Conveyance of Mails.

Conveyance of Malls.

ONVEYANCE being required for the post office mails as undermentioned, for one year, from the 1st January 1845. Persons disposed to contract for providing the same, are invited to transmit their offers in writing, to this office, by twelve o'clock on Tnesday, the 8th day of October next, endorsed "Tender for conveyance of Mails," viz.:—

From and to Melbourne and Portland, by way of Ballan, Mount Emu, Fiery Creek, and the Grange, once a week.

From and to Port Fairy and Fiery Creek, once a week; by way of the Woolshed Inn, or by Mr. Sprut's station, as the Government shall determine.

From and to Geelong and the Wardy Yalloc river, near lake Korangamite, once a week. From and to Melbourne and Mount Macedon,

once a week.
From the Post Office in Melbourne to vessels in Hobson's Bay, twice a day; and from vessels' in Hobson's Bay to the Post Office in Melbourne, as often as mails may arrive; always by the Eastern Beach.

Tenders are to mention distinctly the time proposed to be occupied on any line of road,—but offers for the Portland line, are to state particularly whether as intended for performance of the inverse to Particularly the Portland particularly smeater as intended for performance of the journey, to: Portland and back to Melbourne, within a week or fortnight; and as expedition is so desirable a point in post office communication, the tender proposing the quickest rate of travelling, if combining cheapness, will of course receive a preference.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel-vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance. The contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival; except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A mail cart or carriage, drawn only by one

A mail cart or carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers—exclusive of the driver; under a penalty of £3 for each offence.

All vehicles, and horses employed in the conveyance of mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection, and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster at Melbourne, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be men of certified good and postmen are to be men of certified good character, subject also to rejection by the Post-master at Melbourne.

Contractors are to provide secure lockers for
the mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the
mails on horseback, under penalty of £10, for
damage sustained by any mail; unless where
the damage may arise from unavoidable acci-

Contractors are to carry all post office bags, mails and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster at Mel-bourne, or any of the Postmasters. And they bourne, or any of the Postmasters. And they will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each offence. They may, however, deliver letters on the direct line of road, clear of any Postmaster; and may receive letters from parties on the direct line of road, to be given up to the Postmaster immediately on arrival at the nearest Post Office.

"All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster at Melbourne from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the contractor, and are to

ment falling due to the contractor, and are to be considered as over and above any penalties forfeited under any Act of Council.

Each party tendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this office on the day appointed f ropening the tenders; and each tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the contractor for the safety of the mails, and the due performance of the contract

It being intended hereafter to close all Melbourne inland mails at 4 o'clock p.m., the one

bourne inland mails at 4 o'clock p.m., the one uniform time of half-past 4 p.m. will thus be established for departure of inland mail conveyances from the Post Office at Methourne; but it is to be understood that the days and hours for dispatch and arrival of all inland and

branch mails, are to be fixed and determined by the Postmaster at Melbourne, and are to be subject to his revision, should the convenience of the public so require.

Parties, proposing to tender are invited to seek information at the Post Office at Melbourne, where printed forms of tender may be had upon application. Forms may be also obtained from any of the Post Offices in the districts.
