DAILY RATIONS OF PROVISIONS.

No. I. Emigrants—For Men, 24 oz. wheaten bread, 16 oz. fresh meat. 8 oz. vegetables, half oz. sait, quarter oz. teu, one and a half oz. sugar, quarter oz. soap. For Women—16 oz. wheaten bread, 12 oz. fresh meat, 6 oz. vegetables, half oz. sait, quarter oz. tez, one and a half oz. sugar, parter oz. tez, one and chaffoz. sugar, balf oz. soap. Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds the rations of female adults; above that age and under fifteen

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this notice are to

be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The flour and bread must be the produce of clean sound colonial wheat, from which on the ration of smigratus. of emigrants, serveying parties, thorder police, mounted police—20 per cent., and on the ration to prisoners of the crown 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

Beef and mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the ration to emi-grants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this as well as the convict ration of beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued five days, and Mutton on two days of the week.

two days of the week.

The maize meal to be similar in quality to the wheat meal, and to be twice ground.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—I lb. wheat flour or i lb. biscuit equal to 1½ of bread; I lb. salt beef or I lb. mutton or II or salt work soughts. or I lb. mutton or I0 oz. salt pork, equal to to 1 lb. of fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several rations.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable pro-

ns of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions,

&c., &c.

The supplies for road parties and surveying parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the officer in charge; and in case the whole ration or forege be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12—the tay, 5-12—the bran, 2-12—the starw 1-12.

The supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for

written order of the person duly authorised for

written order of the person dury authorised for the purpose. Provisions and forage being required by rations, according to the scales under their re-spective heads, the tenders are required to ex-press the price per ration only.

The tenders for forage are not required to state the price of the ration for oxen, as when the latter is required one half of the allowance

fixed for horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both horses and oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the party receiving the sup-plies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any anonner, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in nam-ing a third, as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitators not agreeing in opinion will be called upon for his decision, which shall be

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the department requiring it, and the expense

charged to the contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the depart for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the rations are to be received, shall have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that be will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although in the mean time, he must when head that retered article and small small scand. Governor, attnough in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead. Failing of which it will be obtained by the officer or party requiring it, and the ex-pense charged to the contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulet, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate

Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being under stood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made or agreed to be made.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the pre-scribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers in a complete state, to the Sub-Treasurer for examination, and upon their approval, payment will be made by him at Melbourne.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Sub-Treasurer; and a security of £2000 will be required for the due fulfilment of the contract. No tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as security, stating they are willing to become bound as securities for the contractor recordingly, and the honds must be executed. accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the tender being notified, failing of which the

contracts will be again advertised or another's tender accepted.

Conveyance of Mails.

ONVEYANCE being required for the post office mails as undermentioned, for one year, from the 1st January 1845. Persons disyear, from the 1st January 1845. Persons disposed to contract for providing the same, are invited to transmit their offers in writing, to this office, by twelve o'clock on Tuesday, the 8th day of October next, endorsed "Tender for conveyance of Mails," viz.—

From and to Melbourne and Portland, by way of Ballan, Mount Emu, Fiery Creek, and the Grange once a week.

Grange, once a week.

From and to Port Fairy and Fiery Creek, once a week; by way of the Woolshed Inu, or by Mr. Sprot's station, as the Government shall determine.

From and to Geelong and the Lake Inn, near Mr. Lloyd's station, beyond the Wardy Yalloc river, and lake Korangamite, once a

From and to Melbourne and Mount Macedon, once a week.

From the Post Office in Melbourne to vessels in Hobson's Bay, twice a day; and from vessels in Hobson's Bay to the Post Office in Melbourne, as often as mails may arrive; always by the Eastern Beach.

Tenders are to mention distinctly the time proposed to be occupied on any line of road,— but offers for the Portland line, are to state but oners for the Portuan line, are to share particularly whether as intended for performance of the journey, to Portland and back to Melbourne, within a week or fortnight; and as expedition is so desirable a point in port office communication, the tender proposing the quickest rate of travelling, if combining cheapness, will of course receive a preference.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel-vehicles can travel, a pre-ference will be given to carriage conveyance. The contractors will be held strictly bound to

The contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of striyal; except for the first five and ten time of arrival; except for the first five and ten minutes respectively.

A mail cart or carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passenger; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers—exclusive of the driver; under a penalty of £3 for each offence.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection, and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster at Melbourne, or person appointed by him for that purpose. The drivers and postmen are to be men of certified good character, subject also to rejection by the Postmaster at Melbourne.

Contractors are to provide secure lockers for the mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the mails on horseback, under penalty of £10, for damage sustained by any mail; unless where the damage may arise from unavoidable accident.

Contractors are to carry all post office bags, mails and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster at Melbourne, or any of the Postmasters. And they will be bound to prevent he conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise to the, prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each offence. They may, however, deliver letters on the direct line of road, clear of any collection of postages, when required by any Postimaster; and may receive letters from patties on the direct line of road, to be given up to the Postmaster immediately on arrival at the nearest Post Office.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster at Melboune from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the contractor, and are to be considered as over and above any penalties forfeited under any Act of Council.

Each party sendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this office on the day appointed for opening the tenders; and each tender must bear the signatures of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the contractor for the safety of the mails, and the due performance of the contract.

It being intended hereafter to close all Melbourne inland mails at 4 o'clock p.m., the one uniform time of half-past 4 p.m. will thus be established for departure of inland mail conveyances from the Post Office at Melbourne; but it is to be understood that the days and hours for dispatch and arrival of all inland and brauch mails, are to be fixed and determined by the Postmaster at Melbourne, and are to be subject to his revision, should the convenience of the public so require.

Parties proposing to tender are invited to seek information at the Post Office at Melbourne, where printed forms of tender may be had upon application. Forms may be also obtained from any of the Post Offices in the districts.
