GROSE FARM.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that the Paddocks at Grose Farm, will be put up separately to Auction, for Sale on Lease or License for one year, commencing 1st August next, at the Colonial Treasury, Sydney, at Eleven o'clock, on Wednesday, the 16th day of July, namely:—

Lot 1—Is estimated to contain eighteen acres, and comprises two paddocks, fenced, with the old Stockade and the garden and yard attached thereto, and is situate on the north-western end of Grose Farm, but excludes the Police Station at the western extremity. Upset price £30.

Lot 2—Estimated to contain twenty-two and a-half acres, comprises two paddocks fenced, and is situated on the south-west corner of the farm. Upset price £15.

Lot 3—Estimated to contain twenty-six and a-half acres, comprises two paddocks fenced; it is bounded by a fence dividing it from lots 2, 4, & 5. Upset price £18.

Lot 4—Estimated to contain seventeen and a-half acres, in one paddock fenced; it is bounded by the Parramatta Road, and divided by a fence from lots 3, 5, & 6, and the road along the creek bounding lot 1; out of this lot will be reserved a road, extending from a slip panel on the Parramatta Road to the Creek near the Stockade. Blackwood, of Her Majesty's Ship "Fly," and also similar directions for the passage through Endeavour Strait, prepared by Lieutenant Yule, of H. M. S. "Bramble," gladly avails himself of the opportunity of expressing the high sense he entertains of the services rendered to the commercial interests of this Colony by Captain Blackwood and the Officers associated with him in the survey of Torres Straits, and also for their exertions in the erection of the Beacon on Raine's Island.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FROM RAINE'S ISLAND TO CAPE YORK.

The Beacon erected on Raine's Island is in 144° 6' 52" east longitude; and 11° 35' 49" south latitude; variation of the compass 3° 50' East.

This position having been determined with great care, both by Chronometric measurements, and by a series of Astronomical observations, may be considered as nearly correct; and will afford a good opportunity for ships passing to test their Chronometers.

The top of the building (which is a circular stone tower,) is seventy-five feet above low water mark; and it was constantly seen from the mast-head of Her Majesty's Ship "Fly," at a distance of thirteen measured miles.

It is coloured towards the S.E. with vertical black and red bands; the dome which surmounts the building being painted white.

Provisions have been left inside of the building; and it is hoped, that a large five-ton tank which has a good pipe led down into it from the top of the Beacon, may be the means of affording a good supply of fresh water to any persons who may be unfortunate enough to be wrecked in the neighbourhood, and who may land on the Island.

A reef on which the sea always breaks heavily, runs out E.S.E. one mile and a-half from the base of the Beacon, (which is built on the east extreme of the Island,) and closing in towards the Islet on its western side, leaves a small piece of sheltered water where boats may land and small vessels anchor in moderate weather, within a stone's throw of the beach, in four fathoms. It is high water at the full and change at 8h. Om., a.m., and the average greatest rise of tide observed was nine feet at that period.

The mid-channel course for the channel south of Raine's Island is W.S.W.; and, for the northern S.W. by S., both perfectly clear, on which direction having steered for nine miles, soundings will be

obtained in from seventeen to twenty-five fathoms coarse coral sand. The flood tide sets in about W. by S., from two to three knots per hour; at the springs, therefore a ship steering by the north channel, and having the flowing tide, will be liable to be set towards the reefs which form the northern boundary of the passage; and if it be late in the evening when she enters, should anchor directly she strikes soundings; if plenty of day light, haul-up to S.W. half W., for the Middle Banks which should be seen (after having run thirteen or fourteen miles from the time of obtaining soundings,) on the star-board bow, and Sir C. Hardy's Islands a-head.

Better anchorage will now be obtained in twelve and thirteen fathoms coral sand, and the ship will be in a good position for steering in for the main land; by passing either north or south of the Cockburn Reef.

The Middle Banks are three or four small sand banks, generally shewing above water, and surrounded by small coral reefs, off which there are no outlying dangers.

From them the Beacon on Raine's Island bears N.E. by E. half E. twenty-six miles, Peak of northern Hardy Island S.W. by W. twelve miles, and Ashmore's Sand Banks, three in number, will be seen bearing south, nearly six miles distant; and the east extreme of the Cockburn Reef W. by S. nine miles.

To pass in by Pollard's Channel, or to the south of the Cockburn Reef, when one mile from the middle banks, bearing north, steer a W. half S. course for nine miles, and when within one-third of a mile from the end of the reef (which always breaks, and is quite bold to approach,) alter course to S.W. by W., and steer close along the southern edge, by which means a series of shoal patches, which lay between the Cockburn Reef and Hardy's Isles will be avoided. This channel is very deep, twenty-eight and twenty-five fathoms, and at no part is less than three-quarters of a mile in breadth, and appeared on a very close examination to be perfectly clear of sunken dangers; strong tide-rippings gave the appearance of shoal water, when Her Majesty's ship Fly sailed through, but the lead gave nothing less than twenty-five fathoms.

It is about eight miles in length, and when the northern Hardy Island bears E. by N., a small sand bank (which is the southern and western extreme of the dangers) being visible, and nearly on with Haggerston Island extreme, and the Cockburn Isles bear N. by W., a course may be steered for the Bird Isles, which bear N.W., distant eighteen miles. To pass to the north of the Cockburn Reef, steer as before to make the pitch of the reef, when soundings of eight fathoms will be obtained: having clearly made out the breakers on the reef, which is safe to approach, and at the distance of half a mile or less from it, steer a due West course for eight or nine miles, till the Cockburn Isles bear S.W. by S.; being then about a mile from the reef, steer along its edge in nine or ten fathoms, on a north-westerly course.

The Bird Isles should now be seen bearing west. From the north extreme of the Cockburn Reef, which should be rounded in ten or eleven fathoms, a S.S.W. course for a mile or two will lead clear of a sunken patch, (bearing west three miles from the end of Cockburn Reef,) and a direct course may then be steered for the Islands above-named.

By keeping along the edge of the Cockburn Reef,

a series of dangerous shoal coral patches, which run in a parallel direction to the reef, at a distance of three miles from it, will be avoided; the southern danger bears N.W. by W. from the eastern extreme of the Cockburn Reef; and a good mast-head look-out will detect its position, it being very shoal (five feet,) on one part of it.

The Bird Isles being reached, all sail may be carried, and Captain King's track followed to Cape York; and it may be observed, that in with the main land the bottom is mud, and perfectly clear of sunken dangers.

I would therefore recommend reaching the Bird Isles as soon as possible, for when reached, the danger of all Correl's Strait may be said to terminate. Should the weather, however, be fine and clear, in a vessel not drawing more than fifteen or sixteen feet water, the Middle Track may be safely pursued. To follow this track pass either north or south of the Middle Banks, and steer a N. by W. course for thirty miles, keeping a bright look-out for several sunken coral patches which exist near the track, and if the sun be not a-head they will be distinctly seen: having run this distance steer N. W. for fifteen miles, when a sand bank surrounded by a reef should be seen and also Arnold's Bushy Island, in $11^{\circ} 0' S.$ on the larboard bow.

Three sand banks surrounded by small reefs bear E. by N. ten miles from Arnold's Bushy Isle.

The bottom now changes to mud, and the ground becomes clear of sunken dangers.

Mount Adolphus Island (flat topped) will be seen bearing N.W., thirty-five miles; and a course may be steered for Cape York, passing between reef $\frac{1}{2}$ of Captain King's track and some reefs to the northward, in a clear channel of four miles in width.

A ship passing in by Pandora's Entrance, in $11^{\circ} 26' 40'' S.$, (a good and safe passage of two miles in width) should steer for a vegetated sand bank in $11^{\circ} 19' 30'' S.$; whence a N.W. course for forty-eight miles will take her to Arnold's Bushy Island, when the middle track will be joined.

Good anchorage may be obtained in seven fathoms, (fine coral sand,) under the southern Sir C. Hardy's Island. The channel between the two large Islands is perfectly clear, and rounding the north end of the south island in seven or eight fathoms, at the distance of a cable and a-half a good berth may be obtained off a sandy bay just round the bluff head of the Island.

Latitude of Observation Bay, $11^{\circ} 55' 40'' S.$

Longitude $143^{\circ} 33' 18'' E.$

Variation $3^{\circ} 10'$ East.

High water at full and change, at 9 A. 15 m., A.M.

Greatest rise, eight feet.

Fresh water may be obtained here from May till August, but after that time the springs are dry.

When leaving the Hardy's Isles with the intention of passing in to the main land by the Cockburn Reef, steer a N.E. by N. course for four miles, by which means the dangers of Pollard's Channel will be avoided.

In the month of September, Her Majesty Ship Fly watered in a sandy bay about half a mile to the east of Cape York; wells were dug, and the water was good and abundant. The bay may be known by a little low rock about three or four feet above water at its entrance.

It may be advisable here to mention, that in steering for Raine's Island, care should be taken not

to haul in for the reefs until well to the northward of $13^{\circ} 30'$ south latitude; a reef having been discovered this past season by the *Osprey* schooner, in latitude 14° south; and $146^{\circ} 20'$ east longitude. This reef having been seen by two different ships, and both vessels possessing good Chronometers, the above position cannot be far from the truth.*

The Alert or Lihou reefs should also have a good birth given to them of at least a degree of longitude, the current appearing to set very strong to the N.W. in the neighbourhood at certain seasons.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR ENDEAVOUR STRAIT.

N.B.—The Soundings are reduced to the lowest spring-tide level, and the bearings are magnetic. The Variation is about 4 degrees easterly.

Vessels entering from the south-eastward, and drawing above fifteen feet water should, after having passed through the Strait between the Brothers and Albany Isles, keep a good look out for a rock situated nearly in the mid-channel between Mount Adolphus and Cape York. This rock is laid down in the Admiralty Chart by Captain King; it has since been examined by an Officer of Her Majesty's Ship Fly, who found only four fathoms on it; which being reduced to the low water level, would be barely three fathoms; there is deep water around it.

Having passed this danger, a direct course may be shaped for Endeavour Strait, which can be entered by three different openings, the shoalest water being four and a-half fathoms. Of the three passages I consider that to the westward the best, it being twice the breadth of either of the others, and the soundings from nine to ten fathoms, sand. To go through this opening a vessel must pass to the westward of all the Possession Group; the two westernmost being close together and thickly covered with wood. Having passed between these and a high rugged Island to the westward, S.W. by W. will be the course towards Wallis Isles. Pass about two miles to the northward of the northernmost or Red Wallis Isle;† when abreast of it at that distance, the course will be W. three quarters S. eight miles, or until Booby Island bears N. half E; care must be taken not to keep to the southward of this course, as a very narrow sand bank extends from the Red Wallis Island due west for six miles, having two small and shoal patches upon it, one with two and a-half fathoms bearing N. 84° W. four miles; and the other, at the western extremity, bearing N. $87\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W. from the Red Wallis. The channel here is the narrowest part of the passage, and is two miles broad; the depth being sufficient for the largest ships, with the exception of a small sandy knoll, on which I sounded in three fathoms; this patch lies seven and a-half miles N. 79° W. from the Red Wallis. To the

north of this patch the passage is nearly one and a-half mile wide, with six fathoms in mid-channel.

A vessel having proceeded so far west as to bring Booby Island to bear N. half E., I conceive she will then have passed through the Strait, and may shape a course northward and westward according to her destination. That portion of the Strait between Possession Group and Wallis Isles is quite clear of shoal water, having an uniform depth of seven fathoms and upwards.

The spring tides between the Possession Isles sometimes run five knots per hour, the ebb N.N.E. five hours, and the flood S.S.W. seven hours. High water at full and change at one o'clock. Rise and fall nine feet six inches.
