DEPASTURING LICENSES AND ASSESSMENT ON STOCK.

CONSIDERABLE sums being still due to the Government for Depasturing Licenses, and for arrears of Assessment on Stock pastured on Crown Lands beyond the boundaries of location, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be intimated to all persons thus in default, that unless they forthwith pay up all arrears and take out Licenses for the runs they occupy, the Government will be reluctantly compelled to proceed for penalties, and to dispossess them, under the Act of Parliament 9 and 10 Victoria, cap. 404.

And all parties thus in arrear are reminded, that under the proposed Order in Council, the *licensed occupants* of Crown Lands, at the time the same may come into effect, will alone be entitled to demand o obtain without competition leases of their

It is also to be distinctly understood, that while no sum beyond that which has been especially voted for the purpose by the Legislative Council can be guaranteed to any existing Schools, the Governor, in consequence of the great and rapidly encreasing demands upon the Government under the Regulalations in question, deems it necessary to announce, for general information, that he cannot undertake to place upon the Estimates any addition to the Expenditure for Schools of this description, beyond the amount for the whole of the present year, calculated in proportion to the payments for the first quarter of the same.

EFERRING to the Notice from this Office, dated 30th December last, containing a Letter from the Deputy Surveyor General, reporting the result of his Expedition to explore the course of the River Boyne, His Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct the publication of the following Letter from Mr. Assistant Surveyor Burnett, reporting the progress made by him in tracing down that river to the point where it receives the tide water of the ocean.

Camp at Hawkins' Station, Booginbah, 13th April, 1847.

With reference to your letter of the 12th January last, No. 47-9, directing me to trace down the river followed by the Deputy Surveyor General and myself, to latitude about 26 ° 40', I have now the honor to report to you my proceedings, in compliance with these instructions.

In consequence of the very wet weather, I was, as I stated in my former letters, obliged to postpone the departure of my party from Brisbane, until the 1st ultimo, and on the 20th we arrived at this station, having been somewhat delayed by breaking the pole of the dray in a swampy part of the road.

On the 22nd, I left this place with three mounted men, each leading a pack horse, and returned upon our old track as far as Booginbah. I left the creek here, in order to avoid the broken country which we had before passed over, and crossed, in a north-easterly direction, into the valley of a large tributary.

Then proceeding north-west through a fine open country, we came to the stony flat, (called by the blacks Binbin,) from which we had commenced our return on the former expedition. Leaving our old scrub along its banks.

encampment about a mile on the left, I proceeded to the west end of the large briccolo scrub which surrounds the seven hills, and ascended an open hill indicated to me by the Deputy Surveyor General as a point from which a good view of the country before us might probably be obtained. From this point I saw what appeared to be the valley of a large stream, about fifteen miles to the westward, and therefore continued to travel down the valley of the Boorinbah west 14° north, passing for some distance over a continuation of the stony flat, and on the morning of the 25th, after travelling about a mile, I had the satisfaction of reaching the Boyne. This fine river was here about three hundred yards wide; above us was a sheet of water extending as far as the eye could reach, and immediately below us a rocky fall, on which we crossed with some difficulty, there being still a considerable stream of water in the river. My object in crossing was to ascertain the position of the confluence of the Dawson of Leichhardt, which I expected to have found hereabouts, but it appeared that we had come upon the Boyne below that point.

I continued my jaurney along the left bank of the river till the 28th, when a very large and dense pine scrub compelled me to re-cross it. I kept near it on the right bank for the remainder of that day, encamping on a small chain of ponds in latitude 25 ° 18' about a mile beyond a large creek coming in from the southward, having during the last three

days been chiefly making easting. By endeavouring to keep near the river, we had been making but slow progress, in consequence of the great delay occasioned by crossing or heading round the creeks and numerous deep gullies which every where run into it; and as the country on the banks of the river appeared to become still more broken as we went down, I determined upon following its general direction, if possible, without approaching it too closely. I therefore, on the 29th, started in an easterly direction about three miles, and then went north-east, until we were stopped by a large pine scrub. We went along the edge of this scrub for some distance to the eastward, but I found that it turned considerably to the south of east, and there were no symptoms of our getting near the end of it. A heavy storm coming on, obliged us to encamp as speedily as possible, but next morning we retraced our steps for a few miles, and passed on the west side of the scrub.

I then kept a northerly course, and on the 31st came upon a scrub, in which I saw flood marks. which convinced me of the vicinity of the river, and on penetrating the scrub for some distance, I met with a mangrove creek. I then returned and skirted the scrub till it terminated on the bank of the river, which is here very wide, with a considerable rise and fall of tide. We then went along the open bank of the river till stopped by another scrub, just opposite the upper end of a large island, where, finding water in a gully, we encamped. The water of the river was too salt for use; the latitude of this camp was 24 ° 53' 50."

Next morning we followed down the river for about six miles, having gone round the scrubs and some small mangrove creeks, when after crossing a swamp, in which I nearly lost my horse, we came to another, too wet even for a man to travel over, and beyond it was a large salt water creek with a dense

From my knowledge of the general character of | however, we passed for several miles over a very line the coast country, I now had no hopes of being able to proceed with horses, as even could we have gone round to the head of the tide in the creek before us, to do which, and come back, would likely have occupied a day; we should in all probability, have met with another similar obstacle in the course of two or three miles further. The whole country was very flat and low, and no rising ground could be seen in any direction. I also considered that the object of the expedition was now fully accomplished; the intention of the Deputy Surveyor General having been merely to reach the tide, the limit of which we were now considerably below, and sufficiently near the coast to be perfectly certain that the outlet of the Boyne was in Hervey's Bay, most probably at the spot where Flinders noticed two shallow inlets, but which he did not examine.

I was desirous in returning, to keep near the river, to examine that part which I had not seen in going down; but after travelling up it for some miles, we were again compelled to leave it from the broken country and pine scrubs which we found near its banks, and to return as directly as we could to the large creek, near the confluence of which, we had before struck off from the river.

I now determined upon following up this creek, in order to ascertain the nature of the country to the eastward and the practicability of a line of road cutting off the great bend made by the river.

The creek soon separated into two branches, the westernmost of which we followed to its source in a south-westerly direction, when it again became necessary to alter our course.

Before us was a dense mass of briccolo scrub extending for many miles; and on the sonth-east an exceedingly broken country, intersected by pine scrubs; but to the east there was an appearance of flat forest country. To reach this was not a very easy matter, but after following the range for some distance to the northward and eastward we found a steep spur, by which we were able to descend into the valley of the eastern branch of the creek we had followed up. We here found a very open level country, with the finest sheep pasturage I had seen on the journey.

The country became rather indifferent and more thickly wooded towards the source of this creek, from which we crossed over a very low bidge, immediately to the east of a high rocky mountain, but were again intercepted by a pine scrub. Ascending a steep peak near us I found that we were upon the division of the Wide Bay waters from those of the Boyne, and that the pine scrub was not continuous, consisting of two patches, between which, we easily passed, following down a small stream, one of the heads of Munya Creek.

About twenty miles down this creek in a southeasterly direction, we came to a deserted but which had been erected by Mr. Eales when he occupied the Wide Bay country; I also observed another on the opposite side of the creek, and about five miles further down, we came to a third but at the confluence of a creek from the westward.

I endeavoured to cross over to BooginLah by following up this tributary, but the country became so very mountainous and broken, and there was so much scrub near the range, that I returned and port, I cannot at present say, nor could I have pursued a southerly course over a very hilly and

open country, but it seems doubtful whether the supply of water is permanent.

We crossed the range by a very easy pass, about six miles south-east from this station, where we arrived yesterday evening.

In spite of all the care which I had taken of the horses one of them completely knocked up, and we had to leave him on the Wide Bay side of the range, but I have no doubt that we shall be able to get him in a day or two.

The River Boyne, which must always contain an abundant supply of fresh water, runs between steep banks, so high, that although I observed marks of the recent flood, about fifty or sixty feet above the ordinary level of the stream, the banks do not seem to have been over-flowed, excepting at the navigable part, where they become lower. The flood had, however, run back up the gullies and creeks for great distances, and had remained so long, that in several of the creeks I found a cake of mud an inch thick, which had been deposited while the water remained still. The banks of the river are open, and its bed which is sandy and rocky, is generally clear and free from the casuarina which generally fill up the beds of the eastern streams.

The country lying immediately on the River, is generally indifferent, and rather broken; the flats, where they do occur, are poor and sandy, and there is not a good alluvial flat to be seen. On the tributaries, both large and small, there is however, generally good grazing country. On the north-west side as far down as the large pine scrub, and on the south-east side to about lat 25 ° 15'. Below this the country was very poor; grass was frequently replaced by the grass trees; gum, wattle, and teatree scrubs abounded; and poor tea-tree swamps were occasionally met with. At our farthest encampment there was plenty of grass, but of bad quality, similar to that generally found close to the coast. Of arable land, there is hardly any on the Boyne; even the river brushes seem to be of inferior quality to those in other places; indeed, on the whole journey, I have seen little land which could be profitably cul-

On the creek we followed up on our return, there was a good open grazing country, and also in the valley of Munya Creek, on the Wide Bay side as far down as the last but we saw; below this it becomes poor and broken, but it may open out again lower down.

The formation of the country was chiefly trap (much of it porous like that on the Binbin flat) granite and quartz rock, and near the coast some sandstone was found.

The best line of road from Brisbane to the lower part of the Boyne (if a good pass can be found across the range between the Brisbane and Wide Bay waters) would be up Munya Creek and down the eastern branch of the creek we followed up, crossing the range, which is there very low, where we did.

Wide Bay affords a convenient port for all this part of the country, as the river is, I believe, navigable for steamers and coasting vessels for a considerable distance, and good roads can be got to the head of the navigation."

How far the Boyne may be available as a shipping ascertained even had I been able to reach the coast. indifferent country; before crossing the range I therefore beg, that I may be allowed to proceed there with my boat, for the purpose of determining this point, as it is a matter of great importance to the settlers in this part of the country, that they should know which is the best port near them.

No stations have as yet been established beyond latitude $26\,^\circ$; this, which is the northernmost, is in latitude $26\,^\circ$ 1' 48". I believe, however, that much of the country I have been over will be taken up very shortly.
