PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the second year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act further to restrain the unauthorised occupation of Crown Lands, and to provide the means of defraying the expense of a Border Police," it is amongst other things enacted, that for the purpose therein stated, the Crown Lands of this Colony, adjacent to and beyond the limits

allotted for location, shall be divided into so many Districts, and that each District shall extend to and be comprised within such boundaries as the Governor shall, from time to time, appoint by any Proclamation by him made and published in the *Government Gazette*; and Whereas, by Proclamations, bearing date, respectively, the twenty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty, and the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, the said Lands were divided into certain Districts, and whereas it is expedient to add another District, to be called the Moreton Bay District.

Now I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, in virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim that the following are the boundaries of the same, viz:—

MORETON BAY DISTRICT—Bounded on the south by the ranges which separate the sources of the Rivers Brisbane and Logan from those of the Richmond and the Clarence; on the west by the range dividing the sources of the rivers flowing into the western interior from those which fall to the eastern coast; on the east by that coast; and on the northward by the limits of Colonisation, until a more definite boundary shall be determined on that side.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Government House, Sydney, this Fifth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and forty-two, in the Fifth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the re-publication, from the *London Gazette*, of the 13th August, 1841,

of the following Order in Council, relating to Austrian Vessels, arriving from certain Ports of the Danube.

By His Excellency's Command,
E. DEAS THOMSON.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 23rd day of June, 1841.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act, made in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect certain stipulations contained in a treaty of commerce and navigation between Her Majesty and the Emperor of Austria, and to empower Her Majesty to declare, by Order in Council, that ports, which are the most natural and convenient shipping ports of states, within whose dominions they are not situated, may, in certain cases, be considered, for all purposes of trade with Her Majesty's dominions, as the national ports of such states," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that, from and after the passing of the said Act, it should be lawful, notwithstanding any thing contained in the Act of the third and fourth of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, for Her Majesty, from time to time, to declare by Her Order in Council, to be published in the *London Gazette*, that all Austrian vessels arriving from the ports of the Danube, as far as Galatz, inclusively, should, together with their cargoes, whether such cargoes were the produce of Austria or not, be admitted into the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of all possessions of Her Majesty, exactly in the same manner as if such vessels came direct from Austrian ports; and that thereupon, and for so long a time as such Order should be declared to be in force, or remain unrevoked, it should be lawful to import into the British dominions from such Ports of the Danube, in Austrian ships, any goods which, by the laws in force at the time of such importation, might be there imported in Austrian ships from Austrian ports.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased, in pursuance of the power and authority in Her vested by the said Act, to order and declare, and doth hereby order and declare, that all Austrian vessels arriving from the said ports of the Danube, as far as Galatz inclusively, shall, together with their cargoes, whether such cargoes shall be the produce of Austria or not, be admitted into the Ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of all possessions of Her Majesty, exactly in the same manner as if such vessels came direct from Austrian ports.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the re-publication, from the *London Gazette* of the 14th December, 1841, of the following Order in Council.

By His Excellency's Command,

At the Court at Windsor, the 10th day of December, 1841.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by the late Act of Uniformity, which establisheth the Liturgy, and enacts, that no form or Order of Common Prayer be openly used other than what is prescribed or appointed to be used in and by the said Book, it is notwithstanding provided, that in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects which do anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the names be altered and changed from time to time, and fitted to the present occasion, according to direction of lawful authority: Her Majesty was pleased this day in Council to declare Her Royal will and pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Litanies, and Collects for the Royal Family, the words "The Prince of Wales" be inserted immediately after the words "The Prince Albert."

And Her Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this amendment; and that in the meantime, till copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this realm do (for the preventing of mistakes), with the pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing directions: And for the better notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.
