**T**ENDERS will be received at this office, on or before the 27th instant, from persons willing to contract for the supply of good durable stone for the bridge about to be erected over the Yarra Yarra River.

The stone to be prepared at the quarries fit for setting; the beds to be made true, and gauged front and back; the joints to be square the whole width of the stone; the back to be parallel to the front and square from the beds. The headers to be three feet six inches, and the stretchers two feet on the beds, both headers and stretchers to be not less than two feet six inches on the face, and eighteen inches in height; the face to be pitched off square from the beds and joints, and not less than one, nor more than three inches of rough left on the face of the stone. The tender to state the price per cubic foot, and parties tendering to forward a sample of the stone to this office.

The stone to be delivered on the ground at the site of the intended bridge, and when approved of, and measured by the Superintendent of Bridges, will be paid for by monthly instalments. The contractor to make out his own accounts agreeably to a prescribed form in triplicate.

Offers to be endorsed "Tenders for stone New Bridge," and to contain the names of two responsible persons willing to become sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract. The tender to state the quantity the parties are willing to supply per month, and when they can commence delivering the stone. **REQUISITIONS.**

**THE** Governor has been pleased to rescind, the Regulations relative to Requisitions, dated 13th February, 1837, and to direct that the following be strictly attended to by the Civil Departments, the expenses of which are defrayed out of the Colonial Treasury:—

1st.—All requisitions are to be made in duplicate, in the prescribed form for the different Offices and Departments in Sydney, *half-yearly*, on the 1st of December, and 1st of June; and for all Out-stations, Port Phillip District included, *annually*, on the 1st of December, and unless in cases of *great urgency*, at no other period, except for clothing for prisoners in the Gaols, or employed in the Colonial Departments, for which Estimates and Requisitions must be made as heretofore, agreeably to the Regulations of 21st January, 1839. The Requisitions prepared under the former Regulation for the Quarter commencing this day, will, however, be received by the Colonial Storekeeper, but it will be necessary for the Departments in Sydney to forward to that Officer, without delay, Supplementary Requisitions for the remainder of the half-year, and for those at the Out-stations similar demands for the remainder of the year.

2.—Applications for repair or whitewashing of public Colonial buildings and where land is attached, for the repair of gates, fences, and general maintenance of the premises in good order, and Requisitions for furniture for public Colonial buildings are to be made on the Colonial Architect.

3.—Requisitions for clothing, bedding, fuel, light, stationery, printed forms, and for every other description of stores, are to be made on the Colonial Storekeeper.

4th.—Officers in charge of Departments are to include in their Requisitions, such articles only as are usually allowed, and absolutely necessary for the public service; to shew the date of last Requisition, the quantity in possession, and to give a correct description of the articles required, particularly as to size, weight, or measurement, when necessary, and the service for which it is required, and to adhere as far as possible to the regulations in force on this head of service.

5.—Should stores, &c., or repairs to buildings be urgently required during any intermediate period, a Supplementary Requisition is to be sent in to the proper officer, accompanied by a report of the necessity.

**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GIPPS, Knight, Captain-General, and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the GOVERNOR and Council of New South Wales, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act for the Regulation of Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, in the Colony of New South Wales, and its Dependencies, and for other purposes relating thereto*," it is enacted that all Buildings, Erections, Houses, and Premises, which should thereafter be erected, built, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction within the said Colony and its Dependencies, and which should, by Proclamation, to be from time to time published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*, by order of the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, be declared and notified as such public Gaols, Prisons, or Houses of Correction, should from and after the publication of such notification, be severally deemed and taken to be the public Gaol, Prison, or House of Correction of the place or District where the same was or should be situated within the said Colony or its Dependencies respectively, and should be subject to the several provisions thereafter made for the regulation, management, care and discipline of the public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction belonging to the said Colony and its Dependencies, and of the prisoners confined within the same; and whereas there has been for some time in course of erection, as and for a public Gaol, the building called and known by the name of the New Gaol, at Melbourne, Port Phillip, in the said Colony; and it is expedient that the said Gaol should be and be declared to be a public Gaol, Prison, and House of Correction:—

Now, therefore, I, the Governor, by virtue of the said recited Act, and in pursuance of the power and authority thereby in me vested, do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify, the said building at Melbourne, to be a public Gaol, Prison, and House of Correction.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Government House, Sydney, this Twenty-fifth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and in the eight year of Her Majesty's Reign.
