrucker and Heyhooker.

Alleged to have been purchased by claimant, from the Native Chief Tu White, in September, 1839.

Consideration—merchandise to the amount of £50 sterling.

Nature of conveyance—Deed of Feoffment in favour of claimant, dated 1st September, 1839.

Case No. 100.—JOHN GUARD, of Cloudy Bay, New Zealand, and JAMES WYNEN, of London, Great Britain, claimants.

Nature of conveyance—Four Instruments in writing from the above Chiefs, to Mr. Wood, dated 2nd November, 10th November, 10th November, and 31st December 1838.
