REWARDS FOR THE DISCOVERY OF ILLICIT DISTILLATION.

to direct, that the following rules shall be established in rewarding persons who either directly or indirectly may give information to any Inspector of distilleries or other officer of government, leading to the seizure of an unlicensed Still in any part of the Colony; or information leading to the conviction of any person engaged either as a principal or authorised agent in any licensed distillery or rectifying establishment, of any offence against the laws which exist for their regulation; or to the discovery of any practices in or connected with such establishment, by which the revenue is defrauded.

1. The reward to be paid will be a sum of not less than ten pounds nor more than fifty pounds, to be determined by the Governor according to the circumstances of each case and the value of the seizure.

2. The person on whose information the seizure is made is the one entitled to the reward, but if information be given at the same time by two or more individuals, the persons giving it will be jointly or collectively entitled to the reward!

3. If separate information be given to different Officers at or about the same time, or if from any other cause a difficulty arise in determining the party or parties entitled to the reward, their several claims will either the decided on by the Governor, or by officers of the government to whom they may by His Excellency be referred.

4. Expenses necessarily incurred in making any, seizure, including remuneration to parties assisting in making it, are to be paid out of the reward in

such manner as may have been previously agreed upon, or (if there has been no agreement,) in such manner or in such proportions as the Governor may direct.

5. There being reason to believe that Stills have occasionally been put up for the sole purpose of obtaining the reward promised for their discovery, no reward will in future be given for the discovery of any Still which may seem to have been erected for such a purpose only.

6. In every case where a seizure may be made, the report forwarded to the Government respecting it is to be accompanied with an estimate of what the whole of the property seized may be expected to sell for; as well as an estimate of what the formation of the illicit distillery may have probably cost, and its capability of doing mischief.

7. These respective estimates are, in all possible cases, to be made by a board of officers of which the seizing officer is not to be a member.

8. If the person giving information be a prisoner of the crown, His Excellency will take into His most favorable consideration the claim of such person for the highest indulgence which can with propriety be granted to him.

9. The rewards and indulgence held out by this notice will; moreover, be in addition to the share in any penalty or seizure to which the informer may be entitled by the law of the Colony.

10. The regulations respecting rewards for the discovery of Illicit Distillation, as contained in the notices from this Office, dated respectively the 8th December, 1842, and 29th April, 1844, are cancelled from this date.

10. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol—8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, 4oz. yellow soap.

111. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24 oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses, to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

The 31 Districts first mentioned are the Police Districts described in the Notices from this Office, dated 15th September, 1841, and 9th August, 1842, and further particulars respecting them may be obtained from the Police Magistrates and Benches.

Separate Tenders will be required for the forage, in the District of Sydney, but the other supplies for that District are to be Tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Male and Female Orphan Schools, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract; and therefore no Tenders can be received, unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender.

Separate Tenders must also be made for the Male Orphan School, the Female Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children,

and for the Lunatic Asylum.

The Tenders for the Moreton Bay District, to specify the sum required for the supply of the following articles, daily, for Boatmen, in addition to the price of their Ration No. 7, viz. ; - 120z. tea; 1120z. sugar; loz. tobacco.

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying, and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, the Orphan Schools, and the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent, has been extracted in bran and waste,

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five

days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

The Tobacco to be Colonial.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:—1ib. wheat flour or 1ib. biscuit, equal to 1ib. of bread; 1ib. salt beef or 1ib. mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1ib. of fresh beef. These substitutions are not, however, to be made, except on the requisition of the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan Schools, and to the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

The supplies for Road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned:

The maize or barley 4:12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph,) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable mature, by a Board of Survey, composed by perzons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator; the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part,) concur in maming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature; or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Depart-

ment, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality—it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulet, not exceeding one fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor General, in order that a warrant may be prepared and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benches of the several Districts; and no Tender will be attended to unless accompanied by an agreement, in writing, signed by at least two solvent parties, stating their willingness to become sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of the acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which, the Contracts will be again advertised, another Tender accepted; or the supplies otherwise: provided for.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.

Each Tender is to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "Tender for Provisions, &c."
