2. In Corporate Towns the Mayor to be the Re-

turning Officer, and in other places a Returning Officer to be appointed by the Governor.

- 3. Writs for the Election of Members to be issued by the Governor to the Returning Officer, in which Writs the day for holding the Election, and the day on which the same shall be returnable, shall be
- 4. Convenient Polling places to be appointed in the several Electoral Districts. The Returning Officer to preside at the chief Polling place, and to have power to appoint Deputies at the other Polling places.
- 5. The Election to commence and be concluded in

- 7. Such Officers to give notice requiring Voters to send in their claims.

- 10. Lists of Voters in the Electoral Districts to be revised by persons appointed for that purpose.
- 11. Persons making Lists to attend when required before the Revising Officers.
- 12. Revising Officers to have power to insert in the District Lists, the names of claimants omitted, on due proof of claim and qualification.
- 13. Expenses at the first Elections to be paid out of the Funds of the Colony, and in subsequent Elections out of the local Funds of Incorporated Districts.
- 14. No enquiry to be made at the time of Election, except as to the identity of the Voter, the continuance of his qualification, and whether he has voted before at the same Election.
- 15. Certified copies of the Register of Voters to be furnished to each Booth.
- 16. Powers of Deputies of Returning Officers to be defined.
- 17. To provide penalties on Officers for breach of duty.
- 18. No Election to be void by any unavoidable delay or impediment in the time of holding the

#### CONDITIONS,

#### QUALITIES OF THE SUPPLIES.

- 1. All the articles shall be of the best quality of their several kinds.
- 2. The Bread shall be the produce of clean, sound, Wheat, Barley, and Maize, from which, on the Military Ration 20 per cent., and on the Convict Ration 10 per cent., has been extracted in bran and waste. The Wheaten Bread shall be made in loaves of 3lbs., and the Mixed Bread in loaves of  $3\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. each, and baked 24 hours before being issued; and parties Tendering are requested to observe, that the most rigid adherence to the conditions as to the quality of the Bread, shall be invariably enforced.
- 3. The Fresh Meat for the Military Ration shall be in the proportion of 5lbs. of Beef, and 2lbs. of Mutton, weekly, deliverable alternately in fore and hind quarters when the quantity admits of it; for the Convict Rations, the Beef shall be delivered in the same manner; Salted Beef being issued only in summer to Road Parties, and when authorised.
- 4. The Maize Meal shall be similar in quality to the Wheaten Meal, and shall be twice ground.
