It was resolved at a special meeting of the trustees held on the 31st January 1843, his Honor the Super-intendent being present and approving of the same, that out of the surplus balance in favor of the bank, in addition to the 5 per cent already placed at the credit of the depositors, 2½ per cent should be added to the accounts, making the interest on deposits in the bank on 31st December 1842 at the rate of 7½ per cent per annum, with the exception of the amount at the credit of intestate estates, on which the trustees consider 5 per cent is sufficient. The sum of £11 11s 2d, having been set apart towards the establishment of a Rest or Security Fund, in conformity with the Act of the Governor and Council 5 Victoria, No. 5, it was resolved that the remainder be reserved to pay current expenses.

## LOOSE LETTERS BY SHIPS.

WHEREAS, their being reasonable grounds for believing that a great number of Letters which should properly be passed through the Post office are transmitted by vessels independent of the post, the following notice is republished here for general information.

Colonial Secretary's Office,
Sydney, 21st September, 1840.

POST OFFICE.

The Postmaster-General having brought under total the practice which is understood to prescribe

notice the practice which is understood to prevail of bags or mails of letters being made up by merchants and others for despatch, by vessels sailing chants and others for despatch, by vessels sailing for Great Britain or elsewhere, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that under the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 5th William IV. No 24, section 22, any person sending letters or packets chargeable with postage, otherwise than by post, is liable to a penalty of not less than \$2, nor more than \$20, for every such letter or packet so vent, and that orders have been given for atrictly enforcing the penalty in future. His Excellency at the same time directs it to be notified, that masters of vessels render themselves liable to the same penalty, by render themselves liable to the same penalty, by seceiving any letter or packet, on board, except through the Post Office; but that they will be entitled to receive one penny for each letter, or packet sent to them by the Postmaster-Goneral, or Postmaster of the place from which they may be about to depart.

By His Excellency's Command E. DEASTHOMSON. To afford every facility for despatch of letters by vessels leaving the Colopy, mails will at all times be kept open until the latest hour possible, yet leaving time for transmit to the Harbour for shipment. But it: must be evidently to the interest of Merchants themselves and of ship agents to afford information to the Postmaster as early as possibe, of any intended additional delay in the departure of vessels, that his arrangement may the departure of vessels, that his arrangment may also be altered, to meet the same where practicable.
