NOTICE TO MARINERS.

HIS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication of the following copy of a notice, dated, Fort William, 14th December, 1843, touching the Pilot Station, for the River Hooghly during the S. W. Monsoon.

NOTICE

Touching the Pilot Station for the River Hooghly during the S. W. Monsoon of the year 1843, &c.

THE experience of a second season's trial of the new Pilot Station off the South Channel having established that it can be made by Vessels from False Point with the greatest facility, and that Pilots can also be readily supplied, and the same causes existing which during last S. W. Monsoon

rendered necessary the removal of the Pilot Station from off Point Palmyras, to a position about fifteen miles S. W. b. W. of the Outer Floating Light, in Lat. 20° 56' N. Long. 88° 03' E., and in from 17 to 22 fathoms water—Notice is hereby given, that this latter Station will in future be continued during S. W. Monsoon, viz., from 15th March to the 15th September.

No difficulty can possibly be felt in passing from False Point to the New Station, if common attention be paid to the Lead, and to the following directions, prepared by Captain Lloyd, late Offg. Marine Surveyor General, after a careful Survey of the ground between the two Points.

"False Point Light House is in Lat. 20° 19½' N. and Long. 86° 47' E., and the South Channel Buoy in Lat. 25° 59' N. and Long. 88° 4' E., and bears from the Light House N. 61° E. true, or N. E. by E. ½ E. by Compass, distant 83 miles, and is laid 12 fathoms.

A bank of soundings extends from off Point Palmyras in a direction towards the tail of the Western Sea Reef, and the nature of the bottom (as distinguished from that of the Hooghly Deposit which is sand and mud with shining specks,) is a gravelly substance, composed of sand shells and small pebbles discharged from the "Kunka," and other rivers near Point Palmyras; the lighter material of which being carried further out, is deposited, and forms what is called the 'Pilot's Ridge,' which in crossing to the N. Westward, shews a little less water than on either side. In coming from seaward you shoal rather suddenly from 28 to 23 fathoms upon its Eastern edge. It is composed of a shelly sand, or minute gravel of a reddish or rusty brown color.

The best guide therefore to enable a Vessel to direct her course from Table Point to the Vessel at the New Station, will be to run down the edge of the "Pilot's Ridge," which can readily be done by making the Light House, and bringing it to bear about W. S. W. or S. W. by W. distant by computation from 10 to 15 miles, then steering to the E. N. Eastward, and having gradually increased the depth of water to 23 fathoms upon the eastern edge of the ridge, regulate the course to keep between it and 27 fathoms, when by attention to the Lead and nature of the soundings, course and distance run from the Light House, it is almost impossible to miss the Pilot Vessels, (if the above limits are kept within,) either by getting too far to windward or falling to leeward; for the soundings increase so rapidly to seaward from the proposed New Station, that 28 fathoms will not be more than 3 or 4 miles to the Southward of it, and 23 fathoms the same distance to the Westward of it.

The soundings to seaward of the ridge are in general a greenish or olive coloured mud, with occasionally a few bits of broken shells mixed with it.

Vessels approaching the Station during the day are required to shew the usual signal for a Pilot and by night to give as early and as much warning as possible by firing guns, burning blue lights, and by exhibiting two lights in a vertical position, when best seen, but Commanders are strictly enjoined to avoid as much as possible making the Station during the night.

To mark the Station until a proper Light Vessel is built, of which due notice will be given, one of the Pilot Vessels will shew during the day a large

St. George's Jack (white with red cross,) at the main top gallant mast head, and a good mast head light during the night, and will burn a blue light and a Maroon alternately every half hour, and fire a gun at 8 P.M., at midnight, and at 4 A.M. Vessels approaching the Station, and while there, as well as when approaching the *Light and Buoy Station Vessels, are warned to be careful in avoiding collision by night or by day—and in communicating with either of the above Vessels either at anchor or hove to, when it is necessary to cross her to pass under the stern; several instances of serious damage having occurred during the S.W. Monsoon, whereby the Outer Floating Light was more than once compelled to leave her Station for repairs, to the great inconvenience and risk of Vessels entering and quitting the river.

CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE, FOR 1845.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until *Monday, the 11th November next, at noon*, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1845, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Emigrants—*For Men*: 24oz. wheaten bread, 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.—*For Women*: 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.—Children under ten years, to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults: above that age, and under fifteen, the same as Adults.
2. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown, and others in the employment of Colonial Departments when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in Nos. 3, 6, and 7—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.
3. The Rations to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties; and for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, and other Mounted parties, when required:—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.
4. The Ration for wives of Soldiers of the Mounted Police—8oz. bread, 8oz. meat.
5. The Ration for children of Soldiers of Mounted Police above 7 years:— $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of bread, $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. meat.—under 7 years, 4oz. of bread and 4oz. of meat.
6. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light Vessel, Sydney Harbour—16oz. biscuit, 8oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 3oz.

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sugar, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint vinegar.

7. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house, South Head, Telegraphs, and Boatmen in the Departments of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police—24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

8. The Ration to Apprentices to the Colonial Architect:—20oz. bread, 16oz. fresh beef or mutton, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

9. To prisoners confined in Gaol—12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—(Ration No. 2 is issued to Gaol attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 11.)

10. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol—8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. yellow soap.

11. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24 oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses, to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

12. The Ration to Men, and to Apprentices to the Government Printer—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 3oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

13. Forage for Horses and Oxen—8lbs. maize or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

14. For the Light-house, South Head, and Floating-light, Sydney Harbour—Best clarified sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks each.

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying, and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, the Orphan Schools, and the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

The Tobacco to be Colonial.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz. :—1lb. wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit, equal to $1\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of bread; 1lb. salt beef or 1lb. mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1lb. of fresh beef. The supplies for Road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned :—

The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph,) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in

cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed by persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part,) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality—it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor General, in order that a warrant may be prepared and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

of the several Districts; and no Tender will be attended to unless accompanied by an agreement, in writing, signed by at least two solvent parties, stating their willingness to become sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of the acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which, the Contracts will be again advertised, another Tender accepted, or the supplies otherwise provided for.
