PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of New South Wales, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intitled "*An Act for punishing offences committed by Transports kept to labour in the Colonies, and better regulating the Powers of Justices of the Peace in New South Wales,*" it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by any order or orders to be by Him for that purpose issued, with the advice of His Privy Council, to authorize the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other persons for the time being administering the Government of any of His Majesty's Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, to appoint the place or places within His Majesty's Dominions to which any offender convicted in any such Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, and being under Sentence or order for Transportation, shall be sent or Transported: And Whereas, by an order of the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, bearing date the Twenty-second day of May, 1840, and issued in pursuance of the said recited Act of Parliament, it is ordered, That from and after the First day of August, 1840, the respective Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and other persons for the time being, administering the Government of any of Her Majesty's Colonies, shall, in pursuance of the provisions of the said recited Act of the Sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty George the Fourth, by Proclamation to be by Him for that purpose issued, appoint the place or places, within Her Majesty's Dominions, to which any offender convicted in any such Colonies, and being under sentence or order of Transportation, shall be sent or Transported, provided that neither the Colony of Bermuda, nor any of Her Majesty's Possessions in New Holland, or in the Southern Ocean, be so appointed for that purpose, by any such Proclamation as aforesaid, other than the Island of Van Diemen's Land and Norfolk Island, and the islands adjacent to and

comprised within the Government of Van Diemen's Land.

Now, therefore, I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, in pursuance of the said order of the Queen's most Excellent Majesty in Council, and in exercise of the power and authority in me vested, do, by this my Proclamation, appoint the Island of Van Diemen's Land, and the islands adjacent to and comprised within the Government of Van Diemen's Land, to be the places to which all offenders convicted within the Colony of New South Wales or its Dependencies, and being under any sentence or order of Transportation, shall be sent or Transported.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS by certain Acts, passed in the Third and Fourth years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, powers are reserved to Her Majesty to reduce the rates and tolls on foreign ships of Countries with which Great Britain has treaties of reciprocity, and on goods imported or exported therein, in manner in the said Acts mentioned;—
 Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the

advice of Her Privy Council, doth, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authority in Her vested by the above-mentioned Acts, declare, That the ships of all such foreign powers as have treaties of reciprocity with this country, and the cargoes imported or exported therein, shall be admitted, under the said Acts of Parliament, on paying the like rates of duties and tolls as those charged on British vessels and their cargoes.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bills, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

No. 1.—*"A Bill to amend, and to extend to Port Phillip, an Act intituled, 'An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the Savings' Bank of New South Wales.'"*

It being expedient to amend the Act 3 VICTORIA, No. 12, and to extend the provisions thereof, as so amended, to a Savings' Bank to be established at Port Phillip, it is proposed:—

That a Savings' Bank shall be established at Port Phillip, to be called "THE SAVINGS' BANK OF PORT PHILLIP," the management whereof shall be distinct from, and independent of, the Savings' Bank of New South Wales.

That His Honor the Superintendent of Port Phillip shall be the President of the said Institution, and that the management of the affairs thereof shall be vested in Twelve Trustees, to be appointed by the said Superintendent, of whom one shall be styled Vice-President.

That the Act 3 VICTORIA, No. 12, shall extend and apply to the said Institution to be established at Port Phillip.

That the said Act shall be amended by providing for the establishment of a Rest or Security Fund in each Bank.

That the said Act shall be further amended by providing, in the event of the Insolvency, or death of any Officer of the said Banks respectively, for the recovery of such Money, Deeds, or Securities, belonging to such Banks respectively, as may have been in the possession of such Officer at the time of his Bankruptcy or death.

No. 2.—*"A Bill to amend the law for the Transportation of Offenders to Penal Settlements, and to provide for and regulate the Transportation of Offenders to Van Diemen's Land, and the Islands adjacent thereto, and comprised within the Government thereof."*

The places heretofore used as Penal Settlements for the Colony of New South Wales, being no longer used as such, and His Excellency the Governor having, by virtue of the authority vested in the several Governors of Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions,

under an Act of Parliament, passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of King George the Fourth, and an order in Council, bearing date 22nd May, 1840, issued a Proclamation, declaring that the Colony of Van Diemen's Land, and the Islands adjacent thereto, and under the Government thereof, shall be used as places of Transportation for Transported offenders under Colonial sentence of Transportation; it is proposed to repeal so much of 3 William IV., No. 3, as enacts that Transported offenders, under Colonial sentence or order of Transportation, shall be Transported to such Penal Settlements within the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, as the Governor for the time being of the said Colony should direct.

That after sentence passed on any such offender, the Governor may order him to be kept to hard labour at such place as he shall think fit, until his removal to the place of Transportation.

That in all cases where any such offender, already under sentence or order of Transportation passed in any of Her Majesty's Dominions, shall be convicted of an offence for which a sentence of Transportation may be passed, it shall be lawful to pass on such offender a sentence of Transportation for life, or for any term not less than seven years, provided that the term of such sentence shall in no case exceed, in the whole, the duration of sentence to which a free and untransported person would for such offence be liable, in addition to the duration or residue of the term of the original sentence of such Transported offender.

Nothing in the proposed Act to repeal or alter the Act 3 Victoria, No. 22, abolishing the Transportation of Female Convicts.

**OCCUPATION OF CROWN LANDS
WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES.**

WITH reference to the Regulations of 1st August, 1831, 25th September, 1839, and 13th February, 1840, relative to the Leasing of Crown Lands within the Boundaries of Location, and to the 6th clause in the Act of Council, 5 VICTORIA, No. 1, His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that it having been found inconvenient to issue Annual Leases in the manner pointed out in the said Regulations, it is proposed, in future, instead of Annual Leases, to grant Licenses to Depasture Cattle and other Stock in lieu thereof.

The said Regulations have accordingly been cancelled so far as they apply to the Leases in question, and the following are to be substituted for them :—

1st. The Land for the occupation of which Licenses may be obtained, will be advertised from time to time in the *Government Gazette*.

2nd. Persons wishing to have particular Lands advertised, may apply, as heretofore, to the Surveyor General, for that purpose.

3rd. No Lot, consisting of less than one square mile, or 640 acres, will be put up, except in special cases, which may render expedient a departure from this rule: And in any case where there is a broken section with water frontage, the section behind it will be added to the Lot.

4th. The upset price of each Lot will be specified in the advertisement; the bidding will be upon this upset price, and the Lot will be knocked down to the highest bidder. The Government, however, reserves to itself the right of refusing the bidding of any one; and before any bidding is accepted, if the yearly price of the License does not exceed £5, the same will be demanded at the fall of the hammer, but if above £5, a deposit of ten per cent. will be required at the fall of the hammer, and the balance to be paid within one month from the day of sale.

5th. Parties failing to pay the balance within

that period, will forfeit the deposit of ten per cent., and will of course acquire no right to the occupancy of the Land intended to have been included in the License.

6th. Immediately upon payment of the full amount for the License, the same will be issued by the Colonial Treasurer, in the form annexed.

7th. It is to be distinctly understood, that the Lands included in any such License, will be open to purchase under the ordinary Regulations; and in the event of their being sold, must be surrendered by the party upon his receiving one month's notice; but in such case, the balance of the price of the License for the time it has to run, will be refunded to him.

8th. Parties holding Lands under License, in conformity with these Regulations, will be entitled to the exclusive right of occupancy of the same, during the period the License shall remain in force, for the purpose of Depasturing Cattle and other Stock; but a clause will be inserted in it, restraining the holder from cutting Cedar or other Timber, except such of the latter as may be required for domestic uses, for firebote, fencing stock-yards, or other conveniences, for the enjoyment of the Land, provided that no part thereof be sold.

9th. In the District of Port Phillip, Licenses will be issued by the Sub-Treasurer of the District, in the same form and manner, and subject to the same formalities, in all respects, as Licenses in the Sydney District; and persons desiring to have any particular portions of Land advertised, may make application for them to the Senior Surveyor of the District.

FORM OF LICENSE REFERRED TO.

*License to Depasture Crown Lands within the
Limits of Location.*

WHEREAS, by the Act of the Governor and Council, 5 Victoria, No. 1, it is amongst other things enacted, that no person occupying Crown Lands, within the limits prescribed for Location to Settlers, having a valid License for the occupation of the same, signed by the Colonial Treasurer, for the time being, of the said Colony, or such other Officer or Officers as the Governor shall appoint, shall be liable to any penalty, under the Act of Council, 2 Victoria, No. 27, as the same is continued and amended by the former Act, for occupying such Lands contrary to the provisions of the same; and whereas, on the

day of _____, 18____, an Annual License for the occupation of the Crown Land herein-after described, was put up to Auction, when _____ of _____ was declared the highest bidder, at the sum of _____, and whereas he has since duly paid into my hands the said sum.

Now, therefore, I, in pursuance of the authority vested in me, do hereby License the said _____ to Depasture Cattle and other Stock upon the said Land, which is described as follows :— _____ acres, in the county of _____, parish of _____, bounded, &c.

: Provided,

however, that the holder of this License shall not be entitled, by virtue of the same, to cut Cedar or other Timber, growing upon the said Land, except such of the latter as may be required for domestic uses, for fire-bote, fencing stock-yards, or other conveniences, for the enjoyment of the said Land, and that no part thereof be sold: Provided, also, that this License shall be determinable, on the Colonial Treasurer for the time being, or any person appointed by the Governor in that behalf, causing Notice, in writing, for that purpose, to be given or left, for the holder of this License, at his usual or last place of abode, one calendar month before the time limited for cancelling the same, and on payment to him of the balance due for the period the License would otherwise have had to run.

WHEREAS it has been made to appear to the Commissioners of Colonial Lands and Emigration, and by them reported to Her Majesty's Government, that abuses have arisen in certain cases of vessels fitted out, or advertised for the conveyance of Emigrants to New South Wales, on bounties to be received of the local Government; now, in pursuance and by authority of instructions from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, the Commissioners do hereby give notice to all whom it may concern, that if Emigrants shall hereafter be removed from this Kingdom to New South Wales, by persons who hold orders for bounties on the introduction of labourers or others into that Colony, it will be necessary, in order to entitle the claimants to receive such bounties, that they should obtain from the officers acting under the orders of Her Majesty's Commissioners for Land and Emigration, at the ports from which the Emigrant vessels may respectively sail, certificates addressed to the Governor of New South Wales, to the effect, that the Emigrants are fit and proper persons to be removed at the public expence, and that they are about to proceed on the voyage freely, and without any undue influence or misrepresentation having been employed on the part of the claimants of the bounties, or their agents, to induce them so to Emigrate, and that all contracts made with the Emigrants have been duly carried out; and further, that the vessels in which the Emigrants are about to sail are in every respect sound and sea-worthy, and properly manned, and provided with all things requisite for the sustenance, health, and necessary comfort of the Emigrants during the voyage; which certificates, on due proof being made of these facts, the various Emigration Agents before mentioned will be prepared to issue, on application at their respective offices.

NOTICE

For the information of Persons sending out Emigrants on BOUNTY to NEW SOUTH WALES.

In reference to the Notice in the "Royal Gazette" of the 29th day of January last, announcing by direction of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, that parties proposing to claim Bounty on the introduction of Labourers into New South Wales, must previously furnish themselves with certain Certificates, issued under the authority of Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners; the object of the present Paper is to explain the conditions which the Commissioners deem it necessary to attach to the issuing of such Certificates.

SELECTION.

1. The parties holding Orders for Bounty will be required to employ, in the selection of their Emigrants, the form of Certificates annexed to this Notice.

2. Such certificates, when duly filled up, must be transmitted to this Office. They will then be examined, and if approved, will be returned to the parties managing the emigration, with the approval of the Commissioners marked upon the face of the documents. They must afterwards be produced at the port of embarkation to the Commissioners' Agent there, whose duty it will be, as stated in Paragraph 8, to see whether the persons presenting

themselves correspond with the description given in their certificates.

3. The kind of persons to be selected must be entirely regulated by the terms of the notice in the Colony under which the order for bounty has been granted.

4. If the applicants consist of married parties, the certificate of marriage is to be produced for the inspection of the Government Agent at the port of embarkation.

5. It is required by the Rules laid down in the Colony, "that the ages of the parties must be established, where possible, by the production of Copies or Extracts of the Registry of their

"Baptism, duly certified by the Parish Minister, or other proper Officer."

6. In order not to deprive parties of a reasonable opportunity to supply the place of defaulters when the vessel is about immediately to sail from some other port than London, the Commissioners will not, under such circumstances, enforce the reference to their own office of the certificates of passengers added, in order to fill up the ship. The Commissioners' Agent at the port of embarkation, will possess authority to examine and decide on the fresh certificates used on such occasions; and will note his approval in a special form printed at the foot of the certificate. It must rest with the same officer to determine the case in which the principle of the present exception will fairly apply.

7. All publications whatever, by which poor persons are invited by Bounty Agents to emigrate, must be submitted to the Commissioners previously to circulation, as they will not otherwise be able to authorize their officers to certify that improper influence is not used.

8. It will be the duty of the Commissioners' Agents at the port of embarkation to inspect the emigrants, and if the parties presenting themselves correspond with the description contained in the certificates, to state the fact upon the face of those documents, which will then be forwarded with the emigrants to the Colony.

9. It will further be the duty of the Agents to receive, and inquire into any complaints which the intending emigrants may have to make, concerning the means used in prevailing upon them to emigrate, or the non-fulfilment of any engagements made with them by the selecting Agents, or their employers; and if such complaints are of an important character, and appear well founded, the Agents of the Commissioners must either qualify, or altogether withhold the final certificates, according to the nature of the case.

SHIP.

10. The Commissioners will require that all ships in which it is intended to convey emigrants to the Colony, should be of the first class in Lloyd's Register, not lower than the red diphthong with a star; and if there should ever be reason to doubt the sea-worthiness of any vessel, it will be competent to the Commissioners, or their officers, to order a survey.

11. It will be necessary that the proper officer of the Commissioners should be made acquainted with the mode in which it is intended to fit up the ship.

12. It will be required, in all cases, that married couples should not be separated, that their berths should be interposed between those of the single men and single women, and that there should be a separate hospital for males and females, of sufficient dimensions, and in convenient situations. The Victualling Scale must be submitted to the Commissioners, and approved by them.

13. The decks are not to be lumbered, but to be kept duly clear for the working of the ship, and the exercise of the people. All provisions to be stowed under hatches, and only sufficient water for immediate use to be allowed to remain on deck. A proper space is to be reserved in the hold for the emigrants' baggage.

SURGEON.

14. It will be necessary that the diplomas and testimonials of the Surgeon to whose care it is proposed to entrust the emigrants, should be submitted to the Commissioners.

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ISSUING OF THE COMMISSIONERS' GENERAL CERTIFICATE.

15. When all the arrangements are complete, and the ship is sailing, the Commissioners' Agent will, if no objection have occurred, issue a general certificate in the form annexed.* It will be observed, that the correctness of the several emigrants' certificates will not be vouched for by this general document, but that the evidence of their having been duly passed by the Commissioners or their officers, must consist of what appears on the face of the papers themselves.

16. If the ship sails from one port, but calls in at another for part, or all of her passengers, the Commissioners' Agent at the first port will issue the general certificate alluded to in Paragraph No. 15, to be countersigned by the officer at the second port, who will also attend to the duty of passing the certificates of as many passengers as embark at the second place.

17. In order not to interfere with arrangements now in progress, the present regulations will not take effect sooner than the 30th of April next; and in all ships sailing previously, the absence of the Commissioners' certificate is not to constitute any objection to the claim to Bounty.

18. An explanation may be useful on one point. The signature of the Commissioners' Secretary will attest the fact that the emigrants' certificates appear proper as documents; and that there is no apparent reason to doubt the genuineness of the signatures, or the truth of the descriptions. Into these circumstances, therefore, inquiry will be made if necessary. The signature of the Commissioners' Agent will testify the apparent identity of the parties. But their personal fitness, or the question whether or not they come properly within the kind of emigrants for whom Bounty is promised, will be left, as at present, exclusively to the decision of the proper Board in the Colony.

19. The Governor has been instructed that Bounties will not be payable to any parties except on production of the required certificates from the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners.

By His Excellency Sir George Gipps, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, with the advice of the Legislative Council.

An Act to make further provision for the Trial of Cases in the Circuit Courts of New South Wales, and to amend, in certain respects, the Act providing for trial by Jury in such Courts.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "*An Act to provide for the more effectual Administration of Justice in New South Wales, and its Dependencies,*" provision was made for the establishment of Circuit Courts in the Colony of New South Wales; and whereas by another Act of the said Governor and Council, passed in the same year, intituled, "*An Act to provide for the Trial by Jury in Civil and Criminal Cases in the Circuit and other Courts, to be holden within the Colony of New South Wales, and its Dependencies,*" it was enacted, that all Issues both Civil and Criminal, should be tried in such Courts by a Jury; and whereas, the Act hereinbefore last recited has been found in some respects to require amendment, and it is necessary to make further provision for the trial of cases in Circuit Courts, in manner herein-after mentioned: Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, That from and after the passing of this Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being of

the said Colony, by any Proclamation or Proclamations, by him from time to time for that purpose issued, to apportion and divide the said Colony into three or more "Circuit Districts," and to ascertain and fix the boundaries and limits of every such district, and such limits and boundaries from time to time to alter as occasion may require; and from and after any such apportionment and division as aforesaid, every Circuit Court now or hereafter established, or appointed to be holden, under or by virtue of the said first recited Act, shall be a Court of "Gaal Delivery" in and for the particular District only, within which it shall have been or shall be so appointed to be holden: Provided always, that every such Circuit Court shall be a Court of Oyer and Terminer, and of Assize and Nisi Prius, for the said Colony of New South Wales.

(Powers of Circuit Courts as to the assessing of damages and as to punishments)

II. And be it declared and enacted, That every such Circuit Court shall have power and jurisdiction not only to try Issues in all Actions, but also to inquire into and assess Damages therein; and that all persons convicted in any such Court, of any crime or offence cognizable therein, shall be subject and liable to the same penalties and punishments, as by law could be inflicted on them, if convicted of any such crime or offence in the Supreme Court of the said Colony.

(Certain provisions of the Jury Act.)

III. And be it enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, so much of the said recited Act, passed to provide for the Trial by Jury of cases in the said Circuit Courts, as enacts that all Issues of Fact in Civil Actions tried therein shall be tried by a Jury, and also so much of the same as enacts that all such Issues, and all Crimes and Misdemeanors therein prosecuted, shall be tried by a

Powers of Circuit Courts, as Courts of Gaol delivery.

Sect. 1. repealed.

Jury of Inhabitants of the towns or places where such Courts shall respectively be holden, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

(Jury in future to be residents within the town or place where Circuit Courts are holden, or thirty miles therefrom.)

IV. And be it enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, all Crimes and Misdemeanors prosecuted in any such Circuit Court as aforesaid, and all Issues of Fact in Civil Actions therein coming on to be tried, (and which Issues shall by the Supreme Court have been directed to be tried by a Jury,) shall be respectively tried by a Jury of Twelve Inhabitants of the Colony, resident in the town or place where such Circuit Court shall be appointed to be holden, or within a distance of thirty miles therefrom; and all Damages in any such Action which may have been directed to be assessed by a Jury, shall be inquired into and assessed in like manner; and it shall be lawful for the Judges of the said Supreme Court, to frame and issue Writs of Venire Facias accordingly.

(In ordinary cases the trial in Actions to be by Assessors.)

V. Provided always, and be it enacted, That, except in cases where the said Supreme Court, in pursuance of the power vested therein in that behalf, shall direct any such Trial or Assessment to be by a Jury, the trial of all Issues, and assessment of all Damages in Actions in every such Circuit Court, shall be by the Judge before whom such Court shall be holden, and by two Assessors, being Magistrates of the Colony, and resident in or within thirty miles of the place where such Court shall be holden, in the same manner, and subject to the same rules in all respects, as if such Trial, or Assessment, were had in the said Supreme Court before and by one of the Judges thereof, and two Assessors, in Sydney.

(Summoning of Assessors.)

VI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Judges of the said Supreme Court, fourteen days at the least before the intended day of Trial, or Assessment, as the case may be, to issue a precept or precepts to the Sheriff for the summoning of Assessors for all such cases; and the Sheriff shall accordingly, by himself, or his lawful Deputy or Officer, six days at the least before such day of Trial, or Assessment, summon such and so many Magistrates, being not less than three nor more than six, resident as aforesaid, as the said Judges shall direct, or in the absence of any such direction, as the said Sheriff shall think fit; and every such Magistrate shall be summoned in the same manner, and by writing in the same form, (as nearly as may be,) as respectively now are, or hereafter may be, prescribed by law for the summoning of Jurors.

(Compensation to Assessors, and fine for non-attendance.)

VII. And be it enacted, That upon every such Trial or Assessment, as last aforesaid, the Assessors shall be selected from the list of Magistrates so summoned, in like manner as is directed in the case of Assessors summoned to the said Supreme Court; and every Assessor shall, for every case on which he shall serve whether of Trial or Assessment, be allowed the sum of Ten Shillings, which shall immediately be paid by the successful party, and be eventually taxed and allowed as Costs in the cause; and every Magistrate summoned as an

Assessor, who shall neglect to attend in obedience to the summons served upon him, shall, on proof of such service, be liable to the same fine, at the discretion of the presiding Judge, as may be by law imposed by the said Supreme Court for non-attendance in the case of any Special Juror; and every such fine shall, on a return thereof to the said Supreme Court, be levied and appropriated as Fines on Jurors in the said Court now are, or hereafter may be, by law levied and appropriated.

(Provision in cases of deficiency in the list of Special Jurors.)

VIII. And be it enacted, That whenever a Special Jury shall have been awarded for the trial of any such Issue or Issues as aforesaid, and there shall not be a sufficient number of persons qualified as Special Jurors, and resident as aforesaid, for the striking of a "Reduced List" as by law directed in such cases, it shall be lawful for the Sheriff, or his Deputy, to make up the number required for that purpose, from the List of Common Jurors; and no exception shall afterwards be allowed in respect thereof, or for that any number of such Jurors (if on such Reduced List) were or are included in the Jury Panel.

(Provision for cases where the Sheriff is interested.)

IX. And be it declared and enacted, That in every case wherein it shall be made to appear to the said Supreme Court, or to one of the Judges thereof, that the Sheriff is a party or in any manner interested, the Venire or Precept to be issued therein, shall be directed and delivered to the Coroner, or such other person as the said Court or Judge shall in that behalf appoint; and such Coroner or person shall thenceforward have and exercise, for the purposes of such Writ or Precept, all the powers and duties of the Sheriff of the said Colony.

(Declaratory clause as to prosecutor in Circuit Courts.)

X. And be it declared and enacted, That all crimes and offences which have been and are respectively cognizable in the said several Circuit Courts, shall, until the constitution of Grand Juries within the said Colony, continue to be so cognizable, and may be tried in the said Courts respectively, upon Information or Informations exhibited therein by and in the name of Her Majesty's Attorney or Solicitor General for the time being of the said Colony, or either of them; or, in case of their absence from any such Court, by and in the name of such other person as the Governor for the time being of the said Colony shall have appointed, or shall hereafter appoint, in that behalf.

(Governor may appoint District Sheriffs.)

XI. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor, at any time or times hereafter, as he shall see fit, by Warrant under His Hand and Seal, to nominate and appoint some fit and proper person to act as and be the Sheriff in and for every or any such Circuit District; and the Sheriff first so appointed shall continue in office until he shall be re-appointed, or another person shall be appointed in his stead, in manner next hereinafter mentioned; and it shall be lawful for the Governor, on the first Monday in the next and every succeeding year, to nominate and appoint in manner aforesaid, the same or some other fit and proper person, to act as and be the Sheriff for every or any such District, for the year next following; and every such Sheriff so appointed

shall, as soon as conveniently may be, take before one of the Judges of the Supreme Court the oath of Allegiance, and an oath faithfully to execute his office; and every Sheriff appointed as last aforesaid, shall continue in office during the space of one whole year then next following, and until he be re-appointed, or another person be appointed, and sworn into office in his stead, in manner aforesaid; and if the Sheriff for any such Circuit District shall die or depart from the said Colony, or become otherwise incapable of executing the duties of his office, then and in such case, another person shall be appointed and sworn in like manner, and such person shall continue in office for the remainder of the year, and until he be re-appointed, or another person be appointed and sworn into office in his stead, as aforesaid; and every such Sheriff, during the time of his continuance in office, shall, in and for the District for which he shall have been so appointed, have

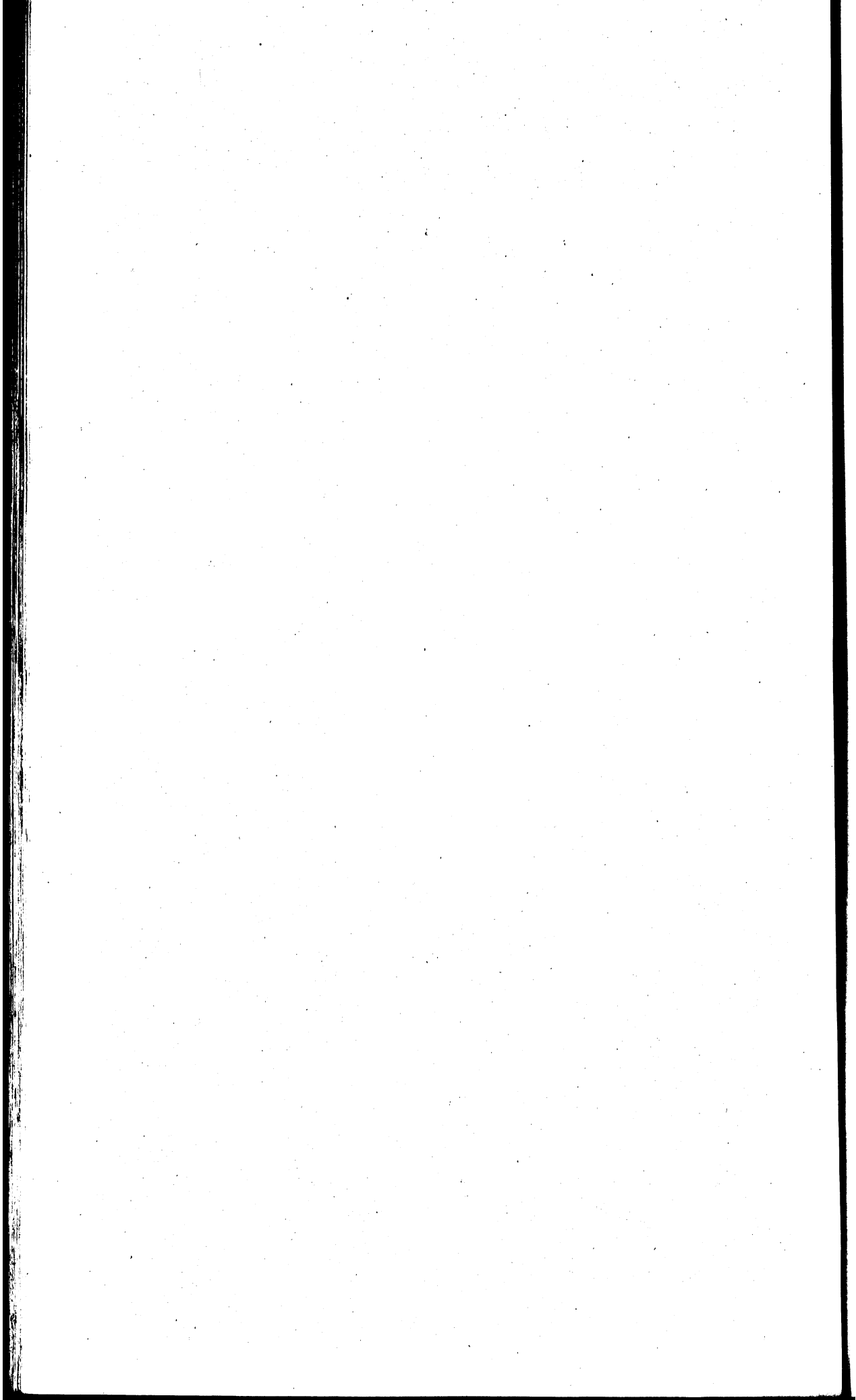
and execute the same powers and duties, and enjoy the same privileges, and be subject to the same liabilities, in all respects, as by law belong to the office of a Sheriff; and the powers, duties, privileges, and liabilities, of the Sheriff of New South Wales, shall, within such District, cease and determine.

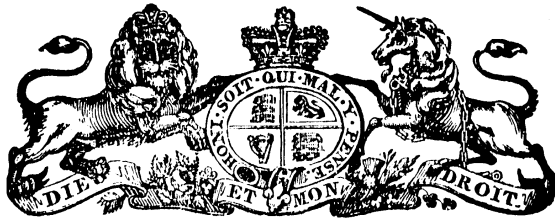

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bills, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

*By His Excellency's Command,

No. 1.—“ A Bill to amend, and to extend to Port Phillip, an Act intituled, ‘ An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the Savings’ Bank of New South Wales.’ ”

It being expedient to amend the Act 3 VICTORIA, No. 12, and to extend the provisions thereof, as so amended, to a Savings’ Bank to be established at Port Phillip, it is proposed :—

That a Savings’ Bank shall be established at Port Phillip, to be called “ THE SAVINGS’ BANK OF PORT PHILLIP,” the management whereof shall be distinct from, and independent of, the Savings’ Bank of New South Wales.

That His Honor the Superintendent of Port Phillip shall be the President of the said Institution, and that the management of the affairs thereof shall be vested in Twelve Trustees, to be appointed by the said Superintendent, of whom one shall be styled Vice-President.

That the Act 3 VICTORIA, No. 12, shall extend and apply to the said Institution to be established at Port Phillip.

That the said Act shall be amended by providing for the establishment of a Rest or Security Fund in each Bank.

That the said Act shall be further amended by providing, in the event of the Insolvency, or death of any Officer of the said Banks respectively, for the recovery of such Money, Deeds, or Securities, belonging to such Banks respectively, as may have been in the possession of such Officer at the time of his Bankruptcy or death.

No. 2.—A Bill to amend the law for the Transportation of Offenders to Penal Settlements, and to provide for and regulate the Transportation of Offenders to Van Diemen’s Land, and the Islands adjacent thereto, and comprised within the Government thereof.

The places heretofore used as Penal Settlements for the Colony of New South Wales, being no longer used as such, and His Excellency the Governor having, by virtue of the authority vested in the several Governors of Her Majesty’s Colonial Possessions, under an Act of Parliament, passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of King George the Fourth, and

an order in Council, bearing date 22nd May, 1840, issued a Proclamation, declaring that the Colony of Van Diemen's Land, and the Islands adjacent thereto, and under the Government thereof, shall be used as places of Transportation for Transported offenders under Colonial sentence of Transportation; it is proposed to repeal so much of 3 William IV., No. 3, as enacts that Transported offenders, under Colonial sentence or order of Transportation, shall be Transported to such Penal Settlements within the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, as the Governor for the time being of the said Colony should direct.

That after sentence passed on any such offender, the Governor may order him to be kept to hard labour at such place as he shall think fit, until his removal to the place of Transportation.

That in all cases where any such offender, already under sentence or order of Transportation passed in any of Her Majesty's Dominions, shall be convicted of an offence for which a sentence of Transportation may be passed, it shall be lawful to pass on such offender a sentence of Transportation for life, or for any term not less than seven years, provided that the term of such sentence shall in no case exceed, in the whole, the duration of sentence to which a free and untransported person would for such offence be liable, in addition to the duration or residue of the term of the original sentence of such Transported offender.

Nothing in the proposed Act to repeal or alter the Act 3 Victoria, No. 22, abolishing the Transportation of Female Convicts.

To His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS,
Knight, Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales, &c. &c. &c.

SIR,—HER MAJESTY having been graciously pleased to erect the Islands of New Zealand into a separate Colony, We, the undersigned, the Magistrates, Civil Officers, and Inhabitants of Auckland, are desirous to avail ourselves of the earliest opportunity, since the dissolution of our connection with your Administration, to testify our grateful sense of the interest you have on all occasions manifested towards this rising settlement, and our acknowledgment of the excellent judgment displayed in all your measures relating to it, so long as it continued under your Government.

We believe that the power of Legislation which Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to grant, will be highly beneficial to this Colony, by affording more ready and immediate modes of meeting the various wants and exigencies incidental to a new Colony; but, whilst gratefully receiving this proof of Her Majesty's regard for the welfare of one of Her most remote possessions, We are at the same time fully sensible how great and important is the assistance we have received from the Colony of New South Wales, under your enlightened Administration, and though severed from Our legal

connexion with it, We yet trust, that community of interests and reciprocity of advantages may afford increased and frequent facility of intercourse, and connect by the closest ties the two Colonies

We avail ourselves of this opportunity to add, that the experience we have enjoyed of your zealous and watchful care for the protection and promotion of our interests, is an assurance and pledge to us that in your Excellency we shall always find every desire and endeavour to continue the same course of encouragement to the equal benefit and prosperity of both Colonies.

SIR,—I have this day had the honor to receive the Address from the Magistrates, Civil Officers, and Inhabitants of Auckland, which your Excellency kindly undertook to convey to my hands.

I beg, through your Excellency, to return to the Gentlemen who concurred in this Address, my sincere thanks for the honor they have done me, and to express to them the satisfaction which I feel, in finding that my anxious desire to advance the interests of New Zealand, during the time it formed part of my Government, is acknowledged and appreciated by them.

The annexation of New Zealand to New South Wales, was a measure of temporary convenience only;—when circumstances no longer required so close a connexion, no one rejoiced more than myself to see New Zealand advanced to the station which it now holds amongst Her Majesty's Colonial possessions; nor does any one, I beg to assure both your Excellency and the Gentlemen who have addressed me, desire more ardently than I do, to see New Zealand prosper under your Excellency's Administration, and to see also the ties growing out of contiguity which connect it with this Colony, daily increased and strengthened.

OCCUPATION OF CROWN LANDS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES.

WITH reference to the Regulations of 1st August, 1831, 25th September, 1839, and 13th February, 1840, relative to the Leasing of Crown Lands within the Boundaries of Location, and to the 6th clause in the Act of Council, 5 VICTORIA, No. 1, His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that it having been found inconvenient to issue Annual Leases in the manner pointed out in the said Regulations, it is proposed,

in future, instead of Annual Leases, to grant Licenses to Depasture Cattle and other Stock in lieu thereof.

The said Regulations have accordingly been cancelled so far as they apply to the Leases in question, and the following are to be substituted for them:—

1st. The Land for the occupation of which Licenses may be obtained, will be advertised from time to time in the *Government Gazette*.

2nd. Persons wishing to have particular Lands advertised, may apply, as heretofore, to the Surveyor General, for that purpose.

3rd. No Lot, consisting of less than one square mile, or 640 acres, will be put up, except in special cases, which may render expedient a departure from this rule: And in any case where there is a broken section with water frontage, the section behind it will be added to the Lot.

4th. The upset price of each Lot will be specified in the advertisement; the bidding will be upon this upset price, and the Lot will be knocked down to the highest bidder. The Government, however reserves to itself the right of refusing the bidding of any one; and before any bidding is accepted, if the yearly price of the License does not exceed £5, the same will be demanded at the fall of the hammer, but if above £5, a deposit of ten per cent. will be required at the fall of the hammer, and the balance to be paid within one month from the day of sale.

5th. Parties failing to pay the balance within that period, will forfeit the deposit of ten per cent., and will of course acquire no right to the occupancy of the Land intended to have been included in the License.

6th. Immediately upon payment of the full amount for the License, the same will be issued by the Colonial Treasurer, in the form annexed.

7th. It is to be distinctly understood, that the Lands included in any such License, will be open to purchase under the ordinary Regulations; and in the event of their being sold, must be surrendered by the party upon his receiving one month's notice; but in such case, the balance of the price of the License for the time it has to run, will be refunded to him.

8th. Parties holding Lands under License, in conformity with these Regulations, will be entitled to the exclusive right of occupancy of the same, during the period the License shall remain in force, for the purpose of Depasturing Cattle and other Stock; but a clause will be inserted in it, restraining the holder from cutting Cedar or other Timber, except such of the latter as may be required for domestic uses, for firebote, fencing stock-yards, or other conveniences, for the enjoyment of the Land, provided that no part thereof be sold.

9th. In the District of Port Phillip, Licenses will be issued by the Sub-Treasurer of the District, in the same form and manner, and subject to the same formalities, in all respects, as Licenses in the Sydney District; and persons desiring to have any particular portions of Land advertised, may make application for them to the Senior Surveyor of the District.

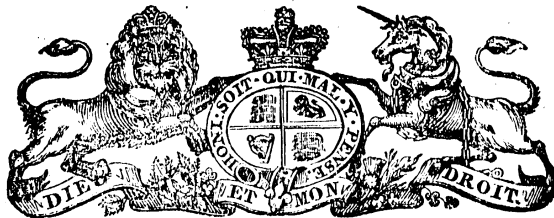

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the present year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "*An Act to make further provision for the Trial of Cases in the Circuit Courts of New South Wales, and to amend, in certain respects, the Act providing for Trial by Jury in such Courts.*" it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, by any Proclamation or Proclamations, by him from time to time for that purpose issued, to apportion and divide the said Colony into three or more Circuit Districts; and whereas, by a certain Proclamation, under my Hand and Seal, bearing date the Second day of January, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one, Circuit Courts, for the trial of Criminal as well as Civil issues, were directed to be holden at the Town of Maitland, to the north; at the Town of Berrima, to the south; and at the Town of Bathurst, to the west, at certain times therein set forth.

Now, therefore, I, the said GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the Authority so in me vested as aforesaid, by the said recited Act, do divide the parts of the said Colony hereinafter mentioned, into three Circuit Districts, to be called, respectively, the Northern, the Southern, and the Western Districts; And I do proclaim and appoint that the said Northern District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony comprehended within the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester, Durham, Hunter, Brisbane, and Bligh, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Northumberland and Bligh as are respectively comprised within the Police Districts of Brisbane Water and Wellington, according to the Boundaries thereof, set forth in the Notice from the Colonial Secretary's Office, published under my Authority in the *New*

South Wales Government Gazette, and bearing date the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty.

And I further proclaim and appoint, that the said Southern Circuit District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony, comprehended within the Counties of Camden, Argyle, St. Vincent, Murray, and King, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Camden and St. Vincent, as are comprised within the Police Districts of Picton, Camden, and Narellan, Campbelltown, Illawarra, and Broulee, according to the boundaries thereof, respectively set forth in the said Notice of the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty, and in a certain other Notice published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, under my Authority, and bearing date the Sixth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

And, lastly, I proclaim and appoint that the aforesaid Western Circuit District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony, comprehended within the Counties of Bathurst, Wellington, Bligh, Phillip, Roxburgh, Georgiana, Westmoreland, and Cook, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Bligh, Westmoreland, and Cook, as are comprised within the Police Districts of Cassilis, Picton, Penrith, and Windsor, according to the Boundaries thereof, respectively set forth in the Notices from the Colonial Secretary's Office, published under my Authority in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, and bearing date, respectively, the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty; the Second day of March, and Sixth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

26th August, 1841.

It is ordered, that henceforth, Answers taken before the Master shall be filed forthwith: and when Answers are taken before a Commissioner, the same shall be immediately sealed up, and endorsed by him with his signature, and transmitted to the Master's Office, with the least possible delay; and henceforth no Answer of any Defendant resident in Sydney, or within five miles thereof, shall be taken otherwise than before such Master.

III. It is ordered, that henceforth, in uncontested Causes, and all others, wherein the Parties, Complainants, and Defendants, shall express their consent thereto in writing, all matters necessary or proper to be proved at the Hearing, may be proved by the examination of Witnesses before the Master. And the examination of every such Witness being reduced to writing, and signed by him, may be read and used at the Hearing, the same as if such Witness were then examined *vivâ voce* in open Court.

The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering, or an Agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

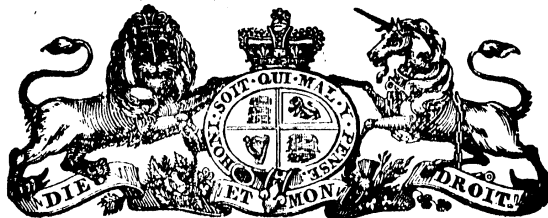

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the present year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "*An Act to make further provision for the Trial of Cases in the Circuit Courts of New South Wales, and to amend, in certain respects, the Act providing for Trial by Jury in such Courts,*" it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, by any Proclamation or Proclamations, by him from time to time for that purpose issued, to apportion and divide the said Colony into three or more Circuit Districts; and whereas, by a certain Proclamation, under my Hand and Seal, bearing date the Second day of January, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one, Circuit Courts, for the trial of Criminal as well as Civil issues, were directed to be holden at the Town of Maitland, to the north; at the Town of Berrima, to the south; and at the Town of Bathurst, to the west, at certain times therein set forth.

Now, therefore, I, the said GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the Authority so in me vested as aforesaid, by the said recited Act, do divide the parts of the said Colony hereinafter mentioned, into three Circuit Districts, to be called, respectively, the Northern, the Southern, and the Western Districts; And I do proclaim and appoint that the said Northern District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony comprehended within the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester, Durham, Hunter, Brisbane, and Bligh, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Northumberland and Bligh as are respectively comprised within the Police Districts of Brisbane Water and Wellington, according to the Boundaries thereof, set forth in the Notice from the Colonial Secretary's Office, published under my Authority in the *New*

South Wales Government Gazette, and bearing date the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty.

And I further proclaim and appoint, that the said Southern Circuit District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony, comprehended within the Counties of Camden, Argyle, St. Vincent, Murray, and King, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Camden and St. Vincent, as are comprised within the Police Districts of Picton, Camden, and Narellan, Campbelltown, Illawarra, and Broulee, according to the boundaries thereof, respectively set forth in the said Notice of the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty, and in a certain other Notice published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, under my Authority, and bearing date the Sixth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

And, lastly, I proclaim and appoint that the aforesaid Western Circuit District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony, comprehended within the Counties of Bathurst, Wellington, Bligh, Phillip, Roxburgh, Georgiana, Westmoreland, and Cook, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Bligh, Westmoreland, and Cook, as are comprised within the Police Districts of Cassilis, Picton, Penrith, and Windsor, according to the Boundaries thereof, respectively set forth in the Notices from the Colonial Secretary's Office, published under my Authority in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, and bearing date, respectively, the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty; the Second day of March, and Sixth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the publication, for general information, of the following Copy of a Letter, dated 21st August, 1841, from Mr. Joseph Parker, Master of the schooner *Mumford*, reporting the particulars of two dangerous Shoals,—one in the Banda Sea, near Velthoen's Island, and the other in the passage from the China to the Mindoro Sea.

By His Excellency's Command,

E. DEAS THOMSON.

(COPY.)

Mumford, 21st August, 1841.

SIR,—I have the honor to report to you the recent discovery of two dangerous Shoals,—one being in the Mindoro, and the other in the Banda Sea. The latter I fell in with myself on the 12th of June last, as per copy from my Log:—P.M., moderate east wind and hazy, heavy swell from S. E.; at 6, Velthoen's Island, bearing west 8 miles; at 8, dark cloudy weather, course S. by W.; at 11, 30' the wind and swell suddenly dropt, and through a thick haze, rippings were seen from the weather quarter to the lee bow, within half a cable's length—kept the vessel away; and as she paid off, she grazed slightly on a detached piece of Coral; no soundings were got at 20 fathoms immediately after; a quarter of an hour after, passing to leeward of it, I could hear it breaking very heavy. It bears S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W, 18 miles from Velthoen's Island.

The other was discovered by Captain Blaxland, of the *Merope*; it bears W. N. W. 13 miles from Apos Island, and is much in the way of Vesseis, proceeding from the China into the Mindoro Sea, by the Northumberland Strait.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance; and the contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering, or an Agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post Office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

GENERAL RULES.

(Exceptions.—The 16th Standing Rule repealed.)

I. It is ordered, that the Sixteenth of the standing Rules in Equity be repealed, and that all Exceptions to Answers, or to the Master's Reports, be henceforth taken and otherwise proceeded with, as is prescribed by the Rules of Practice of the High Court of Chancery in England.

(Taking and filing of Answers.)

II. It is ordered, that henceforth, Answers taken before the Master shall be filed forthwith: and when Answers are taken before a Commissioner, the same shall be immediately sealed up, and endorsed by him with his signature, and transmitted to the Master's Office, with the least possible delay; and henceforth no Answer of any Defendant resident in Sydney, or within five miles thereof, shall be taken otherwise than before such Master.

And the examination of every such Witness being reduced to writing, and signed by him, may be read and used at the Hearing, the same as if such Witness were then examined *vidv voce* in open Court.

It is proposed:—That so much of the Act, 3 WILLIAM IV., No. 3, as directs that any offender shall be Transported to a Penal Settlement, within the Colony of New South Wales or its Dependencies, shall be repealed.

That it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint one or more place or places, within the said Colony, at which any male offender, under any order or sentence of Transportation, passed by any competent Court or authority within the Colony, shall be detained; and every such offender shall be liable to be kept to hard labor on the

Public Roads, or other Public Works of the Colony, during the period of his sentence or order of Transportation.

That it shall be lawful for the Governor to order the removal of such offenders from one such place of detention to another.

That no intercourse shall be allowed with such places of detention, except under written authority from the Governor, under penalty of twenty pounds, or two months imprisonment, or both.

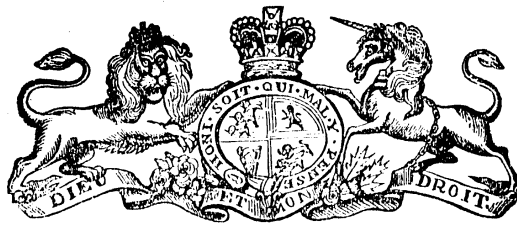

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the present year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "*An Act to make further provision for the Trial of Cases in the Circuit Courts of New South Wales, and to amend, in certain respects, the Act providing for Trial by Jury in such Courts,*" it is amongst other things enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, by any Proclamation or Proclamations, by him from time to time for that purpose issued, to apportion and divide the said Colony into three or more Circuit Districts; and whereas, by a certain Proclamation, under my Hand and Seal, bearing date the Second day of January, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one, Circuit Courts, for the trial of Criminal as well as Civil issues, were directed to be holden at the Town of Maitland, to the north; at the Town of Berrima, to the south; and at the Town of Bathurst, to the west, at certain times therein set forth.

Now, therefore, I, the said GOVERNOR, in pursuance of the Authority so in me vested as aforesaid, by the said recited Act, do divide the parts of the said Colony hereinafter mentioned, into three Circuit Districts, to be called, respectively, the Northern, the Southern, and the Western Districts; And I do proclaim and appoint that the said Northern District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony comprehended within the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester, Durham, Hunter, Brisbane, and Bligh, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Northumberland and Bligh as are respectively comprised within the Police Districts of Brisbane Water and Wellington, according to the Boundaries thereof, set forth in the Notice from the Colonial Secretary's Office, published under my Authority in the *New*

South Wales Government Gazette, and bearing date the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty.

And I further proclaim and appoint, that the said Southern Circuit District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony, comprehended within the Counties of Camden, Argyle, St. Vincent, Murray, and King, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Camden and St. Vincent, as are comprised within the Police Districts of Picton, Camden, and Narellan, Campbelltown, Illawarra, and Broulee, according to the boundaries thereof, respectively set forth in the said Notice of the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty, and in a certain other Notice published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, under my Authority, and bearing date the Sixth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

And, lastly, I proclaim and appoint that the aforesaid Western Circuit District shall consist of all parts of the said Colony, comprehended within the Counties of Bathurst, Wellington, Bligh, Phillip, Roxburgh, Georgiana, Westmoreland, and Cook, with the exception of such parts of the Counties of Bligh, Westmoreland, and Cook, as are comprised within the Police Districts of Cassilis, Picton, Penrith, and Windsor, according to the Boundaries thereof, respectively set forth in the Notices from the Colonial Secretary's Office, published under my Authority in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, and bearing date, respectively, the Twelfth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty; the Second day of March, and Sixth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one.

By His Excellency's Command,

E. DEAS THOMSON.

No. 1.—“*A Bill to authorise the Governor of New South Wales, to detain at hard labor on the Roads or Public Works of the said Colony, any person under sentence or order of Transportation, passed therein.*”

It is proposed:—That so much of the Act, 3 WILLIAM IV., No. 3, as directs that any offender shall be Transported to a Penal Settlement, within the Colony of New South Wales or its Dependencies, shall be repealed.

That it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint one or more place or places, within the said Colony, at which any male offender, under any order or sentence of Transportation, passed by any competent Court or authority within the Colony, shall be detained; and every such offender shall be liable to be kept to hard labor on the Public Roads, or other Public Works of the Colony, during the period of his sentence or order of Transportation.

That it shall be lawful for the Governor to order the removal of such offenders from one such place of detention to another.

That no intercourse shall be allowed with such places of detention, except under written authority from the Governor, under penalty of twenty pounds, or two months imprisonment, or both.

That all offenders, detained as aforesaid, shall be subject to the summary jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace, and the Principal Superintendent of Convicts.

That the proposed Act shall not interfere with the provisions of the Act, 3 VICTORIA, No. 22, abolishing the Transportation of Female Convicts.

That the proposed Act shall not, in any way, affect Her Majesty's prerogative of mercy.

That the proposed Act shall take effect immediately from the passing thereof, and shall be and continue in force for the space of one year thereafter.

No. 2.—“*A Bill for the further amendment of the Law, and for the better advancement of Justice.*”

It being expedient further to amend the Law, and to provide for the better Administration of Justice, it is proposed:—

That with respect to offences committed within the limits of the District of Port Phillip, the resident Judge of such District shall have exclusive Jurisdiction; and with respect to offences committed in any other part of the Colony, the Judges at Sydney shall have exclusive Jurisdiction; and so in like manner with respect to Actions and other Proceedings at Law, and Suits and Proceedings in Equity.

That it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to alter the limits of the District of Port Phillip, for the purposes of the proposed Act.

That the Judges at Sydney, and the resident Judge at Port Phillip, shall, respectively, have concurrent Jurisdiction along the borders of the line dividing Port Phillip from the other parts of New South Wales, and throughout a tract of country extending twenty-five miles on each side of such line.

That the Appellate Jurisdiction of the Judges at Sydney, shall not be affected, nor the power of the Supreme Court, or of the resident Judge at Port Phillip, respectively, to cause the Writs mentioned in the Act, 4 VICTORIA, No. 22, to be executed in any part of the Colony.

That it shall be lawful for the Plaintiff in any Action, after Judgment recovered therein at Port Phillip, to cause a Memorial, containing the particulars in the proposed Act set forth, to be filed in the Office of the Supreme Court, at Sydney; and such Memorial, being duly certified and authenticated by the Seal of the Court of Port Phillip, and filed as aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken, thenceforth to be a Record of such Judgment, and may be dealt with in the same manner as if Judgment had in fact been recovered at Sydney; and the like course may be taken at Port Phillip with respect to Judgments recorded in the Supreme Court at Sydney.

That in case any such Judgment shall have been entered up more than six months, no Execution shall be sued out thereon, without an Affidavit that the sum for which the Writ is sought to be sued out is still due.

That after the passing of the proposed Act, the Plaintiff in any Action commenced at Sydney, or at Port Phillip, respectively, may proceed by foreign Attachment, in manner prescribed by the Act 4 VICTORIA, No. 6, in respect of any Defendant not residing where the Action shall be commenced.

That where a foreign Attachment shall be issued at Sydney, or at Port Phillip, in respect of any Defendant residing at Port Phillip, or Sydney, as the case may be, no other Notice shall be necessary as to such issue, than publication in the Newspapers at either place.

That no Judgment or Proceeding of the Supreme Court at Sydney, or of the Court at Port Phillip, shall be affected or taken to be void, by reason of the Sitting of the said Courts at the same time.

That it shall be lawful for the resident Judge at Port Phillip to reserve, for the opinion of the Judges at Sydney, any point of Law, at his discretion; and the decision of such Judges, after, or without Argument before them, as they shall think fit, shall be binding and conclusive.

That in case of the absence or illness of the Judge appointed to sit in Equity, it shall be lawful for either of the other Judges to sit alone and determine all causes in Equity.

That Appeals shall hereafter be preferred to, and come on to be heard and decided before, the three Judges at Sydney; this provision to apply to Appeals already pending.

That the same powers as are vested in the Judges of the several Courts at Westminster, as to the examination of Witnesses on Interrogatories, in Actions there pending, shall be vested in and may

be exercised by the Judges at Sydney, and the resident Judge at Port Phillip.

That any Examination taken by virtue of such powers may be read, without proof of the signature of the Examinant, provided it shall not be made to appear that the Examinant is within the Jurisdiction of, and able to attend the Court.

That no Plea in Abatement for a *Misnomer* shall be allowed, but the Defendant may cause the Declaration to be amended at the Cost of the Plaintiff, upon a Judge's Summons, founded on Affidavit of the right name; and in all Actions on any written Instrument, it shall be sufficient to designate the parties thereto, by initial letter or letters, or other contraction of the first or other names of the parties.

That in all Actions involving matters of account, it shall be lawful for the Court, or any Judge thereof, on the application of either party, to refer such matters to Arbitration; and that after the passing of the proposed Act, it shall not be necessary in any such case to make the Judge's Order a Rule of the Court.

That on the return of every Writ of Inquiry, or Writ of Trial, issued in any of the cases contemplated by section 26 of the Act 4 Victoria, No. 22, the successful party may tax his Costs, and sign Judgment, and issue Execution forthwith, unless the Commissioner to whom the Writ shall have been directed, shall certify that the unsuccessful party should be afforded an opportunity to move for a new Trial, or fresh Assessment, or, unless the Judge shall stay Judgment therein; and every such Inquiry or Trial shall be before such Commissioner, and two Assessors to be named and summoned by him.

That it shall be lawful for the parties in any Action, after Issue joined, by consent, to state the facts, as the same may be agreed upon between them, in the form of a Special Case, for the opinion of the Court, and to agree that a Judgment shall be entered thereupon for the Plaintiff or Defendant, by confession, or *Nolle Prosequi*, or otherwise, after the decision of such Case, as the Court shall think fit; and in all other Cases where, by any law now in force, the Court, or any Judge thereof, is empowered to direct or authorise the Trial of a feigned Issue, it shall be lawful for such Court, or Judge, to direct or allow the statement of a Special Case for the opinion of the Court on any matter of law.

That after the passing of the proposed Act, it shall be lawful for the Defendant, in all personal Actions, except in Special Cases specified therein, to pay into Court, by leave of a Judge, a sum of money by way of compensation or amends, in such manner, and under such regulations as to Costs and the form of pleading, as the said Court shall prescribe.

That upon all debts, or sums certain, hereafter recovered in any Action, Interest shall be allowed to the Creditor at a rate not exceeding eight per cent.; and, in respect of a Bill of Exchange or Promissory Note, at a rate not exceeding twelve per cent., per annum, from the time when such debt or sum was payable, if payable by virtue of some written instrument, and at a time or date certain, or, if payable otherwise, from the time when payment shall have been demanded in writing; but Interest on Bills of Exchange or Promissory Notes shall not be computed at a

higher rate than eight per cent., where no plea shall have been pleaded.

That in all Actions of Trover or Trespass concerning Goods, a Jury or Assessors may give Damages, in the nature of Interest, over and above the value of the Goods; and also over and above the amount of money receivable in any action on Policies of Insurance hereafter made.

That Witnesses shall be examined, notwithstanding that they may be objected to, on the ground of being interested in the Verdict; but in such case no Verdict in that Action shall at any time be admissible in Evidence, for or against such Witness, or any one claiming under him.

That where two or more persons shall be made Defendants in any personal Action, any one or more of them who shall have a *Nolle Prosequi* entered, or shall obtain a Verdict, shall have Judgment for and recover his reasonable Costs; and where any *Nolle Prosequi* shall have been entered on any Count, or as to part of a Declaration, the Defendant shall have Judgment for, and recover Costs; and also, in all Writs of *Scire Facias*, the Plaintiff shall recover Costs, as well upon a Judgment by default, as on a Judgment after Plea or Demurrer; and when Judgment shall be given on a *Demurrer*, the party in whose favour such Judgment shall be given, shall also have Judgment to recover Costs.

That the Executors or Administrators of any Lessor or Landlord, may distrain upon the Lands demised for any term, or at will, for Arrears of Rent due in the life-time of such Lessor or Landlord.

That Executors or Administrators shall be liable to pay Costs, in case of being nonsuited, or of a Verdict against them in any Action brought in right of their Testator or Intestate.

That no Wager of Law shall be allowed hereafter; and that Actions of Debt shall be maintainable on simple contract against Executors or Administrators.

That Actions may be brought by Executors or Administrators for injury to the real Estate of their Testator or Intestate, committed during his life-time; and the like Actions may be brought against Executors or Administrators for any wrong committed by their Testator or Intestate, in respect of the property, real or personal, of any other person.

That after the passing of the proposed Act, it shall be lawful for the Sheriff, at Sydney, or Deputy Sheriff, at Port Phillip, to sell any Equity of Redemption.

That in all Actions now or hereafter depending, where the Plaintiff, by Verdict or otherwise, shall recover less than Forty Shillings, he shall not be entitled to any Costs whatever, unless the cause of Action shall be certified by a Judge; but that in all cases where the sum recovered shall be above Forty Shillings, notwithstanding that it shall not exceed Ten Pounds, the Plaintiff shall have Judgment for, and recover his Costs, unless the Judge shall certify that the Action might have been brought in one of the Courts of Requests.

That in every case hereafter where a Debtor, resident in the Colony, shall convey or assign to Trustees all his Estate and Effects, for the benefit of all his Creditors, (to be named in a Schedule to the Deed, with the amount due to each) and the Deed conveying the same, shall be executed in manner set forth in the proposed Act, by the Debtor and Trustees, and the Majority in number

and value of his Creditors, or by the Agents of such of them as may be absent from the Colony, the person of such Debtor, from and after the publication of the Notice set forth in the proposed Act, shall be absolutely free from Arrest in Execution at the suit of any Creditor named in the said Schedule, in respect of any Sum or Debt therein included; but no Creditor, whose Debt is under Fifty Pounds, shall be reckoned in number, but in value only.

That in all cases of variance between the proof and record in any Action of Law now or hereafter depending, the Court, or the Judge before whom the Trial is had, instead of causing the Record to be amended, may direct the Jury or Assessors to find the fact or facts according to the Evidence; and the same power may be exercised, not only by the Supreme Court and the several Judges thereof, but also by the several Circuit Courts.

That all Actions of Debt, for Rent or Covenant, or Debt upon any Bond or other Specialty, and of Debt on *Scire Facias*, upon Recognizance, shall be commenced within ten years after the passing of the proposed Act, or within twenty years after cause of Action; all Actions for Penalties, Damages, or Sums given to the Parties grieved by any Law now or hereafter in force, shall be commenced within one year after the passing of the proposed Act, or within two years after the cause of Action; and all Actions of Debt upon any Award, when the submission is not by specialty, or for money levied under *Fieri Facias*, shall be commenced within three years after the passing of this Act, or within six years after the cause of Action.

That if any person entitled to any such Action or *Scire Facias*, shall be, at the time of the cause of Action, within the age of twenty-one, feme Covert, non compos mentis, or beyond sea, such person shall be at liberty to commence the same within such times after becoming of full age, discover, of sound mind, or having returned from beyond sea, as other persons having no such impediment might have done; and Actions may be brought against any person after his return from beyond sea, within the times before limited.

That where an acknowledgment shall be made, the party entitled to Action may bring the same within twenty years after acknowledgment, or part payment, or satisfaction; or, in case of disability, within twenty years after such disability shall have ceased.

That the Act of Parliament, 2 and 3, Wm. IV., cap. 71, shortening the time of legal prescription, shall be adopted and applied in the Administration of Justice in New South Wales and its Dependencies, so far as the same is applicable thereto.

That in case of the Trial of any feigned Issue, or new Trial, the Court or Judge may impose such conditions, and direct such admissions to be made, as shall seem meet; and upon any such new Trial, to order the reading, from the Judge's Notes, of the Testimony of any Witness examined on the former Trial, instead of such Witness being again personally examined; and also, in any such feigned Issue, to permit both or either party to examine the other on Oath.

That all Decrees, Rules, and Orders of the Court, shall have the effect of Judgments.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the publication, for general information, of the following Copy of a Letter, dated 21st August, 1841, from Mr. Joseph Parker, Master of the schooner *Munford*, reporting the particulars of two dangerous Shoals,—one in the Banda Sea, near Velthoen's Island, and the other in the passage from the China to the Mindoro Sea.

Munford, 21st August, 1841.

SIR,—I have the honor to report to you the recent discovery of two dangerous Shoals,—one being in the Mindoro, and the other in the Banda Sea. The latter I fell in with myself on the 12th of June last, as per copy from my Log:—P.M., moderate east wind and hazy, heavy swell from S. E.; at 6, Velthoen's Island, bearing west 8 miles; at 8, dark cloudy weather, course S. by W.; at 11, 30' the wind and swell suddenly dropt, and through a thick haze, rippings were seen from the weather quarter to the lee bow, within half a cable's length—kept the vessel away; and as she paid off, she grazed slightly on a detached piece of Coral; no soundings were got at 20 fathoms immediately after; a quarter of an hour after, passing to leeward of it, I could hear it breaking very heavy. It bears S. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W, 18 miles from Velthoen's Island.

The other was discovered by Captain Blaxland, of the *Merope*; it bears W. N. W. 13 miles from Apos Island, and is much in the way of Vessels, proceeding from the China into the Mindoro Sea, by the Northumberland Strait.

QUIT-RENTS.

THE collection proposed by the Government Notice of 1st January, 1841, to have been made in the present year, of a portion of the sum due for Quit-rents having been postponed, in consequence of the temporary absence of the Colonial Treasurer, until 1842; His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that all persons indebted to the Government, on account of Quit-rents, will be required to pay the same, in whole or in part, during the next year, according to the following arrangement, viz:—

1. Collectors will be appointed in each district, and will be instructed to demand, on the 1st April next, the amount payable for the year 1841, together with an equal amount (where due) for arrears of former years.

2. If these amounts be paid within three months from the day on which they are demanded, no further payment will be required until the year 1843, when a similar demand will be made of the Quit-rent for 1842, with an equal amount for the arrears due on 31st December, 1840.

In future years a demand will in like manner be made, of double the amount due for the year immediately preceding, until all arrears be liquidated, when the amount stated in the Deed of Grant will alone be demanded yearly.

3. If not paid within three months from the date of the first demand, the Collectors will be authorized to proceed by distress or arrest; and in every such case the whole amount due will be levied at once.

4. For such Sums as the Collectors may obtain, they will be allowed five per cent. if the money be paid voluntarily, and ten per cent. if recovered by distress or arrest.

5. Such persons as, before the 1st of April next, may pay into the Treasury, at Sydney, the amount proposed to be levied in the ensuing year, will be allowed a deduction of five per cent., being the per centage that would otherwise be paid to the Collectors.

6. During the present and succeeding year, namely, until the 31st December, 1842, but not afterwards, all persons whatever will be permitted to redeem their Quit-rents, whether for Town Allotments or Portions of Land, and whether the Deed of Grant contain any covenant for redemption, or not, on payment of ten years' rent and all arrears due, into the Treasury.

In such cases, the Discount of five per cent. will be allowed on the arrears, if paid before the 1st of April next, but not on the sum paid for the redemption of the Rents.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement, are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering, or an Agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.

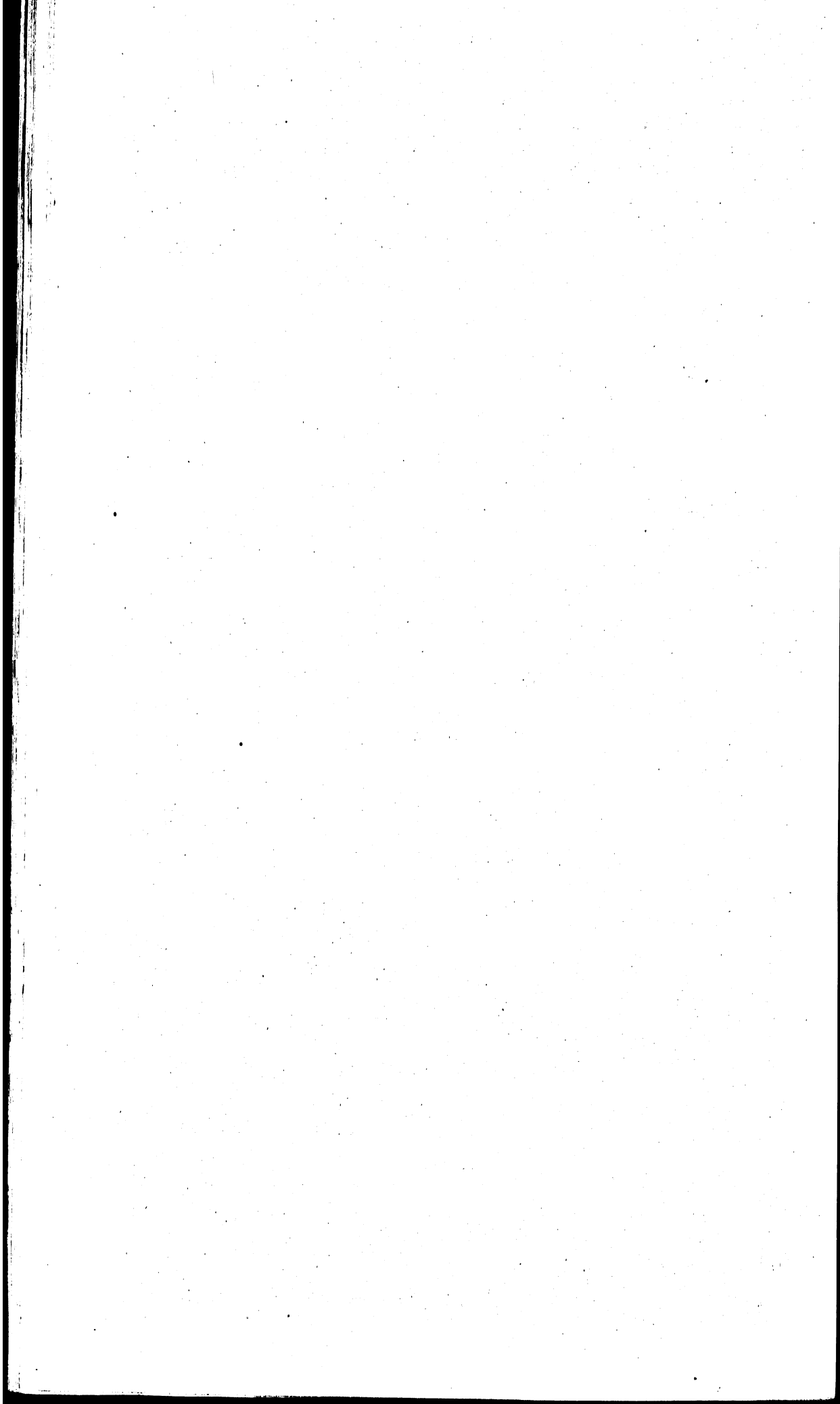

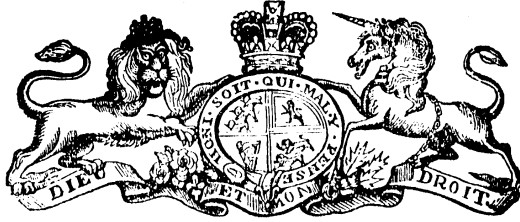

COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the general objects of the following Bills, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

E. DEAS THOMSON.

No. 1.—“*A Bill to enable the Members of an Association, called “THE MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE ASSOCIATION,” to sue and be sued in the name of the Chairman of the said Association for the time being, and for other purposes therein mentioned.*”

It being deemed convenient and just that persons having demands against the “MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE ASSOCIATION,” should be entitled to sue some Member thereof in place and stead of the whole, it is proposed :—

That all Actions and Suits, whether at Law or in Equity, shall be in the name of the Chairman.

That Memorial of the Chairman's name shall be recorded in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court ; and that no Action shall be brought until such Memorial be recorded.

That only one Action shall be brought against the Chairman for the same cause.

That the Evidence of the Chairman or any other Officer, or of any Member of the Association, shall be admissible in any Action or Suit, notwithstanding his interest in the result.

That Execution may issue against any Director—who shall be indemnified out of the Funds of the Association.

That the proposed Act shall be in force at all times during the continuance of the Association.

That the Association shall not be Incorporated by the proposed Act.

That all Bonds, &c., taken in the name of the Chairman, may be put in Suit in the name of the Chairman for the time being.

That the Plaintiff shall not be nonsuited in any Action, for want of proof of record of Memorial.

That a List of the names of the Members of the Association shall be recorded in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court, within thirty days from and after the passing of the proposed Act, and thereafter in the Month of January, in each and every Year ; and the persons named in such List shall be held liable as Members, until a New List be recorded, or until notice be given in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, of his or her retirement from the Association.

As to the RULES of the Association which it is proposed to annex to the proposed Act by way of Schedule—such Rules to be binding on all Members and Officers of the Association.

No. 2.—“*A Bill for the further amendment of the Law, and for the better advancement of Justice.*”

It being expedient further to amend the Law, and to provide for the better Administration of Justice, it is proposed :—

That with respect to offences committed within the limits of the District of Port Phillip, the resident Judge of such District shall have exclusive Jurisdiction ; and with respect to offences committed in any other part of the Colony, the Judges at Sydney shall have exclusive Jurisdiction ; and so in like manner with respect to Actions and other Proceedings at Law, and Suits and Proceedings in Equity.

That it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to alter the limits of the District of Port Phillip, for the purposes of the proposed Act.

That the Judges at Sydney, and the resident Judge at Port Phillip, shall, respectively, have concurrent Jurisdiction along the borders of the line dividing Port Phillip from the other parts of New South Wales, and throughout a tract of country extending twenty-five miles on each side of such line.

That the Appellate Jurisdiction of the Judges at Sydney, shall not be affected, nor the power of the Supreme Court, or of the resident Judge at Port Phillip, respectively, to cause the Writs

mentioned in the Act, 4 VICTORIA, No. 22, to be executed in any part of the Colony.

That it shall be lawful for the Plaintiff in any Action, after Judgment recovered therein at Port Phillip, to cause a Memorial, containing the particulars in the proposed Act set forth, to be filed in the Office of the Supreme Court, at Sydney; and such Memorial, being duly certified and authenticated by the Seal of the Court of Port Phillip, and filed as aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken thenceforth to be a Record of such Judgment, and may be dealt with in the same manner as if Judgment had in fact been recovered at Sydney; and the like course may be taken at Port Phillip with respect to Judgments recorded in the Supreme Court at Sydney.

That in case any such Judgment shall have been entered up more than six months, no Execution shall be sued out thereon, without an Affidavit that the sum for which the Writ is sought to be sued out is still due.

That after the passing of the proposed Act, the Plaintiff in any Action commenced at Sydney, or at Port Phillip, respectively, may proceed by foreign Attachment, in manner prescribed by the Act 4 VICTORIA, No. 6, in respect of any Defendant not residing where the Action shall be commenced.

That where a foreign Attachment shall be issued at Sydney, or at Port Phillip, in respect of any Defendant residing at Port Phillip, or Sydney, as the case may be, no other Notice shall be necessary as to such issue, than publication in the Newspapers at either place.

That no Judgment or Proceeding of the Supreme Court at Sydney, or of the Court at Port Phillip, shall be affected or taken to be void, by reason of the Sitting of the said Courts at the same time.

That it shall be lawful for the resident Judge at Port Phillip to reserve, for the opinion of the Judges at Sydney, any point of Law, at his discretion; and the decision of such Judges, after, or without Argument before them, as they shall think fit, shall be binding and conclusive.

That in case of the absence or illness of the Judge appointed to sit in Equity, it shall be lawful for either of the other Judges to sit alone and determine all causes in Equity.

That Appeals shall hereafter be preferred to, and come on to be heard and decided before, the three Judges at Sydney; this provision to apply to Appeals already pending.

That the same powers as are vested in the Judges of the several Courts at Westminster, as to the examination of Witnesses on Interrogatories, in Actions there pending, shall be vested in and may be exercised by the Judges at Sydney, and the resident Judge at Port Phillip.

That any Examination taken by virtue of such powers may be read, without proof of the signature of the Examinant, provided it shall not be made to appear that the Examinant is within the Jurisdiction of, and able to attend the Court.

That no Plea in Abatement for a *Misnomer* shall be allowed, but the Defendant may cause the Declaration to be amended at the Cost of the Plaintiff, upon a Judge's Summons, founded on Affidavit of the right name; and in all Actions on any written Instrument, it shall be sufficient to designate the parties thereto, by initial letter or

letters, or other contraction of the first or other names of the parties.

That in all Actions involving matters of account, it shall be lawful for the Court, or any Judge thereof, on the application of either party, to refer such matters to Arbitration; and that after the passing of the proposed Act, it shall not be necessary in any such case to make the Judge's Order a Rule of the Court.

That on the return of every Writ of Inquiry, or Writ of Trial, issued in any of the cases contemplated by section 26 of the Act 4 VICTORIA, No. 22, the successful party may tax his Costs, and sign Judgment, and issue Execution forthwith, unless the Commissioner to whom the Writ shall have been directed, shall certify that the unsuccessful party should be afforded an opportunity to move for a new Trial, or fresh Assessment, or, unless the Judge shall stay Judgment therein; and every such Inquiry or Trial shall be before such Commissioner, and two Assessors to be named and summoned by him.

That it shall be lawful for the parties in any Action, after Issue joined, by consent, to state the facts, as the same may be agreed upon between them, in the form of a Special Case, for the opinion of the Court, and to agree that a Judgment shall be entered thereupon for the Plaintiff or Defendant, by confession, or *Nolle Prosequi*, or otherwise, after the decision of such Case, as the Court shall think fit; and in all other Cases where, by any law now in force, the Court, or any Judge thereof, is empowered to direct or authorise the Trial of a feigned Issue, it shall be lawful for such Court, or Judge, to direct or allow the statement of a Special Case for the opinion of the Court on any matter of law.

That after the passing of the proposed Act, it shall be lawful for the Defendant, in all personal Actions, except in Special Cases specified therein, to pay into Court, by leave of a Judge, a sum of money by way of compensation or amends, in such manner, and under such regulations as to Costs and the form of pleading, as the said Court shall prescribe.

That upon all debts, or sums certain, hereafter recovered in any Action, Interest shall be allowed to the Creditor at a rate not exceeding eight per cent.; and, in respect of a Bill of Exchange or Promissory Note, at a rate not exceeding twelve per cent., per annum, from the time when such debt or sum was payable, if payable by virtue of some written instrument, and at a time or date certain, or, if payable otherwise, from the time when payment shall have been demanded in writing; but Interest on Bills of Exchange or Promissory Notes shall not be computed at a higher rate than eight per cent., where no plea shall have been pleaded.

That in all Actions of Trover or Trespass concerning Goods, a Jury or Assessors may give Damages, in the nature of Interest, over and above the value of the Goods; and also over and above the amount of money receivable in any action on Policies of Insurance hereafter made.

That Witnesses shall be examined, notwithstanding that they may be objected to, on the ground of being interested in the Verdict; but in such case no Verdict in that Action shall at any time be admissible in Evidence, for or against such Witness, or any one claiming under him.

That where two or more persons shall be made Defendants in any personal Action, any one or more of them who shall have a *Nolle Prosequi* entered, or shall obtain a Verdict, shall have Judgment for and recover his reasonable Costs; and where any *Nolle Prosequi* shall have been entered on any Count, or as to part of a Declaration, the Defendant shall have Judgment for, and recover Costs; and also, in all Writs of *Scire Facias*, the Plaintiff shall recover Costs, as well upon a Judgment by default, as on a Judgment after Plea or Demurrer; and when Judgment shall be given on a *Demurrer*, the party in whose favour such Judgment shall be given, shall also have Judgment to recover Costs.

That the Executors or Administrators of any Lessor or Landlord, may distrain upon the Lands demised for any term, or at will, for Arrears of Rent due in the life-time of such Lessor or Landlord.

That Executors or Administrators shall be liable to pay Costs, in case of being nonsuited, or of a Verdict against them in any Action brought in right of their Testator or Intestate.

That no Wager of Law shall be allowed hereafter; and that Actions of Debt shall be maintainable on simple contract against Executors or Administrators.

That Actions may be brought by Executors or Administrators for injury to the real Estate of their Testator or Intestate, committed during his life-time; and the like Actions may be brought against Executors or Administrators for any wrong committed by their Testator or Intestate, in respect of the property, real or personal, of any other person.

That after the passing of the proposed Act, it shall be lawful for the Sheriff, at Sydney, or Deputy Sheriff, at Port Phillip, to sell any Equity of Redemption.

That in all Actions now or hereafter depending, where the Plaintiff, by Verdict or otherwise, shall recover less than Forty Shillings, he shall not be entitled to any Costs whatever, unless the cause of Action shall be certified by a Judge; but that in all cases where the sum recovered shall be above Forty Shillings, notwithstanding that it shall not exceed Ten Pounds, the Plaintiff shall have Judgment for, and recover his Costs, unless the Judge shall certify that the Action might have been brought in one of the Courts of Requests.

That in every case hereafter where a Debtor, resident in the Colony, shall convey or assign to Trustees all his Estate and Effects, for the benefit of all his Creditors, (to be named in a Schedule to the Deed, with the amount due to each) and the Deed conveying the same, shall be executed in manner set forth in the proposed Act, by the Debtor and Trustees, and the Majority in number and value of his Creditors, or by the Agents of such of them as may be absent from the Colony, the person of such Debtor, from and after the publication of the Notice set forth in the proposed Act, shall be absolutely free from Arrest in Execution at the suit of any Creditor named in the said Schedule, in respect of any Sum or Debt therein included; but no Creditor, whose Debt is under Fifty Pounds, shall be reckoned in number, but in value only.

That in all cases of variance between the proof and record in any Action of Law now or hereafter depending, the Court, or the Judge before whom the Trial is had, instead of causing the Record

to be amended, may direct the Jury or Assessors to find the fact or facts according to the Evidence; and the same power may be exercised, not only by the Supreme Court and the several Judges thereof, but also by the several Circuit Courts.

That all Actions of Debt, for Rent or Covenant, or Debt upon any Bond or other Specialty, and of Debt on *Scire Facias*, upon Recognizance, shall be commenced within ten years after the passing of the proposed Act, or within twenty years after cause of Action; all Actions for Penalties, Damages, or Sums given to the Parties grieved by any Law now or hereafter in force, shall be commenced within one year after the passing of the proposed Act, or within two years after the cause of Action; and all Actions of Debt upon any Award, when the submission is not by specialty, or for money levied under *Fieri Facias*, shall be commenced within three years after the passing of this Act, or within six years after the cause of Action.

That if any person entitled to any such Action or *Scire Facias*, shall be, at the time of the cause of Action, within the age of twenty-one, feme Covert, non compos mentis, or beyond sea, such person shall be at liberty to commence the same within such times after becoming of full age, discover, of sound mind, or having returned from beyond sea, as other persons having no such impediment might have done; and Actions may be brought against any person after his return from beyond sea, within the times before limited.

That where an acknowledgment shall be made, the party entitled to Action may bring the same within twenty years after acknowledgment, or part payment, or satisfaction; or, in case of disability, within twenty years after such disability shall have ceased.

That the Act of Parliament, 2 and 3, Wm. IV., cap. 71, shortening the time of legal prescription, shall be adopted and applied in the Administration of Justice in New South Wales and its Dependencies, so far as the same is applicable thereto.

That in case of the Trial of any feigned Issue, or new Trial, the Court or Judge may impose such conditions, and direct such admissions to be made, as shall seem meet; and upon any such new Trial, to order the reading, from the Judge's Notes, of the Testimony of any Witness examined on the former Trial, instead of such Witness being again personally examined; and also, in any such feigned Issue, to permit both or either party to examine the other on Oath.

That all Decrees, Rules, and Orders of the Court, shall have the effect of Judgments.

QUIT-RENTS.

THE collection proposed by the Government Notice of 1st January, 1841, to have been made in the present year, of a portion of the sum due for Quit-rents having been postponed, in consequence of the temporary absence of the Colo-

nial Treasurer, until 1842; His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that all persons indebted to the Government, on account of Quit-rents, will be required to pay the same, in whole or in part, during the next year, according to the following arrangement, viz:—

1. Collectors will be appointed in each district, and will be instructed to demand, on the 1st April next, the amount payable for the year 1841, together with an equal amount (where due) for arrears of former years.

2. If these amounts be paid within three months from the day on which they are demanded, no further payment will be required until the year 1843, when a similar demand will be made of the Quit-rent for 1842, with an equal amount for the arrears due on 31st December, 1840.

In future years a demand will in like manner be made, of double the amount due for the year immediately preceding, until all arrears be liquidated, when the amount stated in the Deed of Grant will alone be demanded yearly.

3. If not paid within three months from the date of the first demand, the Collectors will be authorized to proceed by distress or arrest; and in every such case the whole amount due will be levied at once.

4. For such Sums as the Collectors may obtain, they will be allowed five per cent. if the money be paid voluntarily, and ten per cent. if recovered by distress or arrest.

5. Such persons as, before the 1st of April next, may pay into the Treasury, at Sydney, the amount proposed to be levied in the ensuing year, will be allowed a deduction of five per cent., being the per centage that would otherwise be paid to the Collectors.

6. During the present and succeeding year, namely, until the 31st December, 1842, but not afterwards, all persons whatever will be permitted to redeem their Quit-rents, whether for Town Allotments or Portions of Land, and whether the Deed of Grant contain any covenant for redemption, or not, on payment of ten years' rent and all arrears due, into the Treasury.

In such cases, the Discount of five per cent. will be allowed on the arrears, if paid before the 1st of April next, but not on the sum paid for the redemption of the Rents.

As expedition is of so much importance, offers for any quicker conveyance of the Mails than is now effected will be favourably entertained; but it is to be understood that they are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance; and the contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has directed that the following Port Regulations for the Island of Tahiti, be published for general information.

PORT REGULATIONS.

To Masters or Commanders of Vessels entering the Ports of Tahiti and Moorea.

1. A Pilot will go off to every Vessel duly displaying her Ensign or National Colours, and making the usual signal for a Pilot as soon as she approaches within a reasonable distance of the Ports to conduct her in; and on her departure, one day's notice being usually given, the Pilot will also take her to sea.

2. Any Vessel calling at the Port, the Captain must pay twenty-five dollars; ten for the Pilot, and fifteen for the Queen, for the anchorage, before she can be allowed to receive any water or other refreshment from the shore. In case of afterwards anchoring in any other parts of Tahiti or Moorea, every Vessel is to pay four dollars at each Port; and if the said Vessel come to anchor again in the first Port prior to leaving these Islands, she is to pay four dollars.

3. Should any Captain wish to ship Natives, two dollars must be paid for each man.

4. No Master or Commander of a Vessel is to discharge any Seaman, or any other person belonging to his Vessel, or to allow such person or persons in any way to leave the Vessel, without special permission from the Government, under a penalty of thirty dollars, twenty of which shall go to the Queen, six to the Governor of the Port where the Ship anchors, and four to the person who conducts the individual to his Ship, or makes known the circumstance to the proper authorities.

5. No Master or Commander of a Vessel is allowed to land any Passenger without special permission from the Queen and Governor.

6. Any person deserting from a Vessel shall be immediately apprehended, without waiting for orders to that effect from the Master or Commander of the Vessel from which he has deserted, for which the person apprehending him shall receive eight dollars, if apprehended within eight miles from the Vessel, and five dollars if apprehended at a greater distance. No Master or Commander is allowed to refuse taking back the deserter thus returned, under a penalty of thirty dollars. He can have him kept in prison till the Vessel be ready for sea, by paying one dollar per week for

his board. Should the same person desert again from the Ship, the same sum will be demanded for taking him as in the first instance.

7. Any deserter found after his Vessel has sailed, shall be put in prison, and kept to hard labour for six months.

8. Any person who entices another to desert, or secretes him when he has deserted, or who in any way assists deserters, shall cut four whale boat loads of fire-wood and carry it to the place appointed.

9. No Ship's company, or any part of a Ship's company, to be on shore in the night. Any person belonging to a Vessel, found on shore after 9 o'clock without a written pass, will be taken up and confined till morning, when he will be allowed to go on board his Vessel, by the Master or Commander of such Vessel paying two dollars, one for the Government, and one for the person who takes the Seaman into confinement.

10. Any person going about at night and taken by the watchman, must pay two dollars—that is, the person going about after the report of the second gun. Any person belonging to a Vessel, or being convicted selling, or in any way bartering with spirituous liquors of any kind, either on board or on shore, shall have no further trade or communication with the shore, but shall leave the Port immediately.

11. Any Native belonging to the shore, found working on board any Vessel or Boat on Sabbath days, to make fifty fathoms of public road.

12. In case of heaving a Vessel down, the Master or Commander shall pay to the Government sixty dollars, thirty for heaving down, fifteen for the hawse, and fifteen for the land on which he puts the casks.

13. Should the Master or Commander of any Vessel refuse to pay the Pilot his lawful fees, after the aforesaid service has been duly performed, or in any way maltreat the said Pilot, or refuse to comply with any of the above Port Regulations, a full statement of the facts, with a copy of these Regulations, will be transmitted to the proper authorities in the country to which the Vessel belongs.

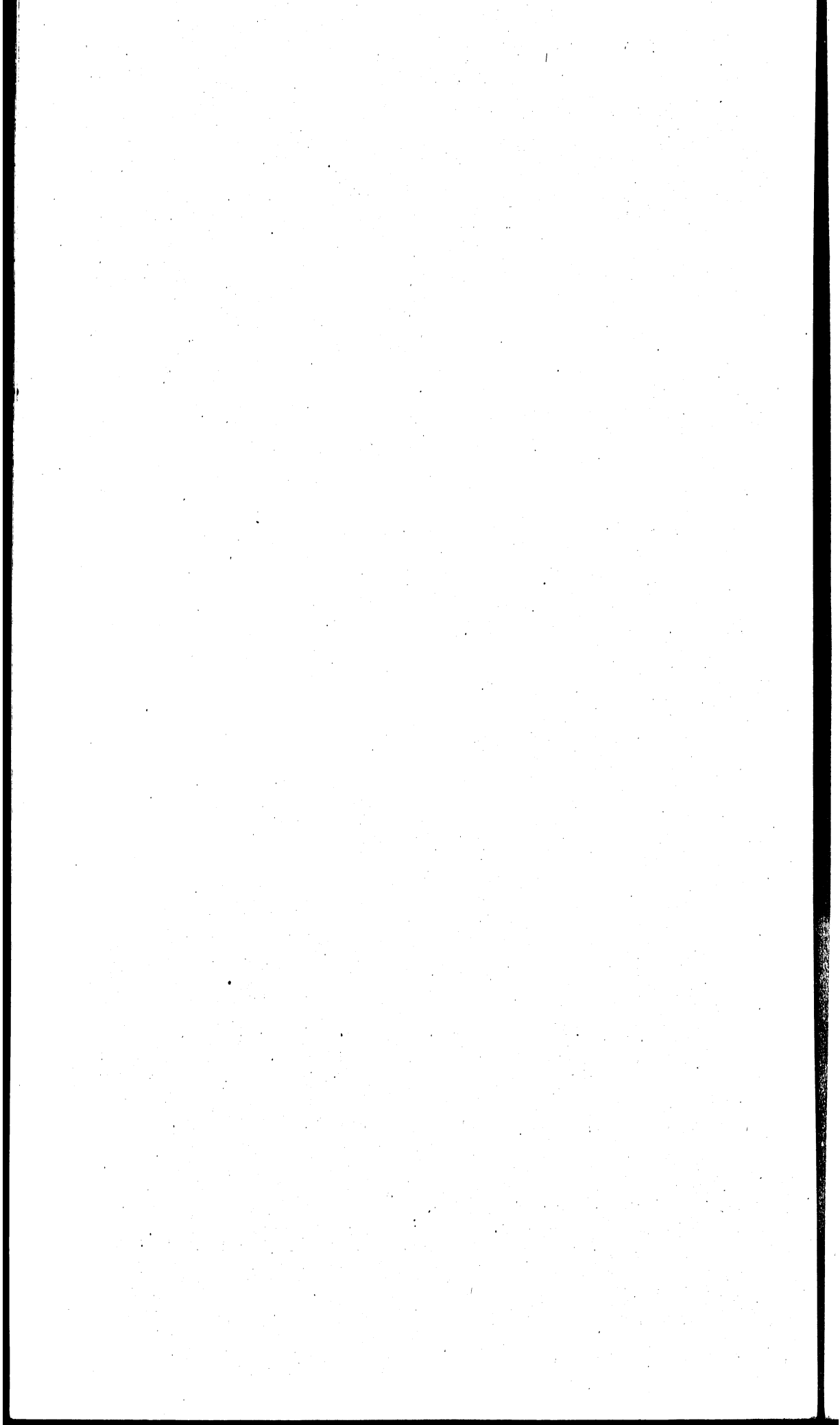

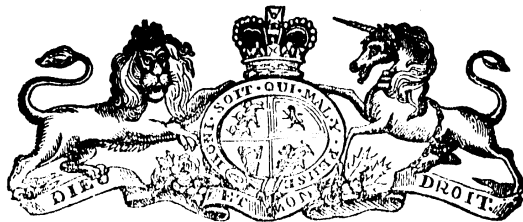

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has directed that the following Port Regulations for the Island of Tahiti, be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,
E. DEAS THOMSON.

PORT REGULATIONS.

To Masters or Commanders of Vessels entering the Ports of Tahiti and Moorea.

1. A Pilot will go off to every Vessel duly displaying her Ensign or National Colours, and making the usual signal for a Pilot as soon as she approaches within a reasonable distance of the Ports to conduct her in; and on her departure, one day's notice being usually given, the Pilot will also take her to sea.

2. Any Vessel calling at the Port, the Captain must pay twenty-five dollars; ten for the Pilot, and fifteen for the Queen, for the anchorage, before she can be allowed to receive any water or other refreshment from the shore. In case of afterwards anchoring in any other parts of Tahiti

or Moorea, every Vessel is to pay four dollars at each Port; and if the said Vessel come to anchor again in the first Port prior to leaving these Islands, she is to pay four dollars.

3. Should any Captain wish to ship Natives, two dollars must be paid for each man.

4. No Master or Commander of a Vessel is to discharge any Seaman, or any other person belonging to his Vessel, or to allow such person or persons in any way to leave the Vessel, without special permission from the Government, under a penalty of thirty dollars, twenty of which shall go to the Queen, six to the Governor of the Port where the Ship anchors, and four to the person who conducts the individual to his Ship, or makes known the circumstance to the proper authorities.

5. No Master or Commander of a Vessel is allowed to land any Passenger without special permission from the Queen and Governor.

6. Any person deserting from a Vessel shall be immediately apprehended, without waiting for orders to that effect from the Master or Commander of the Vessel from which he has deserted, for which the person apprehending him shall receive eight dollars, if apprehended within eight miles from the Vessel, and five dollars if apprehended at a greater distance. No Master or Commander is allowed to refuse taking back the deserter thus returned, under a penalty of thirty dollars. He can have him kept in prison till the Vessel be ready for sea, by paying one dollar per week for his board. Should the same person desert again from the Ship, the same sum will be demanded for taking him as in the first instance.

7. Any deserter found after his Vessel has sailed, shall be put in prison, and kept to hard labour for six months.

8. Any person who entices another to desert, or secretes him when he has deserted, or who in any way assists deserters, shall cut four whale boat loads of fire-wood and carry it to the place appointed.

9. No Ship's company, or any part of a Ship's company, to be on shore in the night. Any person belonging to a Vessel found on shore after 9 o'clock without a written pass, will be taken up and confined till morning, when he will be allowed to go on board his Vessel, by the Master or Commander of such Vessel paying two dollars, one for the Government, and one for the person who takes the Seaman into confinement.

10. Any person going about at night and taken by the watchman, must pay two dollars—that is, the person going about after the report of the second gun. Any person belonging to a Vessel, or being convicted selling, or in any way bartering with spirituous liquors of any kind, either on board or on shore, shall have no further trade or communication with the shore, but shall leave the Port immediately.

11. Any Native belonging to the shore, found working on board any Vessel or Boat on Sabbath days, to make fifty fathoms of public road.

12. In case of heaving a Vessel down, the Master or Commander shall pay to the Government sixty dollars, thirty for heaving down, fifteen for the hawse, and fifteen for the land on which he puts the casks.

13. Should the Master or Commander of any Vessel refuse to pay the Pilot his lawful fees, after the aforesaid service has been duly performed, or in

any way maltreat the said Pilot, or refuse to comply with any of the above Port Regulations, a full statement of the facts, with a copy of these Regulations, will be transmitted to the proper authorities in the country to which the Vessel belongs.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, with the advice of the Legislative Council.

An Act to amend, and to extend to Port Phillip, an Act, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the Savings' Bank of New South Wales."

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend, in manner hereafter mentioned, an Act Preamble. of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, passed in the Third Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled 3 Victoria, "An Act to consolidate and amend No. 12. "the Laws relating to the Savings' Bank of New South Wales;"

and whereas, by reason of the increase of population in the District of Port Phillip, in the Colony of New South Wales, and of the distance thereof from Sydney, in the said Colony, it is expedient to establish in the said District, a Savings' Bank, which shall, in its conduct and management, be distinct from, and independent of, the Savings' Bank of New South Wales, and to extend to the same, and such branches thereof as may from time to time be established in the Country Districts of Port Phillip, the provisions of the said recited Act, as amended by this Act:

Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Port Phillip. Legislative Council thereof, That an Institution, to be called "THE SAVINGS' BANK OF PORT PHILLIP," shall be established at Melbourne, in the said District, for the receipt, management,

and security of such sums as shall be therein deposited, with power to establish Branch Banks in the interior parts of the said District, as occasion may require, and such Bank and Branch Banks shall be regulated respectively in manner hereinafter provided.

(Appointment of President, Vice-President, and Trustees.)

II. And be it enacted, That His Honor, the Superintendent of Port Phillip for the time being, shall be the President of the said Institution; and that the management of the affairs of the same shall be vested in Twelve Trustees, to be appointed by the said Superintendent, of whom one shall be styled Vice-President; and that the said Superintendent shall and may from time to time remove from Office, all or any of the Trustees of the said Institution, and re-appoint the same or any of them, or shall and may appoint others, or another, in their or his place or stead; and in case of any vacancy occurring in the number of such Trustees, or of any appointment, removal, re-appointment, or fresh appointment as aforesaid of any such Trustees, the same shall be published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, by order of the said Superintendent.

(The Act of 3 Victoria, No. 12, to extend and apply to Port Phillip, as to the management and conduct of the Bank.)

III. And be it enacted, That the said recited Act, as amended by this Act, shall extend and apply to the said Savings' Bank, to be established at Port Phillip, under this Act or Ordinance, and to such branches thereof as may from time to time be established, and the several clauses and provisions thereof, shall be held to govern and regulate the said Savings' Bank of Port Phillip, in as full and ample a manner, to all intents and purposes, so far as the same are applicable and can be applied

thereto, as if the said Bank had been established under the said recited Act, and had been specially named therein ; and the President, Vice-President, and Trustees, as well as the Accountants and other Officers of the said Savings' Bank, shall and may exercise and perform respectively the same powers, authority, control, and duties in the management of the concerns of the said Bank, or of any branch thereof which may be established as aforesaid, as the President, Vice-President, Trustees, Accountants, and other Officers of the Savings' Bank of New South Wales, do or may exercise in the management of the affairs of the said Savings' Bank of New South Wales.

(Interpretation of words used in 3 Victoria, No. 12)

IV. And be it enacted, That wherever in the said recited Act, or in this Act, the word "Governor" occurs, the same shall in respect to the said Bank to be established at Melbourne as aforesaid, be held to mean "the Superintendent of the District of Port Phillip," or "the Chief Officer of Government" resident in the said District ; and that wherever in the said recited Act, the words "Supreme Court of New South Wales" or "the Chief Clerk of the Supreme Court of New South Wales" occur, the same shall be held to mean respectively "the Supreme Court established at Port Phillip, under the jurisdiction of the resident Judge," or "the Chief Officer of that Court ;" and that wherever the words "Colonial Bank" or "Banks in Sydney" occur, the same shall, in respect to the said Savings' Bank, to be established at Melbourne, be held to mean "Colonial Bank or Banks in Melbourne."

(Provision for a Security or Rest Fund.)

V. And whereas, it is deemed expedient to amend the said recited Act, by establishing a Rest or Security Fund, to meet any deficiency or loss which may unexpectedly occur : Be it therefore enacted, That out of the profits of the business of the Savings' Bank of New South Wales, and of the Savings' Banks to be established at Port Phillip, the Trustees of the said Banks respectively, shall and may annually set apart such sums, not being less than one-twentieth nor more than one-tenth part of the whole amount of interest divisible for the year among the depositors, as such Trustees may think proper, towards the establishment of a Rest or Security Fund for such Banks respectively, for the purpose of meeting any loss or deficiency which may unexpectedly occur, until such Rest or Security Fund shall amount to one-twentieth part of the whole sum which shall at that time be in deposit in the said Banks respectively ; and thereafter the Trustees of the said Banks respectively shall, at the end of each and every year, add to or take from the said Rest or Security Fund, such a sum as shall cause the amount thereof, at the commencement of each succeeding year, to be, as nearly as conveniently practicable, one-twentieth part of the whole amount then in deposit.

(Executors, &c., of Officers of Savings' Banks to pay money due to Savings' Banks, before any other Debts.)

VI. And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said recited Act, by providing for the more easy recovery of monies and securities in the hands of Officers of the said Banks, or their Executors, in the event of insolvency, or death of such Officers : Be it therefore enacted, That

if any person, now or hereafter holding any Office in either of the said Savings' Banks, or any Branch thereof, and having in his hands or possession any monies or effects belonging to such Savings' Bank, or any Deeds or Securities relating to the same, shall become Bankrupt or Insolvent, or shall make any assignment of his lands, goods, chattels, or effects for the benefit of his Creditors, or against whose lands, goods, chattels, or effects any execution, attachment, or other process shall have issued, or if any such Officer shall die, then and in any such case, it shall and may be lawful for any two or more of the Trustees of the said Savings' Banks respectively, to apply to such Officer or to his Assignees, or to the Sheriff or other person executing such process, or to his executors or administrators, or to any other person or persons having legal right, as the case may require, and to demand that such monies or effects belonging to such Savings' Bank, and all Deeds, Securities, or papers relating to the same, shall be paid over or delivered up to the said Trustees, or to such person as they shall appoint ; and the party or parties so applied to, and having the same, shall, within forty days after such demand as aforesaid, deliver over to such Trustees, or to any person or persons whom they may appoint to receive the same, all effects or other things belonging to such Savings' Bank, and all Deeds, Securities, or papers relating to the same, and shall pay out of the Estate, Assets, or Effects of such person so being, or having been an Officer of the said Bank, all sums of money belonging, or due by such Officer to the said Bank, before any other of the Debts of the said Officer are paid or satisfied, or before the money directed to be levied by such process as aforesaid, is paid over to the party issuing such process, as the case may be ; and all assets, lands, goods, chattels, estates and effects, shall be bound to the payment and discharge thereof accordingly.

"An Act to facilitate Proceedings by and against the Proprietors of a certain Joint Stock Company, lately carrying on business in Sydney, in the Colony of New South Wales, under the name, style, or firm, of the 'AUSTRALIAN AUCTION COMPANY;' and for other purposes therein mentioned."

WHEREAS a certain Joint Stock Company, which lately carried on business as Auctioneers in Sydney, in the Colony of New South Wales, under the name, style, or firm, of the "AUSTRALIAN AUCTION COMPANY," have met with great difficulty in the Prosecution of Actions, brought for

the recovery of debts justly due to the said Company; and whereas it would facilitate the settlement of the affairs of the said Company, and be of public utility and advantage, that all claims for and against the said Company, existing before the passing of this Act, should be sued for by, and prosecuted against the said Company, in the name of some one Member thereof, whose name and description should be recorded for the information of the Public; but as these purposes cannot be

obtained without the aid and authority of the Legislature, Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, That from and after the passing of this Act, all Actions, Suits, or Proceedings, whether at Law or in Equity, in Bankruptcy, or Sequestration, or otherwise howsoever, to be commenced, instituted, or prosecuted by or on behalf of the said Company, or any person or persons as Trustee or Trustees of the said Company, against any Body or Bodies, Politic or Corporate, or against any person or persons, whether a Member or Members of the said Company or otherwise, in respect of any debt, claim, right, cause of action, interest or liability whatsoever now subsisting, or to arise hereafter out of, or in respect of, or relating to any such debt, claim, right, cause of action, interest or liability, mediately or immediately, shall and may be commenced, instituted, or prosecuted in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, as the nominal Plaintiff, Complainant or Petitioner for and on behalf of the said Company; and that all Actions, Suits, or Proceedings at Law or in Equity, or otherwise as aforesaid, to be commenced, instituted, or prosecuted against the said Company, by or on behalf of any Body or Bodies, Politic or Corporate, or by or on behalf of any person or persons, whether a Member or Members of the said Company or otherwise, shall and may be commenced, instituted, or prosecuted against the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, as the nominal defendant for and on behalf of the said Company, then and in that case against any Member or Members of the said Company:

Plaintiffs may join any one or more Members of the Company with the Chairman as Defendants in Equity.

A Member's share in Capital of Co-partnership not to be set off against any demand which such Co-partnership may have against him.

Equity against any demand which such Company may have against such Member on account of any

other matter or thing whatsoever, but all proceedings in respect of such matter or thing may be carried on as if no claim or demand existed in respect of such Capital or Joint Stock, or of any dividends, interest, profits, or bonus, payable or apportionable in respect thereof.

(Prosecutions and other Criminal proceedings to be in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors.)

And be it enacted, That all Criminal Informations and Prosecutions to be brought, instituted, or carried on by or on behalf of the said Company, for fraud upon or against the said Company, or for embezzlement or robbery, or for counterfeiting or stealing the bills, notes, bonds, monies, securities, goods, chattels, effects, or other property of or belonging to the said Company, or for any felony, misdemeanor, or other offence committed against or with intent to injure or defraud the said Company, shall and lawfully may be brought, instituted, or carried on in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company; and in all Indictments, Informations, and other proceedings as aforesaid, it shall and may be lawful and sufficient to describe the Property of the said Company as the Property of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company; and that any offence committed with intent to injure or defraud the said Company, shall and lawfully may, in any prosecution for or on account of the same, be stated to have been committed with intent to injure or defraud the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company; and any Offender or Offenders may thereupon be lawfully convicted of any such Offence; and in any other allegations or indictments, informations, or other proceedings, for or on behalf of the said Company, it shall and may be lawful and sufficient, from and after the passing of this Act, from time to time, to state the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, as the nominal plaintiff, complainant, or petitioner; and the death, resignation, or removal, or other act of such Chairman, or change in the Members of the said Company by transfer of shares, or otherwise, shall not abate any such action, suit, or prosecution, or other proceeding, but the same may be continued, prosecuted, and carried on in the name of any person who may be or become Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company.

(Memorial of the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors to be recorded in the Supreme Court of New South Wales.)

III. And be it enacted, That a Memorial of the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, in the form or to the effect of the form set forth in the Schedule to this Act annexed, signed by the said Chairman and by a majority of the said Court of Directors, shall be recorded upon oath in the Supreme Court of New South Wales, within thirty days after the passing of this Act; and when and so often as any Chairman of the Court of Directors of the said Company shall be newly elected, or a Chairman shall be substituted for the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, a Memorial of the name of such

newly elected or substituted Chairman of the said Court of Directors, in the same form, or to the same effect as the hereinbefore-mentioned Memorial, signed by such newly elected or substituted Chairman, and by a majority of the said Court of Directors, shall in like manner be recorded upon oath in the said Supreme Court, within thirty days after such election or substitution.

(No Action to be brought in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors until Memorial recorded.)

IV. Provided always and be it enacted, That until such Memorial, as hereinbefore first mentioned, be recorded in manner hereinbefore directed, no action, suit, or other proceeding shall be brought by the said Company, in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors thereof, as aforesaid, under the authority of this Act.

(Evidence of Chairman, Members, and Officers, to be admissible.)

V. And be it enacted, That in all actions, suits, petitions, or other proceedings, whether civil or criminal, in which the said Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, or any Member of the said Company, shall be on behalf of such Company, and under and by virtue of this Act, Plaintiff, Complainant, Petitioner, or Defendant, it shall and may be lawful for such Chairman, or Member, or for any Officer engaged in the executive duties of the said Company, to give evidence in such action, suit, petition, or other proceeding, notwithstanding the name of such Chairman or Member shall be used as Plaintiff, Complainant, Petitioner, or Defendant, and notwithstanding that such Chairman, Member, or Officer as aforesaid, shall or may be interested in the result of such action, suit, petition, or other proceeding, as a Shareholder or Co-partner, in the said Company.

(Company may make Contracts and Conveyances in the name of the Chairman.)

VI. And be it enacted, That all contracts, agreements, conveyances, leases, releases, assignments, surrenders, covenants, receipts, and other documents made or to be made, given, or granted, by, or to, or on behalf of the said Company, relating to any such now subsisting debt, claim, right, cause of action, interest, or liability as aforesaid, shall and may be made and executed, and enforced by, or to, or against the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company; and the same shall be binding upon the said Company, and the Capital Stock thereof, and pass all the Estate and Interest of the said Company.

(Execution may issue against any Member of the Company.)

VII. And be it enacted, That execution upon any decree or judgment in any action, suit, petition, or other proceeding, obtained against the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being, or other Member of the said Company as aforesaid, whether as Plaintiff or Defendant, may be issued against, and levied and satisfied upon and out of the goods, chattels, lands, and tenements, of any Member or Members whomsoever of the said Company for the time being, as if such decree or judgment had been obtained against such Member or Members personally.

(List of Members to be recorded on oath in the Office of Registrar of Supreme Court.)

VIII. And be it enacted, That for the purpose of giving better effect to the provision last hereinbefore contained, the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company shall, within thirty days from the passing of this Act, and thereafter in the month of January in each year, so long as this Act shall remain in force, cause a true List of the names of all the then existing Members of the said Company, with their respective places of abode and descriptions, to be recorded on oath in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court; and the same shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times, by any person requiring the same, on payment of a fee of one shilling; and if such Chairman shall fail to cause such List to be recorded in manner aforesaid, he shall be liable to a penalty of One Hundred Pounds, to be recovered by action of debt in the said Supreme Court, by any person or persons who shall sue for the same.

(Every person included in such List to be considered a Member until new List recorded, or until he shall have given notice in the Government Gazette of his retirement.)

IX. And be it enacted, That every person whose name shall be so recorded, shall be considered a Member of the said Company, and be liable as such, until a new List of the Members' names shall be recorded as aforesaid, or until he shall have given notice, in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, of his retirement from the said Company: Provided always, that every Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, in whose name any action, suit, petition, or other proceeding shall be commenced, prosecuted, carried on, or defended, and every Member or Members of the said Company against whose goods, chattels, lands, or tenements, execution shall be so issued as aforesaid, shall always be reimbursed and paid out of the funds of the said Company, all such damages, costs, and expenses, as by the event of any such proceedings, such Chairman, or Member, or Members, shall or may be put unto in respect thereof; and all such remedies shall be allowed as between the several Members of the said Company for the time being, as if this Act had not been passed; Provided, nevertheless, that the body of such Chairman shall not, by reason of his being Defendant in any such action, suit, or proceeding, be liable to be arrested, seized, or taken in execution.

(Bankruptcy of individual Members not to affect the Company.)

X. And be it enacted, That the bankruptcy, insolvency, or stopping payment of any Officer, Director, Chairman, or other Member of the said Company, in his individual capacity, shall not be construed to be the bankruptcy, insolvency, or stopping payment of the said Company; and that the property and effects of the said Company, and the persons, property, and effects of the individual Members thereof, shall, notwithstanding such bankruptcy, insolvency, or stopping payment, be liable to execution in the same manner as if such bankruptcy, insolvency, or stopping payment had not taken place.

(Act to continue in force notwithstanding change of Members.)

XI. And be it enacted, That the provisions of

this Act shall extend to the said Company at all times during the continuance of the same, notwithstanding any change in the Members thereof, by transfer of shares or otherwise howsoever.

(Company not incorporated by this Act.)

XII. Provided always and be it enacted, That nothing herein contained shall extend, or be deemed, taken, or construed to incorporate the Members of the said Company, or to relieve or discharge them, or any of them, from any responsibility, duties, contracts, or obligations whatsoever, which by law they now are, or at any time hereafter shall be subject or liable to, either between the said Company and others, or between the individual Members of the said Company, or any of them and others, or among themselves, or in any other manner whatsoever, except so far as the same is affected by the provisions of this Act, and the true intent and meaning of the same.

(Securities and Contracts to be put in suit by the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being.)

XIII. And be it enacted, That all bonds, mortgages, warrants of attorney, and other securities, not being assignable in law, and all contracts and agreements, whether parol or under seal, which have been, or shall or may at any time hereafter be taken in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, for or on account of the said Company, in any way relating to or arising out of such now subsisting debt, claim, right, cause of action, interest or liability as aforesaid, shall and may be put in suit, and enforced, sued, and prosecuted upon, at Law or in Equity, in the name of the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company in whose name the same may have been taken or entered into, or in the name of any person who shall or may succeed to that office and be the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, at the time such proceeding or proceedings shall be instituted, carried on, or continued, notwithstanding the name of any such succeeding Chairman be not inserted in any such bond, mortgage, warrant of attorney, or other such security, or in any such contract or agreement, as an obligee, mortgagee, assignee, or payee of the sum or sums of money therein respectively mentioned or secured; and the death, resignation, removal, or other act of any Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company in whose name any such bond, mortgage, warrant of attorney, or other such security as aforesaid, or any such contract or agreement, shall be so put in suit, shall not abate any action, suit, or other proceeding had thereon, but the same may be continued and carried on where it left off, in the name of any person who may be or become the Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company; and the legal estate in all lands, tenements, and all property real and personal belonging or mortgaged to the said Company, for all legal rights and capacities in respect of the said Company, shall and may become vested in the succeeding Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being, immediately upon the recording of the Memorial hereinbefore required of the name of such succeeding Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company

in the said Supreme Court; and so on *toties quoties* whensoever any new appointment, election, or substitution of a Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company shall take place, and such Memorial thereof shall be recorded as aforesaid.

(Plaintiff not to be non-suited for want of proof of record of the Memorial.)

XIV. And be it enacted, That in any action to be brought by any Chairman of the Court of Directors for the time being of the said Company, by virtue of this Act, the Plaintiff therein shall not be non-suited, nor shall a verdict be given against the Plaintiff, for want of proof of the record of such Memorial or Memorials as hereinbefore mentioned, nor shall the existence of such Memorial be taken to be in issue, unless specially desired by any Defendant; but in case the Defendant in any such action shall specially deny on the record that any such Memorial has been duly recorded as aforesaid, and shall make it appear on such trial that no such Memorial has been so recorded, then a non-suit shall be entered in such action.

(Saving the rights of Her Majesty and others.)

XV. Provided always and be it enacted, That nothing in this Act contained, shall be deemed to affect or apply to any Right, Title, or Interest of Her Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, or of any Body Politic or Corporate, or of any person or persons excepting such as are mentioned therein, or of those claiming by or under him, her, or them.

(Commencement and duration of Act.)

XVI. And be it enacted, That this Act shall commence and take effect from and after the passing thereof, and shall continue in force for two years thereafter, and not longer, save and except as to any action, suit, prosecution, or other proceeding at Law or in Equity actually commenced or instituted, which, notwithstanding this Act shall have expired, may be carried on in all respects whatsoever as if the same had continued in force.

(Act to be deemed a Public Act.)

XVII. And be it enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by the Judges of the Supreme Court of New South Wales, and of the several Circuit Courts throughout the Colony, and by all other Judges, Justices, and others, within the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, without being specially pleaded.

"An Act for facilitating Proceedings by and against 'THE HUNTER'S RIVER STEAM NAVIGATION COMPANY,' and for other purposes therein mentioned."

WHEREAS several persons have formed themselves into a Joint Stock Company or Society, established at Sydney, in the Colony of New South Wales, under the name, style, or firm of the "HUNTER'S RIVER STEAM NAVIGATION COMPANY," for the purpose of trading with steam vessels between Sydney and Hunter's River, and the rivers adjacent thereto, in the said Colony; and whereas, for such purposes, the said Company have subscribed amongst themselves by way of capital, or joint stock, the sum of forty thousand pounds, in four thousand shares, of ten pounds each, the whole of which capital stock, or sum of forty thousand pounds, has been paid up; and whereas, difficulties may arise in recovering debts due to the said Company, and in maintaining actions or proceedings for damages done to their property, and also in prosecuting persons who may steal or embezzle the bills, notes, bonds, monies, goods, chattels, or effects of the said Company; and whereas it would be convenient and just that persons having demands against the said Company, should be entitled to sue some Member thereof in place and stead of the whole, but as these purposes cannot be effected without the authority of the Legislature: Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, That from and after the passing of this Act, all actions and suits, and all proceedings at Law or in Equity, to be commenced, instituted, prosecuted, or carried on, by or on behalf of the said Company, or wherein the said Company is or shall be in any way concerned against any body or bodies, politic or corporate, or against any person or persons, whether a Member or Members of the said Company or otherwise, shall and may be lawfully commenced, instituted, and prosecuted or carried on, in the name of the person who shall be the Secretary of the said Company at the time any such action, suit, or proceeding shall be com-

menced or instituted, as the nominal plaintiff, complainant or petitioner, for or on behalf of the said Company; and that all actions, suits, or proceedings as aforesaid, to be commenced, instituted, or prosecuted against the said Company, shall be commenced, instituted, and prosecuted against the Secretary for the time being of the said Company, as the nominal defendant for and on behalf of the said Company; and that in all criminal prosecutions to be instituted or carried on by or on behalf of the said Company, for fraud upon or against the said Company, or for embezzlement, robbery, or stealing the bills, notes, bonds, monies, goods, chattels, effects, or any other property of the said Company, or for any felony, misdemeanor, or other offence in which the said Company shall sustain any loss or damage, it shall be lawful to state such bills, notes, bonds, monies, goods, chattels, effects, or any other property of the said Company, to be the property of such Secretary for the time being of the said Company, notwithstanding it shall be proved at the trial that the same belongs to the said Company; and any offence committed with the intent to injure or defraud the said Company, shall and lawfully may in any prosecution for the same, be stated or laid to have been committed with intent to injure or defraud such Secretary for the time being of the said Company, and any offender or offenders may thereupon be lawfully convicted of any such offence;

and the death, resignation, or removal, or other act of such Secretary, shall not abate any such action, suit, or prosecution, but the same may be continued where it left off, and be prosecuted and carried on in the name of, or against any person who may be or become, the Secretary of the said Company for the time being; and that where it shall be necessary for any person to serve any summons, notice, writ, or other proceeding at Law or in Equity, upon the said Company, service thereof respectively shall be made upon such Secretary for the time being, or at his usual place of abode.

(Funds of the Company not to be employed in discounting.)

II. Provided always, and be it enacted, That the said Company shall not, either by the Directors, or by any Member or Members thereof, or by their Agent, or by any other person on their behalf, employ any funds whatever of the said Company in discounting Bills of Exchange, or Promissory Notes payable in the Colony, under penalty or forfeiture of treble the sum or sums so discounted, lent, or advanced by or on behalf of the said Company, to be recovered in the Supreme Court, or any Circuit Court of the said Colony, by Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint, or Information, one moiety or half of such penalty or forfeiture, when recovered, shall, after deducting the charges of prosecution, be paid to the Colonial Treasurer of the said Colony, for the use of Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, for the public uses of the said Colony, and in support of the Government thereof, and the other moiety shall be paid to the Informer suing for the said penalty.

(Memorial of the name of the Secretary to be recorded in the Supreme Court of New South Wales, and renewed when any new Secretary shall be elected.)

III. And be it enacted, That a Memorial of

the name of the Secretary of the said Company, in the form or to the effect for that purpose set forth in the Schedule to this Act annexed, signed by the said Secretary and by a majority of the Directors of the said Company, shall be recorded upon the oath of the Secretary of the said Company for the time being, in the Supreme Court of New South Wales, within thirty days from and after the passing of this Act; and when and as often as any person shall be duly elected Secretary of the said Company, a Memorial of the name of such newly elected Secretary, in the same form or to the same effect as the hereinbefore-mentioned Memorial, signed by such newly elected Secretary, and by a majority of the several persons who shall be Directors of the said Company at the time of the election of such newly elected Secretary, shall in like manner be recorded upon the oath of the Secretary of the said Company for the time being, in the said Supreme Court, within thirty days next after such Secretary shall be elected.

(No Action to be brought until Memorial recorded.)

IV. Provided always, and be it enacted, That until such Memorial of the name of the Secretary for the time being of the said Company, be recorded in manner hereinbefore directed, no action, suit, or other proceeding, shall be brought or continued by or on behalf of the said Company, under the authority of this Act.

(Secretary and other Officers and Proprietors of the Company, competent witnesses.)

V. And be it enacted, That in all actions, suits, petitions, or other proceedings, at Law or Equity, in which the said Secretary for the time being shall be, on behalf of the said Company, and under and by virtue of this Act, plaintiff, complainant, petitioner, or defendant, it shall and may be lawful for the said Secretary for the time being, or for a Director, Auditor, Treasurer, Clerk, or any other Officer engaged in the executive duties of the said Company, or for any Proprietor of the said Company, to give evidence in such action, suit, petition, or other proceeding, notwithstanding the name of such Secretary for the time being, shall be used as plaintiff, complainant, petitioner, or defendant, and notwithstanding that such persons giving evidence as aforesaid, shall or may be interested in the result of such action, as a Member of the said Company.

(Execution upon any judgment may be issued against any Member of the Company, who shall have his remedy against the other Members, &c.)

VI. And be it enacted, That execution upon any decree, order, or judgment, in any such action, suit, petition, or other proceeding, obtained against the Secretary for the time being of the said Company, whether he be plaintiff or defendant therein, may be issued against, and levied upon, the goods and chattels, lands and tenements, of any Member or Members whomsoever of the said Company for the time being, in like manner, and not otherwise than, as if such decree or judgment had been obtained against such Member or Members personally: Provided always, that the body or goods, lands or tenements of such Secretary, shall not, by reason of his being defendant in any such action, suit, or proceeding, be liable to be arrested, seized, or taken in execution: And provided further, that every such Secretary in whose name any such action, suit, petition, or other proceeding shall be commenced, prosecuted, carried on, or defended, and every such Member or Members against whose

goods, chattels, lands, or tenements, execution upon any judgment or decree shall be issued or levied as aforesaid, shall always be reimbursed and paid out of the Funds of the said Company, all such damages, dues, expenses, costs, and charges, as by the event of any such proceedings such Secretary, or Member or Members, shall or may be put unto, or become chargeable with; and all such remedies shall be allowed, as between the several Members of the said Company for the time being, as if this Act had not been passed.

(Names of the then existing Members of the Company, and their places of abode, to be recorded on oath in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court, within thirty days from the passing of this Act, and thereafter in the month of January in every year.)

VII. And be it enacted, That the Secretary or other principal Officer for the time being of the said Company, shall, within thirty days from the passing of this Act, and thereafter in the month of January in each and every year, cause a true list of the names of all the then existing Members of such Company, with their respective places of abode and designation, to be recorded upon oath in the Office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court, and that the same shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times, by any person requiring the same, on payment of a fee of one shilling; and if any such Secretary or principal Officer of the said Company, shall fail to cause such list to be recorded in manner aforesaid, he shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred pounds, to be recovered by action of debt in the said Supreme Court, by any person or persons suing for the same: Provided always, that nothing herein contained, shall make liable such Secretary or other principal Officer, to the payment of such penalty for any omission on account of any Member changing his name or place of abode, or any female Member marrying, or any Member becoming bankrupt or insolvent, or departing this life, if such Secretary or principal Officer shall not have received notice of the same respectively.

(Persons whose names are so recorded, to be considered Members of the Company, until new list made out, or notice given in the Government Gazette.)

VIII. And be it enacted, That every person whose name shall be so recorded, shall be considered a Member of the said Company, and be liable to be sued as such, until a new list of the Members' names shall be recorded as aforesaid, or until he or she shall have given notice in the *New South Wales Government Gazette* of his or her retirement from the said Company.

(Act to be at all times valid, notwithstanding change of Members of the Company.)

IX. And be it enacted, That the provisions in this Act contained, shall extend and be construed, deemed, and taken to extend to the said Company at all times during the continuance of the same, whether the said Company be now or hereafter composed of some or all or any of the persons who were the original or are the present Members thereof, or of all or some of those persons, together with some other person or persons, or shall be composed altogether of persons who were not original nor are now Members of the same.

(Company not incorporated by this Act.)

X. Provided always, and be it enacted, That nothing herein contained shall extend, or be

deemed, taken, or construed to incorporate the Members or Proprietors of the said Company, or to relieve or discharge them or any of them from any responsibility, duties, contracts, or obligations whatsoever, which by law they now are, or at any time hereafter shall be subject or liable to, either between the said Company and others, or between the individual Members of the said Company, or any of them and others, or among themselves or in any other manner whatsoever, except so far as the same is affected by the provisions of this Act, and the true intent and meaning of the same.

(Bonds and other securities may be put in suit, &c., in the name of the Secretary for the time being, though not named in such security.)

XI. And be it enacted, That all bonds, covenants, warrants of attorney, and other securities not being assignable in law, which have been, or which shall or may at any time hereafter be, taken in the name of any person as Secretary, or in the name of any Director or Directors of the said Company, for or on account of the said Company, shall and may be put in suit, and be held, sued, or prosecuted upon at Law or in Equity, in the name of the Secretary for the time being of the said Company, notwithstanding the name of any such Secretary be not inserted in such bond, covenant, warrant of attorney, or other security, as an obligee, covenantee, mortgagee, assignee, or payee of the sum or sums of money therein respectively secured; and the death, resignation, removal, or other act of any such Secretary of the said Company for the time being, shall not abate any action, suit, or other proceeding, but the same may be continued where it left off, and be prosecuted and carried on in the name of any person who may succeed to that office, or be or become the Secretary of the said Company; and all legal rights and capacities in respect of the said Company, shall become vested in such new Secretary as aforesaid, to all intents and purposes, immediately upon the recording of the Memorial of the name of the new Secretary in the said Supreme Court, and so on *toties quoties* whenever any new appointment or election of a Secretary for the time being of the said Company shall take place, and such new Memorial thereof shall be recorded as aforesaid.

(Plaintiff not to be non-suit for want of proof of the Memorial.)

XII. And be it enacted, That in any action to be brought by any Secretary of the said Company by virtue of this Act, the plaintiff therein shall not be non-suit, nor shall a verdict be given against the plaintiff, for want of proof of the record of such Memorial or Memorials as hereinbefore mentioned; but in case the defendant in any such action shall make it appear on such trial, that no such Memorial or Memorials has or have been recorded, then a non-suit shall be entered in such action.

(If any part of capital be withdrawn, or any shares cancelled or created after passing of Act, all privileges and advantages thereby conferred to cease and determine.)

XIII. Provided always and be it enacted, That if any part of the capital stock of the said Company be withdrawn, or any of the said shares in that capital be cancelled, or if any further number of shares be created after the passing of this Act, then and in such case all the rights, privileges, and advantages conferred by this Act on the said

Company, shall cease and determine: Provided nevertheless, that, subject to the several restrictions hereinbefore contained, it shall be lawful for the said Company at any time to increase their joint stock or capital to any sum not exceeding Sixty thousand pounds, by an addition to each of the said existing shares of any sum or sums not exceeding Five pounds, payable in one or more instalments.

(Rights of the Crown not affected.)

XIV. Provided always and be it enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to affect or apply to any Right, Title, or Interest of Her Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, or of any Body or Bodies Politic or Corporate, or of any person or persons except such as are mentioned herein, or of those claiming by or under him, her, or them.

(This Act not to take effect till the same shall have received the Royal Assent.)

XV. And be it enacted, That this Act shall not commence or take effect until the same shall have received the Royal Approbation, and the notification of such Approbation shall have been made in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, by order of His Excellency the Governor for the time being of the said Colony.

(This Act to be deemed a Public Act.)

XVI. And be it enacted, That this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and shall be judicially taken notice of as such by the Judges of the Supreme Court of New South Wales, and by all other Judges, Justices, and others, within the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, without being specially pleaded.

POLICE DISTRICTS.

IN reference to the Government Notice of 12th August, 1840, relative to the boundaries of the Police Districts of the Colony, and to the Notices of 17th November, 1840, 2nd March, 9th April, and 6th August, 1841, making certain alterations in the same; His Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct, that the whole be now re-published for more convenient reference.

His Excellency, however, desires it to be notified, that the present division has been made merely to simplify and facilitate the Police operations of the Colony, and is not intended to supersede, or in any way interfere with the division of the Colony into Counties, as already published by the Proclamations of the 22nd May, and 27th November, 1835, or with the boundaries of any Counties which may hereafter be proclaimed.

I. SYDNEY.

Embracing a north-eastern portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundreds of Sydney and Packerham, except the parish of Concord; bounded on the north and north-west by Broken Bay and Cowan Creek; on the west by lines bearing south-westerly and south dividing Hynde's grant to Lane Cove River, thence by Lane Cove and its Bays to the western point of Bali's Head Bay, crossing the Parramatta River to Longnose Point, thence by the Long Cove to the junction of the Parramatta and Liverpool Turnpike Roads, and by the Liverpool Road to the Village Reserve at Irish Town, and from thence by a line bearing south to and by the Salt Ponds; on the south by George's River, and the south shore of Botany Bay to Cape Solander, the sea shore which forms the eastern boundary to the South Head, crossing the entrance of Port Jackson to the North Head, and continued to Barrenjerrey Head, at the entrance of Broken Bay.

2. PARRAMATTA.

Embracing a northern and midland portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundreds of Parramatta and Dundas, and the parish of Concord; bounded on the north by the Hawkesbury River; on the north-west by a line bearing south-westerly to the North Road leading to Wiseman's Ferry; on the west by this Road, to the northern boundary of George Sutor's grant of fifty acres, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the junction of the Pitt Town and Windsor Roads, thence by the Windsor Road, and a line bearing west to the confluence of Breakfast and Eastern Creeks, and by Eastern Creek to the Cowpasture Road; on the south by the Prospect old Road and Prospect Creek to Lansdowne Bridge, thence by the Liverpool Road to its junction with the Parramatta Road; on the east by a line from thence bearing north-easterly to Long Cove, and by its eastern shore to Longnose Point, crossing the Parramatta River to the western point of Ball's Head Bay, thence by Lane Cove and its Bays, and Lane Cove River, and by a line bearing north and north-easterly dividing Hynde's grant to Cowan Creek, and by this Creek to the Hawkesbury River aforesaid.

3. LIVERPOOL.

Embracing a midland portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundred of Liverpool and parishes of Cabramatta and Wattamolla; bounded on the north from Cape Solander by Botany Bay, George's River, the Salt Ponds, the Liverpool Road, and Prospect Creek to the Cowpasture Road; on the west by the Cowpasture Road to the junction of the Northern Road, by the Northern Road to South Creek, and by South Creek to the Bringelly Road, and by this Road to the junction of the Cowpasture old Road, and by the Cowpasture old Road to the junction with the cross Road leading to the Campbelltown Road; on the south by this cross Road to the Campbelltown Road, thence by a line bearing easterly, crossing Bunberry Curran and Bow Bowling Creeks, George's River, Deadman's Creek to the northern boundary of John Lucas' grant, on Woronora Creek, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Wattamolla on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary of the district to Cape Solander aforesaid.

4. CAMPBELLTOWN.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of Cumberland, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Camden, and the parishes of Cook, in the Hundred of Bringelly and Heathcote, and Bulga, in the Hundred of Wattamolla; bounded on the north from Wattamolla by a line bearing north-westerly to the northern boundary of John Lucas' grant, on Woronora Creek, thence by a line bearing westerly crossing Deadman's Creek, George's River, Bow Bowling, and Bunberry Curran Creeks, to the southern crosscut road, on the Campbelltown Road, and by this crosscut road to the range dividing the Campbelltown and old Cowpasture Roads; on the west by the summit of this range, bearing south-westerly to the southern boundary of Howe's Eskdale Estate, on the Nepean, and by this River to a distance of five miles south of the confluence of the Cordeaux River; on the south by a line from hence bearing east to the dividing range at the head of the

Cordeaux River; and on the east by the crest of the range and a line east to the sea shore, near Bulli, which is the eastern boundary to Wattamolla aforesaid.

5. PICTON.

Embracing a midland portion of the County of Camden, and an eastern portion of the County of Westmoreland; bounded on the north by the Warragamba and Cox's Rivers from the confluence of Weriberi Creek, to the confluence of the Kowming River; on the west by the Kowming River to its sources near the Colong Mountain; on the south by a line bearing south-easterly from Colong to Jellore, from thence by a line bearing north-easterly to Lupton's Inn, and from that Inn by a line bearing east to the Nepean River; on the east by the Nepean River to the mouth of the gully which separates D'Arietas' grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and by this gully to the north-east corner of Douglass' grant; thence by the northern boundary of this grant and a line bearing westerly, crossing Wand J. Macarthur's grants, and the Clergy and School Estate, to the south-east corner of Antill's grant of 900 acres; and by the southern boundaries of this grant and R. Crawford's grant, thence by a line bearing north-westerly along the ridges of the Boolbinmatta Range of Mount Prudhoe and Razorback, to the south-east corner of Wylde's grant of 600 acres, thence by the eastern and northern boundaries of this grant and the dividing line of the Clergy and School Estate, and Wylde's grant of 2000 acres, to Weriberi Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Warragamba River aforesaid.

6. CAMDEN AND NARRELLAN.

Embracing a north-eastern portion of the County of Camden, and a south-western portion of the County of Cumberland; bounded on the north by the Nepean River, commencing at the northernmost angle of J. Blaxland's grant of 800 acres to the confluence of the Warragamba; on the north-west by this river to the confluence of Weriberi Creek; on the west by this creek to the line dividing the Clergy and School Estate from Wylde's grant of 2000 acres; on the south by this line bearing east, and by the northern boundary line of Wylde's 600 acres grant, thence by the eastern boundary line of the said grant, thence by a line bearing south-easterly along the summit or ridges of Razorback and Mount Prudhoe, continuing to, and along the ridge of the Boolbinmatta Range to the southern boundary line of Crawford's grant of 1000 acres, and by this line and the southern boundary line of Antill's grant of 900 acres, and a line bearing easterly, crossing the Clergy and School Estate, and W. and J. Macarthur's grants, to the north-west angle of A. Douglass' grant of 800 acres; and by the northern boundary line of this said grant to the gully which separates D'Arietas' grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and by this gully to the Nepean; on the east by the Nepean River to the southern boundary of Howe's Eskdale Estate; thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the summit of the range dividing the Cowpasture and Campbelltown Roads, to the crosscut road between the Campbelltown Road and the old Cowpasture Road; and by the old Cowpasture Road, to its junction with the Bringelly Road; and by the

Bringelly Road and Bringelly Creek to its confluence with the Nepean, and by the Nepean to the northernmost angle of J. Blaxland's grant as aforesaid.

ILLAWARRA.

Embracing the eastern portion of the County of Camden, and the northern portion of the County of St. Vincent; bounded on the north by a line west, to the head of the Cataract River, commencing on the sea shore near Bulli; on the west by the Illawarra range, thence by a line to the middle source of the Kangaroo River, thence by that River to its confluence with the Shoalhaven River, and by this River to about two miles south of the confluence of the Warreamungo; on the south by the range north of Endrick's River, to the source of Yalmal Creek; and again by a range to Lambes' grant; and by the eastern shore of St. George's Basin to Sussex Haven, and thence by the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to near Bulli, as aforesaid.

8. BERRIMA.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of Camden; bounded on the north by a line bearing west from the source of the Cordeaux River to Lupton's Inn; from this Inn by a line bearing south-westerly to Jellore; from Jellore by a line bearing north-westerly to the Wollondilly River in a line with Colong, and continued by this River, to the mouth of a Creek rising at Murrum; on the west by the Wollondilly, Paddy's River, and the Uringalla to its source; and by a line to the source of Barber's Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with the Shoalhaven River; on the south by the Shoalhaven and Kangaroo Rivers; on the east by the middle source of the Kangaroo, and a line bearing north-easterly to the Illawarra range, and by that range to the source of the Cordeaux River.

9. GOULBURN.

Embracing the southern portion of Georgiana, and the whole of the County of Argyle; bounded on the north by Guinecor Creek, the Burrah Lake, and the Abercrombie River, to a Village Reserve near Bingham, at the mouth of the Isabella River, and from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to a source of Kangaloola Creek at the Village Reserve, thence by that creek to its confluence with the Crookwell; on the west by the Crookwell River to its source, and by the dividing range to Lake George; on the south by the northern margin of Lake George to the the Village Reserve at Kenna's, thence by a line bearing east to Onyongia, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Wolowolar and the source of Boro Creek, and by this creek and the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of the Mongarlow River; on the east by the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of Barber's Creek, and by this creek and a line bearing north-easterly to the source of the Uringalla, and then by the Uringalla and Paddy's River, and the Wollondilly to the confluence of Guinecor Creek, as aforesaid.

10. BRAIDWOOD.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of St. Vincent, and the eastern portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north by the range, north of Endrick River, the Shoalhaven River, and Boro Creek to its source at Wolowolar; on the west including Long Swamp

by the Gourock Range to Tumanwong; on the south by a line bearing easterly to the south-western angle of Curlewis' grant, and by the southern boundary of this grant to the Shoalhaven River, and a line bearing east to Deua River; on the west by the Deua River, to the confluence of the Araluen, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the Budawang Range, and by this range to the range aforesaid, north of the Endrick River.

11. BROULEE.

Embracing a south-eastern portion of the County of St. Vincent; bounded on the north by the eastern shore from Sussex Haven and St. George's Basin to Lamb's grant, thence by a Range to the source of Yalmal Creek; on the west by Budawang Range to the source of the Buckenbowra, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the confluence of the Araluen Creek with the Deua River; and on the south by the Deua River to Moruya; and on the east by the sea shore to Sussex Haven aforesaid, which forms the eastern boundary of the District.

12. QUEANBEYAN.

Embracing the greater portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north from Wolowolar Mountain, by a line bearing west-north-west to Alianoyonyiga, and from thence by a line bearing south to Kenny's grant, thence by the eastern and western margins of Lake George, and by the crest of the Callaria Range, to the source of the Gundaroo Creek, and by this creek to its junction with the Yass River, from thence by a line bearing south-west to the range connected with One Tree Hill, and by this range to One Tree Hill, thence by a line bearing westerly to the Murrumbidgee River; on the west by the Murrumbidgee River to Nickleagle; on the south by a creek, and a line bearing east to Tinderry Mountains, thence by the western source, and again by the eastern source of the Queanbeyan River, and thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Tumouwong; and on the east by the Gourock Range to Wolowolar aforesaid.

13. YASS.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of King, and the northern portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north by the Crookwell, to its confluence with the Narrawa, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the Burrowa River at the confluence with Padman Creek; on the west by Burrowa River to its source, then crossing the dividing range to the source of Dassingallen Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with the Yass River; and by this river to its confluence with the Murrumbidgee to about four miles north of the Village Reserve; on the south from thence by a line bearing easterly to One Tree Hill, thence by the crest of the range connected with One Tree Hill for a distance of about three miles, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the junction of Gundaroo Creek with Yass River; and by this creek to its source, at the foot of the Cellarin Range; on the east by this range to the source of the Crookwell River aforesaid.

14. WINDSOR.

Embracing a north-western portion of the County of Cumberland, and the north-eastern portion of the County of Cook, and a southern portion of the County of Hunter; bounded on the north by the Hawkesbury to Wiseman's Ferry,

thence up the valley of Webb's Creek, and by the dividing range to the confluence of the Wollim Creek with the Colo River; on the west by the Colo River and the Wollonganby to its two sources, thence by a line bearing south to King George's Mount, and from thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Grose's River; on the south by Grose's River to its confluence with the Hawkesbury, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Rickaby's Creek, at the crossing of the Richmond Road, and by this road to Eastern Creek; on the east by Eastern Creek to its confluence with Breakfast Creek, thence by a line bearing east to the Windsor Road, and by this Road to its junction with the Pitt Town Road, from thence by a line bearing north-easterly to William Suttor's grant of 50 acres to the North Road, and by this road to the south-west angle of the parish of Frederick, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the Hawkesbury aforesaid.

15. PENRITH.

Embracing the south-eastern portion of the County of Cook, a western portion of the County of Cumberland, and a small portion northward of the county of Camden; bounded on the north from Rooty Hill, and Eastern Creek by the Richmond Road to Rickaby's Creek, thence by a line bearing north-westerly to Grose's River, and by that river to Mount Hay; on the west from Mount Hay, by a line bearing southerly to the Weatherboard Hut, thence by Jamison's Valley to Cox's River; on the south by Cox's and the Warragamba Rivers to a point two miles above the confluence of the Warragamba and Werriberri, thence by a line bearing east to the Village Reserve on the Nepean, thence by the Nepean, Bringelly Creek, and Bringelly Road, to South Creek; on the east by South Creek to the Northern Old Road; and by this road and the Cowpasture Old Road, and a line bearing north-westerly to Eastern Creek, and by Eastern Creek to Rooty Hill, and the Richmond Road aforesaid.

16. HARTLEY.

Embracing the western portion of the County of Cook, the midland and southern portions of the County of Westmoreland, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Georgiana; bounded on the north by the valley of the Colo River, from the confluence of Wollin Creek, to the confluence of Cook's Creek; on the west by Cook's Creek and the dividing range to Honeysuckle Flat, the point where the county boundary meets the Bathurst Road, thence by that road to its intersection by Solitary Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with Fish River, and by the Fish River to its source; thence by a line bearing south-westerly crossing the dividing range to the source of the Isabella River, and by that river to its confluence with the Abercrombie; on the south of the Abercrombie River to its southern source, from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Burrah Burrah Lake, thence to the source of Guinecor Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Wollondilly; on the east of the Wollondilly to Bonnum Peak, intersected by a line from Jellore Mountain to Colong Mountain bearing north-westerly; thence by this line to the middle source of the Koroming River, thence by the Koroming River and Jamison's Valley to the

Weatherboard Hut; thence by a line bearing north-easterly to Mount Hay; thence by a line bearing north-westerly to King George's Mount; thence by a line bearing northerly to the source of the Wollonganby, and by this river and the Colo River to the confluence of Wollin Creek aforesaid.

17. BATHURST.

Embracing the County of Roxburgh the northern portion of the County of Bathurst, the northern portion of the County of Georgiana, and the western portion of the County of Westmoreland; bounded on the north by the Cudgegong River to the Village Reserve; on the west by a creek bearing south-westerly to the western source of Cunningham's Creek, thence by Cunningham's Creek, the Turin River, and Macquarie River, to Lewis' Ponds, thence by Lewis' Ponds and Frederick's Valley to the northern boundary of Simeon Lord's grant; and from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Conoballas; on the south by a line from Conoballas, bearing easterly to the north-east angle of J. Sterling's grant, and to the dividing range dividing the waters of King's Plains and Fitzgerald's Valley, and by the crest of this range and the dividing range of the Abercrombie and Campbell's Waters, to the Werong Range, at the source of the Fish River; on the west by the Fish River, to its confluence with Solitary Creek, and by that Creek to where it intersects the Bathurst Road, and by that road to Honeysuckle Flat, the point where the county boundary meets the road; thence by the great dividing range to the source of Cook's Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Colo River, and by this river to its source and the source of the Cudgegong River aforesaid.

18. CARCOR.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of Bathurst, the northern portion of the County of King, and the western portion of the County of Georgiana; bounded on the north commencing at the source of the Isabella River, by the crest of the dividing range of the Abercrombie and Campbell's Rivers, and the crest of the dividing range of Fitzgerald's Valley and King's Plains Waters to the eastern boundary of Sterling's grant, thence by a line bearing westerly to Conoballas; on the west by a line bearing southerly to Panuara Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Belubula River, thence by the Belubula, Lachlan, and Burrowa Rivers, to the confluence of Pudman Creek; on the south by a line from thence bearing north-westerly to the confluence of the Narrawa and Crookwell, and by the Crookwell River to the confluence of Kangaloola Creek, thence by Kangaloola Creek and a line bearing north-westerly to the Village Reserve at the confluence of the Isabella River with the Abercrombie; on the east by the Isabella River to its source aforesaid.

19. WELLINGTON.

Embracing the midland and southern portions of the County of Wellington; bounded on the north from the confluence of Wildra Creek with the Cudgegong River by a line bearing north-westerly to the range dividing the Cudgegong and Erskine Waters; on the west by the crest of this range to the confluence of the Macquarie and Bell Rivers, thence by the Bell and Molong Rivers and Boorenor Creek, and a line bearing

southerly to Conoballas; on the east by a line bearing north-easterly to the northern boundary of Simeon Lord's grant, thence by Frederick's Valley and Lewis' Ponds to the Macquarie, thence by the Macquarie and the Turon Rivers, and Cunningham's Creek to the range dividing the Pyrumon River from the Mero Creek, and by the crest of this range to the confluence of the Mero Creek with the Cudgegong, and by the Cudgegong River to the confluence of Wildra Creek aforesaid.

20. MUDGEES.

Embracing the whole of the County of Phillip, and the northern portion of the County of Wellington; bounded on the north from the confluence of Widdin Creek by the Goulburn River, and Wildra Creek to its confluence with the Cudgegong; on the west by the Cudgegong River to the confluence of Mero Creek, thence on the south by the crest of the range, dividing the Macquarie and Pyrumon from the Mero Waters to the western source of Cunningham's Creek, thence by a Creek bearing north-easterly to the village reserve, on the Cudgegong River, and by this river to its source at Coricudgy; on the east by a line bearing north to Widdin Creek, and by Widdin Creek to its confluence with the Goulburn aforesaid.

21. BRISBANE WATER.

Embracing the south-eastern portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north by a line from Reid's Mistake across Lake Macquarie, bearing westerly to Dora Creek, and by Dora Creek to the Warrawolong Range and to Mount Warrawolong, thence on the west by the crest of the said range to Mount Simpson and the north road, and by this road to Wiseman's Ferry; on the south by the Hawkesbury and Broken Bay Roads to Box Head on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to Reid's Mistake aforesaid.

22. NEWCASTLE AND RAYMOND TERRACE.

Embracing a southern portion of the County of Gloucester, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north from South Head by the southern shores of Port Stephens to the village reserve of Sawyer's Point at the entrance of the Karua River, thence by a tracked road to Mossman's land on the William's River, thence on the west by William's River to the north-eastern angle of the boundary of William Spark's grant, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the Sugar Loaf Mountain, and by the Sugar Loaf Range to the source of Dora Creek; on the south by Dora Creek and a line bearing easterly from its mouth crossing Lake Macquarie to Reid's Mistake on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to the South Head of Port Stephens aforesaid.

23. DUNGOG.

Embracing the greater portion of the County of Gloucester, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north from Farquhar Inlet by the River Manning and the Barnard River to its source; on the west by the range dividing the Manning and Hunter Waters, and the range dividing the Allyn and William's Waters to the southern boundary of John Verge's grant, thence by a line bearing east to William's River, and by this river to the western boundary of Mossman's land, thence on the south by a

track bearing easterly to the village reserve at Sawyer's Point of the Karua River, and by the southern shore of Port Stephens to South Head on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary of Farquhar Inlet as aforesaid.

24. MAITLAND.

Embracing the northern portion of the County of Northumberland, and a southern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north-east by the Hunter to Morpeth, thence across the River and by the right bank of the Paterson River to the northern boundary of T. 25. WOLOMBI AND MACDONALD RIVER.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of Northumberland, and a part of the southern portion of the County of Hunter; bounded on the north by the Broken Back Range from the head of Wallis' Creek, and by the range heading Milbro Dale to the Wambo Range, and thence by the Monandilla Range heading Doyle's and Greig's Creeks to Widdin Creek; on the west by Widdin Creek to Coricudgy, thence by the head of the Cudgegong River to Ganduddy Creek, and by this Creek and a line bearing southerly to Umbiella Creek, and by this Creek to its confluence with the Colo or Capertee River; on the south by the Colo River to the confluence of Wollim Creek, thence by the crest of the range dividing the Colo and Macdonald Waters to the confluence of the Macdonald River with the Hawkesbury, and thence to Wiseman's Ferry; on the east by the New North Road to Mount Simpson, and by this range to Warrawolong, thence to the range heading Dora Creek, and by this range to the Broken Back Range at the head of Wallis' Creek aforesaid.

These Districts are the Police Districts, described in the Notice from this Office, bearing this date, and further particulars respecting them may be obtained from the Police Magistrates and Benches.

Separate Tenders will be required for the Forage in the District of Sydney, and for the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children; but the other supplies for that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Orphan Schools and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract; and therefore no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders must also be made for each of the Orphan Schools and for the Lunatic Asylum.

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House,

Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz :—11 $\frac{1}{2}$ wheat flour or 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ biscuit, equal to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ of bread; 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ salt beef or 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the Officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan Schools, and to the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

The supplies for road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations, to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned :—

The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department

requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

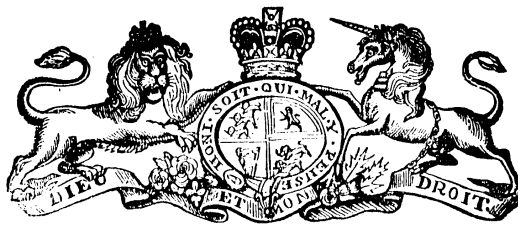

As the numbering of the present Edition differs throughout from that of the last, it will be necessary, in order to prevent any misunderstanding from signalizing with the two Editions, that all vessels possessing this Edition of 1841, in making their numbers or other communications, with any Ship or Signal Station, should first hoist the Numeral Pendant (at some other mast head) to signify that they are using this Edition; upon seeing which, Ships and Signal Stations will immediately hoist the First Distinguishing Pendant with Union Jack underneath, as the answering Signal; and when such answering Signal is not made, it will be understood that the Vessel or Station does not possess the new Edition, in which case the Ship (if she has it) will communicate with the old Edition.

POLICE DISTRICTS.

IN reference to the Government Notice of 12th August, 1840, relative to the boundaries of the Police Districts of the Colony, and to the Notices of 17th November, 1840, 2nd March, 9th April, and 6th August, 1841, making certain alterations in the same; His Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct, that the whole be now re-published for more convenient reference.

His Excellency, however, desires it to be notified, that the present division has been

made merely to simplify and facilitate the Police operations of the Colony, and is not intended to supersede, or in any way interfere with the division of the Colony into Counties, as already published by the Proclamations of the 22nd May, and 27th November, 1835, or with the boundaries of any Counties which may hereafter be proclaimed.

1. SYDNEY.

Embracing a north-eastern portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundreds of Sydney and Packerham, except the parish of Concord; bounded on the north and north-west by Broken Bay and Cowan Creek; on the west by lines bearing south-westerly and south dividing Hynde's grant to Lane Cove River, thence by Lane Cove and its Bays to the western point of Ball's Head Bay, crossing the Parramatta River to Longnose Point, thence by the Long Cove to the junction of the Parramatta and Liverpool Turnpike Roads, and by the Liverpool Road to the Village Reserve at Irish Town, and from thence by a line bearing south to and by the Salt Ponds; on the south by George's River, and the south shore of Botany Bay to Cape Solander, the sea shore which forms the eastern boundary to the South Head, crossing the entrance of Port Jackson to the North Head, and continued to Barrenjerrey Head, at the entrance of Broken Bay.

2. PARRAMATTA.

Embracing a northern and midland portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundreds of Parramatta and Dundas, and the parish of Concord; bounded on the north by the Hawkesbury River; on the north-west by a line bearing south-westerly to the North Road leading to Wiseman's Ferry; on the west by this Road, to the northern boundary of George Suttor's grant of fifty acres, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the junction of the Pitt Town and Windsor Roads, thence by the Windsor Road, and a line bearing west to the confluence of Breakfast and Eastern Creeks, and by Eastern Creek to the Cowpasture Road; on the south by the Prospect old Road and Prospect Creek to Lansdowne Bridge, thence by the Liverpool Road to its junction with the Parramatta Road; on the east by a line from thence bearing north-easterly to Long Cove, and by its eastern shore to Longnose Point, crossing the Parramatta River to the western point of Ball's Head Bay, thence by Lane Cove and its Bays, and Lane Cove River, and by a line bearing north and north-easterly dividing Hynde's grant to Cowan Creek, and by this Creek to the Hawkesbury River aforesaid.

3. LIVERPOOL.

Embracing a midland portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundred of Liverpool and parishes of Cabramatta and Wattamolla; bounded on the north from Cape Solander by Botany Bay, George's River, the Salt Ponds, the Liverpool Road, and Prospect Creek to the Cowpasture Road; on the west by the Cowpasture Road to the junction of the Northern Road, by the Northern Road to South Creek, and by South Creek to the Bringelly Road, and by this Road

to the junction of the Cowpasture old Road, and by the Cowpasture old Road to the junction with the cross Road leading to the Campbelltown Road; on the south by this cross Road to the Campbelltown Road, thence by a line bearing easterly, crossing Bunberry Curran and Bow Bowing Creeks, George's River, Deadman's Creek to the northern boundary of John Lucas' grant, on Woronora Creek, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Wattamolla on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary of the district to Cape Solander aforesaid.

4. CAMPBELLTOWN.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of Cumberland, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Camden, and the parishes of Cook, in the Hundred of Bringelly and Heathcote, and Bulga, in the Hundred of Wattamolla; bounded on the north from Wattamolla by a line bearing north-westerly to the northern boundary of John Lucas' grant, on Woronora Creek, thence by a line bearing westerly crossing Deadman's Creek, George's River, Bow Bowing, and Bunberry Curran Creeks, to the southern crosscut road, on the Campbelltown Road, and by this crosscut road to the range dividing the Campbelltown and old Cowpasture Roads; on the west by the summit of this range, bearing south-westerly to the southern boundary of Howe's Eskdale Estate, on the Nepean, and by this River to a distance of five miles south of the confluence of the Cordeaux River; on the south by a line from hence bearing east to the dividing range at the head of the Cordeaux River; and on the east by the crest of the range and a line east to the sea shore, near Bulli, which is the eastern boundary to Wattamolla aforesaid.

5. PICTON.

Embracing a midland portion of the County of Camden, and an eastern portion of the County of Westmoreland; bounded on the north by the Warragamba and Cox's Rivers from the confluence of Weriberi Creek, to the confluence of the Kowming River; on the west by the Kowming River to its sources near the Colong Mountain; on the south by a line bearing south-easterly from Colong to Jellore, from thence by a line bearing north-easterly to Lupton's Inn, and from that Inn by a line bearing east to the Nepean River; on the east by the Nepean River to the mouth of the gully which separates D'Arietas' grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and by this gully to the north-east corner of Douglass' grant; thence by the northern boundary of this grant and a line bearing westerly, crossing Wand J. Macarthur's grants, and the Clergy and School Estate, to the south-east corner of Antill's grant of 900 acres; and by the southern boundaries of this grant and R. Crawford's grant, thence by a line bearing north-westerly along the ridges of the Boolbinmatta Range of Mount Prudhoe and Razorback, to the south-east corner of Wyld's grant of 600 acres, thence by the eastern and northern boundaries of this grant and the dividing line of the Clergy and School Estate, and Wyld's grant of 2000 acres, to Weriberi Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Warragamba River aforesaid.

6. CAMDEN AND NARRELLAN.

Embracing a north-eastern portion of the

County of Camden, and a south-western portion of the County of Cumberland; bounded on the north by the Nepean River, commencing at the northermost angle of J. Blaxland's grant of 800 acres to the confluence of the Warragamba; on the north-west by this river to the confluence of Weriberi Creek; on the west by this creek to the line dividing the Clergy and School Estate from Wylde's grant of 2000 acres; on the south by this line bearing east, and by the northern boundary line of Wylde's 600 acres grant, thence by the eastern boundary line of the said grant, thence by a line bearing south-easterly along the summit or ridges of Razorback and Mount Prudhoe, continuing to, and along the ridge of the Boolbinmatta Range to the southern boundary line of Crawford's grant of 1000 acres, and by this line and the southern boundary line of Antill's grant of 900 acres, and a line bearing easterly, crossing the Clergy and School Estate, and W. and J. Macarthur's grants, to the north-west angle of A. Douglass' grant of 800 acres; and by the northern boundary line of this said grant to the gully which separates D'Arietas' grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and by this gully to the Nepean; on the east by the Nepean River to the southern boundary of Howe's Eskdale Estate; thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the summit of the range dividing the Cowpasture and Campbelltown Roads, to the crosscut road between the Campbelltown Road and the old Cowpasture Road; and by the old Cowpasture Road, to its junction with the Bringelly Road; and by the Bringelly Road and Bringelly Creek to its confluence with the Nepean, and by the Nepean to the northermost angle of J. Blaxland's grant as aforesaid.

7. ILLAWARRA.

Embracing the eastern portion of the County of Camden, and the northern portion of the County of St. Vincent; bounded on the north by a line west, to the head of the Cataract River, commencing on the sea shore near Bulli; on the west by the Illawarra range, thence by a line to the middle source of the Kangaroo River, thence by that River to its confluence with the Shoalhaven River, and by this River to about two miles south of the confluence of the Warreamungo; on the south by the range north of Endrick's River, to the source of Yalmal Creek; and again by a range to Lambes' grant; and by the eastern shore of St. George's Basin to Sussex Haven, and thence by the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to near Bulli, as aforesaid.

8. BERRIMA.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of Camden; bounded on the north by a line bearing west from the source of the Cordeaux River to Lupton's Inn; from this Inn by a line bearing south-westerly to Jellore; from Jellore by a line bearing north-westerly to the Wollondilly River in a line with Colong, and continued by this River, to the mouth of a Creek rising at Murrum; on the west by the Wollondilly, Paddy's River, and the Uringalla to its source; and by a line to the source of Barber's Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with the Shoalhaven River; on the south by the Shoalhaven and Kangaroo Rivers; on the east by the middle source of the Kangaroo, and a line bearing north-

easterly to the Illawarra range, and by that range to the source of the Cordeaux River.

9. GOULBURN.

Embracing the southern portion of Georgiana, and the whole of the County of Argyle; bounded on the north by Guinecor Creek, the Burrah Lake, and the Abercrombie River, to a Village Reserve near Bingham, at the mouth of the Isabella River, and from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to a source of Kangaloola Creek at the Village Reserve, thence by that creek to its confluence with the Crookwell; on the west by the Crookwell River to its source, and by the dividing range to Lake George; on the south by the northern margin of Lake George to the the Village Reserve at Kenna's, thence by a line bearing east to Onyongia, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Wolowolar and the source of Boro Creek, and by this creek and the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of the Mongarlow River; on the east by the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of Barber's Creek, and by this creek and a line bearing north-easterly to the source of the Uringalla, and then by the Uringalla and Paddy's River, and the Wollondilly to the confluence of Guinecor Creek, as aforesaid.

10. BRAIDWOOD.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of St. Vincent, and the eastern portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north by the range, north of Endrick River, the Shoalhaven River, and Boro Creek to its source at Wolowolar; on the west including Long Swamp by the Gourrock Range to Tumanwong; on the south by a line bearing easterly to the south-western angle of Curlewis' grant, and by the southern boundary of this grant to the Shoalhaven River, and a line bearing east to Deua River; on the west by the Deua River, to the confluence of the Araluen, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the Budawang Range, and by this range to the range aforesaid, north of the Endrick River.

11. BROULEE.

Embracing a south-eastern portion of the County of St. Vincent; bounded on the north by the eastern shore from Sussex Haven and St. George's Basin to Lamb's grant, thence by a Range to the source of Yalmal Creek; on the west by Budawang Range to the source of the Buckenbowra, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the confluence of the Araluen Creek with the Deua River; and on the south by the Deua River to Moruya; and on the east by the sea shore to Sussex Haven aforesaid, which forms the eastern boundary of the District.

12. QUEANBEYAN.

Embracing the greater portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north from Wolowolar Mountain, by a line bearing west-north-west to Alianoyonyiga, and from thence by a line bearing south to Kenny's grant, thence by the eastern and western margins of Lake George, and by the crest of the Callaria Range, to the source of the Gundaroo Creek, and by this creek to its junction with the Yass River, from thence by a line bearing south-west to the range connected with One Tree Hill, and by this range to One Tree Hill, thence by a line bearing westerly to the Murrumbidgee River; on the west by the Mur-

rumbridge River to Nickleagle; on the south by a creek, and a line bearing east to Tinderry Mountains, thence by the western source, and again by the eastern source of the Queanbeyan River, and thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Tumouwong; and on the east by the Gourcock Range to Wolowolar aforesaid.

13. YASS.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of King, and the northern portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north by the Crookwell, to its confluence with the Narrawa, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the Burrowa River at the confluence with Padman Creek; on the west by Burrowa River to its source, then crossing the dividing range to the source of Dassingallen Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with the Yass River; and by this river to its confluence with the Murrumbidgee to about four miles north of the Village Reserve; on the south from thence by a line bearing easterly to One Tree Hill, thence by the crest of the range connected with One Tree Hill for a distance of about three miles, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the junction of Gundaroo Creek with Yass River; and by this creek to its source, at the foot of the Cullarin Range; on the east by this range to the source of the Crookwell River aforesaid.

14. WINDSOR.

Embracing a north-western portion of the County of Cumberland, and the north-eastern portion of the County of Cook, and a southern portion of the County of Hunter; bounded on the north by the Hawkesbury to Wiseman's Ferry, thence up the valley of Webb's Creek, and by the dividing range to the confluence of the Wollin Creek with the Colo River; on the west by the Colo River and the Wollonganby to its two sources, thence by a line bearing south to King George's Mount, and from thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Grose's River; on the south by Grose's River to its confluence with the Hawkesbury, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Rickaby's Creek, at the crossing of the Richmond Road, and by this road to Eastern Creek; on the east by Eastern Creek to its confluence with Breakfast Creek, thence by a line bearing east to the Windsor Road, and by this Road to its junction with the Pitt Town Road, from thence by a line bearing north-easterly to William Suttors's grant of 50 acres to the North Road, and by this road to the south-west angle of the parish of Frederick, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the Hawkesbury aforesaid.

15. PENRITH.

Embracing the south-eastern portion of the County of Cook, a western portion of the County of Cumberland, and a small portion northward of the county of Camden; bounded on the north from Rooty Hill, and Eastern Creek by the Richmond Road to Rickaby's Creek, thence by a line bearing north-westerly to Grose's River, and by that river to Mount Hay; on the west from Mount Hay, by a line bearing southerly to the Weatherboard Hut, thence by Jamison's Valley to Cox's River; on the south by Cox's and the Warragaraba Rivers to a point two miles above the confluence of the Warragamba and Werriberri, thence by a line bearing east to the Village Reserve

on the Nepean, thence by the Nepean, Bringelly Creek, and Bringelly Road, to South Creek; on the east by South Creek to the Northern Old Road; and by this road and the Cowpasture Old Road, and a line bearing north-westerly to Eastern Creek, and by Eastern Creek to Rooty Hill, and the Richmond Road aforesaid.

16. HARTLEY.

Embracing the western portion of the County of Cook, the midland and southern portions of the County of Westmoreland, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Georgiana; bounded on the north by the valley of the Colo River, from the confluence of Wollin Creek, to the confluence of Cook's Creek; on the west by Cook's Creek and the dividing range to Honeysuckle Flat, the point where the county boundary meets the Bathurst Road, thence by that road to its intersection by Solitary Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with Fish River, and by the Fish River to its source; thence by a line bearing south-westerly crossing the dividing range to the source of the Isabella River, and by that river to its confluence with the Abercrombie; on the south of the Abercrombie River to its southern source, from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Burrah Burrah Lake, thence to the source of Guinecor Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Wollondilly; on the east of the Wollondilly to Bonnum Peak, intersected by a line from Jellore Mountain to Colong Mountain bearing north-westerly; thence by this line to the middle source of the Koroming River, thence by the Koroming River and Jamison's Valley to the Weatherboard Hut; thence by a line bearing north-easterly to Mount Hay; thence by a line bearing north-westerly to King George's Mount; thence by a line bearing northerly to the source of the Wollonganby, and by this river and the Colo River to the confluence of Wollin Creek aforesaid.

17. BATHURST.

Embracing the County of Roxburgh the northern portion of the County of Bathurst, the northern portion of the County of Georgiana, and the western portion of the County of Westmoreland; bounded on the north by the Cudgegong River to the Village Reserve; on the west by a creek bearing south-westerly to the western source of Cunningham's Creek, thence by Cunningham's Creek, the Turin River, and Macquarie River, to Lewis' Ponds, thence by Lewis' Ponds and Frederick's Valley to the northern boundary of Simeon Lord's grant; and from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Conoballas; on the south by a line from Conoballas, bearing easterly to the north-east angle of J. Sterling's grant, and to the dividing range dividing the waters of King's Plains and Fitzgerald's Valley, and by the crest of this range and the dividing range of the Abercrombie and Campbell's Waters, to the Werong Range, at the source of the Fish River; on the west by the Fish River, to its confluence with Solitary Creek, and by that Creek to where it intersects the Bathurst Road, and by that road to Honeysuckle Flat, the point where the county boundary meets the road; thence by the great dividing range to the source of Cook's Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Colo River, and by this river to its source and the source of the Cudgegong River aforesaid.

18. CARCOR.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of Bathurst, the northern portion of the County of King, and the western portion of the County of Georgiana; bounded on the north commencing at the source of the Isabella River, by the crest of the dividing range of the Abercrombie and Campbell's Rivers, and the crest of the dividing range of Fitzgerald's Valley and King's Plains Waters to the eastern boundary of Sterling's grant, thence by a line bearing westerly to Conoballas; on the west by a line bearing southerly to Panuara Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Belubula River, thence by the Belubula, Lachlan, and Burrowa Rivers, to the confluence of Pudman Creek; on the south by a line from thence bearing north-westerly to the confluence of the Narrawa and Crookwell, and by the Crookwell River to the confluence of Kangaloola Creek, thence by Kangaloola Creek and a line bearing north-westerly to the Village Reserve at the confluence of the Isabella River with the Abercrombie; on the east by the Isabella River to its source aforesaid.

19. WELLINGTON.

Embracing the midland and southern portions of the County of Wellington; bounded on the north from the confluence of Wildra Creek with the Cudgegong River by a line bearing north-westerly to the range dividing the Cudgegong and Erskine Waters; on the west by the crest of this range to the confluence of the Macquarie and Bell Rivers, thence by the Bell and Molong Rivers and Boorenor Creek, and a line bearing southerly to Conoballas; on the east by a line bearing north-easterly to the northern boundary of Simeon Lord's grant, thence by Frederick's Valley and Lewis' Ponds to the Macquarie, thence by the Macquarie and the Turon Rivers, and Cunningham's Creek to the range dividing the Pyramon River from the Mero Creek, and by the crest of this range to the confluence of the Mero Creek with the Cudgegong, and by the Cudgegong River to the confluence of Wildra Creek aforesaid.

20. MUDGEE.

Embracing the whole of the County of Phillip, and the northern portion of the County of Wellington; bounded on the north from the confluence of Widdin Creek by the Goulburn River, and Wildra Creek to its confluence with the Cudgegong; on the west by the Cudgegong River to the confluence of Mero Creek, thence on the south by the crest of the range, dividing the Macquarie and Pyramon from the Mero Waters to the western source of Cunningham's Creek, thence by a Creek bearing north-easterly to the village reserve, on the Cudgegong River, and by this river to its source at Coricudgy; on the east by a line bearing north to Widdin Creek, and by Widdin Creek to its confluence with the Goulburn aforesaid.

21. BRISBANE WATER.

Embracing the south-eastern portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north by a line from Reid's Mistake across Lake Macquarie, bearing westerly to Dora Creek, and by Dora Creek to the Warrawolong Range and to Mount Warrawolong, thence on the west by the crest of the said range to Mount Simpson and the north road, and by this road to Wiseman's

Ferry; on the south by the Hawkesbury and Broken Bay Roads to Box Head on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to Reid's Mistake aforesaid.

22. NEWCASTLE AND RAYMOND TERRACE.

Embracing a southern portion of the County of Gloucester, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north from South Head by the southern shores of Port Stephens to the village reserve of Sawyer's Point at the entrance of the Karua River, thence by a tracked road to Mossman's land on the William's River, thence on the west by William's River to the north-eastern angle of the boundary of William Spark's grant, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the Sugar Loaf Mountain, and by the Sugar Loaf Range to the source of Dora Creek; on the south by Dora Creek and a line bearing easterly from its mouth crossing Lake Macquarie to Reid's Mistake on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to the South Head of Port Stephens aforesaid.

23. DUNGOG.

Embracing the greater portion of the County of Gloucester, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north from Farquhar Inlet by the River Manning and the Barnard River to its source; on the west by the range dividing the Manning and Hunter Waters, and the range dividing the Allyn and William's Waters to the southern boundary of John Verge's grant, thence by a line bearing east to William's River, and by this river to the western boundary of Mossman's land, thence on the south by a track bearing easterly to the village reserve at Sawyer's Point of the Karua River, and by the southern shore of Port Stephens to South Head on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary of Farquhar Inlet as aforesaid.

24. MAITLAND.

Embracing the northern portion of the County of Northumberland, and a southern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north-east by the Hunter to Morpeth, thence across the River and by the right bank of the Paterson River to the northern boundary of T. Nowlan's land; on the north by the northern boundary of Nowlan's land, and across the Government Reserve to Lamb's Valley, and to the Hunter at the eastern boundary of Gaggin's land, and thence by the right bank of the Hunter to the entrance of Black Creek; on the west by Black Creek to the Maitland Road, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Broken Back Mountain; on the south from thence by the crest of the Broken Back Mountain to the Sugar Loaf Range at the source of Wallis' Creek; on the east by the Sugar Loaf Range and a line bearing north-easterly to William Spark's grant, thence crossing the Hunter by the right bank of this River to the confluence of William's River, being the commencement of the north-east boundary aforesaid.

25. WOLOMBI AND MACDONALD RIVER.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of Northumberland, and a part of the southern portion of the County of Hunter; bounded on the north by the Broken Back Range from the head of Wallis' Creek, and by the range heading Milbro Dale to the Wambo Range, and thence by the Monandilla Range heading Doyle's and

Greig's Creeks to Widdin Creek; on the west by Widdin Creek to Coricudgy, thence by the head of the Cudgegong River to Ganduddy Creek, and by this Creek and a line bearing southerly to Umbrella Creek, and by this Creek to its confluence with the Colo or Capertee River; on the south by the Colo River to the confluence of Wollim Creek, thence by the crest of the range dividing the Colo and Macdonald Waters to the confluence of the Macdonald River with the Hawkesbury, and thence to Wiseman's Ferry; on the east by the New North Road to Mount Simpson, and by this range to Warrawolong, thence to the range heading Dora Creek, and by this range to the Broken Back Range at the head of Wallis' Creek aforesaid.

26. PATERSON.

Embracing the eastern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north by the range at the heads of the Paterson and Allyn Rivers; on the west by the range dividing the Waters of Glendon Brook from the Paterson to the south-east angle of T. Gaggin's grant on the Hunter; on the south by a line bearing easterly across the Government Reserve to Lamb's Valley, and thence by the northern boundary of Nowlan's land, thence by the right bank of the Paterson to its confluence with the Hunter, and by the Hunter to the confluence of William's River; on the east by the William's River beyond the Government Reserve; thence by a line bearing westerly to the dividing range of the Allyn and William's Waters, and by this range to the northern boundary aforesaid.

27. PATRICK'S PLAINS.

Embracing the midland portion of the County of Durham, the north-eastern portion of the County of Hunter, and the north-western portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north by the range at the head of Fall Brook; on the west by the range heading Sandy Creek and Muswellbrook, to a point where the road crosses to the east of Mount Arthur, thence by a line bearing southerly to the eastern boundary of James Robertson's grant, and the River Hunter, thence by the western boundary of Jerry's Plains reserve and the Wambo range; on the south by the range heading Milbro Dale, crossing the north road near to Wollombi Brook, thence to Broken Back Mountain; on the east by a line bearing north-easterly from Broken Back Mountain to Black Creek, at the northern boundary of Stephenson's grant, thence by Black Creek to the Hunter and the south-west angle of Underwood's grant crossing the river to the dividing range of the Paterson Waters and the Glendon Brook, to the range at the head of Fall Brook aforesaid.

Separate Tenders will be required for the Forage in the District of Sydney, and for the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children ; but the other supplies for that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Orphan Schools and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract ; and therefore no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders must also be made for each of the Orphan Schools and for the Lunatic Asylum.

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz :—11b wheat flour or 11b biscuit, equal to 1¼lb of bread ; 11b salt beef or 11b mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 11b of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the Officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan School, and to the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

The supplies for road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations, to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge ; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned :—

The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the

Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality: it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a

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month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed Forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benches, of the several Districts; and as adequate security will be required for the due fulfilment of the Contract, no Tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as such, stating that they are willing to become bound as securities for the Contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which, the Contracts will be again advertised, or another Tender accepted.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.

Each Tender is to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "*Tender for Provisions, &c.*"
