For women—16 oz. wheaten bread, 12 oz. fresh meat, 6 oz. vegetables, half oz. salt, quarter oz. tea, one and a half oz sugar, half oz. soap. Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds the rations of female adults; above that age and under fifteen the same as adults.

No. 6. Prisoners confined in gaol—12 oz. wheaten bread, 12 oz maize meal, 4 oz fresh beef, 8 oz. vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz soap. (Ration No. 2 is issued to gaol attendants, and to witnesses, and others waiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, ration No. 8.)

No. 8. Children of femule prisoners confined in gaol—8 oz wheaten bread, 4 oz fresh beef, 1 pint milk, quarter oz yellow soap.

No. 8. Prisoners co. i. ed in lock-up or watch-houses—24 oz wheaten bread.

No. 9. Forage for horses and oxen for all colonial services—8 bs maize or barley, or 10 bs cats, 4 bs brau, 12 bs oaten or caltivated grass hay, and 4 bs wheat straw for each bullock.

No. 10. For the Lighthouses—best clarified sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks each.

No. 11. For men attached to Lighthouses, No. 11. For men attached to Lighthouses, Telegraphs, Water Police, and Harbour Master's boats' crews—24 or wheat bread, 16 oz fresh beef, a quarter oz salt, one quarter oz sap.

No. 12. Fuel and light—sperm and common oil per gallon, mould and dip candles per ib cotton wick ditto.

Military rations of provisions for mounted police or other mounted force, and native police, if required, the same scale as that for surveying parties.

For hospitals, Chief Protector's department, native police, and all other services when ordered —20 per cent flour, fresh beef and mutton, wheaten bread (first, second and third quality), maize meat, bottled port wine, arrowroot, rice, sago, pearl barley, tea, sugar, salt, oatmeal, yellow soap, colonial leaf tobacco, vegetables, milk, vinegar, lime, straw, common oil, dip and mould candles, rum, brandy, porter, and cotton wisk, and consumers.

All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

The flour and bread must be the produce of clean sound colonial wheat, from which on the ration of emigrants, surveying parties; border, police; mounted police, 20 per cent, and on the ration to prisoners of the crown 10 per cent, has been extracted in bran and waste.

Beef and mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the ration of emigrants, and, when the quantity admits of it, this well as the convict ration of beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

Beef to be issued five days and mutton on two days of the week.

The maize meal to be similar in quality to the wheat meal, and to be twice ground:

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—I be wheat flour-or I biscuit equal to 12 of bread; I be salt beeffor I be mutton or 10 oz salt pork, equal to 1 be of fresh heef. fresh beef.

These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several rations.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable pro-

vegetables to be supplied in reasonable pro-portions of potatees, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c. &c.

The supplies for road parties and surveying parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the officer in charge; and in case the whole ration of forage

be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the ration un-dermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12—the hay 5-12-the bran 2-12-the straw 1-12.

The supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

Provisions and forage being required by ra-tions, according to the scales under their re-spective heads, the tenders are required to

The tenders for forege are not required to state the price of the ration for oxen, as when the latter is required one half of the allowance fixed for horses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both horses and oxen.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third, as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

If the board, arbitrators, or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the department requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department or officer in charge of the party or. parties for whom the rations are to be received, shall have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mutct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such n-tice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made or agreed to be made.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers in a complete state, to the Sub-Treasurer for examination, and upon their approval, payment will be made by him at Melbourne.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Sub-Treasurer; and a security of £2000 will be required for the due fulfilment of the contract. No tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as security, stating they are willing to become bound as securities for the contractor accord-ingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the tender being notified, failing of which the contracts will be again advertised or another tender accepted. (TRANSFER OF TICKETS.) ::: . .

T appearing to the Governor, that some IT appearing to the Governor, that some misapprehension exists with respect to the meaning of the 10th clause of the Ticket of Leave Regulations of the 25th May, 1835, which directs "That all applications for the transfer of a Ticket of Leave from one Distance of the case of the series of the reside trict to another, or for permission to reside without the bounds of the District for which the Ticket is granted, must be made to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts through the Petty Sessions of the District for which the Ticket already held is granthd, or through the ricket arready nead is granting, or through the nearest Justice as the case may be;" His Excellency desires it to be explained, that the object of requiring such applications to be transmitted through the Bench of the District was not (as has apparently in some cases been assumed) to enable the Magistrates to regulate the supply of labour in their Districts, but to establish a proper discipline and control over the Convicts, and to prevent such of them as may have laid themselves open to suspiciou from changing their Districts, in order to evade a surveillance, which a knowledge of their character may have rendered necessary; whilst it was always intended that well conducted men should select for themselves any of the rural Districts where they thought, they were

most likely to obtain, profitable employment.
When, therefore, applications for the transfer
of Tickets of Leave are received, they should
be invariably forwarded to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts, for His Excellency's allowance or disallowance; and should the Bench see reason to object to the transfer, the grounds of their objection should be spe-cially stated in their-report, 2007.
