ADDITIONAL TICKET-OF-LEAVE REGULATIONS.

ITH reference to Articles VIII, IX and X, of the Regulations of 25th May, 1835, respecting the Muster Passes, and change of District of persons holding Tickets-of-Leave, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct that the following alterations, except as to Musters in the District of Sydney, be made therein,

and take effect from the 1st of January next; but in all other respects the said Regulations are to continue in force as heretofore viz:—

1. The quarterly Musters of Ticket-of-Leave Holders are abolished.

2. In order that every Ticket-of-Leave Holder may be known to the Magistrates of the Districts, and especially to the Police Magistrate if there be one, a Register of all persons holding Tickets-of-Leave in the District is to be kept by the Clerk of the Bench at the chief Police Station of the District.

3. In these Registers are to be entered the residence of each Ticket Holder, the name of his master or employer, and his trade or calling, or the means by which he may obtain his livelihood.

4. All persons who may now hold Tickets-of-Leave, or who may obtain them before the 1st of January next, are required either personally or in writing to report their names, residences, the names of their masters or employers, their trade or calling or means of maintaining themselves, at the Court of Petty Sessions held at the chief Police Station of the District, before the 14th day of January next, and all holders of Tickets-of-Leave coming into any District after the 1st of January next, are required to do the same within fourteen days after their arrival.

5. A similar Report is to be made, or furnished by them in every succeeding year, between the 1st

and 14th January.

6. Every Holder of a Ticket-of-Leave must, in a similar manner, report every change of his residence or of service within fourteen days after the occurrence of the same, furnishing, of course, the names of his new master and residence.

7. These Reports may, however, be made by the master or employer instead of the man himself,

if he be in hired service.

8. The Police Magistrate or Bench of Magistrates will adopt, in every District, such further Regulations, not inconsistent with the above, as they may judge necessary, in order to secure to themselves a knowledge of the residence and movements of every Ticket-of-Leave Holder in their District.

9. The Police Magistrate or Bench of Magis-

trates will, also, whenever they think it necessary, interrogate the holder of a Ticket-of-Leave respecting his or her means of subsistence and manner of life; and if they shall not be satisfied that the party subsists honestly, they will render a Special Report of the Case to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts for the Governor's information.

10. The District within which every Ticketof-Leave is to be considered in force is the Police District named therein, according to the boundaries of the same, set forth in the Government

Notice of the 15th September, 1841.

11. No Ticket-of-Leave Holder is to be out of his District without a pass, except in the execution of his duty when employed as a constable.

12. Passes are to be given only by the Police Magistrate of any District, or by two Magistrates of it acting in Petty Sessions, and every Pass must be countersigned by the Clerk of the Bench.

13. Such passes can be granted only for periods not exceeding fourteen days; and no pass can be renewed, nor any new pass granted to the same person, until after the expiration of two months, reckoned from the date of his former pass.

14. Forms for these passes will be furnished to the different Benches; they will be chargeable with a fee of two shillings and sixpence each, which fee will be carried to the account of Government, and no other or higher fee is in any case to

be taken.

15. All Passes will be entered on the Register. 16. Passes for a longer period than formeen days can only be granted by the Principal Superintendent of Convicts, on application of the Ticketof-leave holder, through the Petty Sessions of the

17. The different Police Magistrates throughout the Colony, and where there is no Police Magistrate, the Clerk of the Beach acting under the direction of the Magistrates, will transmit halfyearly returns to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts, of all Ticket-of-leave holders resident or registered in their districts, with the names of their employers, their Trades or calling, or the means by which they maintain themselves. They will also furnish returns of all persons, who, though they hold Tickets for the district, are not resident or registered in it.

These returns will be sent in on the 1st of March,

and 1st of September, in each year.

18. They will at the same time furnish returns of all Passes granted within their district during the half year.

19. These Regulations will extend to women holding Tickets-of-leave as well as to men, but married women may be registered by their husbands provided these latter be free.

20. These regulations will not extend however to the District of Sydney in which the Musters of Ticket-of-Leave holders, are to be continued as

21. The Principal Superintendent of Convicts is the only person who can grant permission to any holder of a Ticket-of-Leave to change his District; and application must be made to that Officer through the Petty Sessions of the District for which the party holds a Ticket-of-Leave.

22. As these Regulations are not in any way Intended to interfere with the employment of the second section line north of W. Hayes 640

lars of the 28th July, 1837, 3rd June, 1840, 8th July, 1840, and 7th November, 1840, will all continue to be in force.

23. Any breach of these Regulations by a Ticket-of-Leave holder, will subject him or her to the immediate Cancellation of his or her Ticket.
