PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS
FITZ Rov, Knight Companion of the
Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order,
Captain-General and Governor-inChief of the Territory of New South
Wales and its Dependencies, and ViceAdmiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

THEREAS by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the fifth and sixth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the carriage of Passengers in Merchant Vessels," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, or Officer administering the government of any British Colony, (other than the Colonies therein specifically provided for,) to declare, by Preclamation to be issued for that purpose, that the said Act, except as therein is excepted, shall be extended, and shall apply to the carriage of Passengers by sea from any such Colony to such places as may by him be named for the purpose in such Proclamation; and thereupon the said Act shall be thenceforth so extended, and shall apply accordingly;-And whereas it is, by the said Act, further enacted. that it shall be lawful for the Governor, or Officer administering the government of any of the British Colonies, to which the said Act, as respects the carriage of Passergers by sea therefrom, shall have been extended by Proclamation, as thereinbefore is mentioned by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be by him from time to time issued for that purpose, to declare the rule of computation by which the length of the voyage of any ships carrying Passengers from such Colony to any other place shall be estimated for the purposes of the said Act: Now, I, SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ Roy, the Governor aforesaid, by this my Proclamation issued for that purpose, do declare that, subject to the exceptions

therein contained, the said Act shall be extended, and shall apply to the carriage of Passengers by sea from New South Wales aforesaid to any one of the places hereinafter named; and I do hereby further declare, that the following shall be the rule of computation by which the length of the voyage of any ship carrying Passengers from New South Wales to each such place shall be estimated for the purposes of the said Act, (that is to say):—

For a voyage to the United Kingdom—One hundred and eighty days.

For a voyage to the Cape of Good Hope—One hundred and ten days.

For a voyage to Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay—One hundred days.

For a voyage to Ceylon—One hundred days. For a voyage to China—One hundred days.

For a voyage to Manilla or Batavia—Ninety days. For a voyage to Manilla or Singapore—Ninety days. For a voyage to the Western Coast of America—Sixty days.

For a voyage to the Eastern Coast of America—One hundred days.

For a voyage to Tabiti, or the South Sea Islands—Fifty days.

For a voyage to Western Australia—Forty days. For a voyage to South Australia—Twenty-five days. For a voyage to New Zealand—Twenty-one days.

LL persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their accounts through the proper channel, before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of public monies, will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st of December, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands respectively up to that date, so that the entire Revenue collected by each, may be credited in the Accounts of the year within which it was received.

The Heads of Departments and other Officers, who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence, are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable, and with all convenient despatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of December, to pay into the Colonial Treasury, the unexpended balance of such advances that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to 31st proximo.

They will also, as soon as practicable, after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of ex-

penses incurred within the same, which do not admit of being previously settled, so that if possible all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month

after its termination.

The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and to report through the proper channel, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith, on the part of the Government Officers concerned.

FAMILIES OF EXILES.

IS Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct the re-publication of the following Notice.

By His Excellency's Command, E. DEAS THOMSON.

HER Majesty's Government having determined to defray a moiety of the expense of conveying to this Colony the families of those married persons who arrived at Port Phillip as "Exiles" from Great Britain, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified that, in any case in which the Exile shall place in next, the materials of the old Guard House, near the the hands of the Local Government a sum sufficient to cover one-half the expense of conveying his wife and children to the Colony, the other half will be defrayed by the Home Government.

Persons of this class, therefore, who are desirous of availing themselves of this indulgence, will make application accordingly to His Honor the Superintendent of Port Phillip, if still resident in that District, or otherwise to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts in Sydney.

As however, it will not be possible to predetermine the actual expense of providing passages for each such family, the applicants will be required to deposit in the Colony such a sum of money as will cover one moiety of the probable expense, calculated according to the following scale, and the balance (if any) after paying a moiety of the actual expense

incurred, will be returned to the parties, namely :-

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct the re-publication of the following Notice.

By His Excellency's Command. E. DEAS THOMSON.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that Her Majesty's Government have determined to revive the practice of forwarding to this Colony, at the public expense, the wives and families of married convicts who have become free by pardon or otherwise, or who have obtained tickets of leave, and who may be recommended by the GOVERNOR as worthy of that indulgence.

2. Those persons who have already obtained tickets of leave, or any higher degree of liberty, or whose terms of transportation have expired, and who may be desirous of being joined by their families, will make application in the annexed form, to the Principal Superintendent of Convicts.

3. Every such application must be supported by the recommendation of two or more respectable persons known to the Government, and satisfactory assurance must be afforded that the applicant has the means of supporting his family.

4. In like manner, Convicts at present under sentence will be allowed to apply for the above indulgence, as soon as they have received tickets of leave, but not before.

5. Those persons whose applications were forwarded to the Secretary of State under the regulations of 6th May, 1833, but were not then complied with, will be required to make fresh applications in the accompanying form.
