GENTLEMEN.—I offer myself to your notice as a candidate for the honor of being elected one of your Representatives in the new Legislative Council, with some diffidence, because of the well founded objection to elect a Civil Officer. But for this I should have come more readily forward to solicit your suffrages, when invited to do so by the enlightened and independent electors of Melbourne.

I have endeavoured to make known to our countrymen at home, the valuable resources of that portion of Australia, all still dormant nevertheless; the rich soil unavailable to them, and scarcely tenable by you; and you may be well assured that any measures likely to promote the interests of both countries, by peopling the one with the redundant population of the other, should have my unbiassed and determined support.

I appeal to such of you as I had the pleasure of seeing in London, whether I have overrated the intrinsic value of the country; and I trust the result of this appeal will prove by your favorable support, that I have not been guilty of exaggeration, and that "the goodness of the land" is such as I have described it. Associated as my name has the honor to be with the discovery of Australia Felix, and having contributed in no inconsiderable degree by my private and personal influence in England to make its value known; I yield to no man in an intense anxiety to see that fine province done justice to in every respect; and I appeal to my past history while in this Colony, whether its physical improvement has not been paramount with me to every personal consideration.

Gentlemen—I have no declarations to make respecting grounds of old political differences at home, having lived so much in Australia myself that I scarcely understand them. I trust the New Legislature will deliberate wisely on all vital questions arising out of the present depressed condition of the Colony, and be unanimous in the adoption of vigorous measures to revive it and restore its prosperity. As such measures cannot be now foreseen I shall only urge in further support of my claims to your confidence, that I have past the best years of my life in the service of this country; that it is the birth-place of the greater portion of my numerous family, and that I am strongly prepossessed in favour of Australia Felix as the probable future home of some of my children.

The survey and development of the capabilities of the Southern District has formed part of my official duty; your interests and my duty are already identical; and by electing me as one of your representatives, you would bring that geographical knowledge for which the country has paid already into practical utility for its farther colonization, division, and improvement.
