PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIFFS, Knight, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 5th and 6th year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for regulating the Sale of Waste Land belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies*;" I do hereby notify and proclaim, that at 11 o'clock of Wednesday, the 13th day of November next, the following Portions of Crown Lands will be offered for sale by Public Auction, at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney, at the upset price affixed to each lot respectively, on the terms and conditions, and under the provisions of the above recited Act. (Deposit 10 per cent.)

COUNTRY LOTS.

1. GLOUCESTER, 60, Sixty acres, parish unnamed, on the Manning River; at the confluence of Patorini's Creek; commencing at the south-east corner, (a water gum on the left bank of Patorini's Creek,) and thence bounded on the south by a line bearing west 9 chains and 85 links; thence on the west by a line bearing north 35 chains and 20 links to the Manning River, thence on the north by the Manning River, to the confluence of Patorini's Creek; and thence easterly by that creek upwards to the south-east corner aforesaid. The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying, and Mounted Police, or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating Light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, the Orphan Schools, and the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued to the Orphan Schools on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

The Tobacco to be Colonial.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz. :—1lb. wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit, equal to 1½lb. of bread; 1lb. salt beef or 1lb. mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1lb. of fresh beef. These substitutions are not, however, to be made, except on the requisition of the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan Schools, and to the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

The supplies for Road and other parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; and in case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned :—

The maize or barley 4-12, the hay 5-12, the bran 2-12, the straw 1-12.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per Ration only.

The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed by persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part,) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Depart-

ment, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality—it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made, or agreed to be made.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor General, in order that a warrant may be prepared and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Printed forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benches of the several Districts; and no Tender will be attended to unless accompanied by an agreement, in writing, signed by at least two solvent parties, stating their willingness to become sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of the acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of which, the Contracts will be again advertised, another Tender accepted, or the supplies otherwise provided for.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.

Each Tender is to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "*Tender for Provisions, &c.*"

Further particulars and information may be obtained on application at this Office, or to the Auditor General.

The parties Tendering, or an Agent for them, are requested to attend at this Office, at the time appointed for receiving the Tenders, to afford such explanation or information as may be required.

TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased, in pursuance of instructions from the Right Honorable the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, to direct the publication of the following Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, between Her Majesty, and the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, dated the 4th of April, 1844.

TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE GRAND DUKE OF OLDENBURG,

SIGNED AT LONDON, APRIL 4, 1844.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, April 30, 1844.]

HER Majesty the QUEEN of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the one part; and His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, on the other part; being equally animated by the desire of extending the commercial relations between their respective dominions, have agreed for this purpose to conclude a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, and have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the QUEEN of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable George Earl of Aberdeen, Viscount Gordon, Viscount Formartine, Lord Haddo, Methlick, Tarvis, and Kellie, a Peer of the United Kingdom, a member of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, Knight of the most ancient and most noble Order of the Thistle, and Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign affairs; and the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone, a member of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, a member of Parliament, and President of the Committee of Privy Council for Affairs of Trade and Foreign Plantations;

And His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, the Sieur Henry Frederick Tiarks, Knight of the Oldenburg Order of the House and of Merit, Chargé d'Affaires of His Royal Highness;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

From and after the date of the exchange of the ratifications of the present Treaty, British vessels arriving at, remaining in, or departing from, the ports of the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg, and vessels of the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg arriving at, remaining in, or departing from, the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, shall be subject to no other or higher dues or charges, of whatsoever nature they may be, than those which are now, or shall hereafter be imposed upon national vessels, on their arrival at, during their remaining in, or on their departure from such ports.

ARTICLE II.

1°. All articles of the growth, produce, or manu-

facture of the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, which are or shall be permitted to be exported from the ports of Oldenburg in vessels of Oldenburg, shall likewise be permitted to be exported from those ports in British vessels, either to the ports of the United Kingdom, or of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, or to the ports of any other foreign country.

2°. All articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the dominions of Her Britannic Majesty, which are or shall be permitted to be exported from the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, in British vessels, shall likewise be permitted to be exported from those ports in vessels of Oldenburg, either to the ports of Oldenburg, or to the ports of any other foreign country.

3°. All articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Oldenburg, which are or shall be permitted to be imported in British vessels, from the ports of Oldenburg, or from the ports of any other foreign country, into the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or from the ports of Oldenburg into the ports of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, shall likewise be permitted to be imported in vessels of Oldenburg.

4°. All articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the dominions of Her Britannic Majesty, which are or shall be permitted to be imported into the ports of Oldenburg in vessels of Oldenburg, shall likewise be permitted to be imported into those ports in British vessels, either from the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, or from the ports of any other foreign country.

ARTICLE III.

All articles whatsoever which can be legally imported into the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, in vessels of Oldenburg, or into the ports of Oldenburg in British vessels, shall, on their importation, be subject to the same duties of importation, dues, and charges, and be entitled to the same bounties, drawbacks, and allowances, whether such articles be imported in vessels of the one or of the other country.

ARTICLE IV.

All articles whatsoever which can legally be exported from the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, in vessels of Oldenburg, or from the ports of Oldenburg in British vessels, shall, on their exportation, be subject to the same duties of exportation, dues, and charges, and be entitled to the same bounties, drawbacks, and allowances, whether such articles be exported in vessels of the one or of the other country.

ARTICLE V.

In consideration of British vessels, together with their cargoes, being by the laws of Oldenburg admitted to entry in the ports of Oldenburg, when coming from the ports of all countries; and in consideration of British trade and navigation with Oldenburg being placed upon the footing of the most favoured nation; having regard also to the facility which the application of steam power to inland navigation affords for the conveyance of produce and merchandize of all kinds up and down rivers, and

to the new opening which may by these means be given to the trade and navigation between the United Kingdom and Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, on the one hand, and the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg on the other; it is agreed that vessels of Oldenburg, together with their cargoes, consisting of all such goods as for the time being may or can be legally imported into the United Kingdom and Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad by the said vessels, from any port of Oldenburg, shall, when coming from the ports of the Elbe, the Ems, the Weser, or the Meuse, or any other navigable river between the Elbe and the Meuse, be admitted into the ports of the United Kingdom and of Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, on the same terms as if the ports from which such vessels may come as aforesaid, were within the dominions of the Grand Duke of Oldenburg; and such vessels shall be permitted to import such goods as aforesaid upon the same terms on which such goods might be imported if coming from the ports of Oldenburg; and also, that such vessels proceeding from the United Kingdom, or Her Britannic Majesty's possessions abroad, to the ports aforesaid, shall be treated as if returning to a port of Oldenburg.

And it is hereby agreed, that the privileges granted by the fifth Article of this Treaty, shall continue only so long as British vessels and British trade and navigation shall continue to enjoy the advantages, in consideration of which the said privileges are hereinbefore mentioned to have been conceded,

And further, that the said privileges shall extend and be continued to the vessels of Oldenburg, in respect to the ports referred to in this Article, only so long as British vessels and their cargoes shall, upon their arrival thereat, during their remaining therein, and upon their departure therefrom, be placed upon the same footing as vessels of Oldenburg.

ARTICLE VI.

The present Convention shall be in force until the 1st of January, 1848, and further for the term of six years, provided that neither of the High Contracting parties shall have given to the other six months' notice that the same shall cease to be in force on the said 1st of January, 1848; and if neither Party shall have given to the other six months' previous notice that the present Convention shall cease on the 1st of January, 1848, then the present convention shall further remain in force until the 1st of January, 1854; and further, until the end of twelve months after either of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice to the other of its intention to terminate the same, each of the High Contracting Parties reserving to itself the right of giving such notice to the other. And it is hereby agreed between them, that at the expiration of twelve months after such notice shall have been received by either Party from the other, this Convention, and all the provisions thereof, shall altogether cease and determine.

ARTICLE VII.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications thereof shall be exchanged at London, at the expiration of two months, or sooner if possible.

In witness whereof, the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the Seals of their Arms.

Done at London, the fourth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-four.
