H IS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the re-publication, from the South Australian Government Gazette, of the following Sailing Directions for Gulf St. Vincent.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR GULF ST. VINCENT.

AFTER making Kangaroo Island, steer E. 1/2 N. through Investigator's Straits, between that island and Althorpe Island. Should the wind be from the eastward, you will find no difficulty in beating through the Straits, nor anything in the way more than is pointed out in Flinders's chart. If bound up Gulf St. Vincent, great care is requisite to avoid Troubridge Shoal, situated on the west side of the entrance, as the flood tide through Backstairs Passage sets strong (particularly on the full and change of the moon) directly upon the shoal; therefore, coming from the westward, the course should not be altered until Point Marsden bears S.W. by W. ½ W., when you will be about ten miles from the high land inside Cape Jervis, named in Flinders's chart N.W. Bluff, when you may shape your course for the Light Vessel, N.N.E., forty miles distant. For about six leagues up the Gulf, the land is high and bold; but above that, the shore becomes very low, with hummocks of sand upon it; and the same description of coast prevails to the head of the Gulf.

After passing the high coast land, the water shoals far out, and in some places (when within the distance of ten miles from the Light) five fathoms will be found at a distance of four miles from the beach. have a cast of the lead, as it is shoal a considerable

Be careful of your soundings, particularly at night; and in running up to the Light, keep, as nearly as you can, in between five and six fathoms waterapproaching inside five, as within that depth the water shoals suddenly; and if you keep outside six fathoms, you may pass to the westward of the Light and not see it. In these soundings you will make the Light ahead, which may be seen twelve miles from the deck of a ship. The shoal—called the Bar—at at the entrance to the Port, bears N.E. one mile from the Light Vessel. When you are within a proper distance, a boat will be sent to you from the Light Vessel with a pilot, and to receive all mails and letters. Should you sight the Light in the early part of the night, you may anchor anywhere to the southward of it in six fathoms, or keep under weigh until daylight, taking care to be to the southward of the Light, and as near it as possible in the morning, as the tide answers early. Where the Light Vessel is moored, in latitude 34° 44' S., the anchorage is safe; but a good full scope of chain is required, never less than lifty fathorns; and, if it blow, a full chain. Never let go the second anchor if you can avoid it, rather give more chain, as your vessel will ride much easier with one anchor down than two.

When bound down the Gulf, steer from the Light Vessel S.S.W., which will keep you in sight of the land on the east side of the Gulf, and out of the influence of the tide through Backstairs Passage, until you are to the southward of Troubridge Shoal; but on no account shape a course that you may fancy will enable you to weather the Shoal, (thereby laying the ship's broadside exposed to a rapid tide running directly upon it) until you are sufficiently to the southward to shape your course down the Strait.

In beating down the Gulf, never exceed a distance of ten miles from the larbourd shore (as the opposite side is a shoal) and be careful, when standing in, to

distance off, until you get down to the high land. In some places to the northward of Holdfast Bay, there are not more than five fathoms at a distance of four miles from the beach, and the water shoals very quickly within that depth; but where the high land fronts the sea, the shore is steep, except a reef that lies a mile off, about three miles to the southward of Holdfast Bay. The Flag Staff at Holdfast Bay is in latitude 34 ° 58' 28" S. In moderate weather, endeavour to be as close to the land as possible by sunset, when you will be certain of the wind off the land, which will lead you down the coast. Do not allow yourself to be thrown off until you are well down with Cape Jervis, and to the southward of Troubridge Shoal, which is an extensive flat, and only in the middle shows a patch of about 200 yards

Ships bound down Investigator's Strait meeting a strong westerly wind, and wishing to anchor, will find good holding ground close in on the east side of

Point Marsden, in six fathoms water.

Vessels coming from the eastward through Backstairs Passage, and bound up the Gulf, should night be approaching, must keep on the north side of the Passage, and haul round Cape Jervis-all that coast being quite bold. When the Gulf is open, shape a course N. by E. 1/2 E. for the Light Vessel.

It is to be understood that the Mails are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance, and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants, or passengers, or otherwise, to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under a penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Contractors will be bound not to assign any portion of their Contract without consent of the Postmaster-General.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence, on all roads except between Melbourne and Yass, and on that road the penalty will be £10.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General, from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering or an agent for him, must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signature of two respectable and solvent persons, willing to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract.

The hours of starting from each Post Office, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

Printed forms of Tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE, FOR 1846.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 10th November next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1846, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

10. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol: -8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, 4oz. yellow soap.

11. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses: -24oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour-(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)
