IT If reference to the Notice in the Government Gazette, of he 24th January Jast, in which was published so much of the Act of the Imperial Parliament, 7th and 8th Victoria, c. 69, as relates to the admission of appeals to Her Mujesty in Council, from the judgment of any Court of Justice in any British Colony or Possession, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication for general information of the following Order made by the Judicial Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council in suance of the provisions of the said Act.

By the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

WY HEREAS by an Act passed in the eighth year of her Majesty's reign, intituled. "An Act for amending an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of his late Majesty, intituled an Act for the better administration of Justice in his Majesty's Privy Council, and to extend its jurisdiction and powers," it was enacted "that it should be hurful for the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, to make any general rule or regulations to be binding upon all Courts in the colonies and other Foreign Settlements of the Crown requiring the Judges notes of the evidence taken before such Court on any cause appealed, and of the reasons given by the Judges of such Court, or by any of them, for or against the judgment pronounced by such Court, which notes of evidence and reasons should by such Court be transmitted to the Clerk of the Privy Council within one calendar month next after the leave given by such Court to prosecute any appeal, to her Majesty in Council, and such order of the said Committee should be binding upon all Judges of such Courts in the colonies or Foreign Settlements of the Crown: "Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Judicial Committee of the Privy Council are pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that twen any appeal shall be prosecuted from any judgment of any Court, in the colonies or Foreign Settlements of the Crown, By the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

the reasons given by the Judges of such Court, or by any of such Judges, for or against such judgment, shall be by the Judge or Judges of such Court communicated in writing to the Registrar of such Court, or other officer whose duty it is to prepare and certify the transcript record of the proceedings in the cause, and that the same be by him transmitted in the original to the Clerk of her Majesty's Privy Council at the same time when the documents and proceedings proper to be laid before her Majesty in Council upon the hearing of the appeal are transmitted.

Whereof the Judges of all such Courts in the colonies, or Foreign Settlements of the Crown, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

### TORRES' STRAITS.

H IS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication to direct the publication of the following amended Sailing Directions, for the passage through Endeavour Strait, prepared by Lieutenant C. B. Yule, R. N., Commanding H. M. S.

Bramble.

It is intended that the present shall be substituted for the temporary Sailing Directions for the same passage, published in the Government Gazette, of the 30th May last, which were prepared before Lieutenant Yule's Survey was in a

# SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR ENDEA-VOUR STRAIT.

VOUR STRAIT.

VESSELS coming from the southward and eastward, drawing above fifteen feet water, should, after having passed the Brothers and Albany Isles, keep a good look out for a rock situated nearly midway between Cape York and Mount Adolphus; this rock is laid down in the Admiralty Chart by Captain King, it has since been examined by an Officer of II. M. S. Fly, who found only four fathoms on it, which being reduced to the low water level would be barely three fathoms; there is deep water round it. From this rock the S. W. extremity of the table of Mount Adolphus bears N.53 E. 44 miles, Cape York S. 67 W. 4 miles, rock a. N. 52 W. 6 and Albany Rock which has a conspicuous white summit, S. 42 E. 3\frac{1}{4} miles. Having passed this shoal, a direct course to the westward may be shaped, passing about one mile northward of York Island; from this position; the course will be W. 2 S. 10\frac{1}{4} miles, (always allowing for tide) which will lead to abreast of the Western Passage into Endeavour Strait; it may be entered by two others between Strait; it may be entered by two others between the Possession Isles, which are both perfertly safe, but as the former is twice as broad as either the Possession Isles, which are both perfectly safe, but as the former is twice as broad as either of the others, with 'deeper water and less tide, I consider it the best of the three. When abreast of this opening steer S.SW. \( \frac{1}{2} \) W, or nearly midway between Entrance Island, which is high and rocky, and the two westernmost of the Possession Isles, which are close together and thickly covered with wood. 'Having passed through this opening, continue the same course S.S.W. \( \frac{1}{2} \) W, until Barn 'Islet, which is small but high and rugged, bears 'S. 42 E. 3\( \frac{1}{2} \) miles, and the two woody islets are in one, bearing N. 35 E.; the rest course will be W. \( \frac{1}{2} \) S. 15 miles, or, as the Wallis Isles will now be visible from the masthead, steer such a course as will lead two miles to the northward of the northern or Red Wallis Island; when it bears south, distant two miles the given course (W. \( \frac{1}{2} \) S. is still to be continued.

tinued nine miles, or until Booby Island, which may be seen from the mast-head, bear N. 5° E. Care must be taken not to keep to the southward of the course, (W. § S.) as a very narrow sand bank extends from Red Wallis Island west six miles, having only two fathoms on its western extremity. The passage here is the narrowest part, and is two miles broad, the least depth being sufficient for the largest ships with the exneing summent for the largest sings with the ca-ception of a small sandy knoll, on which I got three fathoms. A vessel having proceeded so far west as to bring Booby Island to bear N. 5° E. I consider she will then have passed through the I consider she will then have passed through the strait, and may shape a course northward and westward according to her destination. That por-tion of the strait between the Possession Group and Wallis' Islands, is quite clear of shoal water, having an uniform depth of seven fathoms and upwards, the nature of the bottom being generally coral sand.

The spring tides between the Possession Isles sometimes run five knots per hour; the ebb N.N.E. five hours; and the flood seven hours S.S.W.; the range is nine feet six inches. At the Wallis Islam's I found the tides too irregular to enable me to give any definite information with regard to the time of high and low water, or at what time the set of the tide east or west changes. The range is seven feet and the greatest velocity is two knots per hour. The ebb runs east and the flood west.

I generally found the the direction of the tides in all parts of the strait accorded with the trend of the channels.

All the bearings and courses are Magnetic, and the soundings are reduced to the lowest spring tide levels.

VACCINATION.

In order to avert the calamities which must necessarily follow if the Small Pox be in troduced into the Colony, and to keep up a constant supply of Vaccine Lymph, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that children will receive Vacciation gratis, if taken to any of the Public Hospitals or Colonial Surgeons throughout the Colony, every Tuesday, at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon. But as the operation itself, without any proof of its having taken effect, would be insufficient security to the public mind, His Excellency has been pleased to direct, that a charge of one shilling shall be deposited for every child vaccinated, which sum shall be returned on the presentation of the child on the next Vaccination day.

His Excellency strongly recommends to parent

His Excellency strongly recommends to parent and guardians to avail themselves, as early as possible, of the means thus afforded to them os taking this necessary and proper paccaution, with respect to all children not already vaccinated nated.
