If the required particulars be not furnished within that period, or if a Caveat be lodged, or other cause of uncertainty arise which cannot be satisfactorily determined by the Government, the case will be referred to the Commissioners of Claims, and the parties subjected to the expense of that proceeding.

IMMIGRATION.

WHEREAS under the system of Bounty Emigration which continued in operation until the end of the year '1841, many married couples are represented to have emigrated to this Colony without their children, in consequence of their inability to pay the sums demanded, in addition to the Government Bounties, for the passages of such children: and whereas it has been deemed expedient to afford to such children, out of the Public Funds, the means of rejoining their parents:—Notice is hereby given, that application for free passages for his or her children will be received from any 'Bounty Immigrant' who left Great Britain on or before the 7th day of January, 1842,* provided that such 'Immigrant' was produced before, and passed by, the Immigration Board either at Sydney or Melbourne, as one of a married couple.

The applications are to be addressed to the Agent for Immigration, at Sydney, or to His Honor the Superintendent, at Melbourne, and must be made in the annexed form, of which copies may be obtained from the Agent for Immigration.

Applications approved by this Government will be forwarded to the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners in England, who will be requested to make enquiry, in each case, into the applicant's statements, and, if satisfied of their correctness, to guarantee the allowance of Bounties, according to the current rates, upon the introduction into the Colony of the children specified in the application, on the following conditions:—

- 1.—That on their arrival in the Colony the children shall be severally produced before the Immigration Board in good bodily and mental health.
- 2.—That every male under the age of fourteen years and every female, be shown to the satisfaction of the Immigration Board to have been under the charge of a married couple during the voyage.
- 3.—That every male above eighteen, and every female above fifteen years, be provided with testimonials of good character, signed by clergy, men and respectable inhabitants of note in the places of their former residence.

Before, however, any application can be forwarded to the Commissioners in England, the applicant will be required to lodge in the hands of the Immigration Agent the promissory note of himself and two persons of credit, for £5 for each child desired to be brought out, as security that such child will be withdrawn, within a reasonable time after arrival, from under the charge of the Government.

It is to be observed, that all persons to whom passages are granted by the Government, are required to provide themselves with a sufficient supply of clothing, &c., for the voyage, and the following information therefore, taken from a late official document issued by the Land and Emigration Commissioners in England, is in-

Rewards for the Discovery of Illicit Distillation.

HIS Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct that the following Rules shall be established in rewarding persons who either directly or indirectly may give information to any Inspector of Distilleries or other Officer of Government, leading to the seizure of an unlicensed Still in any part of the Colony, or information leading to the conviction of any person engaged either as a principal or authorized Agent in any Licensed Distillery or Rectifying Establishment, of any offence against the Laws which exist for their regulation, or to the discovery of any practices in or connected with such Establishment by which the Revenue is defrauded.

1.—The Reward to be paid will be a sum never exceeding Fifty Pounds, to be determined by the Governor according to the circumstances of each case, and the value of the seizure.

2.—The person on whose information the seizure is made, is the one entitled to the Reward, but if information be given at the same time by two or more individuals, the persons giving it will be jointly or collectively entitled to the Reward.

3.—If separate information be given to two different Officers at or about the same time, or if from any other cause a difficulty arises in determining the party or parties entitled to the Reward, their several claims will either be decided by the Governor or by the Officers of the Government to whom they may by His Excellency be referred.

4.—Expenses necessarily incurred in making any seizure including remuneration to parties assisting in making it, are to be paid out of the Reward in such manner as may have been previously agreed upon, or (if there has been no agreement) in such manner or in such proportions as the Governor may direct.

5.—There being reason to believe that Stills have, occasionally been put up for the sole purpose of obtaining the Reward promised for their discovery, no Reward will in future be given for the discovery of any Still which may seem to have been erected for such a purpose only.

6.—In every case where a seizure may be made, the report forwarded to the Government respecting it is to be accompanied with an estimate of what the whole of the property seized may be expected to sell for, as well as an estimate of what the formation of the Illicit Distillery may have probably cost, and its capability of doing mischief.

7.—These respective estimates are, in all possible cases, to be made by a board of Officers, of which the seizing Officer is not to be a member.

8.—If the person giving information be a Prisoner of the Crown, His Excellency will take into his most favorable consideration the claim of such person for the highest indulgence which can, with propriety, be granted to him.

9.—The rewards and indulgence held out by this Notice will moreover be in addition to the share in any penalty or seizure to which the informer may be entitled by the Law of the Colony.

10.—The Regulations respecting Rewards for the Discovery of Illicit Distillation, as contained in the Notices from this Office dated respectively the 8th December, 1842, and 29th April, 1844, are cancelled from this date.

11.—All seizures made by any Revenue Officer shall be immediately reported to the Chief Inspector of Distilleries, who shall cause the proper steps to be taken to prosecute the parties concerned, as also to realize the amount of the goods seized, and divide the same in accordance with the Act.

Indulgences to Convicts.

CIRCUMSTANCES appearing to require a revision of the Regulations under which Tickets of Leave and Conditional Pardons are now granted to Prisoners of the Crown in this Colony, His Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct, that the following modifications be adopted in these Regulations from the date hereof.—

1.—Without reference to the periods fixed by former Regulations, any Convict who may have served three entire years without punishment, and without any record of misconduct being made against him, may apply in the usual manner for a Ticket of Leave; and if on the investigation of his case, he appear to be deserving of the indulgence, and no legal or other impediment exist to his receiving it, a Ticket of Leave will be granted to him, and will remain in force during the Governor's pleasure.

2.—In like manner, any person who may have held a Ticket of Leave with continued good conduct during a period of not less than three years, and may be recommended by not less than three Magistrates or other persons of respectability, known to the Government, may apply, by peti-

tion, to the Governor for a Conditional Pardon.
In promulgating these Regulations, however, the Governor feels it necessary to remark, that his attention has been drawn to the unnecessary labour which is occasioned in the Department of the Principal Superintendent of Convicts, by the irregular and improper applications of persons for indulgences which they are not entitled to ask for; and His Excellency gives this general Notice, that all persons who may hereafter by their applications give unnecessary trouble of any sort, will expose themselves to the loss of the advantage promised by these Regulations, or to other punishment as the case may require.
