#### Conveyance of Mails, in 1847.

CONVEYANCE being required for the Post Office Mails as undermentioned, for one year from the 1st January 1847, persons disposed to contract for providing the same are invited to transmit their offers in writing to this office by twelve o'clock on Monday, the 2nd day of November next, endorsed "Tender for Conveyance of Mails," viz:—

From Melbourne, by way of Bunnenyong and the Grange, to Portland, and for the return thereof by the same route, once a week.

From the Grange to the Glenelg north of the River Wannon, by a given line of route, and from thence to Mount Gambier, and for the return thereof by the same route, once a fortnight.

From and to Melbourne and the Post Office near Mount Macedon, once a week.

From and to Port Fairy and Fiery Creek, once a week.

From the Post Office in Melbourne to vessels in Hobson's Bay, twice a day; and from vessels in Hobson's Bay to the Post Office in Melbourne as often as mails may arrive, always by the eastern beach.

The time proposed to be occupied on the line of road must be stated in the offer, and as expedition is so desirable a point in Post Office communication, the tender proposing the quickest rate of travelling, if combining cheapness, will of course receive preference.

Contractors are to carry all bags delivered to them under authority of the Postmasters, and to provide dry covering for the mails on horseback, carriage conveyance will be preferred when practicable.

Contractors are to receive letters from parties on the line of road, to be delivered at the Post Office first arrived at, but are not to depart from direct line of road to collect the same, under penalty of five shillings for refusal.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet for fee or hire, to the prejudice of the Post Office revenue, under penalty of five pounds for each offence.

Fixed hours will be arranged for departure and arrival of the mails, under penalty for delay.

Horses, vehicles, and postmen to be subject to approval of the Postmaster at Melbourne.

Each party tendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this office on the day appointed for opening the tenders.

Printed forms of tenders may be had on application at any of the Post Offices, and any further particulars may be learned from the Postmaster at Melbourne.

application should be made for such postage, the newspapers cannot of course be forwarded.

The clause of the act referred to is herewith published for general information, and to which particular attention is in all cases recommended in future.

Postmasters throughout the district of Port Phillip will be careful in the observance of this Regulation, as well in respect of the date of newspapers in restricting their free transit to the seven days, as in respect of the endorsement of "Newspaper only."

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

ANNO DECIMO,

No. I.

An Act to prevent for a limited time, party-processions, and certain other public exhibitions, in the Colony of New South Wales. [Assented to 27th October, 1846.]

**W**HEREAS there are in the Territory of New South Wales various societies or associations, whereof some partake, or are supposed by many persons, to partake of a political character; and whereas it is to be apprehended that any procession or meetings, distinguished by any emblem expressive of party feelings or political events, may create religious and political animosities between different classes of her Majesty's subjects, and are also calculated to occasion riots, tumults, and breaches of the public peace, and it is highly expedient and necessary to guard against the same: Be it therefore enacted by his Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, That from and after the commencement of this Act any body of persons who shall meet and parade together, or join in procession, or who shall assemble in any public-house, tavern, or other place within the Colony, for the purpose of celebrating or commemorating any festival, anniversary, or political event, relating to or connected with any religious or political distinctions, or differences between any classes of her Majesty's subjects, or of demonstrating any such religious or political distinction or difference, and who shall bear, wear, or have among them any fire-arms or other offensive weapons, or shall have publicly exhibited any banner, emblem, flag, or symbol, the display whereof may be calculated to provoke animosity between her Majesty's subjects of different religious persuasions, or who shall be accompanied by any music of a like nature or tendency, shall be and be deemed to be an unlawful assembly, and every person present thereat shall be and be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction thereof be liable to be punished accordingly: Provided that nothing in this Act contained shall extend to any procession or assemblage held in the course of any election of any Member to serve in the Legislative Council of New South Wales.

II. And be it enacted, That any Justice or Justices of the Peace shall and may proceed, with such assistance as shall be necessary, to the place where any procession or meeting of persons hereby declared to be unlawful shall be held or take place, and such Justices, or one of such Justices, or some other person by their or his order shall then and there read or repeat aloud to the persons so assembled a command or notice to disperse in the words or to the effect following—(that is to say)—“Our Sovereign Lady the Queen doth command and charge all persons being here assembled, immediately to disperse themselves, and peaceably to depart,

upon the pains contained in the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled ‘An Act to prevent party processions, and certain other public exhibitions, in the Colony of New South Wales.’”

III. And be it enacted, That the persons so met and assembled together shall forthwith disperse and depart; and in case any one or more of the persons so met or assembled together as aforesaid shall not disperse and depart within the space of one quarter, of an hour from the time of such notice or command being given, it shall be lawful for the same Justice or Justices who shall have read such command or notice, or any other Justice or Justices of the Peace, to cause the person or persons so refusing or neglecting to disperse or depart to be apprehended by a warrant for that purpose, to be signed by him or them; and such offender or offenders shall thereupon be proceeded against in a summary way for such offence, before any two or more Justices of the Peace, before whom he or they may be brought; and such Justices are hereby authorised to hear and determine the complaint, and every person convicted thereof, on the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, shall be committed to any gaol or house of correction, and there be imprisoned for any time not exceeding one calendar month, and for a second or any subsequent conviction against the provisions of this Act for any time not exceeding three calendar months.

IV. And be it enacted, That this Act shall commence and take effect from and after the passing thereof, and shall thenceforward continue in force for three years, but no longer.

## NEWSPAPERS.

WHEREAS much carelessness has of late been evinced in the posting of newspapers, as well for transit by land as by sea, by inattention in a very great degree to the Regulations laid down for the conveyance of newspapers in the 8th clause of the Post Office Act, 5th William IV., No. 24: And whereas the Postmaster-General has of late returned to Melbourne from Sydney, for postage, many newspapers posted in disregard of this Act in the Port Phillip district, but the newspapers in themselves not affording any guide as to whom application should be made for such postage, the newspapers cannot of course be forwarded.

The clause of the act referred to is herewith published for general information, and to which particular attention is in all cases recommended in future.

Postmasters throughout the district of Port Phillip will be careful in the observance of this Regulation, as well in respect of the date of newspapers in restricting their free transit to the seven days, as in respect of the endorsement of "Newspaper only."

## Act of Council 5 William IV. No 24.

Clause 8. Provided always, and be it enacted, That all newspapers printed in the colony, if transmitted within seven days from the date thereof, and all printed newspapers received from abroad, shall, if enclosed in an envelope open at both ends, be received, conveyed, and delivered free of all postage whatever: Provided however, that no such newspaper shall contain any note, letter, memorandum, or other thing or writing therein or thereon, excepting only the direction on the outside thereof, and that there shall be also marked on the outside of all newspapers printed in the colony, the words "Newspaper only," or "Newspapers only," as the case may be: And in case any such newspaper or newspapers as last mentioned shall be put into any post office at any time after the expiration of seven days from the date thereof, or if any such newspaper shall be transmitted in any way contrary to the provisions of this act, each and every such newspaper, or packet containing newspapers, shall be charged with postage as a letter or packet, according to its weight.

## Closing of Ship Mails.

VERY much inconvenience being experienced as well by the public as the post-office, in the want of some positive point or place for faithful and daily information as to the projected departure of vessels from the harbour, and so, of the closing of post-office mails for despatch by such vessels: Commanders of Vessels, Ship Agents, and Mercantile houses generally, will be rendering a service of much public utility, if, by their clerks or messengers, as they may be visiting the post-office, or by information given to the letter carriers in the rounds through the town, they will hereafter keep the post-office advised as to projected departures, or further delays of vessels, or of ultimate clearance at the Customs.

By this means the list kept suspended at the post-office window may be truly depended upon, and care shall be at all times taken to keep the list revised under the latest information.

CIRCULAR, Downing-street,

SIR,—Circumstances have induced me to reconsider that part of Lord Stanley's General In-

structions of 7th March, 1842, which direct that the Half Salary of an Officer absent from his duties for the last half of the leave of absence originally granted to him should not be paid until after his return to the Colony.

I find that since that rule was established, almost every Officer who has been absent on leave in this Country, has applied for a relaxation of it in his favor, and has been able to allege such circumstances as to induce the Secretary of State to comply with the application. I infer from this that the rule has been found either not to answer its purpose, or to effect that purpose at the expense of too much inconvenience and embarrassment to individuals as compared with any advantage attending it, to warrant its being carried practically into operation. But as it appears to me very undesirable that a rule of this description should be maintained nominally after it has become in reality a dead letter, I have decided on abolishing it and allowing an Officer, absent on leave in this country, to receive here his half salary for the whole period of that leave, as it may from time to time become due. At the same time the other instructions contained in Lord Stanley's Despatch of 7th March, 1842, and all other regulations established to prevent abuse in the application for or grant of leave of absence, are to be considered in full force.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same. &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a certain Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the fifth and sixth years of the Reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act for the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land," it was, amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor of New South Wales to prorogue the Legislative Council thereof from time to time, and dissolve the same by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever He should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Legislative Council was convened, and met for the despatch of business, on Tuesday, the eighth day of September last, and has since continued in Session, and it has now become expedient to prorogue the same for the period hereinafter mentioned: Now I, Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, the Governor aforesaid, do hereby, in pursuance of the power and authority so in me vested, prorogue the said Legislative Council from the present date until Tuesday, the fifteenth day of December next ensuing.

An Act to prevent for a limited time, party-processions, and certain other public exhibitions, in the Colony of New South Wales. [Assented to 27th October, 1846.]

WHEREAS there are in the Territory of New South Wales various societies or associations, whereof some partake, or are sup-

posed by many persons, to partake of a political character; and whereas it is to be apprehended that any procession or meetings, distinguished by any emblem expressive of party feelings or political events, may create religious and political animosities between different classes of her Majesty's subjects, and are also calculated to occasion riots, tumults, and breaches of the public peace, and it is highly expedient and necessary to guard against the same: Be it therefore enacted by his Excellency the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, That from and after the commencement of this Act any body of persons who shall meet and parade together, or join in procession, or who shall assemble in any public-house, tavern, or other place within the Colony, for the purpose of celebrating or commemorating any festival, anniversary, or political event, relating to or connected with any religious or political distinctions, or differences between any classes of her Majesty's subjects, or of demonstrating any such religious or political distinction or difference, and who shall bear, wear, or have among them any fire-arms or other offensive weapons, or shall have publicly exhibited any banner, emblem, flag, or symbol, the display whereof may be calculated to provoke animosity between her Majesty's subjects of different religious persuasions, or who shall be accompanied by any music of a like nature or tendency, shall be and be deemed to be an unlawful assembly, and every person present thereat shall be and be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction thereof be liable to be punished accordingly: Provided that nothing in this Act contained shall extend to any procession or assemblage held in the course of any election of any Member to serve in the Legislative Council of New South Wales.

11. And be it enacted, That any Justice or Justices of the Peace shall and may proceed, with such assistance as shall be necessary, to the place where any procession or meeting of persons hereby declared to be unlawful shall be held or take place, and such Justices, or one of such Justices, or some other person by their or his order shall then and there read or repeat aloud to the persons so assembled a command or notice to disperse in the words or to the effect following—(that is to say)—"Our Sovereign Lady the Queen doth command and charge all persons being here assembled, immediately to disperse themselves, and peaceably to depart, upon the pains contained in the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled 'An Act to prevent party processions, and certain other public exhibitions, in the Colony of New South Wales.'"

111. And be it enacted, That the persons so met and assembled together shall forthwith disperse and depart; and in case any one or more of the persons so met or assembled together as aforesaid shall not disperse and depart within the space of one quarter, of an hour from the time of such notice or command being given, it shall be lawful for the same Justice or Justices who shall have read such command or notice, or any other Justice or Justices of the Peace, to cause the person or persons so refusing or neglecting to disperse or depart to be apprehended by a warrant for that purpose, to be signed by him or them; and such offender or offenders shall thereupon be proceeded against in a summary way for such offence, before any two or more Justices of the Peace, before whom he or they may be brought; and such Justices are hereby authorised to hear and determine the complaint, and every person convicted thereof, on the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, shall be committed to any gaol or house of correction, and there be



imprisoned for any time not exceeding one calendar month, and for a second or any subsequent conviction against the provisions of this Act for any time not exceeding three calendar months.

IV. And be it enacted, That this Act shall commence and take effect from and after the passing thereof, and shall thenceforward continue in force for three years, but no longer.

SIR,—Circumstances have induced me to reconsider that part of Lord Stanley's General Instructions of 7th March, 1842, which direct that the Half Salary of an Officer absent from his duties for the last half of the leave of absence originally granted to him should not be paid until after his return to the Colony.

I find that since that rule was established, almost every Officer who has been absent on leave in this Country, has applied for a relaxation of it in his favor, and has been able to allege such circumstances as to induce the Secretary of State to comply with the application. I infer from this that the rule has been found either not to answer its purpose, or to effect that purpose at the expense of too much inconvenience and embarrassment to individuals as compared with any advantage attending it, to warrant its being carried practically into operation. But as it appears to me very undesirable that a rule of this description should be maintained nominally after it has become in reality a dead letter, I have decided on abolishing it and allowing an Officer, absent on leave in this country, to receive here his-half salary for the whole period of that leave, as it may from time to time become due. At the same time the other instructions contained in Lord Stanley's Despatch of 7th March, 1842, and all other regulations established to prevent abuse in the application for or grant of leave of absence, are to be considered in full force.

**Proclamation.**

By his Excellency Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by a certain proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, the Crown Lands adjacent to, and beyond the limits of Location, in the District of Port Phillip, were divided into four Districts, and it is deemed expedient further to subdivide the same: Now, therefore, I, the Governor aforesaid, in virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim, that the Crown Lands adjacent to and beyond the limits of location in the said District of Port-Phillip have been divided into five Districts, and that the following are the boundaries of the same respectively, viz:—

1. Gipps Land District—Bounded on the south and east by the sea; on the north by a line running in a westerly direction from Cape Howe to the source of the nearest tributary of the Murray, and the Australian Alps; again on the west by the Alps and a line south to Anderson's Inlet.

2. Murray District—Bounded on the south and west by the River Goulburn to its junction with the Murray; on the north and north-east by the River Murray and its tributaries; and on the south-east by the dividing Range (Alps.)

3. Western-Port District—Bounded on the south by the Coast from Anderson's Inlet to the South Eastern limit of the County of Bourke, further by the eastern and northern boundaries of the said County to the River Werribee; on the west by the River Werribee and a north-westerly line to Mount Cole, thence by a line to the source of the Avoca River, by the Avoca River to Lake Bael Bael, and thence by a line due north to the River Murray; on the north and north-east by the River Murray to the Goulburn River, following the course of the latter River to its source; and on the east by a line running due south to Anderson's Inlet.

4. Portland Bay District—Bounded on the west by part of the South Australian frontier; on the north by the range dividing the waters falling into the Murray from the waters falling into the Glenelg and other Rivers to the eastward of Portland Bay, extending from the head of the Glenelg to Mount Cole; on the east by part of the Western Port District and the County of Grant; and on the south by the sea coast, exclusive of the County of Normanby.

5. Wimmera District—Bounded on the east by a line from Mount Cole to the source of the Avoca River, thence by the Avoca River to Lake Bael Bael, thence by a line due north to the River Murray; on the north by the River Murray to the South Australian frontier; on the west by the South Australian frontier to the range dividing the waters falling into the Murray from those falling into the Glenelg and other Rivers to the eastward of Portland Bay; and on the south by that range to Mount Cole.

CIRCULAR. Downing-street,  
1st May, 1846.

SIR.—Circumstances have induced me to reconsider that part of Lord Stanley's General Instructions of 7th March, 1842, which direct that the Half Salary of an Officer absent from his duties for the last half of the leave of absence originally granted to him should not be paid until after his return to the Colony.

I find that since that rule was established, almost every Officer who has been absent on leave in this Country, has applied for a relaxation of it in his favor, and has been able to allege such circumstances as to induce the Secretary of State to comply with the application. I infer from this that the rule has been found either not to answer its purpose, or to effect that purpose at the expense of too much inconvenience and embarrassment to individuals as compared with any advantage attending it, to warrant its being carried practically into operation. But as it appears to me very undesirable that a rule of this description should be maintained nominally after it has become in reality a dead letter, I have decided on abolishing it and allowing an Officer, absent on leave in this country, to receive here his half salary for the whole period of that leave, as it may from time to time become due. At the same time the other instructions contained in Lord Stanley's Despatch of 7th March, 1842, and all other regulations established to prevent abuse in the application for or grant of leave of absence, are to be considered in full force.

WHEREAS by a certain proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, the Crown Lands adjacent to, and beyond the limits of Location, in the District of Port Phillip, were divided into four Districts, and it is deemed expedient further to subdivide the same: Now, therefore, I, the Governor aforesaid, in virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim, that the Crown Lands adjacent to and beyond the limits of location in the said District of Port Phillip have been divided into five Districts, and that the following are the boundaries of the same respectively, viz:—

1. Gipps Land District—Bounded on the south and east by the sea; on the north by a line running in a westerly direction from Cape Howe to the source of the nearest tributary of the Murray, and the Australian Alps; again on the west by the Alps and a line south to Anderson's Inlet.
