MARRYAT'S SIGNALS.

AT the request of the Agent for Lloyds, His Excellency the GOVERNOR has directed the publication, for general information, of the following notices relating to Marryat's Code of Signals.

MARRYAT'S CODE OF SIGNALS.

THE rapid and extensive growth of Commercial Intercourse, the numerous additions of late years to Maritime Discovery, and the great increase in Steam Navigation, having rendered, after a term of Twenty-five Years, the old Edition of the Code of Signals too imperfect for present use, the Author has considered it advisable to re-arrange and enlarge it so as to adapt it to the present wants of the Merchant Service.

With this view, the Work has been entirely revised, and though the New Edition consists as before of Six Parts, yet each Part has been materially enlarged. The Vocabulary now contains upwards of 5000 words, and the Sentences are

upwards of 3400 in number, including every thing applicable to Steam Navigation and Machinery.

No alteration has been made in the Flags, excepting that the Second Distinguishing Pendant is now applied to the continuation of the Numbers of Merchant Vessels.

An examination will at once evince the increased usefulness and superiority of the New Edition, and impress upon the Agents to Lloyd's and others, the importance not only of providing themselves with it, but of extending its publicity amongst Merchants, Owners, and Captains of Vessels, as much as lies in their power.

NOTICE.

As the numbering of the present Edition differs throughout from that of the last, it will be necessary, in order to prevent any misunderstanding from signalizing with the two Editions, that all vessels possessing this Edition of 1841, in making their numbers or other communications, with any Ship or Signal Station, should first hoist the Numeral Pendant (at some other mast head) to signify that they are using this Edition; upon seeing which, Ships and Signal Stations will immediately hoist the First Distinguishing Pendant with Union Jack underneath, as the answering Signal; and when such answering Signal is not made, it will be understood that the Vessel or Station does not possess the new Edition, in which case the Ship (if she has it) will communicate with the old Edition.

POLICE DISTRICTS.

IN reference to the Government Notice of 12th August, 1840, relative to the boundaries of the Police Districts of the Colony, and to the Notices of 17th November, 1840, 2nd March, 9th April, and 6th August, 1841, making certain alterations in the same; His Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct, that the whole be now re-published for more convenient reference.

His Excellency, however, desires it to be notified, that the present division has been

made merely to simplify and facilitate the Police operations of the Colony, and is not intended to supersede, or in any way interfere with the division of the Colony into Counties, as already published by the Proclamations of the 22nd May, and 27th November, 1835, or with the boundaries of any Counties which may hereafter be proclaimed.

1. SYDNEY.

Embracing a north-eastern portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundreds of Sydney and Packerham, except the parish of Concord; bounded on the north and north-west by Broken Bay and Cowan Creek; on the west by lines bearing south-westerly and south dividing Hynde's grant to Lane Cove River, thence by Lane Cove and its Bays to the western point of Ball's Head Bay, crossing the Parramatta River to Longnose Point, thence by the Long Cove to the junction of the Parramatta and Liverpool Turnpike Roads, and by the Liverpool Road to the Village Reserve at Irish Town, and from thence by a line bearing south to and by the Salt Ponds; on the south by George's River, and the south shore of Botany Bay to Cape Solander, the sea shore which forms the eastern boundary to the South Head, crossing the entrance of Port Jackson to the North Head, and continued to Barrenjerrey Head, at the entrance of Broken Bay.

2. PARRAMATTA.

Embracing a northern and midland portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundreds of Parramatta and Dundas, and the parish of Concord; bounded on the north by the Hawkesbury River; on the north-west by a line bearing south-westerly to the North Road leading to Wiseman's Ferry; on the west by this Road, to the northern boundary of George Suttors' grant of fifty acres, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the junction of the Pitt Town and Windsor Roads, thence by the Windsor Road, and a line bearing west to the confluence of Breakfast and Eastern Creeks, and by Eastern Creek to the Cowpasture Road; on the south by the Prospect old Road and Prospect Creek to Lansdowne Bridge, thence by the Liverpool Road to its junction with the Parramatta Road; on the east by a line from thence bearing north-easterly to Long Cove, and by its eastern shore to Longnose Point, crossing the Parramatta River to the western point of Ball's Head Bay, thence by Lane Cove and its Bays, and Lane Cove River, and by a line bearing north and north-easterly dividing Hynde's grant to Cowan Creek, and by this Creek to the Hawkesbury River aforesaid.

3. LIVERPOOL.

Embracing a midland portion of the County of Cumberland, consisting of the Hundred of Liverpool and parishes of Cabramatta and Wattamolla; bounded on the north from Cape Solander by Botany Bay, George's River, the Salt Ponds, the Liverpool Road, and Prospect Creek to the Cowpasture Road; on the west by the Cowpasture Road to the junction of the Northern Road, by the Northern Road to South Creek, and by South Creek to the Bringelly Road, and by this Road

to the junction of the Cowpasture old Road, and by the Cowpasture old Road to the junction with the cross Road leading to the Campbelltown Road; on the south by this cross Road to the Campbelltown Road, thence by a line bearing easterly, crossing Bunberry Curran and Bow Bowing Creeks, George's River, Deadman's Creek to the northern boundary of John Lucas' grant, on Woronora Creek, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Wattamolla on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary of the district to Cape Solander aforesaid.

4. CAMPBELLTOWN.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of Cumberland, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Camden, and the parishes of Cook, in the Hundred of Bringelly and Heathcote, and Bulga, in the Hundred of Wattamolla; bounded on the north from Wattamolla by a line bearing north-westerly to the northern boundary of John Lucas' grant, on Woronora Creek, thence by a line bearing westerly crossing Deadman's Creek, George's River, Bow Bowing, and Bunberry Curran Creeks, to the southern crosscut road, on the Campbelltown Road, and by this crosscut road to the range dividing the Campbelltown and old Cowpasture Roads; on the west by the summit of this range, bearing south-westerly to the southern boundary of Howe's Eskdale Estate, on the Nepean, and by this River to a distance of five miles south of the confluence of the Cordeaux River; on the south by a line from hence bearing east to the dividing range at the head of the Cordeaux River; and on the east by the crest of the range and a line east to the sea shore, near Bulli, which is the eastern boundary to Wattamolla aforesaid.

5. PICTON.

Embracing a midland portion of the County of Camden, and an eastern portion of the County of Westmoreland; bounded on the north by the Warragamba and Cox's Rivers from the confluence of Weriberi Creek, to the confluence of the Kowming River; on the west by the Kowming River to its sources near the Colong Mountain; on the south by a line bearing south-easterly from Colong to Jellore, from thence by a line bearing north-easterly to Lupton's Inn, and from that Inn by a line bearing east to the Nepean River; on the east by the Nepean River to the mouth of the gully which separates D'Arietas' grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and by this gully to the north-east corner of Douglass' grant; thence by the northern boundary of this grant and a line bearing westerly, crossing Wand J. Macarthur's grants, and the Clergy and School Estate, to the south-east corner of Antill's grant of 900 acres; and by the southern boundaries of this grant and R. Crawford's grant, thence by a line bearing north-westerly along the ridges of the Boolbinmatta Range of Mount Prudhoe and Razorback, to the south-east corner of Wyldes' grant of 600 acres, thence by the eastern and northern boundaries of this grant and the dividing line of the Clergy and School Estate, and Wyldes' grant of 2000 acres, to Weriberi Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Warragamba River aforesaid.

6. CAMDEN AND NARRELLAN.

Embracing a north-eastern portion of the

County of Camden, and a south-western portion of the County of Cumberland; bounded on the north by the Nepean River, commencing at the northermost angle of J. Blaxland's grant of 800 acres to the confluence of the Warragamba; on the north-west by this river to the confluence of Weriberi Creek; on the west by this creek to the line dividing the Clergy and School Estate from Wylde's grant of 2000 acres; on the south by this line bearing east, and by the northern boundary line of Wylde's 600 acres grant, thence by the eastern boundary line of the said grant, thence by a line bearing south-easterly along the summit or ridges of Razorback and Mount Prudhoe, continuing to, and along the ridge of the Boolbinmatta Range to the southern boundary line of Crawford's grant of 1000 acres, and by this line and the southern boundary line of Antill's grant of 900 acres, and a line bearing easterly, crossing the Clergy and School Estate, and W. and J. Macarthur's grants, to the north-west angle of A. Douglass' grant of 800 acres; and by the northern boundary line of this said grant to the gully which separates D'Arietas' grant, called Morton Park, from Douglass' grant, and by this gully to the Nepean; on the east by the Nepean River to the southern boundary of Howe's Eskdale Estate; thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the summit of the range dividing the Cowpasture and Campbelltown Roads, to the crosscut road between the Campbelltown Road and the old Cowpasture Road; and by the old Cowpasture Road, to its junction with the Bringelly Road; and by the Bringelly Road and Bringelly Creek to its confluence with the Nepean, and by the Nepean to the northermost angle of J. Blaxland's grant as aforesaid.

7. ILLAWARRA.

Embracing the eastern portion of the County of Camden, and the northern portion of the County of St. Vincent; bounded on the north by a line west, to the head of the Cataract River, commencing on the sea shore near Bulli; on the west by the Illawarra range, thence by a line to the middle source of the Kangaroo River, thence by that River to its confluence with the Shoalhaven River, and by this River to about two miles south of the confluence of the Warreamungo; on the south by the range north of Endrick's River, to the source of Yalmal Creek; and again by a range to Lambes' grant; and by the eastern shore of St. George's Basin to Sussex Haven, and thence by the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to near Bulli, as aforesaid.

8. BERRIMA.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of Camden; bounded on the north by a line bearing west from the source of the Cordeaux River to Lupton's Inn; from this Inn by a line bearing south-westerly to Jellore; from Jellore by a line bearing north-westerly to the Wollondilly River in a line with Colong, and continued by this River, to the mouth of a Creek rising at Murrumbidgee; on the west by the Wollondilly, Paddy's River, and the Uringalla to its source; and by a line to the source of Barber's Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with the Shoalhaven River; on the south by the Shoalhaven and Kangaroo Rivers; on the east by the middle source of the Kangaroo, and a line bearing north-

easterly to the Illawarra range, and by that range to the source of the Cordeaux River.

9. GOULBURN.

Embracing the southern portion of Georgiana, and the whole of the County of Argyle; bounded on the north by Guinecor Creek, the Burrah Lake, and the Abercrombie River, to a Village Reserve near Bingham, at the mouth of the Isabella River, and from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to a source of Kangaloola Creek at the Village Reserve, thence by that creek to its confluence with the Crookwell; on the west by the Crookwell River to its source, and by the dividing range to Lake George; on the south by the northern margin of Lake George to the the Village Reserve at Kenna's, thence by a line bearing east to Onyongia, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Wolowolar and the source of Boro Creek, and by this creek and the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of the Mongarlow River; on the east by the Shoalhaven River to the confluence of Barber's Creek, and by this creek and a line bearing north-easterly to the source of the Uringalla, and then by the Uringalla and Paddy's River, and the Wollondilly to the confluence of Guinecor Creek, as aforesaid.

10. BRAIDWOOD.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of St. Vincent, and the eastern portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north by the range, north of Endrick River, the Shoalhaven River, and Boro Creek to its source at Wolowolar; on the west including Long Swamp by the Gourrock Range to Tumanwong; on the south by a line bearing easterly to the south-western angle of Curlewis' grant, and by the southern boundary of this grant to the Shoalhaven River, and a line bearing east to Deua River; on the west by the Deua River, to the confluence of the Araluen, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the Budawang Range, and by this range to the range aforesaid, north of the Endrick River.

11. BROULEE.

Embracing a south-eastern portion of the County of St. Vincent; bounded on the north by the eastern shore from Sussex Haven and St. George's Basin to Lamb's grant, thence by a Range to the source of Yalmal Creek; on the west by Budawang Range to the source of the Buckenbowra, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the confluence of the Araluen Creek with the Deua River; and on the south by the Deua River to Moruya; and on the east by the sea shore to Sussex Haven aforesaid, which forms the eastern boundary of the District.

12. QUEANBEYAN.

Embracing the greater portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north from Wolowolar Mountain, by a line bearing west-north-west to Alianoyonyiga, and from thence by a line bearing south to Kenny's grant, thence by the eastern and western margins of Lake George, and by the crest of the Callaria Range, to the source of the Gundaroo Creek, and by this creek to its junction with the Yass River, from thence by a line bearing south-west to the range connected with One Tree Hill, and by this range to One Tree Hill, thence by a line bearing westerly to the Murrumbidgee River; on the west by the Mur-

rumbridgee River to Nickeleagle; on the south by a creek, and a line bearing east to Tinderry Mountains, thence by the western source, and again by the eastern source of the Queanbeyan River, and thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Tumouwong; and on the east by the Gourrock Range to Wolowolar aforesaid.

13. YASS.

Embracing the southern portion of the County of King, and the northern portion of the County of Murray; bounded on the north by the Crookwell, to its confluence with the Narrawa, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the Burrowa River at the confluence with Padman Creek; on the west by Burrowa River to its source, then crossing the dividing range to the source of Dassingallen Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with the Yass River; and by this river to its confluence with the Murrumbidgee to about four miles north of the Village Reserve; on the south from thence by a line bearing easterly to One Tree Hill, thence by the crest of the range connected with One Tree Hill for a distance of about three miles, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the junction of Gundaroo Creek with Yass River; and by this creek to its source, at the foot of the Cullarin Range; on the east by this range to the source of the Crookwell River aforesaid.

14. WINDSOR.

Embracing a north-western portion of the County of Cumberland, and the north-eastern portion of the County of Cook, and a southern portion of the County of Hunter; bounded on the north by the Hawkesbury to Wiseman's Ferry, thence up the valley of Webb's Creek, and by the dividing range to the confluence of the Wollin Creek with the Colo River; on the west by the Colo River and the Wollonganby to its two sources, thence by a line bearing south to King George's Mount, and from thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Grose's River; on the south by Grose's River to its confluence with the Hawkesbury, thence by a line bearing south-easterly to Rickaby's Creek, at the crossing of the Richmond Road, and by this road to Eastern Creek; on the east by Eastern Creek to its confluence with Breakfast Creek, thence by a line bearing east to the Windsor Road, and by this Road to its junction with the Pitt Town Road, from thence by a line bearing north-easterly to William Suttors' grant of 50 acres to the North Road, and by this road to the south-west angle of the parish of Frederick, thence by a line bearing north-easterly to the Hawkesbury aforesaid.

15. PENRITH.

Embracing the south-eastern portion of the County of Cook, a western portion of the County of Cumberland, and a small portion northward of the county of Camden; bounded on the north from Rooty Hill, and Eastern Creek by the Richmond Road to Rickaby's Creek, thence by a line bearing north-westerly to Grose's River, and by that river to Mount Hay; on the west from Mount Hay, by a line bearing southerly to the Weatherboard Hut, thence by Jamison's Valley to Cox's River; on the south by Cox's and the Warragaraba Rivers to a point two miles above the confluence of the Warragamba and Werriberri, thence by a line bearing east to the Village Reserve

on the Nepean, thence by the Nepean, Bringelly Creek, and Bringelly Road, to South Creek; on the east by South Creek to the Northern Old Road; and by this road and the Cowpasture Old Road, and a line bearing north-westerly to Eastern Creek, and by Eastern Creek to Rooty Hill, and the Richmond Road aforesaid.

16. HARTLEY.

Embracing the western portion of the County of Cook, the midland and southern portions of the County of Westmoreland, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Georgiana; bounded on the north by the valley of the Colo River, from the confluence of Wollin Creek, to the confluence of Cook's Creek; on the west by Cook's Creek and the dividing range to Honeysuckle Flat, the point where the county boundary meets the Bathurst Road, thence by that road to its intersection by Solitary Creek, and by that creek to its confluence with Fish River, and by the Fish River to its source; thence by a line bearing south-westerly crossing the dividing range to the source of the Isabella River, and by that river to its confluence with the Abercrombie; on the south of the Abercrombie River to its southern source, from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Burrah Burrah Lake, thence to the source of Guinecor Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Wollondilly; on the east of the Wollondilly to Bonnum Peak, intersected by a line from Jellore Mountain to Colong Mountain bearing north-westerly; thence by this line to the middle source of the Koroming River, thence by the Koroming River and Jamison's Valley to the Weatherboard Hut; thence by a line bearing north-easterly to Mount Hay; thence by a line bearing north-westerly to King George's Mount; thence by a line bearing northerly to the source of the Wollonganby, and by this river and the Colo River to the confluence of Wollin Creek aforesaid.

17. BATHURST.

Embracing the County of Roxburgh the northern portion of the County of Bathurst, the northern portion of the County of Georgiana, and the western portion of the County of Westmoreland; bounded on the north by the Cudgegong River to the Village Reserve; on the west by a creek bearing south-westerly to the western source of Cunningham's Creek, thence by Cunningham's Creek, the Turin River, and Macquarie River, to Lewis' Ponds, thence by Lewis' Ponds and Frederick's Valley to the northern boundary of Simeon Lord's grant; and from thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Conoballas; on the south by a line from Conoballas, bearing easterly to the north-east angle of J. Sterling's grant, and to the dividing range dividing the waters of King's Plains and Fitzgerald's Valley, and by the crest of this range and the dividing range of the Abercrombie and Campbell's Waters, to the Werong Range, at the source of the Fish River; on the west by the Fish River, to its confluence with Solitary Creek, and by that Creek to where it intersects the Bathurst Road, and by that road to Honeysuckle Flat, the point where the county boundary meets the road; thence by the great dividing range to the source of Cook's Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Colo River, and by this river to its source and the source of the Cudgegong River aforesaid.

18. CARCOR.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of Bathurst, the northern portion of the County of King, and the western portion of the County of Georgiana; bounded on the north commencing at the source of the Isabella River, by the crest of the dividing range of the Abercrombie and Campbell's Rivers, and the crest of the dividing range of Fitzgerald's Valley and King's Plains Waters to the eastern boundary of Sterling's grant, thence by a line bearing westerly to Conoballas; on the west by a line bearing southerly to Panuara Creek, and by this creek to its confluence with the Belubula River, thence by the Belubula, Lachlan, and Burrowa Rivers, to the confluence of Pudman Creek; on the south by a line from thence bearing north-westerly to the confluence of the Narrawa and Crookwell, and by the Crookwell River to the confluence of Kangaloola Creek, thence by Kangaloola Creek and a line bearing north-westerly to the Village Reserve at the confluence of the Isabella River with the Abercrombie; on the east by the Isabella River to its source aforesaid.

19. WELLINGTON.

Embracing the midland and southern portions of the County of Wellington; bounded on the north from the confluence of Wildra Creek with the Cudgegong River by a line bearing north-westerly to the range dividing the Cudgegong and Erskine Waters; on the west by the crest of this range to the confluence of the Macquarie and Bell Rivers, thence by the Bell and Molong Rivers and Boorenor Creek, and a line bearing southerly to Conoballas; on the east by a line bearing north-easterly to the northern boundary of Simeon Lord's grant, thence by Frederick's Valley and Lewis' Ponds to the Macquarie, thence by the Macquarie and the Turon Rivers, and Cunningham's Creek to the range dividing the Pyrumon River from the Mero Creek, and by the crest of this range to the confluence of the Mero Creek with the Cudgegong, and by the Cudgegong River to the confluence of Wildra Creek aforesaid.

20. MUDGEE.

Embracing the whole of the County of Phillip, and the northern portion of the County of Wellington; bounded on the north from the confluence of Widdin Creek by the Goulburn River, and Wildra Creek to its confluence with the Cudgegong; on the west by the Cudgegong River to the confluence of Mero Creek, thence on the south by the crest of the range, dividing the Macquarie and Pyrumon from the Mero Waters to the western source of Cunningham's Creek, thence by a Creek bearing north-easterly to the village reserve, on the Cudgegong River, and by this river to its source at Coricudgy; on the east by a line bearing north to Widdin Creek, and by Widdin Creek to its confluence with the Goulburn aforesaid.

21. BRISBANE WATER.

Embracing the south-eastern portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north by a line from Reid's Mistake across Lake Macquarie, bearing westerly to Dora Creek, and by Dora Creek to the Warrawolong Range and to Mount Warrawolong, thence on the west by the crest of the said range to Mount Simpson and the north road, and by this road to Wiseman's

Ferry; on the south by the Hawkesbury and Broken Bay Roads to Box Head on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to Reid's Mistake aforesaid.

22. NEWCASTLE AND RAYMOND TERRACE.

Embracing a southern portion of the County of Gloucester, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Northumberland; bounded on the north from South Head by the southern shores of Port Stephens to the village reserve of Sawyer's Point at the entrance of the Karua River, thence by a tracked road to Mossman's land on the William's River, thence on the west by William's River to the north-eastern angle of the boundary of William Spark's grant, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the Sugar Loaf Mountain, and by the Sugar Loaf Range to the source of Dora Creek; on the south by Dora Creek and a line bearing easterly from its mouth crossing Lake Macquarie to Reid's Mistake on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary to the South Head of Port Stephens aforesaid.

23. DUNGOG.

Embracing the greater portion of the County of Gloucester, and a north-eastern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north from Farquhar Inlet by the River Manning and the Barnard River to its source; on the west by the range dividing the Manning and Hunter Waters, and the range dividing the Allyn and William's Waters to the southern boundary of John Verge's grant, thence by a line bearing east to William's River, and by this river to the western boundary of Mossman's land, thence on the south by a track bearing easterly to the village reserve at Sawyer's Point of the Karua River, and by the southern shore of Port Stephens to South Head on the sea shore, which forms the eastern boundary of Farquhar Inlet as aforesaid.

24. MAITLAND.

Embracing the northern portion of the County of Northumberland, and a southern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north-east by the Hunter to Morpeth, thence across the River and by the right bank of the Paterson River to the northern boundary of T. Nowlan's land; on the north by the northern boundary of Nowlan's land, and across the Government Reserve to Lamb's Valley, and to the Hunter at the eastern boundary of Gaggin's land, and thence by the right bank of the Hunter to the entrance of Black Creek; on the west by Black Creek to the Maitland Road, thence by a line bearing south-westerly to Broken Back Mountain; on the south from thence by the crest of the Broken Back Mountain to the Sugar Loaf Range at the source of Wallis' Creek; on the east by the Sugar Loaf Range and a line bearing north-easterly to William Spark's grant, thence crossing the Hunter by the right bank of this River to the confluence of William's River, being the commencement of the north-east boundary aforesaid.

25. WOLOMBI AND MACDONALD RIVER.

Embracing the south-western portion of the County of Northumberland, and a part of the southern portion of the County of Hunter; bounded on the north by the Broken Back Range from the head of Wallis' Creek, and by the range heading Milbro Dale to the Wambo Range, and thence by the Monandilla Range heading Doyle's and

Greig's Creeks to Widdin Creek; on the west by Widdin Creek to Coricudgy, thence by the head of the Cudgegong River to Ganduddy Creek, and by this Creek and a line bearing southerly to Umbrella Creek, and by this Creek to its confluence with the Colo or Capertee River; on the south by the Colo River to the confluence of Wollim Creek, thence by the crest of the range dividing the Colo and Macdonald Waters to the confluence of the Macdonald River with the Hawkesbury, and thence to Wiseman's Ferry; on the east by the New North Road to Mount Simpson, and by this range to Warrawolong, thence to the range heading Dora Creek, and by this range to the Broken Back Range at the head of Wallis' Creek aforesaid.

26. PATERSON.

Embracing the eastern portion of the County of Durham; bounded on the north by the range at the heads of the Paterson and Allyn Rivers; on the west by the range dividing the Waters of Glendon Brook from the Paterson to the south-east angle of T. 4. To the Male Children under six years of age—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 1½oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, ½oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, ½oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, ½oz. salt, ½oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, ½oz. soap.

These Districts are the Police Districts, described in the Notice from this Office, bearing this date, and further particulars respecting them may be obtained from the Police Magistrates and Benches.

Separate Tenders will be required for the Forage in the District of Sydney, and for the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children; but the other supplies for that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Orphan Schools and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract; and therefore no Tenders can be received unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders must also be made for each of the Orphan Schools and for the Lunatic Asylum.

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Boatmen, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz:—11lb wheat flour or 11lb biscuit, equal to 1½lb of bread; 11lb salt beef or 11lb mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 11lb of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the Officer authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan School, and to the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

The supplies for road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations, to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—

The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the

Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Provisions and Forage being required by Rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the Tenders are required to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality: it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a

month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor-General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed Forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benchmen, of the several Districts; and as adequate security will be required for the due fulfilment of the Contract, no Tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as such, stating that they are willing to become bound as securities for the Contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which, the Contracts will be again advertised, or another Tender accepted.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.

Each Tender is to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "*Tender for Provisions, &c.*"
