NOTICE is hereby given that the following Bye-Laws, made and passed by the Town Council of Melbourne, in accordance with the 91st section of the Melbourne Municipal Corporation Act, will come into force on and after the 16th instant.

BYE-LAW, NO 1.

Of Town Council of Melbourne, made and passed 4th April, 1843.

WHEREAS the establishment of a Cattle Market for the convenience and benefit of the inhabitants of Melbourne has become absolutely necessary, and great evil must necessarily arise from any delay in the establishment thereof; be it therefore ordered and directed by the Mayor, men and Councillors of the town of Melbourne, that a Market be established for the sale of cattle, horses, and other live stock, subject to such regulations as may have been heretofore adopted by the late Market Commissioners; or, as may hereafter, from time to time, be adopted by the Town Council of Melbourne, on the reserve on the north boundary of the town, adjoining the late cattle Market reserve defined in a schedule hereunto annexed marked A, and the said Cattle Market shall be the only place within the said town where any market for the sale of cattle or other live stock shall be held or kept; and if any person shall sell or expose for sale, any cattle or other live stock in any of the streets, lanes, entries, or other public passages or places other than the place appointed as the Cattle Market aforesaid, every such person shall, on conviction thereof before any one or more Justices of the Peace for the said town, forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of five pounds.

SCHEDULE A.

All that piece or parcel of land, situate on the northern boundary of the town of Melbourne, and lying within the said town, containing by admeasurement one acre more or less, bounded on the north by the southern boundary line of the reserve known as the late Cattle Market, being a line bearing east ten chains from the south-west corner of said reserve, on the east by a line bearing south one chain and the south by a line bearing west ten chains, and on the west by a line bearing north one chain.

BYE-LAW, NO 2.

Of Town Council of Melbourne, made and passed 4th April, 1843.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 6 Victoria, No 7, intitled "an Act to incorporate the inhabitants of the town of Melbourne," the Town Council of Melbourne is authorised and required from time to time, to estimate, as correct, as may be, what amount will be sufficient for the payment of the expenses to be incurred in carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act; and whereas, in order to raise the amount so estimated, the said Town Council is by the said Act, authorised and required from time to time, to order a town rate to be made within the said town, and to direct an assessment to be made of every building within the limits of the said town, according to its full fair and average annual value,

clear of all outgoings, subject to certain provisions in the said Act contained; and whereas, on the assessment so made, the said Council is authorised and required, from time to time, to cause to be levied such rate or rates, not exceeding one shilling in the pound in any one year, as to the said Council shall seem proper. Be it therefore directed by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the town of Melbourne, that in order to raise the amount required to carry into effect the provisions of the Corporation Act during the present year, a town rate of one shilling in the pound shall be levied on the assessment made under the authority of the said Council, payable at such times and in such manner as the said Council may from time to time direct.
