PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General, and Governor-in-chief of the Territory of New South Wales; and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the fifth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act further to amend an Act, intituled 'An Act for the better preservation of the Ports, Harbours, Havens, Roadsteads, Channels, Navigable Creeks and Rivers, in New South Wales, and the better regulation of Shipping in the same,'" it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council of the said Colony, from time to time, to frame Rules and Regulations to be observed by the Masters and Commanders of all Ships or Vessels in the Harbour of Port Jackson, and that all such Rules and Regulations shall take effect at the expiration of one month from the date of being promulgated by Proclamation, and published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*.

Now therefore, I, the Governor aforesaid, with the advice of the said Executive Council, do hereby order and direct, that in future, no combustible matter, such as pitch, tar, resin, or oil, shall be heated on board of any Ship or Vessel, either in Sydney Cove or Darling Harbour, but that all such combustible matters shall be heated either on shore, or in a boat astern at a proper distance from such Ship or Vessel;—And any person who shall offend against this Regulation, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five pounds, nor more than thirty pounds, for every such offence, as provided in the second clause of the said Act of the Governor and Council, 5 Victoria, No. 18.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General, and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the GOVERNOR of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the second year of His late Majesty's reign; intituled "An Act for repealing so much of an Act, intituled 'An Act to continue until further provision shall be made, certain Duties, Tolls, Rates, Fees, or other sums of money imposed by the Governors of New South Wales,' and for other purposes as relates to the levying of Tolls in New South Wales, and for raising a fund towards making, repairing, and upholding Public Roads, Bridges, and Ferries, and for regulating the collection of Tolls thereon;"

it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the said Colony for the time being, by any Proclamation or Proclamations under his hand, from time to time, to appoint places at which Tolls shall be collected, and to cause the same to be collected upon any line of Road which has been or shall be wholly or partly made, and which is repaired at the Public expense, and to cause Toll to be collected at any Bridge, built, purchased, or repaired at the Public expense, and at any Ferry constructed or upheld at the same, and to cause such Gates, Bars, Chains, Rails and Fences, to be built and set up, as shall be deemed necessary for preventing Passengers, Beasts, and Carriages, from passing, unless there shall be then paid such Toll as shall be due or demandable under the authority of the said recited Act; And whereas, by my Proclamations, bearing date respectively, the 20th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two; the 6th day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six; and the 31st day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty, certain places were appointed for the collection of certain Tolls whereat they have been collected, and it has become necessary to appoint a place on the River Hunter, at the intersection of the new line of road from East Maitland to Paterson Township,

and a place on the Brisbane River between North and South Brisbane, Moreton Bay, for that purpose; Now I, the Governor aforesaid, in pursuance of the authority vested in me by the said recited Law or Ordinance, do by this my Proclamation, appoint the crossing on the River Hunter, at the intersection of the new line of Road from East Maitland to Paterson Township, and the crossing on the Brisbane River, between North and South Brisbane, Moreton Bay, to be places in addition to those formerly named, at which Ferries shall be established, and at which Tolls shall be collected, to the amount and under the Regulations, restrictions, and provisions of the said recited Ordinance, of which Ferries all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice, according to the provisions of the said recited Law or Ordinance.

TEN POUNDS REWARD.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, and the Orphan Schools, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in Bran and Waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz:—1½ wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit, equal to 1½ of bread; 1½ salt beef or 1½ mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1½ of fresh beef. These substitutions are not, however, to be made except on the requisition of the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan Schools, and to the Institution for destitute Roman Catholic Children, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

The supplies for road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:—

The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the Parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when

required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the

Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor General, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benches of the several Districts; and no Tender will be attended to unless accompanied by an agreement, in writing, signed by at least two solvent parties, stating their willingness to become sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which, the Contracts will be again advertised, another Tender accepted, or the supplies otherwise provided for.

The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under

authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise, to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering, or an Agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract.
