PROCLAMATION.

By IIIs Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

A HEREAS, by an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales. passed in the 4th year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, " An Act for the regulation of Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction in the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and for other purposes relating thereto," it is enacted, that all Buildings, Erections, Houses, and Premises, which should thereafter be erected, built, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public Gauls, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, within the said Colony and its Dependencies, and which should, by Proclamation, to be from time to time published in the New South Wales Government Gazette, by order of the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, be declared and notified as such public Gaols, Prisons, or Houses of Correction, should, from and after the publication of such notification, be severally deemed and taken to be the public Gaol, Prison, or House of Correction of the place or District where the same was or should be situated within the said Colony or its Dependencies, respectively, and should be subject to the several provisions thereinafter made for the regulation, management, care, and discipline of the Public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction belonging to the said Colony and its Depens dencies, and of the Prisoners confined within the same. And whereas there has been for some time in course of erection, as and for a Public Gaol, the Building called and known by the name of this New Gaol, adjacout to the New Court House, at Darlinghurst, near Sydney, in the said Colony, and it is expedient that the said Gaol should he and be declared to be a Public Goal, Prison, and House of Correction.

Now, therefore, I, the Governor, by virtue of the said recited Act, and in parameter of the power E. DEAS THOMSON. and authority thereby in me vested, do hereby

proclaim, declare, and notify the said Building at I nuation of the street which extends along the Darlinghurst, situate as aforesaid, to be a Public Gaol, Prison, and House of Correction.

No. 1 .- " A Bill to repeal so much of an Act, intituled, 'An Act to abolish the Transportation of Female Convicts, and to provide for the more effectual punishment of Female Offenders within the Colony of New South Wales', as authorises the confinement of any Female Offender in a Dark Cell."

By this Bill it is proposed to repeal so much of the Act 3, VICTORIA, No. 22, as authorises the confinement of Female Offenders in a Dark Cell.

IS Excellency the Governor, in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 2nd VICTORIA, No. 2, intituled 44 An Act for Regulating the Police in the Towns of Parramatta, Windsor, Maitland, Bathurst, and other Towns respectively, and for removing and preventing Nuisances and Obstructions, and for the better alignment of Streets therein;" and with reference to His Excellency's Proclamation of the 28th July, 1840, extending the provisions of the said Act to the town of Campbelltown, in the County of Cumberland, has been pleased to direct the publication of the following description of the boundaries of the town of Campbelltown as aforesaid, viz: commencing at a marked post situated by a small bridge on the high road from Sydney, north-easterly of Graham's Inn, being a line bearing east 49 degrees 15 minutes, south 59 chains 45 links, to a marked post near the eastern corner of the Campbelltown reserve; from thence by a line bearing south 44 degrees 35 minutes, west 35 chains 45 links, to a marked post near the southern conner of the Campbelltown reserve; from thence by a line bearing west 3 degrees, north 47 chains 60 links, to a marked post on the western side of the Appin Road; from thence by a line bearing west 42 degrees, north 26 chains, to a marked post near the junction of the roads leading to the Menangle and Cowpasture Fords; from thence by a line bearing north 38 degrees, east 68 chains 35 links, to a marked post on the northern side of the continorth-eastern boundary of the Campbelltown reserve; and from thence by a line bearing east 19 degrees 20 minutes, south 11 chains and 40 links, to the aforesaid post on the high road from Sydney.

SELECTIONS OF SPECIAL SURVEYS.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, for the information of all. parties interested, that instructions have been given for the measurement, according to the Regulations of the 4th March, 1841, of the following selections of Special Surveys in the Districts of Port PHILLIP and CORNER INLEY, made by the respective parties undermentioned.

It is proper, however, to observe, that if, in the progress of the admeasurement, it be found that the Regulations, either in respect to water-frontage, or any other particular, cannot, on account of the nature of the selections, be adhered to, it will follow. not that those Regulations are to be dispensed with, but that the selections must be disallowed,

and others made in a different locality.

With respect to the selections at Corner Inlet. it is further to be observed, that they are not in any way to prejudice the right of the Government to make the reserves of land for the purposes mentioned in the 8th paragraph of the Regulations above referred to, when the survey shall be sufficiently advanced to enable the Government to do so with a proper regard to the public interests.

1. FREDERIC WRIGHT UNWIN, 5120. Five thousand one hundred and twenty acres, county of Bourke, parish of Bulleen; bounded on the north by the Yarra Yarra River; on the west by portion No. 1 containing 1019 acres; on the south by Koonung Koonung Creek; and on the east by a line bearing north from the said creek to the Yarra Yarra River. (17th March, 1841.)

2. HENRY DENDY, 5120, Five thousand one hundred and twenty acres, county of Bourke, parish unnamed; bounded on the west by the sea coast of the Port Phillip Bay; on the north by the fivemile Melbourne Reserve; on the east and south by lines to include the quantity of 5120 acres.

(19th March, 1841.)

3. WILLIAM RUTLEDGE, 5120, Five thousand one hundred and twenty acres, county unnamed, parish unnamed, on Powlett and Green's runs, near the Sydney Road; bounded on one side by a creek, and on all others by lines to include the quantity of 5120 acres. (12th April, 1841.)

4. John Orr, 5120, Five thousand one hundred and twenty acres, about fourteen miles from . Corner Inlet, on the east bank of the River Albert, to include the above quantity. (23rd April,

HENRY ELGAR, 5120, Five thousand one hundred and twenty acres, county of Bourke, partly in the parish of Boroundara, and partly in a parish unnamed; bounded on the north by Koonung Koonung Creek; on the west by the section line which divides portions Nos. 2 and 3, from portion No. 1, in the parish of Bulleen; on No. 4 from portion No. 5, in the parish of Bulleen; and on the south by a line to include the quantity of 5120 acres. (May 1st, 1841.)

8. John Reeve, 5120. Five thousand one hundred and twenty acres, county unnamed, parish unnamed, near Corner Inlet, situated on the east bank of the River Tarra. (Date of selection

not stated).

REWARDS FOR THE APPREHENSION OF RUNAWAY CONVICTS.

Is Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct, with reference to the Notices from this Office of 13th, of April, 1832, and 12th November, 1838, that the existing regulations respecting the payment of rewards for the apprehension of Convicts illegally at large, be considered cancelled, and that the following be adopted in their room, viz:—

1. For the apprehension and conveyance, before a Magistrate, of every Convict who shall have absconded, or been absent for any period, with intent to abscond, from ordinary Government work, or the service of an individual, there shall be paid as a reward the sum of Ten Shillings, which sum may be increased to any amount not exceeding Twenty Shillings, if the Magistrate before whom the Convict is taken shall consider that, from any particular circumstances attending the capture, the Constable or person capturing is deserving of a higher reward than Ten Shillings.

2. For the apprehension and conveyance before a Magistrate, of every Convict, who, whilst serving under sentence to an Ironed Gang, or as a second class Convict, shall have absconded, or been absent, with intent to abscond, from any Ironed Gang, or Stockade, or otherwise from legal custody, the sum of Twenty Shillings, which sum may be encreased to any amount not exceeding Thirty Shillings, if judged proper by the Magistrate, for the reasons stated in the foregoing paragraph.

3. For the apprehension and conveyance before a Magistrate, of any runaway Convict, who, being under a charge of any Transportable offence, shall afterwards be committed to take his trial for the same before the Supreme Court, or any Circuit Court, or Court of General Quarter Sessions, the sum of Fifty Shillings; but if the prisoner apprehended be an armed Bushranger, or capital Felon, the sum of Three Pounds will be paid, which

latter sum may be encreased to any amount not exceeding Five Pounds, if judged proper by the Magistrate, for the reasons stated in paragraph I. And in order to ensure a speedy apprehension of offenders, an addition will be made to the rewards specified in this paragraph of one-fourth their respective rates, if the offender be captured within twenty-one days after he shall have absconded, of one-third if within fourteen days, and of one half if within one week. Under this paragraph, therefore, it will be seen, that whilst the Reward will never be less than Fifty Shillings, it may, under Special circumstances, be increased to Seven Pounds Ten Shillings.

4. It is to be distinctly understood, that the Rewards specified in the 3rd section of these Regulations are not to be paid in any case where the Prisoner apprehended is tried under summary jurisdiction, by Magistrates in Petty Sessions.

5. It is also to be distinctly understood, that one Reward only can be paid, under these Regulations, for the apprehension of any Convict; and that if the higher reward be claimed on the committal of such Convict for any of the offences before mentioned, the lower or apprehension Reward will merge in it.

6. Rewards under these Regulations are to be immediately paid on the spot by the Police Magistrate, or Bench of Magistrates, in conformity with the instructions contained in the circular letter

from this Office, of this date.

7. When any person serving under sentence as a Convict shall render any service in the discovery or apprehension of offenders, which would, under the above Regulations, entitle him to a pecuniary Reward, he shall receive such a remission of sentence as it may be in the power of the Governor to make to him, the lowest reward being a remission of six months in the calculation of his time for a Ticket-of-Leave, and the highest an Absolute Pardon.
