PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by a certain Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend an Act intituled 'An Act to repeal an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, intituled 'An Act to authorise the erection of Pounds, and for regulating the Impounding of Cattle, and to make further and other provisions in lieu thereof, and to extend the provisions thereof,'" it was, amongst other things, enacted, that whenever the Governor, or Acting Governor for the time being, should deem it expedient and advantageous to extend the provisions of the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, so far as the same relate to any person suffering any cattle belonging to him, or in his charge, to stray or go about, or be tethered or depastured in any street or public place, within the limits or reputed limits of the several Towns in the said Act mentioned, to such other Towns now erected, or hereafter to be erected or established, at any place within the said Colony as might thereafter be deemed necessary, it should and might be lawful for the said Governor or Acting Governor for the time being, to declare the same by Proclamation, to be published in the *Government Gazette* :—

Now therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said recited act, by this my Proclamation do hereby declare, that so much of the provisions of the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, as is hereinbefore particularly specified, be extended to the Town of Queanbeyan, in the County of Murray.

### STANDING ORDERS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SYDNEY.

#### GENERAL DUTIES OF THE MAYOR, OR CHAIRMAN OF THE COUNCIL.

1. THAT the Council shall sit within one quarter of an hour after the time expressed in the summons or notice to attend; and if there be not a quorum then present, those in attendance shall depart.
2. That if at any time after the Mayor, or Chairman, has taken the Chair, one-third of the Members be not present, the Mayor shall, by his own authority, immediately adjourn the Council to the next sitting day.
3. That the Chairman shall preserve order, and that his decision on disputed points of order, shall be final.
4. That the Chairman shall not give his opinions, or argue any question in the Council, unless the votes of the Members upon a division be equal, when he may state the reasons which influence him in giving his casting vote.
5. That when the Chairman is called upon to explain a point of order or practice, he is to state the rule applicable to the case, without argument or comment.
6. That the Chairman shall put all questions, and declare the sense of the Council thereon.

No. 39. APRIL 23, 1844.—3

7. That if two or more Members rise to speak at the same time, the Chairman shall decide which Member is entitled to pre-audience.

8. That the Chairman may, without waiting for the interposition of the Council, call to order any Member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, except in explanation, and without introducing any new matter.

9. That the Chairman shall, on every motion made and seconded, put the question, first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as may be necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority.

#### GENERAL RULES FOR THE CONDUCT OF BUSINESS.

10. That the minutes of the proceedings of the Council be openly read at the commencement of each succeeding meeting.

11. That Reports from Committees shall be received before any other business, but shall not be considered or adopted without due notice thereof, pursuant to the 94th section of the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council, 6 Victoria, No. 3.

12. That all motions shall be made, and petitions presented, by Members in their places.

13. That every Member shall stand when speaking, and shall address the chair.

14. That whenever any matter of order arises, it shall be immediately taken into consideration.

15. That (except in Committee) no Member shall speak twice on the same question, unless in explanation, where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood: Provided, however, that the mover shall be allowed to reply, and that every Member shall have the liberty of speaking once on every amendment, as well as on the original motion.

16. That no Member shall digress from the matter under discussion, or make personal reflections on Members, or impute motives.

17. That when any Member shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other Member, the Member so offending, shall be required by the Chairman to withdraw the expression, and to make a satisfactory apology to the Council.

18. That a debate may be adjourned to a later hour of the same day, or to another day, as may be specified.

19. That the Member, upon whose motion any debate shall be adjourned by the Council, shall be entitled to pre-audience on the resumption of the debate.

20. That it shall be competent for any Member to divide the Council on any question, both in full Council and in Committees of the whole Council; and upon such division those who are on the affirmative side shall seat themselves on the benches on the right hand of the Chairman, and those who are on the negative shall seat themselves on the benches on his left hand; and no Members shall leave their seats till their names be taken down by the Town Clerk, or person officiating for him.

21. That previous to any division, or at any other time, strangers may be ordered to withdraw, and that in all divisions, every Member present be compelled to vote.

22. That no Member, during debate, shall be referred to by his name, but as the Alderman of his Ward, or the Councillor of his Ward.

23. That all divisions of the Council shall be entered on the minutes of the proceedings.

24. That the Orders of the Day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former Meetings, but any Member may bring forward such business as may be advisable, in the form of a Notice of Motion, such notice to be given to the Town Clerk, in writing, at some previous Meeting, or at least four days previous to the Meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration, and exhibited on the notice paper, on the outer door of the Town Hall at least three clear days previous to such Meeting; and all such Notices of Motion shall be considered in the order in which they are given, and shall take precedence of all the Orders of the Day: Provided that no such notice shall be brought on, unless the proper notice required by the 9th section of the Corporation Act shall have been given.

25. That no Member shall absent himself from the Council for two successive Meetings, without an express leave of absence from the Mayor or Council, under a penalty of ten shillings and sixpence, for each offence.

26. That any Member may require the question or matter under discussion, to be read for his information at any time during the debate, but not so as to interrupt any other Member while speaking.

#### MOTIONS.

27. That no discussion shall take place on a Notice of Motion, except with reference to fixing the day on which the motion is to be made.

28. That after the presentation of Reports and Petitions, the reading of Correspondence, and the reception of Notices of Motion, motions shall take precedence of all other business of the day.

29. That any number of amendments may be proposed on a motion before the Council; and when more than one amendment is moved and seconded the question shall first be put on the last amendment, and then on the next to the last, and so on in the inverse order in which they were moved; except when such motion or amendment shall relate to the fixing of salaries, rates, or other matters of finance, in which case the lowest sum shall be put first, then the next lowest, and so on to the highest.

30. That any motion for adjournment, if seconded, shall be immediately put without discussion; but if such motion be negatived, it shall not be competent for any member to make a similar motion until half an hour at least shall have elapsed from the period of moving the one that has been negatived.

31. That no notice shall be taken by the Chairman of any motion unless it be seconded.

32. That every member making a motion shall put it in writing, sign and deliver it to the Town Clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and every motion after being so seconded and read by the Town Clerk, shall be considered the property of the Council, and shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Council.

#### PETITIONS.

33. That Petitions and Notices of Motion shall be received immediately after the reception of Reports.

34. That on the presentation of a Petition, it shall be read at length but debate shall take place on

the prayer thereof, until notice has been given in the usual manner; and the only question that can be entertained by the Council on the day of its presentation shall be, that the Petition be received.

35. That it shall be incumbent on any member presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the language thereof, and to report to the Council, that he considers it unobjectionable.

36. That all Petitions be received only as the Petitions of the parties signing the same.

#### COMMITTEES.

37. That no Committee of the Council shall consist of less than five members.

38. That of every Committee three shall form a quorum, with the exception of a Committee of the whole Council, when nine shall form a quorum.

39. That the Chairman of every Committee shall be the convener thereof, and may direct the Town Clerk to call meetings whenever he shall think it expedient.

40. That the appointment of Special Committees shall continue until the specific duty for which they are appointed shall have been discharged: that of Standing Committees, until the next General Election of Councillors after the date of such appointment; provided, however, that such Committees may at any time be dissolved by vote of the Council after due notice.

41. That the Rules of the Council shall be observed in a Committee of the whole Council, except the rule limiting the number of times of speaking.

42. That every Report of a Committee shall be signed by the Chairman thereof.

#### MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

43. That no person holding any office of emolument under Government shall be capable of holding office under the Council.

44. That all the Officers employed by this Council, with the exception of the City Solicitor, shall devote the whole of their time to the performance of their duties.

45. That in cases where security is required, the sureties offered shall be approved by the Council, and it shall not be competent for the Council to accept as surety any of its members, or any person holding office under the Corporation.

46. That no work affecting the Funds of the City be undertaken until the probable expense be first submitted to the Finance Committee to consider and report to the Council the means of carrying the same into effect, and that all accounts to be paid by the Corporation shall be examined by the said Committee, and reported on by them, before any warrant shall be issued for the payment thereof.

47. That the Treasurer's Accounts be laid before the Council, by the Mayor, at the first meeting of each quarter, or oftener if required by the Council.

48. That whenever the Mayor shall receive a requisition, signed by at least eight members, to call a meeting of the Council to consider an Address, Memorial, Petition, or Remonstrance to the Governor, Legislative Council, or any other authority, upon any occasion, the Mayor shall call such meeting of the Council within four days of the delivery to him of such requisition, and the same shall be taken into consideration immediately after the opening of the Council, in preference to any Petition or other business, notwithstanding any Order, Rule, or By-Law to the contrary.

49.
