Park, in consideration of the assignment to him of a man specially named, He has directed that all the Convicts in the employment of that Gentleman be immediately withdrawn; and his Excellency has further directed, that in any future case of a similar nature, the name of the person who may offer money to any Officer employed under Government, shall be published in the Government Gazette.

We, the Inhabitants of Port Phillip, beg leave to address your Excellency with the assurance of our unfeigned loyalty towards our Sovereign, and of our sincere respect for your Excellency, Her Majesty's representative in New South Wales.

We hail, with the highest satisfaction, your Excellency's visit to this District, and we trust your Excellency's stay will be sufficiently prolonged to offer an opportunity for that full examination into the resources, improvements, and wants, alike of the town and province, which they would seem to deserve.

To this examination we respectfully solicit your Excellency's earnest attention; and should it result in your Excellency's conviction that we possess the true elements of prosperity, and that we are practically working them out, then we trust that your Excellency will afford us the aid which is essential to their more full and rapid developement.

We sincerely hope that your Excellency's visit will have the happy effect of firmly establishing that respect and confidence which it is so desirable should exist in our mutual relations; and it is our ardent desire that your Excellency may bear with you, on your return to the seat of Government, no ungrateful recollections of Australia Felix.

The following is his Excellency's reply :-

GENTLEMEN—I am happy at length to find myself in the District of Port Phillip; I feel greatly obliged to you for the very kind and cordial reception which you have given me, and I thank you particularly for this Address.

My stay, gentlemen, amongst you must necessarily be shorter than I could desire it to be; but it will be, I trust, sufficiently prolonged to enable me to form an opinion of the resources of your province, and of the improvements of which it is susceptible, as also of its immediate wants.

To become better acquainted with these latter is one of the chief objects of my visit; to satisfy them, as far as the means at my disposal will permit, I trust I need not say is my very anxious desire.

Favoured as you are with a District of exceeding Bainston William, Albio beauty and fertility, I cannot doubt that the on- Britton Richard, Fairlie

ward course of your prosperity will be as steady as the first developement of it has been striking; and I shall, indeed, gentlemen, bear away with me a grateful recollection of Australia Felix, if I may permit myself to hope that my visit has in any way tended to advance your interests, or to confirm and strengthen those feelings of unanimity and mutual confidence, which are no less necessary for the happiness of individuals, than for the prosperity of states.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—We, the undersigned Inhabitants, residing in the District of Geelong, respectfully crave permission to present to your Excellency our sincere congratulations on this your first visit to Australia Felix, and cordially unite in expressing our respect to your Excellency's person and government, as well as loyalty and devotion to our beloved Queen.

The long expected visit of your Excellency to this remote portion of the Colony, revives the hope that our wants of every kind, when brought respectfully before your Excellency, will meet with that consideration which our numbers and respectability, as well as the wealth and importance of the District, require.

We further beg to express our earnest and heartfelt wishes for your Excellency's personal and domestic happiness and prosperity, and our fervent prayers to the Author of all Good, that you, Sir, and Lady Gipps, may be blessed and cheered through the anxious cares of your high and exalted station.

In conclusion, we earnestly hope that your Excellency's administration may be distinguished by such wise and equitable legislation as shall secure equal rights and immunities to all Her Majesty's loyal subjects.

To this Address His Excellency returned a verbal answer, thanking the Inhabitants of the District for the kind welcome which they had given him to their District, and promising to attend to the wants of it. His Excellency also expressed his regret that the time did not allow of his returning a written answer to their Address.
