PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIFFS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 5th and 6th year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "*An Act for regulating the Sale of Waste Land belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies,*" I do hereby notify and proclaim, that at 11 o'clock of Wednesday, the 16th day of October next, the following portions of Crown Land will be offered for Sale by Public Auction, at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney, at the upset price affixed to each lot respectively, on the terms and conditions, and under the provisions of the above recited Act. NORFOLK ISLAND.

**H**IS Excellency the GOVERNOR has directed the re-publication, from the *Hobart Town Gazette*, of the following Letters Patent, severing Norfolk Island from the Government of New South Wales, and from the Diocese of Australia, and annexing the said Island to the Government and Colony of Van Diemen's Land, and to the Diocese of Tasmania, from and after the twenty-ninth day of September, 1844.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith,

To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Seventh Year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to amend so much of an Act of the last Session for the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land as relates to Norfolk Island," after reciting, that it is expedient that Norfolk Island should be severed from the Gov-

ernment of New South Wales, and annexed to the Government and Colony of Van Diemen's Land, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Us, by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to sever Norfolk Island from the Government of New South Wales, and annex it to the Government and Colony of Van Diemen's Land, from and after a day to be mentioned in such Letters Patent: Now know ye, that, in pursuance and exercise of the Powers so vested in Us as aforesaid, by the said recited Act of Parliament, We, of Our especial grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion, by this Commission under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, ordain and appoint, that from and after the Twenty-ninth day of September, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty-four, Our said Island, called Norfolk Island, shall be severed from the Government of New South Wales, and annexed to the Government and Colony of Van Diemen's Land. And We do hereby further will and declare, that from and after the aforesaid Twenty-ninth day of September, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty-four, Norfolk Island aforesaid shall cease to belong to the Colony of New South Wales, and shall be taken to be a part of the Colony of Van Diemen's Land. In witness whereof we have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith,

To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting.

WHEREAS His late Majesty, Our Royal Uncle, King William the Fourth, of glorious and happy memory, did, by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the Eighteenth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, in the Sixth Year of His reign, erect, found, ordain, and constitute all the Territories and Islands comprised within or dependent upon the Colonies of New South Wales, Van Diemen's Land, and Western Australia, into a Bishop's See or Diocese, and did declare and ordain that the same should be styled the Bishoprick of Australia: And whereas by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our said United Kingdom, bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-first day of August, One thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and in the Sixth Year of Our Reign, We were pleased to revoke and determine the said first recited Letters Patent, so far as the same related to the Territories and Islands comprised within or dependent upon Our said Colony of Van Diemen's Land, and to the exercise of jurisdiction spiritual or ecclesiastical, and of any other rights, privileges, and powers, by the said Bishop of

Australia and his successors in and over the said Colony of Van Diemen's Land and its Dependencies; and We did further by the said Letters Patent, erect, ordain, make, and constitute the Church of Saint David in Hobart Town, within the said Colony of Van Diemen's Land, to be a Cathedral Church and Bishop's See; and did ordain that the whole Town of Hobart Town should thenceforth be a City, and be called the City of Hobart Town; and We did, by the said Letters Patent, wholly separate, divide, and exempt the said City, and all that Our Island of Van Diemen's Land, and all Islands and Territories lying to the southward of Wilson's Promontory in thirty-nine degrees and twelve minutes of south latitude, and to the northward of the forty-fifth degree of south latitude, and between the one hundred and fortieth and one hundred and fiftieth degrees of longitude east from Greenwich, and also Macquarie Island, lying to the south-eastward of the said Island of Van Diemen's Land, and all other the Dependencies of Our said Colony of Van Diemen's Land; and did declare that the said City and Colony should thenceforth be wholly separated and exempted from the jurisdiction, authority, and Diocese of the said Bishop of Australia and his successors, and did ordain, make, constitute, and declare the same to be the Diocese of the Bishop of Tasmania by the said Letters Patent, nominated and appointed, and of his successors Bishops of Tasmania, and to be called in all time coming the Diocese of Tasmania: And whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend so much of an Act of the last Session for 'the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land as relates to Norfolk Island'" it was amongst other things enacted, "that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to sever Norfolk Island from the Government of New South Wales and from the Diocese of Tasmania, and to annex it to the Government and Colony of Van Diemen's Land and to the Diocese of Tasmania, from and after a day to be mentioned in such Letters Patent, and from and after such day Norfolk Island should cease to belong to the Colony of New South Wales and to the Diocese of Australia, and should be taken to be a part of the Colony of Van Diemen's Land and of the Diocese of Tasmania: And whereas it is Our Royal intention to sever the said Island called Norfolk Island and its Dependencies from the See or Diocese of Australia, and to annex the same to the See or Diocese of Tasmania; Now know ye, that in pursuance of such Our Royal intention, and of the powers in Us by the said Act or otherwise vested, We do by these Our Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, will and ordain, or declare, that from and after the Twenty-ninth day of September, in the Year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty-four, the said Island called Norfolk Island and its Dependencies shall cease to belong to the said See or Diocese of Australia, and shall be, and be taken to be, a part of the said See or Diocese of Tasmania, to all intents and purposes whatsoever; and We do further by these presents, will, ordain, and declare, that all Places, Churches, and Chapels, and the whole Clergy and others Our subjects within the said Island and its Dependencies, shall, from and after the said Twenty-ninth day of September, be released and discharged

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from the jurisdiction, authority, and control of the said Bishop of Australia, and the Archdeacons, Commissaries, and other Officers belonging to the said See or Diocese of Australia, save as to any matter or things heretofore had or done, or which may be had or done before the said Twenty-ninth day of September, and shall, from and after the said day, be under and subject to the jurisdiction, authority, and control of the said Bishop of Tasmania and his successors, and to the Archdeacon, Commissary, or other Officers of the said See or Diocese of Tasmania. And to the end that all things aforesaid may be firmly holden and done, We will and grant to the Right Reverend Father in God Francis Russell Nixon, Bishop of Tasmania, that he shall have Our Letters Patent, under Our Great Seal of Our said United Kingdom duly granted and sealed. In witness whereof We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering or an agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract.
