**CHILI.**

**H**IS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the re-publication, from the *London Gazette*, of the 3rd September, 1841, of the following Order in Council, relating to Chili.

**PRESENT,**

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the sixth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, but repealed and re-enacted by third and fourth William Fourth, cap. fifty-nine, intituled "*An Act to regulate the Trade of the British possessions abroad,*" after reciting that, "by the law of navigation foreign ships are permitted to import into any of the British possessions abroad, from the countries to which they belong, goods, the produce of those countries, and to export goods from such possessions, to be carried to any foreign country whatever, and that such permission should be subject to certain conditions," it is enacted, "that the privileges thereby granted to foreign ships shall be limited to the ships of those countries which, having Colonial possessions, shall grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having Colonial possessions, shall place the commerce and navigation of this country, and of its possessions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured nation, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of any foreign country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not, in all respects, be fulfilled by such foreign country."

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to grant, pending negotiations for a treaty

of commerce between Chili and Great Britain, the privileges aforesaid to the ships of Chili, recognized as such by the British navigation laws; Her Majesty doth, therefore, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authority in Her vested by the said last recited Act of Parliament, declare and grant, that it shall and may be lawful for Chilian ships (recognized as aforesaid) to import into any of the British possessions abroad, from the dominions of Chili, goods, the produce of those dominions, and to export goods from such possessions, to be carried to any foreign country whatever; provided, that, if British subjects and commerce in Chili shall, at any time cease to enjoy all the privileges, whatever they may be, which the subjects and commerce of any other foreign nation may enjoy in Chili, then such permission to trade with the British Colonies shall immediately be withdrawn:

Provided always, that the privileges granted shall be confined to Chilian vessels, built, owned, and navigated in manner required by the British laws of navigation.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**ACTS OF COUNCIL APPROVED.**

**H**IS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified that the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies has intimated in a Despatch, dated the 14th August, 1841, No. 332, that HER MAJESTY has been graciously pleased to approve and confirm the undermentioned Acts, passed by the Governor and Council, in the fourth year of Her Majesty's reign, subject to the amendments hereafter mentioned, viz:—

- 1.—"*An Act to simplify proceedings at Law or in Equity, by or against the 'General Steam Navigation Company,' and for other purposes therein mentioned,*" (12th August, 1840,) subject to a supplementary enactment to be passed, providing for the case, in which the Company

might omit or delay or neglect, to appoint a Secretary, in the event of the death, resignation, or removal of that Officer.

2.—“An Act to enable the Proprietors of a certain Joint Stock Company, carried on in the Town of Melbourne, in the Colony of New South Wales, under the name, style, and firm, of the ‘Melbourne Fire and Marine Assurance Company,’ to sue and be sued in the name of the Chairman of the said Joint Stock Company for the time being, and for other purposes therein mentioned,” (20th October, 1840,) subject to a supplementary enactment to be passed providing for the case, in which the Company might omit or delay or neglect, to appoint a Chairman, in the event of the death, resignation, or removal of that Officer.

QUIT RENTS.

THE Colonial Treasurer having reported that he is now prepared to enter upon the collection of Quit Rents, His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the re-publication of the Notice on this subject, dated 4th September, 1841.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that the Collectors of Quit Rents are to pay into the Colonial Treasury, on the 15th day of each month, the amount of their respective collections for the preceding month, accompanied by a statement of particulars.

The Collectors will also furnish to each person from whom they may receive Quit Rents, a memorandum of the amount, and of the Grant for which it may be paid; and it is requested that this document may be forwarded, without delay, to the Colonial Treasurer, who will thereupon issue a receipt for the Quit Rent paid, in his own name.

QUIT RENTS.

THE collection proposed by the Government Notice of 1st January, 1841, to have been made in the present year, of a portion of the sum due for Quit Rents having been postponed, in consequence of the temporary absence of the Colonial Treasurer, until 1842; His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that all persons indebted to the Government, on account of Quit Rents, will be required to pay the same, in whole or in part, during the next year, according to the following arrangement, viz:—

1. Collectors will be appointed in each District, and will be instructed to demand, on the 1st April next, the amount payable for the year 1841, together with an equal amount (where due) for arrears of former years.

2. If these amounts be paid within three months from the day on which they are demanded, no further payment will be required until the year

1843, when a similar demand will be made of the Quit Rent for 1842, with an equal amount for the arrears due on 31st December, 1840.

In future years a demand will in like manner be made, of double the amount due for the year immediately preceding, until all arrears be liquidated, when the amount stated in the Deed of Grant will alone be demanded yearly.

3. If not paid within three months from the date of the first demand, the Collectors will be authorized to proceed by distress or arrest; and in every such case the whole amount due will be levied at once.

4. For such sums as the Collectors may obtain, they will be allowed five per cent. if the money be paid voluntarily, and ten per cent. if recovered by distress or arrest.

5. Such persons as, before the 1st of April next, may pay into the Treasury, at Sydney, the amount proposed to be levied in the ensuing year, will be allowed a deduction of five per cent., being the per centage that would otherwise be paid to the Collectors.

6. During the present and succeeding year, namely, until the 31st December, 1842, but not afterwards, all persons whatever will be permitted to redeem their Quit Rents, whether for Town Allotments or Portions of Land, and whether the Deed of Grant contain any covenant for redemption, or not, on payment of ten years' rent and all arrears due, into the Treasury.

In such cases, the Discount of five per cent. will be allowed on the arrears, if paid before the 1st of April next, but not on the sum paid for the redemption of the Rents.

#### CHURCH GRANTS.

THE following descriptions of GRANTS of LAND and TOWN ALLOTMENTS, which have at various periods been appropriated to

the purposes of the UNITED CHURCH of ENGLAND and IRELAND, as hereunder more particularly mentioned, are published for general information, in order that all parties concerned may have an opportunity of correcting any errors or omissions that may have been made inadvertently.

At the expiration of one month from this date, if no Caveat be lodged, or other cause of uncertainty appear, Deeds of Grant for the respective portions of Land and Allotments will be executed in favor of the approved Trustees in each case, under the provisions of the Acts of the Colonial Legislature, 7 William IV., No. 3, and 8 William IV., No. 5, viz:—

1. APPIN, 40, Forty acres, county of Cumberland, *parish of Appin*; commencing at the junction of Foggeroi-street and Illawarra-street; bounded on the north by Foggeroi-street, bearing west 10 degrees, north 32 chains; on the west by the public Road, bearing south 10 degrees, west 16 chains 90 links; on the south by the same road, bearing east 33 chains; and on the east by Illawarra-street, bearing north 10 degrees, east 10 chains and 90 links.

Authorised by Sir Richard Bourke as a Glebe.

2. BUNGONIA, 40, Forty acres, county of Argyle, *parish of Bungonia*; bounded on the north by a line west 21 chains, commencing at Bungonia Creek, north 14 degrees, west 2 chains and 50 links from the south-west corner of the town of Bungonia; on the west by a line south 25 chains 50 links; and on the south and east by Bungonia Creek.

CASTLEREAGH, 3r. 13p., Three roods and thirteen perches, county of Cumberland, *parish of Castlereagh*, town of Castlereagh, allotment No. 38; bounded on the north-east by allotment No. 37, being a line bearing east 34 degrees, south 3 chains; on the south-east by a line bearing south 34 degrees, west 2 chains 79 links; on the south-west by ——— street, being a line bearing west 34 degrees, north 3 chains; and on the north-

wes by ——— street, being a line bearing north 34 degrees, east 2 chains 79 links.

GOULBURN, 1, One acre, county of Argyle, *parish of Goulburn*, opposite the junction of the Mulwarree Ponds with the Wollondilly River, at the old township of Goulburn; bounded on the north by a line west 280 links; on the west by a line south 360 links; on the south by a line east 280 links; and on the east by a line north 360 links.

9. HAWKESBURY RIVER, 2r. 20p., Two roods and twenty perches, county of Cumberland, *parish of Cornelia*, at Wiseman's; bounded on the south-west by a line north-west 2 chains 80 links, commencing at the Hunter's River Road; on the north-west by a line north-east 2 chains 50 links; on the north-east by a line south-east 2 chains and 25 links to the Hunter's River Road; and on the south-east by that road.

10. HAWKESBURY RIVER, 8a. 1r., Eight acres and one rood, county of Cumberland, *parish of Frederick*, about two miles below Wiseman's; commencing at the mouth of a creek opposite Joshua Rose's grant of 134 acres, on the Hawkesbury River; bounded on the east by the creek 6 chains; on the north by the Hawkesbury River 15 chains; and on all other sides by the rocks.

MACQUARIE, 39a. 2r., Thirty-nine acres and two roods, *parish of Macquarie*, at the junction of Koolunbung and Wright's Creeks; bounded on the north by Wright's Creek 8 chains, (commencing at the junction of the two creeks); on the east by a line south 14 chains 80 links; on the south by a line west 27 chains to the Koolunbung Creek; and on the west by that creek to the junction of the creeks.

QUALITIES OF THE SUPPLIES.

1. All the articles shall be of the best quality of their several kinds.
2. The Bread shall be the produce of clean, sound Colonial Wheat, Barley and Maize, from which, on the Military Ration 20 per cent., and on the Convict Ration 10 per cent., has been extracted in bran and waste. The Wheaten Bread shall be made in loaves of 3lbs, and the Mixed Bread in loaves of 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. each, and baked 24 hours before being issued.
3. The Fresh Meat for the Military Ration shall be in the proportion of 5lbs. of Beef and 2lbs. of Mutton, Weekly, deliverable alternately in fore and hind quarters, when the quantity admits of it; for the Convict Rations, the Beef shall be delivered in the same manner; Salted Beef being issued only in summer to Road Parties, and when authorised.
4. The Maize Meal shall be similar in quality to the Wheaten Meal, and shall be twice ground.
5. The Vegetables for the Hospitals and other Establishments entitled thereto, shall be supplied in reasonable proportions of Potatoes, Greens, Pumpkins, Onions, &c.  
The Rum shall be West India, five per cent. under proof.

MODE OF DELIVERY.

6. No part whatever of the Supplies above specified shall be received in charge of the Commissariat, but shall all be delivered by the Contractor direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, upon the written order of the Commissariat Officer in charge of the District, or of the person authorised for that purpose.
7. At the several fixed Stations the Rations for the Troops, the Convict Establishments, and Road and other parties, shall be delivered by the Contractor at the Barracks, Establishments, or Huts, where the Parties to be supplied are stationed; being previously to removal from the Contractor's Premises approved by a Person authorised for the purpose.
8. The Forage shall be delivered by the Contractor at the Establishments where the Horses or Cattle are stationed; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species shall be reckoned as the proportion of the Ration undermentioned, viz. :—

The Maize or Barley	4-12ths.

**GENERAL CONDITIONS.**

9. Parties tendering may do so by either of the three following modes, at their option, viz. :—

1. The whole of the Supplies of every description, in each District, may be included in one Tender, as at present.

2. Or the Supplies may be tendered in sub-divisions, as below, by a separate Tender for each sub-division, viz. :—

1. The Military Ration.
2. The several Rations for Convicts are described from 2 to 8, inclusive.
3. The Ration of Forage.
4. The Ration of Fuel and Light.
5. The supplies for Hospitals.
6. The Supplies for the Penal Settlements, (Sydney).

3. Or the various articles comprising the several Rations referred to, as well as all those required for Hospitals and other purposes, may be tendered separately or singly, by weight and measure. The undersigned reserving to himself the power of accepting Tenders for supplying by any of these modes, which he may find most expedient.

18. Flour in place of bread to be given for the Military Ration, when required, in the proportion of 14 2.7th ozs. of the former, for 16 ozs. of the latter.

20. The Rations and Articles particularised under the head of Provisions, No. 1 to 12, may be required not only for the purposes specified, but also for any other purpose of the Military, Naval, and Convict services, should there be occasion for it.
