By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain General, and Governor in Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, with the advice of the Legislative Council.

"An Act for applying certain sums arising from the Revenue receivable in New South Wales, to the service thereof, for the year One thousand eight hundred and forty-three, and for further appropriating the said Revenue."

WHEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the Ninth year of the Reign of His Preamble. late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled *"An Act to provide for the administration of Justice in New South Wales Cap. 83. and Van Diemen's Land, and for the more effectual Government thereof, and for other purposes relating thereto,"* it was among other things enacted, that all and every the powers and authorities vested by certain other Acts of Parliament therein referred to, or either of them, in the Governor of New South Wales, or the person administering the Government thereof, should thenceforth be vested in and exercised by the said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony; and that the produce of the several duties imposed and made payable under and by virtue of the said recited Acts therein referred to, and also under and by virtue of that Act, should be applied in such manner, and to such purposes, as the said Governor and Council should from time to time, by any Law or Ordinance appoint: Be it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of New

South Wales, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, That out of the sum of One hundred and twenty-eight thousand and seventy-five pounds, five shillings, and sevenpence, being the excess of the amount appropriated for the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and forty-one, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding twenty-nine thousand two hundred and twenty-five pounds, sixteen shillings, and ten-pence, to supply the deficiencies in the amount appropriated for certain Departments and Services for that year.

(There shall and may be issued and applied £18,065 5s. 11d., for Supplementary Expenditure, for the year 1842, viz:—)

II. And be it enacted, That out of the produce of the said Duties there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding eighteen thousand and sixty-five pounds, five shillings, and eleven-pence, to defray the Supplementary charge on the Colonial Treasury, for the year One thousand eight hundred and forty-two, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and eight pounds, six shillings and eight-pence, to meet the half salary of the Colonial Treasurer, absent on leave from first October, one thousand eight hundred and forty, to twenty-eighth February, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and ninety pounds, to defray the Supplementary expense of the Auditor General's Department; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seventy-six pounds, and fifteen shillings, to defray the Supplementary expense of the Colonial Storekeeper's Department; and any sum or

sums of money not exceeding nine hundred and thirty-three pounds, six shillings, and eight-pence, to defray the Supplementary expense of the Roman Catholic Church; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding ninety-six pounds, and five shillings, to defray the Supplementary expense of Presbyterian Schools; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and twenty-nine pounds, six shillings, and six-pence, in aid of Private Contributions to a like amount, for the Sydney Dispensary; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seventy-one pounds, and nineteen shillings, in aid of Private Contributions to a like amount, for the Australian School Society; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand and sixty-one pounds, six shillings, and four-pence, as a Gratuity to Sir Thomas Mitchell, Surveyor General, for Services while employed in exploring the Interior beyond the Boundaries of Location, from the sixth day of April to the fourteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and from the seventeenth day of March to the twenty-eighth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, in all, three hundred and eighty-eight days, at One thousand pounds per annum; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding One thousand five hundred pounds, to meet the Drafts of the respective Officers of Ordnance, for erecting the New Military Barracks, Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand eight hundred and ninety pounds, fourteen shillings, and two-pence, towards erecting the New Gaol at Bathurst, being the sum remaining unexpended on thirty-first December, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one, of the amount appropriated for the erection of the New Gaol and Court House; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five thousand and eighty-three pounds, and two shillings, towards erecting the New Gaol at Goulburn, being inclusive of the sum of three thousand and eighty-three pounds, and two shillings, remaining unexpended on thirty-first December, One thousand eight hundred and forty-one; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand pounds, towards erecting the New Gaol at Maitland, being a portion of the sum of Six thousand three hundred and twenty-seven pounds, seventeen shillings, and three-pence, appropriated for the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and forty-one, but not expended in that year; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds, towards building a Court and Watch House at Murrumbidgee, being a moiety of the sum of five hundred pounds, appropriated for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, but not expended in that year; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and seventy-four pounds, seven shillings, and six pence, to cover the expense of additional work to the Gaol at Berrima; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and twenty-five pounds, to defray the cost of three Camels; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and seventy-four pounds, seventeen shillings, and one penny, to defray the Supplementary expense of Establishments and Services at Port Phillip.

(There shall and may be issued and applied

III. VI. And be it enacted, That out of the produce of the said Duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding thirty-one thousand three hundred and eighty-one pounds, and ten shillings, for defraying the charge of the Church Establishments of the said Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding eleven thousand four hundred and eighty-one pounds, and ten shillings, to defray the expense of the Establishment of the United Church of England and Ireland; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand and six hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the Presbyterian Church; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding nine hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of the Wesleyan Methodist Mission; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand three hundred and fifty pounds, to defray the expense of the establishment of the Roman Catholic Church; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding twelve thousand pounds, to meet unforeseen demands to which the Government is pledged under the Church Act, including building of Churches for all denominations, and salaries of Clergymen

who may arrive in the Colony, with permission of the Secretary of State.

And be it enacted, That out of the produce of the said Duties, there shall and may be issued and applied any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight thousand and four hundred pounds, to defray the charge of Miscellaneous Services of the said Colony, for the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, as hereinafter more particularly expressed; that is to say, any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred pounds, towards the support of the Sydney School of Arts; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand and two

hundred pounds, to defray the expense of Stationery, Bookbinding, Gazettes, and Almanacks, for the several Colonial Departments; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred pounds, to defray the expense of Furniture for Public Offices; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred pounds, to defray the expense of Fuel and Light for Public Offices; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the expense of conveying stores to the several Public Departments; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred pounds, to defray the expense of lighting the Government Lamps, in the City of Sydney; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the passage of Convicts transported to Van Diemen's Land; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, to meet unforeseen expenses, on occasions of emergency, and to be hereafter accounted for.

a Wharf at Portland; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a Gaol at Melbourne; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a Court House at Melbourne; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of erecting a Police Office at Melbourne; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of building a Watch House at Portland; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred and fifty pounds, towards defraying the expense of building a Police Office at Williams' Town; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eight thousand pounds, towards defraying the expense of other Public Works and Buildings; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four thousand pounds, to defray the expense of the Ecclesiastical Establishments; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the School Establishments; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred and ninety-four pounds, and ten-pence, to defray the expense of the Medical Establishment; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding eighty pounds, to defray the salary of the Tipstaff to His Honor the Resident Judge; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding seven hundred pounds, to defray the expense of the Law Officers of the Crown; and any sum or sums of money, not exceeding nine hundred and thirty-nine pounds, and ten shillings, to defray the expense of the Supreme Court; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding six hundred and eighty-five pounds, to defray the expense of the Establishment of the Deputy Sheriff; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three hundred and ten pounds, to defray the allowances for travelling and attendance, to Witnesses and Jurors; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding five hundred and thirty-five pounds, to defray the expense of Courts of Requests; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two hundred and twenty-six pounds, to defray the salary of a Coroner, and the expense of Inquests; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand three hundred and ninety-four pounds, to defray the expense of the Water Police; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one hundred and sixty-four pounds, and five shillings, to defray the expense of the Police at Williams' Town; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand one hundred, and twenty-four pounds, three shillings, and nine-pence, to defray the expense of the Police at Geelong; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand and ninety-six pounds, eight shillings, and nine-pence, to defray the expense of the Police at Portland; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred and thirty-one pounds, thirteen shillings, and nine-pence, to defray the expense of the Police at the Grange; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred and thirty-seven pounds, thirteen shillings, and nine-pence, to defray the expense of the Police at Port Fairy; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred and thirty-seven pounds, thirteen shillings, and nine-pence, to defray the expense of the Police at the Grampians, and

Pyrenees; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding four hundred and thirty-seven pounds, thirteen shillings, and nine-pence, to defray the expense of the Police at Goulburn or Broken River; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand six hundred and ninety-five pounds, fifteen shillings, and ten-pence, to defray the expense of the Mounted Police; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding three thousand six hundred and fifty-one pounds, twelve shillings, and six-pence, to defray the expense of the Border Police; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand six hundred and seventy-five pounds, and five shillings, to defray the expense of the Native Police; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding one thousand seven hundred and twenty-two pounds, two shillings, and one penny, to defray the expense of the Melbourne Gaol; and any sum or sums of money not exceeding two thousand pounds, to defray Miscellaneous expenses.

(Treasurer to pay the above at such times as the Governor by warrant shall order.)

XV. And be it enacted, That the Treasurer of the said Colony shall issue and pay the said several sums, to such persons, for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, upon such days, and in such proportions, as the Governor for the time being, by any warrant or order in writing, to be signed by him, shall from time to time order and direct; and that the payments so to be made, shall be charged upon, and payable out of, the Revenues of the said Colony.

(And to receive credit in his accounts for payments made in pursuance thereof.)

XVI. And be it enacted, That the said Treasurer shall, in his accounts, from time to time, be allowed credit for any sum or sums of money paid by him, in pursuance of such warrant or order in writing as aforesaid; and that the receipt or receipts of the respective persons to whom the same shall be so paid, shall be a full and valid discharge to the said Treasurer, in passing his said accounts, for any such sum or sums as shall be therein mentioned; and that he shall and do receive credit for the same accordingly.

An Act for directing the application of all Fines imposed for Drunkenness.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Second Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act for consolidating and amending

"the Laws relating to the Licensing of Public Houses, and for further regulating the sale and consumption of Fermented and Spirituous Liquors in New South Wales," it is amongst other things enacted and declared, that the Law of England, imposing fine and punishment for drunkenness, is applicable to this Colony, and that all fines imposed, however disposable by the Law of England, shall be distributed within the Colony in like manner as other fines and penalties recoverable under the said recited Act; and whereas it is expedient to repeal so much of the said recited Act as relates to the distribution and disposition of all fines for drunkenness, whether imposed under the said Law of England, or the said recited Act, and to apply the same in the manner hereinafter directed: Be

it therefore enacted, by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, That the same, so far as relates to the disposition and distribution of the said fines, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

(All Fines for Drunkenness, not exceeding 5s., to be paid to the Benevolent Asylum; if exceeding 5s., one half to informer, and the residue to the Benevolent Asylum.)

11. And be it enacted, That all fines which shall, after the passing of this Act, be imposed for drunkenness under the Law of England, so declared to be applicable as aforesaid, or under the said recited Act, shall be appropriated in manner following, that is to say;—if not exceeding the sum of five shillings, the whole shall be paid to

the Treasurer, or other authorised Officer of any Benevolent Asylum, or other Charitable Institution or Society, established or to be established in the district of the Colony where the case shall be heard, for the relief of such poor persons as through age, sickness, accident, or other infirmity, are unable to support themselves; and if exceeding the sum of five shillings, then in such proportion, not exceeding one half, to the informer, as the Justice or Justices before whom the case shall be heard may in his or their discretion direct, and the residue, to the Treasurer, or other authorised Officer of any such Benevolent Asylum, or other Charitable Institution or Society as aforesaid: Provided that in any district in which there is no Benevolent Asylum, or other Charitable Institution, or Society, the said fines, or portion of the same as aforesaid, shall be paid towards the support of the Benevolent Society in the City of Sydney.
