THE Grand Master, Officers, and Brethren of the Sydney District of the Loyal and Independent Order of Odd Fellows of the Manchester Unity, are desirous most humbly to offer to your Excellency, their sincere congratulations on the safe arrival of yourself and family at the seat of your future government.

They are anxious, as early as possible, to express to your Excellency, that they retain in this distant land the same ardent loyalty and devoted attachment, the same profound veneration for Her Gracious Majesty the Queen, which is admittedly possessed by their Brethren of the Order in England.

Their earnest hope is, that during the time your Excellency may fill the high office in which it has pleased Her Majesty to place you, the blessing of health may constantly attend you, and that your Excellency's administration of the Government of this their adopted country, may (as they have no doubt it will) tend to advance its welfare and prosperity.

WE, the undersigned, the Grand Master, Directors, and Officers of the Australian Supreme Grand Lodge of the Independent order of Odd Fellows in New South Wales and its Dependencies, and the Officers and Members of the Lodges in connection therewith, beg most respectfully to approach your Excellency to offer our sincere congratulations upon your appointment to the Govern-

ment of this Colony, and your safe arrival in it, to undertake the arduous and important charge of directing its future destinies.

We beg leave to tender to your Excellency our assurance of the firmest spirit of loyalty and devotion to Her Majesty's Person and Government, for which the Members of our Order have ever been most eminent.

We beg to assure your Excellency that whilst in our Lodges, we meet on neutral ground, all discussions upon religious and political subjects being most strictly excluded; we endeavour to the utmost of our power, to do good, and be just to all men.

We beg to state, that the Funds of our Lodges raised by small weekly contributions, are dispensed in a three-fold form, viz:—First, the Casual Fund to relieve sick and distressed Members of the Order; Second, the Funeral Fund, to bury deceased Brothers and purchase decent mourning for their bereaved families; and Third, the widow and Orphans' Fund to assist Widows of deceased Brothers in bringing up their children, and causing them to be properly educated; objects which in this Colony, where the Friends of deceased Members are often far separated from their Relatives and Connections, are we conceive of paramount importance.

We request permission to present your Excellency with copies of our various Laws and Regulations, to enable your Excellency the more correctly to form an estimate of the principles by which we are governed; and we most respectfully solicit, that your Excellency will be graciously pleased to honor our Independent Order, by becoming its Patron.

We beg to express to your Excellency our sincere wishes for your health and happiness, and that your Excellency's Government may be long and prosperous.

We have the distinguished honor to subscribe ourselves with great respect your Excellency's most obedient and very humble Servants.

**W**E, the undersigned, the President, Vice-President, and officers of the Church of England Lay Association of New South Wales, desire to approach your Excellency with the sincere congratulations of the Association on your safe arrival in this Colony, and to express not only our devoted attachment to Her Majesty's sacred person, but also our confidence in your Excellency as the Queen's representative in this important dependency of the British Crown.

While we anticipate a beneficial and prosperous Government of the Colony in its temporal affairs under the administration of your Excellency, we are no less sanguine in our expectations that whatever plans shall be found to be the best adapted to extend the influence and to advance the interests of the National Church of England in this vast and spiritually destitute diocese will receive from your Excellency cordial and prompt encouragement.

We would most respectfully represent to your Excellency that more than one-half of the entire population of the Colony consists of members of the National Church, who are entitled to look for the effectual preservation and extension amongst them of the benefits and blessings of the parochial system of England.

From the want, however, of clergymen placed in the charge of districts, each containing only a manageable amount of population, and provided with a church, a pastor's residence, and a school in connection with the Church of England, under the immediate superintendence of a resident clergyman, numbers of its members scattered as they are over so immense a diocese, are necessarily deprived of the due and regular ministrations of their own Church. And, in common with multitudes, whom it is the Church's office to gather into her fold, remain without any adequate provision for public worship, or for education in religious principles and moral habits.

We cannot avoid urging upon your Excellency's most serious consideration the perfect adaptation of the National Church for remedying the deplorable state of religious destitution to which we refer, were its temporal means rendered adequate to meet the almost overwhelming claims upon its ministrations.

Judging from the experience of past times in the mother country, as well as from the beneficial results of Christian education under the guidance of the Church in this Colony, wherever it has been effectually carried out, we are equally anxious to place before your Excellency our deep impression of the value of a Church Education, by means of Parochial Schools, and the pressing necessity which exists for increasing the inadequate support which such schools at present receive from the State.

For an association, established for the purpose of co-operating with other Church Societies, in the amelioration of these spiritual wants, and of extending the influence and increasing the effi-

ciency of the Ancient and National Church of England in this Colony, we anticipate your Excellency's especial favour; and while we have the honour to state that its institution took place with the sanction of our highly esteemed Diocesan the Lord Bishop of Australia,—that the Archbishop of Canterbury has been pleased to signify his Grace's warm approval of its objects—and the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to accord his patronage in England, we cannot refrain from soliciting from your Excellency to add to marks of approbation so encouraging, your Excellency's consent to become the Patron of the Association in this Colony.

In conclusion, we sincerely pray that your Excellency may enjoy the high satisfaction of ruling over a peaceful, loyal, and united people, in a prosperous and happy land; and that however successful your Excellency's efforts may be in the advancement of this Colony to the position of a rich and mighty dependency of Great Britain, yet that when called upon to relinquish its Government into Her Majesty's hands, the most gratifying of the many proud recollections which will attend your Excellency from these shores may be found in the consciousness, that as the representative of the Temporal Head of the Church, and sworn defender of its faith, your Excellency spared no effort permanently to secure for this Colony an adequate dispensation of the spiritual blessings our Holy Church was designed to confer.

**FIFTEEN POUNDS REWARD, OR A

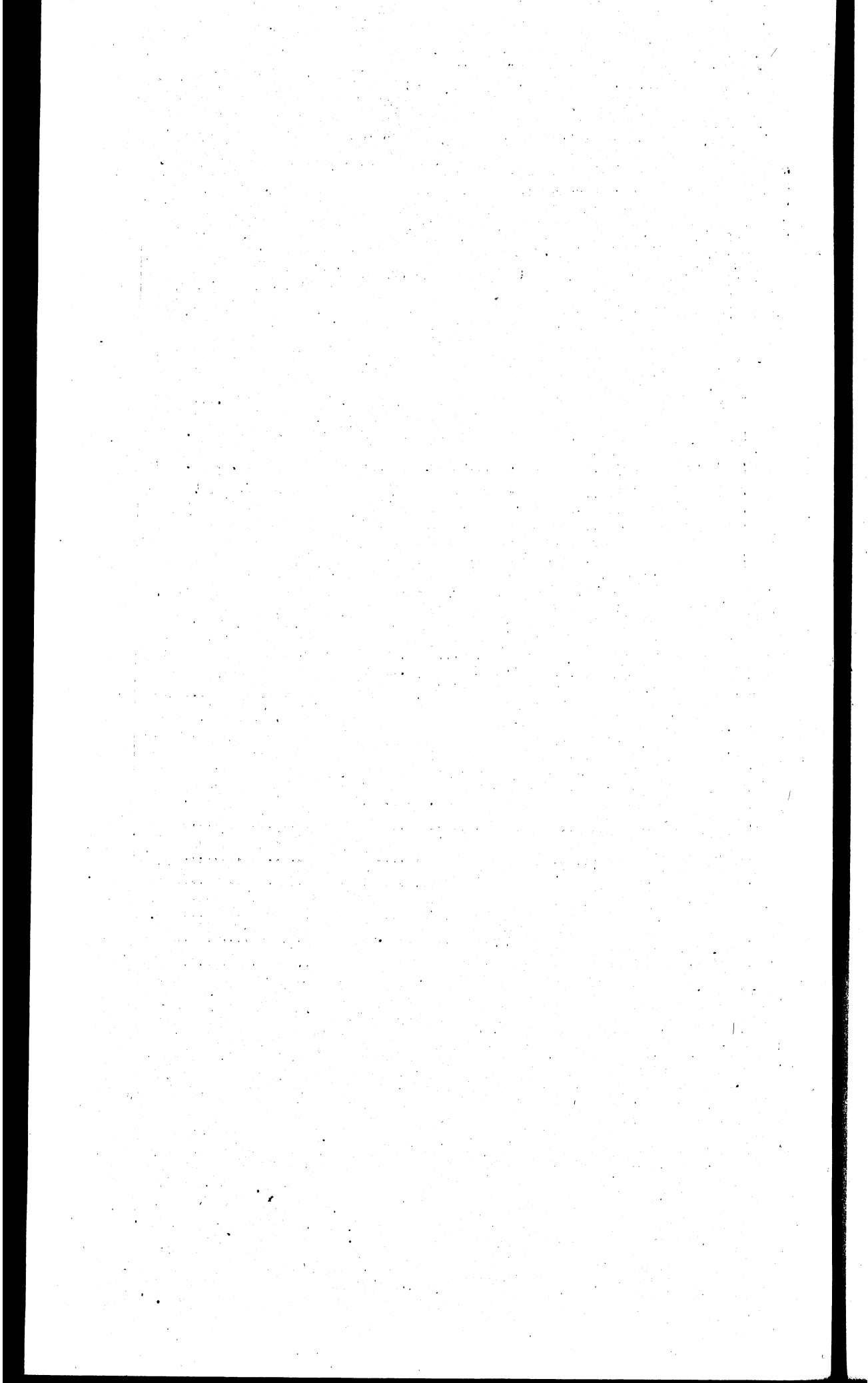
