It is to be understood that the Mails are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance, and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the con-

veyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise, to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Contractors will be strictly bound not to assign any portion of their Contract without consent of the Postmaster-General.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General, from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering or an agent for him, must attend at this office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signature of two respectable and solvent persons, engaging to enter into a bond with the Contractor for the safety of the Mails and the due performance of the Contract, and every stipulation therein.

The hours of starting from each Post Office or stage and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

Printed forms of Tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

REPAIR OF THE WINDSOR AND RICHMOND ROAD, BETWEEN FAIRFIELD AND THE RICHMOND COMMON.

TENDERS will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock of Monday, the 11th October, marked "Tenders for repairing the Windsor and Richmond Road," from persons willing to contract for effecting the following repairs on that portion of the Windsor and Richmond Road, lying between Fairfield and the Richmond Common, a distance of about one mile and a quarter.

One cross-drain to be made in the hollow, nearly opposite Fairfield, to be six feet wide, one foot nine inches high, and to extend the entire width of the road (30 feet), the bottom of the drain to be three feet six inches below the surface of the road, a cut to be made from the drain of a sufficient depth, width, and length to allow the free departure of the water, to be metalled nine inches in depth; two bridges, 30 feet in width, and 95 feet and 91 feet in length, to be stripped, new slabbed, fenced, and metalled 9 inches in depth.

Three cross-drains, near the Common, to be stripped, cleared out, and re-slabbed with the best of the slabs taken off the two bridges; the slabs to be well jointed, solidly bedded, and firmly dowelled to the bracers, the ends of the slabs in particular to have a solid bearing; the three drains to be metalled 9 inches in depth.

650 superficial yards of slabbing for the cross-drain and the two bridges to be of good sound iron bark, to be at least two and a half inches thick, and in length to suit the distance apart of the bracers, to be close jointed, solidly bedded, and firmly dowelled to the bracers, the end of each slab to have a solid bearing.

24 rods of side sleepers for the new drain, and the two bridges, to be one foot in diameter, excepting for the new drain, to be in lengths of not less than 20 feet, of good sound iron bark, to be adzed flat on the under side, so as to bed solid on the slabs, and to be firmly dowelled through the slabs to the outer bracers.

22½ rods of a two-railed fence for the two bridges, the posts to be adzed 5 inches square, to be firmly morticed into the side sleepers 9 feet apart, and

well stayed both in and outside, the end posts to be one foot in diameter, without bark, and to be sunk at least three feet in the ground at the ends of the sleepers; the tops of all the posts to be 4 feet above the upper side of the sleepers; the rails to be of good straight box saplings, of not less than one foot in circumference without the bark; the upper rails to be inserted into the posts six inches from their tops, the under rail eighteen inches lower.

195 cubic yards of Limestone metal for the two bridges and the four drains; to be broken so as to pass through a two and a half inch ring, and on no pretence to be subjected to the influence of fire.

134 lineal yards of Roadway to be reformed 30 feet in width, and to be metalled 20 feet wide; the metal to have an average depth of 7½ inches; the road to have a curved fall of 15 inches towards the water tables. The metal to be similar to that described above for the bridges.

300 cubic yards of sandstone rock, to be quarried off from the brow of the hill opposite Fairfield, to be broken up and laid down on any part of the hill pointed out by the officer superintending.

The metal to be kept in its place by the Contractor till properly bound.

All the metal on the bridges and drains to receive a coat of gravel three inches in depth.

A safe and uninterrupted passage to be kept open to the public, while the works are being performed.

The whole of the works herein mentioned are to be completed, at the entire risk and cost of the Contractor or Contractors, within six months from the date of the signing of the bond, to the satisfaction of the Surveyor General, or the officer superintending.

Payment will be made at the rate of 75 per cent, as the work proceeds.

Forms of Tender may be obtained on application at the Surveyor General's Office, Sydney; and at the foot of every Tender there must be a memorandum, signed by the party tendering, and two responsible persons as sureties, agreeing to be responsible for the due performance of the contract, in the event of the Tender being accepted, and undertaking, in that event, that they will severally execute, and deliver at the office of the Civil Crown Solicitor, in Sydney, within fifteen days from the notification of acceptance, a Bond to Her Majesty in the penal sum of three hundred pounds, for securing such performance; otherwise such Tender will not be taken into consideration.
